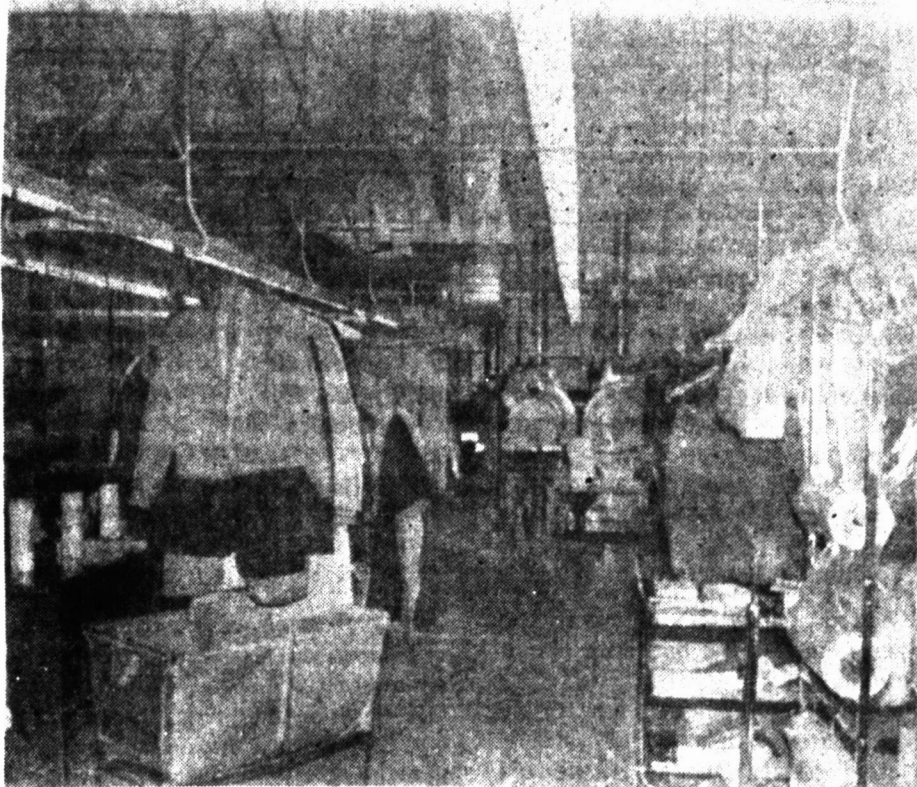

## Broncos defeat McLean Tigers

The Clarendon Broncos defeated the McLean Tigers at McLean Friday night 45-0. It was a display of a ball control offensive with some passing that completely destroyed the Tigers.

The opening march by the Broncos was a hint of things to come. The Broncos received the opening kick off and marched 75 yards for their first touchdown despite two penalties. The drive took almost 6 minutes. James Ariola, Marcus Smith, Daniel Ford, Brad Shadle and Wes Hatley all shared in the ball carrying as Smith scored from the 2 yard line behind the blocking of Neal Bellah, Mike Murray, Robb Brewer, Steven Phillips, Craig Wright, Mike Moore, Monte Hollar, and Jake LaGrone.

On McLean's first series, the Tigers fumbled and Smith recovered on McLeans 25 yard line. The Broncos quickly struck for 6 points as Smith once again scored from the three yard line. Hatley ran the two points conversion in and the Broncos lead was up to 14-0.

The second period saw the Bronco defense continue to shine and the offense rang up their third touchdown as a 35 yard pass from Hatley to LaGrone set the Broncos up on the Tigers 2 yard line. Smith once again covered the final two yards to up the

Bronco lead to 20-0.

The Tigers received the kick off to open the second half and were unable to move the ball. The Broncos took over on their forty yard line and once again scored with the help of a 32 yard pass from Hatley to LaGrone. Ford scored from the three yard line to make the score 26-0. Ashley Nixon recovered a Tiger fumble at the McLean 30 yard line and Arthur Harris covered the last 12 yards to make the score 32-0.

The Broncos weren't finished scoring in the third quarter as defensive halfback Jason Klinnert intercepted a pass and went 25 yards down the side line to make the score Broncos 38 - McLean 0.

