Under his leadership to church grew and prospered. God blessed in a mighty way. Bro. Pinion is a fine man and the church as well as the community will miss him and his family in the coming years.

Gary Pinion accepted the Call of the Tabernacle Baptist Church in Farmington, New Mexico on June 17, 1987. Bro. Pinion is not leaving on a bad note. There were no problems that resulted in his resignation. He felt that God had plans for him and his family elsewhere. Bro. Pinion wishes to express his love and thanks to all those who made his ministry a success.

Greenbelt Lake offers a variety of recreational opportunities

Greenbelt Lake is owned and operated by the Greenbelt Water Authority. The Authority began pumping water through their filter plant in August of 1966, the year the Lake was completed.

Greenbelt Lake has 1490 surface acres of water, it is 70.62 feet deep at the dam, which is the deepest part of the Lake.

The average winter water temperature is between 30 and 40 degrees, while the summer water temperature averages about 80 degrees.

Greenbelt Lake furnishes water to five cities, Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Crowell and Quanah. They also furnish water to the Red River Water Authority of Texas.

The Lake is also used extensively for recreation, such as boating, water skiing, jet skiing, swimming and fishing.

Several fishing tournaments are held on the Lake yearly. Several varieties of fish are found in abundance in Greenbelt Lake, among them are Black and Florida Bass, Small Mouth White Bass, Northern Pike, Walleye, Channel and Blue Catfish, Crappies and Perch. Because of the mild winters, it is good fishing all year long.

There are two parks at Greenbelt Lake, Kincaid Park and a private Boy Scout Park, which is used for the Scouting programs in Clarendon.

The Lake also has a Fish Nursery Pond, that the Texas Parks and Wildlife uses.

Another reason that makes Greenbelt Lake a good recreation area is the excellent facilities surrounding the Lake. Greenbelt Marina has two stores with fishing supplies, bait, groceries, and gas. They sell fishing and hunting licenses and lake permits can also be purchased as Greenbelt Marina.

The store on the West side of the Lake has 57 space mobile home park with a boat ramp with covered boat slips. Just as soon as the work is complete, which they estimate in another week or so, there will be a new beach area.

On the South side of the Lake they are working on 3 new beach areas, a new covered storage building with 35 units, a new boat slip and an expanded RV hook-up area with 96 spaces. Greenbelt Marina also offers boats, jet skis and paddle boats for rent.

Dan Lewis owner of Greenbelt Marina and Concessionarian is making a special effort to expand the recreational facilities on the Lake and an extra special effort to keep all the recreational areas clean.

Because Greenbelt Lake is a privately owned Lake, to use the facilities you must have a permit. A yearly permit for one person, and a yearly permit for a boat is \$20.00. They sell daily permits for \$2.00 per person. You must have a permit, regardless if you are fishing or just using the recreation facilities, if you are 15 years or older.

The Lake is used extensively by surrounding towns, such as Claude, Wellington, Memphis, Groom as well as Pampa, Borger, Amarillo and as far away as Hereford. To verify that, there were approximately 12,000 visitors over the July 4th weekend.

On the North side of Greenbelt Lake there is Clarendon Country Club, which is available by membership only, and an 18-hole golf course.

Just a little further north of the Country Club, you will find the small community of Howardwick. Howardwick consists of a population of 205 permanent homes and 307 weekend homes and 96 winter homes.

Howardwick is basically a retirement community as only about 18 homes have children residing in the home. Howardwick originally had 3638 lots for sale and now there are only 85 unsold lots.

Howardwick boasts of a First Baptist Church, a City Hall, Community Center, Fire Station, Lions Club, Friendship Club, Lakers Homemakers Extension Club, swimming pool, bike trail, and a community cellar. They have a mayor and city council government. In the winter time the men play dominoes at the city hall and there is a bingo game twice a month.

Across the street from the City Hall, there is a Canteen, which sells gas, bait, tackle, lake permits and groceries, they also have a restaurant. The Canteen is operated by the Bruce Ariola and Roddy Klinnert families.

Greenbelt Lake is a great place for family recreation, fishing, swimming and/or just relaxing.

Preparation can speed application

People who plan to apply for monthly Social Security retirement, survivor, or disability benefits can help speed the process if they are well prepared at the time they apply. Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo, said recently.

The applications are designed to obtain information about the worker, spouse, children and work history, including military service and railroad employment. Applications for disability benefits also record information about the person's disabling condition.

A person will need certain documents to support his or her claim. Only original copies of documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies are not acceptable.

Missing towels

Some or all of the following documents may be required in a particular case: Birth certificate, proof of military service, W-2 form or self-employment tax return for the most recent year, proof of marriage, proof of divorce, children's birth certificates, and death certificate if applying for survivor benefits. People applying for disability benefits should have information about their work history and information about the sources that treated them for their medical condition.

A person should not delay applying for benefits because he or she does not have all the required evidence. People at the Social Security office may be able to suggest alternatives.

When possible, a person should

apply 2 or 3 months before he or she wants benefits to begin. This will allow plenty of time to process the claim so checks will start on time.

People do not have to visit a Social Security office to apply. They can take care of this by telephone or they can call to set up an appointment. More information about applications can be obtained at the Amarillo Social Security office, located at 3601 W. 15th, Suite 16, Amarillo, Texas. The telephone number is (806) 376-2241.

The Clarendon Chapter members who attended were Renee Campbell, April McCarey, Lynn Wiggs, and Joseph Jaramillo.

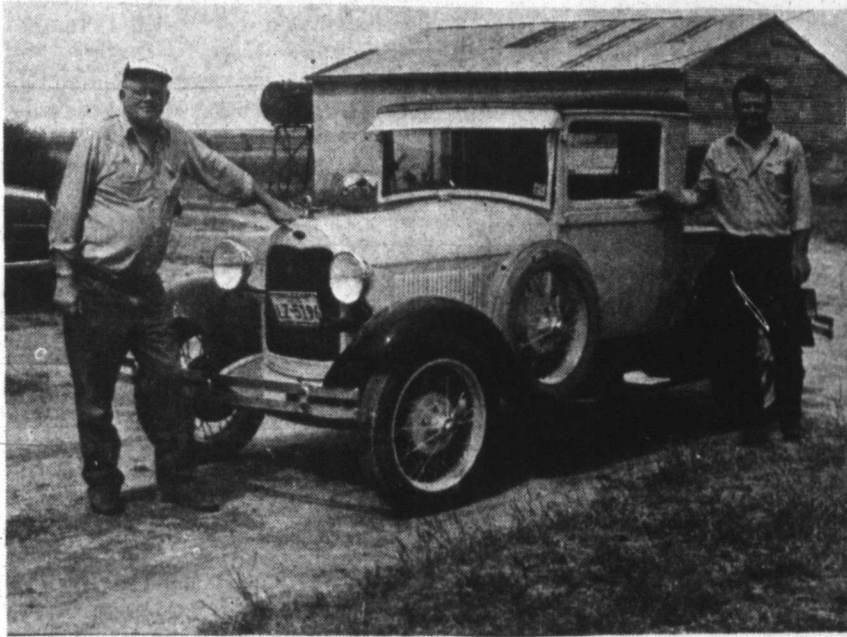