The fourth quarter saw Ariola return a punt 76 yards for the last touchdown and Nixon kicked the point after to make the final score 45-0. Hatley caught the punt and handed off to Ariola and Ariola got behind the wall and went untouched to end the scoring.

The Broncos open their home schedule this Friday night in Clarendon against the always tough White Deer Bucks. The opener is also Homecoming. The Broncos and Bucks both are 1-1 for the season.

## Crime prevention meeting held Sept. 9

Approximately 60 people met in the courtroom of the old courthouse on September 9th to hear a program on crime prevention. Stan Kropff, Regional Crime Coordinator from Amarillo was the keynote speaker. Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson also gave a short program on how to protect your neighborhood.

The crime rate in the United States is ever creeping upward. Burglary is the fastest growing felony. A prowler enters someone's home every fifteen seconds. Of the \$400 million worth of goods stolen every year, only 52 is recovered. Eighty percent of the rapes, injuries, and assaults committed take place during a burglary.

Statistics show that 75% of burglars have prior convictions. The reason is because burglary is so easy.

It is not only the urban communities who are victimized by burglars. Burglaries and larceny theft within the rural areas and small communities have increased by 13% recently. There are many ways in which to

protect your property from thieves. One of the most important is to know your neighbor. Make them aware of your family's living habits. Get to know their's equally well.

The home with a "lived-in" look or an "at home" look is a deterrent to burglars. Follow these rules if you're only leaving your home for a few minutes:

- Lock the doors and windows
- At night, leave a light on in locations not visible from windows
- Leave a radio playing
- DO NOT LEAVE NOTES ON YOUR DOOR
- Shut and lock garage door
- Keep a list of serial numbers on

all property which can be easily carried from your home.

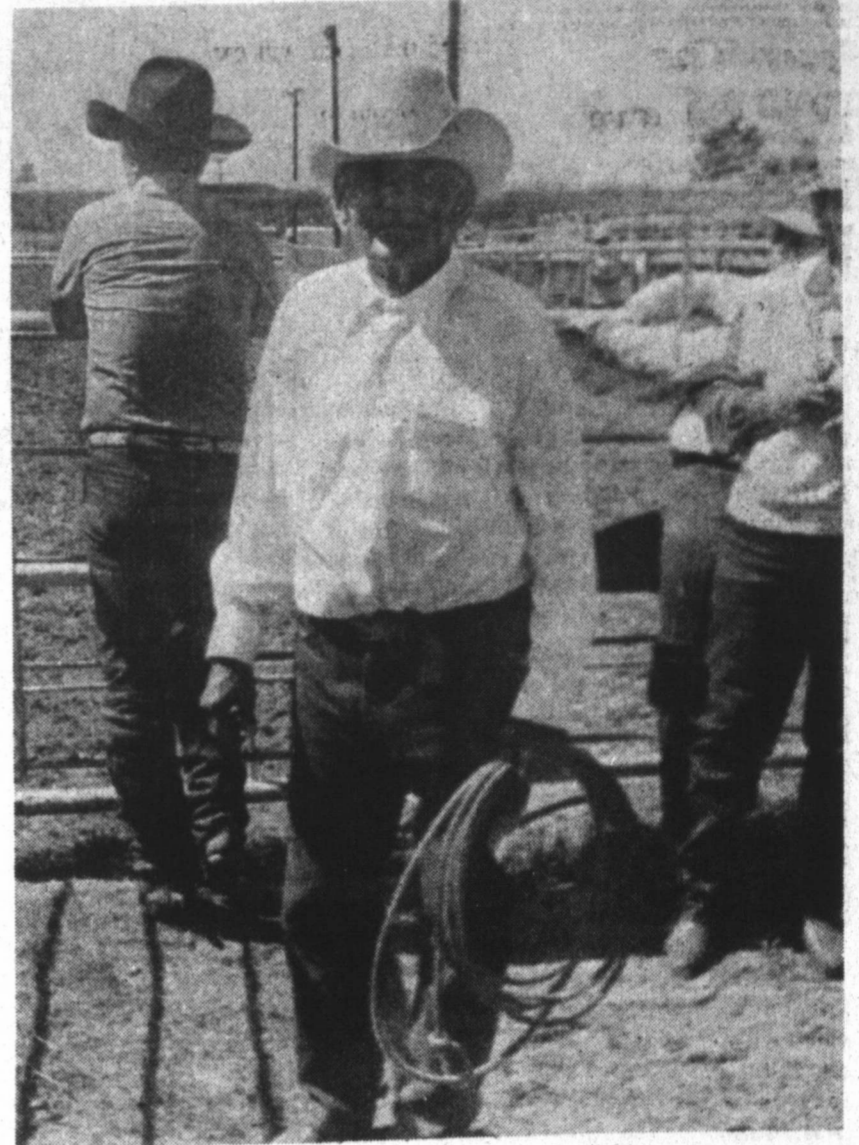

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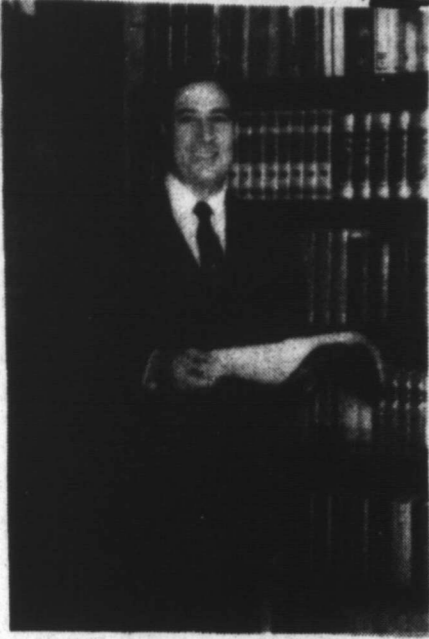

## From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



First of all a Christian who walks in the Spirit will experience the filling of the Spirit. (Ephesians 5:18) Being Spirit filled does not result reveling and confusion that is associated with being filled with wine (not the tongues confusion of the pentecostals). It is actually quite the contrary. By definition the filling of the Holy Spirit is the unhindered indwelling of the Holy Spirit. Sins that quench and grieve the Spirit are not present in a Spirit-filled life. Therefore the Holy Spirit may empower us to witness, give victory over sin and lead us to do the will of God. That is Spirit-filling.

The second evidence of a Spirit-controlled life is the presence of joy. (Ephesians 5:19.) The result of the Spirit within is a joy that overflows to the outside and results in the singing of spiritual songs and making melody in the heart to the Lord. The Spirit centered life is not a depressed life but rather one that experiences a "joy unspeakable and full of glory." (Peter 1:8).

A third evidence of Spirit control is a spirit of thanksgiving. (Ephesians 5:20.) We are told to give "thanks always for all things." There are those who claim to be Spirit-filled and yet cannot even thank God for His daily provisions. Lord help us to be a grateful people.

Finally our Spiritual walk is evidence by submission (Ephesians 5:21). A submission to one another that considers others more than self. But also a submission to the Lord that prays, "Not my will but thy will be done." Let us all determine this week and every week to "walk in the Spirit."

**WALK IN THE SPIRIT**  
In Galatians 5:16 we are instructed to "Walk in the Spirit" which will result in a life that "shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh." To walk in the Spirit involves the total control of our lifestyle by the Holy Spirit. There are people who will try to make you believe they are spiritual by what they say but their lives do not reveal the presence of the Spirit. In Eph. 5:18-21 the apostle Paul tells us four evidences of a Spirit-controlled life.

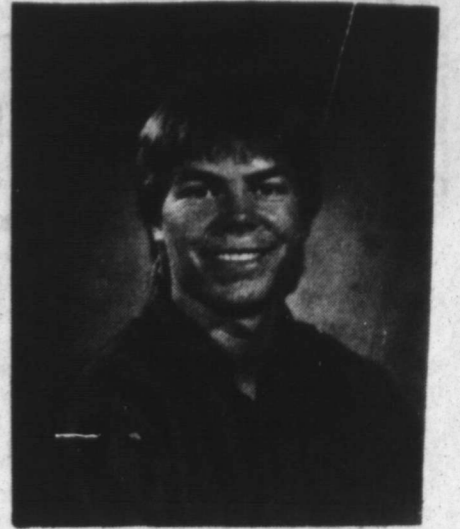

\*Motion was made to pass a resolution to adopt a 3 percent increase in total tax revenues for 1986.

### TAX RATE RESOLUTION

Be it resolved, that the City of Clarendon has adopted a 3 percent increase in total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll 1986.

Adopted by the City Council of the City of Clarendon on this the 26th day of August, 1986.

The resolution passed by the vote all ayes and no noes.

Motion was made to pass a resolution establishing the Clarendon Municipal Airport Fund.

### RESOLUTION

Whereas, Article 46d-11 of the

Municipal Airports Act requires that

"The revenues obtained by a municipality from the ownership, control and operation of any airport or navigation facility, including proceeds from the sale of any airport or portion thereof or air navigation property, shall deposited in a special fund to be designated the Clarendon Municipal Airport Fund, which revenues shall be appropriated solely to, and used by the municipality for, the purposes authorized by this Act."

Whereas, the City of Clarendon wishes to comply with the requirement by establishing a separate airport fund to be known as the Clarendon Municipal Airport Fund,

Therefore be it resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon, that the City of Clarendon establish a Clarendon Municipal Airport Fund, all revenues from the airport to be deposited into this fund and any expenditure from the fund will be for airport purposes only.

Passed and approved this 26th day of August, 1986, by the following vote, all ayes and no noes.

The request for a street light by the jail driveway was discussed.

This item was tabled until the City has checked with the county to see if they will pay the monthly charge for the light.

Motion was made to pass a resolution borrowing \$10,000 for the period of 6 months to be repaid from 1986 taxes. The resolution passed by the vote all ayes and no noes.

## Super sweet onion generates super profits for valley farmers

COLLEGE STATION — To most folks in the economically depressed Rio Grande Valley, the only thing sweeter than the new super onion developed by Texas A&M scientists is the cash that it is generating — and new jobs being created.

We're talking big, sweet onions that are turning big, sweet multi-million-dollar profits for Texas farmers and providing the basis for new jobs in an area plagued by one of the highest unemployment rates in the nation.

How big? A typical onion of the new variety weighs in at about a pound and is about the size of a softball.

How sweet? "It won't bring tears to your eyes when you cut it and eat it," promises Dr. Leonard Pike, the Texas A&M professor of horticulture who headed the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) team that genetically engineered the new onion. TAES, the state's agricultural research agency, is part of The Texas A&M University System.

## Texas A&M anthropologists discover 300 year old shipment of glass lenses

COLLEGE STATION — A recent archaeological find near Jamaica was quite a spectacle — quite a few spectacles, in fact, says a Texas A&M University anthropologist.

More than four dozen eyeglass lenses or fragments, now almost 300 years old and clouded, were recovered recently from a graveyard of ships in the Caribbean. Texas A&M project director James Parrent brought the artifacts to campus for preliminary conservation.

The brittle glass lenses were found sealed in the sand and ballast from the shipwreck, said Parrent. Fragments of a wooden box were found nearby.

The lenses would ordinarily be sold as over-the-counter reading aids in the early 1700s. Parrent consulted with a local optometrist to confirm that the objects were eyewear pieces and not optics for telescopes.

The eyeglass parts were recovered from what may be the wreck of the Spanish vessel commonly known as the Genovesa, a 54-gun ship that sank in 1730. The Genovesa was heavily salvaged on behalf of the Spanish by British authorities, said Parrent.

## Hands-on wildlife museum to be utilized by A&M veterinary students

COLLEGE STATION — A hands-on wildlife museum for veterinary students, believed to be the first of its kind in the nation, has opened at Texas A&M University to help train professionals who will work with wildlife and the non-native species being raised by Texas ranchers, say officials.

The museum is part of Texas A&M's new, privately funded wildlife and exotic animal research center, which will probably house its first species of non-native antelope this fall.

"We will use this museum as a basic teaching unit for veterinary and other graduate students to assist the understanding of wildlife medicine and health care, and just the size and feel of animals many of them have never before seen up-close," said center director Dr. Stephen Seager, a veterinary scientist.

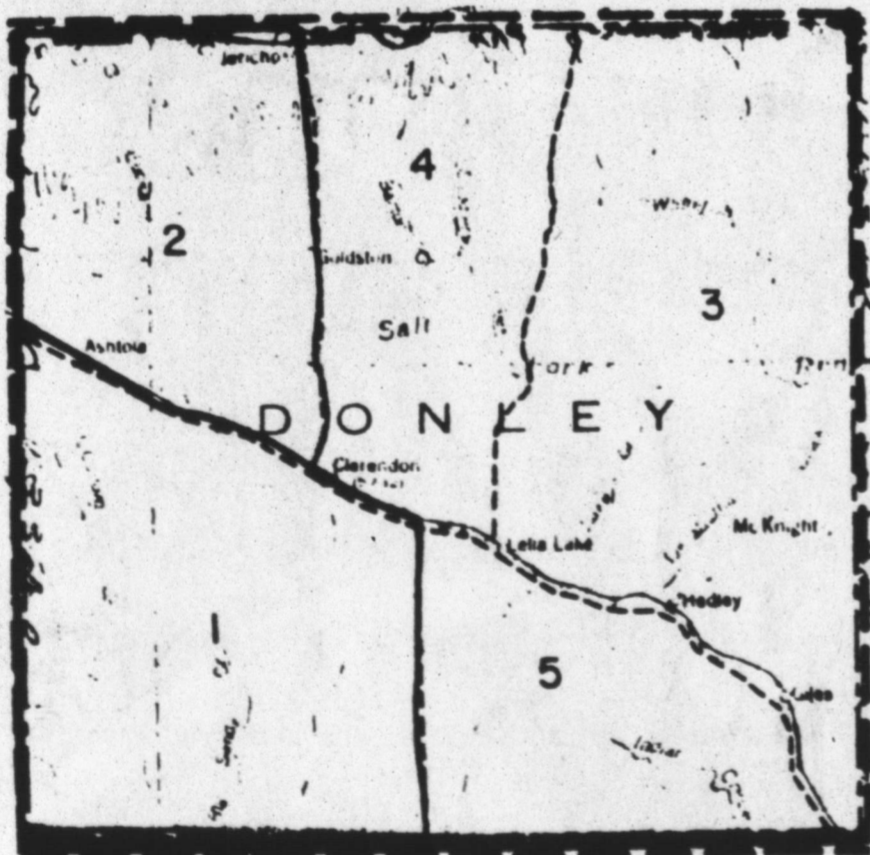
The museum contains dozens of exhibits, including mounted trophy specimens, skins or bones of wild animals, most of them non-native.

### ENDOMETRIOSIS RELIEF

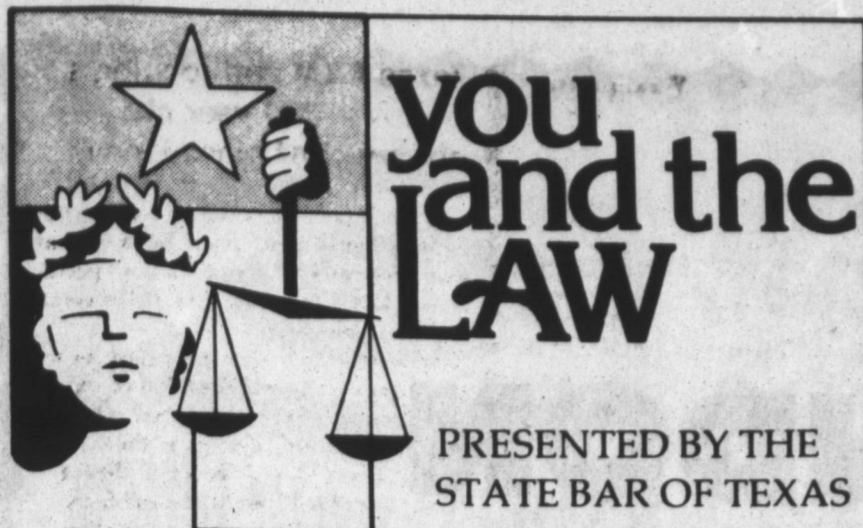
Endometriosis is a painful condition of the reproductive organs of women. The name endometriosis relates to the endometrium - the tissue lining the walls of the uterus. It is believed that endometriosis occurs when fragments of this lining material become implanted at various sites in the pelvic cavity. The implanted fragments form new tissue each month and then go through a shedding process similar to that of the normal menstrual cycle. Blood from the fragments has no way to leave the body. Consequently, there is internal bleeding, pain, cramping and inflammation. According to a recent report in the FDA

Consumer, the number of American women who suffer from this condition may be as high as 5 million. It is estimated that almost one-third of all reported cases of infertility may be associated with endometriosis.

One of the few drugs that has shown to be somewhat effective against this condition is an agent called danazol, a synthetic male hormone capable of shrinking the implanted endometrial fragments, thus decreasing pain, cramping, and other symptoms. Some reports indicate that symptoms may reoccur, however, within 8 to 12 months after the hormone is discontinued.

**Q:** Is there a law regarding people riding in the back of open bed pickup trucks? A boy was recently injured when the driver had to stop suddenly and the boy was thrown from the truck.

**A:** There are no laws in Texas which prohibit passengers from riding in the back of an open bed pickup truck. The only possible cause of action by the boy, suing, (through his parents), would be against the driver under the common law theory of negligence, alleging that the driver should have known that the child could be thrown from the pickup, and didn't use proper care to prevent the accident. Other circumstances, such as the age of the child, whether the driver had been drinking, the condition of the roadway, and so forth, would need to be evaluated to see, given all the factors, whether the driver was negligent.

**Q:** My wife and I took a tour to Mexico. The travel agent said our tour group would form at the airport in Mexico. It did not. There were no hotel reservations in Mexico. We did not get everything we were promised. The travel agent said later we would be compensated, but so far they have not, and they will not return my calls. What can I do?

**A:** You must examine very carefully your agreement with the travel agent. If the promises you claim were made are not in writing, you might have a difficult time proving that the travel agent breached the contract with you. If you do have a written agreement in which these promises are made, you have a good chance of getting a refund for any money paid to the agent for the trip. If the amount of refund you are seeking is less than \$1,000 you can sue the agent yourself in a Small Claims Court. If the agent advertises the services that you did not receive, you may have a claim under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act, which an attorney would best be equipped to handle.

**Q:** My wife and I sold our home and made a profit. We also bought another home at the same time. I want to report a gain on our tax return next year, but am a little confused about how to do it. Could you explain this fully and whether the purchase of the second home would affect the gain?

**A:** Generally, a homeowner who sells his old home and buys a new one can avoid "gain" recognition if the new home is more expensive than the old one, and the new home is purchased within two years before or after the sale of the old home. To avoid "gain," an election must be made on your income tax return. In order to make the election, a statement must be attached to the return that shows: (1) the basis of the old residence, (2) the date the old residence was sold, (3) the sales price of the old residence as adjusted to take in "fixing up" costs, and (4) the purchase price, date of purchase, and date of occupancy of the new residence.

If you are over age 55 at the time the old residence is sold, you may exclude up to \$125,000 of the gain realized on the sale. The exclusion election may be made only once during your lifetime.

### Being happily remarried may depend largely on family relationships

COLLEGE STATION — Some of the strongest influences on how happy someone will be in a second marriage include how well that person gets along with his or her new in-laws and with original family members such as parents, says a Texas A&M University psychology researcher.

Another strong influence on a person's happiness in a second marriage is the degree of amiability or understanding the person perceives between the new and former spouses, said Jay R. Solomon, who recently completed work for a doctoral degree in counseling psychology, under the direction of Professor Arthur J. Roach of the Educational Psychology Department.

Solomon contacted 113 people who were married for the second time after a divorce to determine the significance of assorted family relationships on marriage satisfaction. Solomon said earlier research in second marriages has focused primarily of the ages of the new partners, length of marriage and other factors such as income and religious persuasions.

"I thought there had to be some impact from other relationships, such as in-laws, the ex-grandparents, and so forth," Solomon said. "If people had problems with these other relationships at the time of the second marriage, it would be like getting off to a bad start."

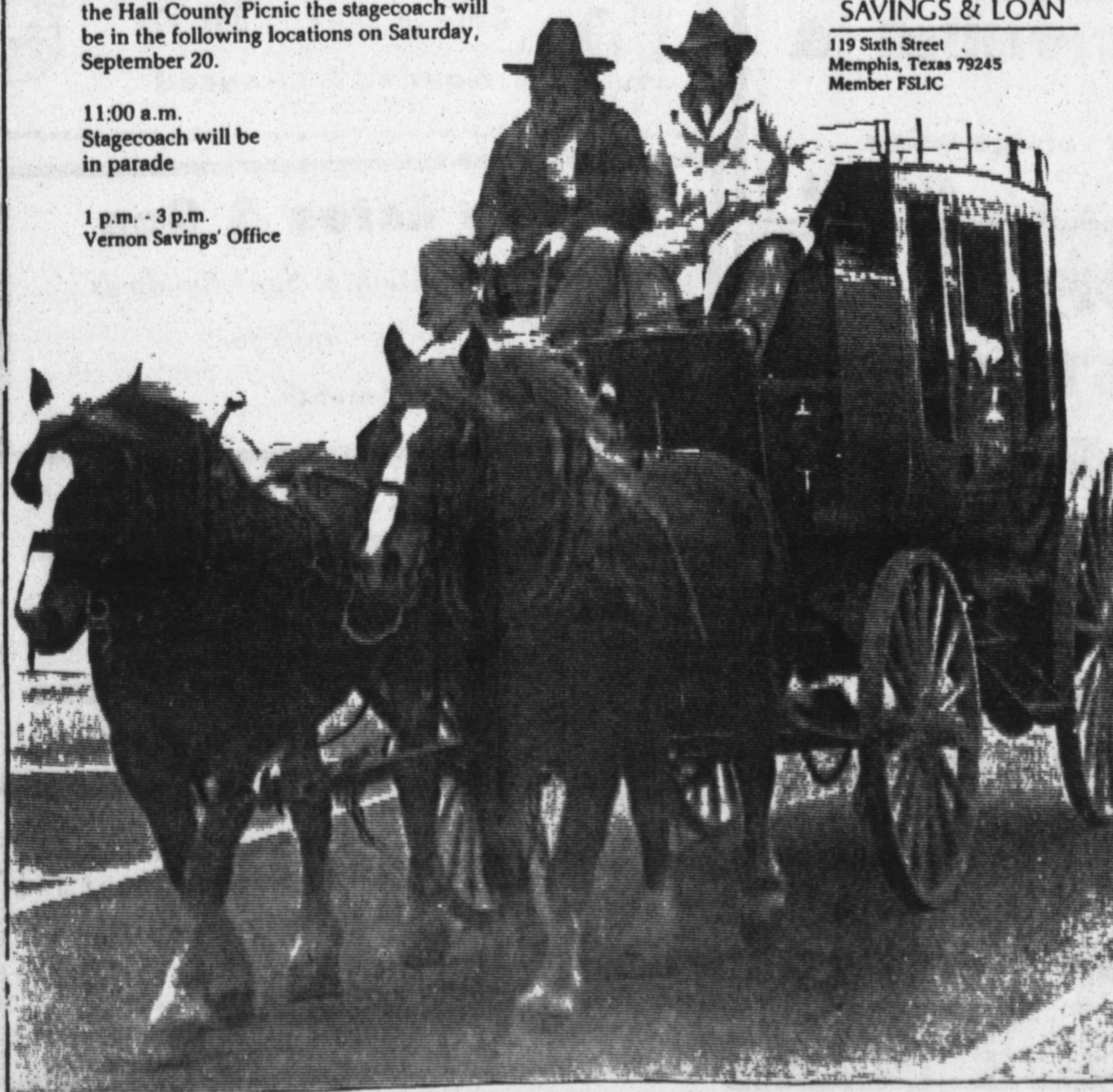

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 4, 1986

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."
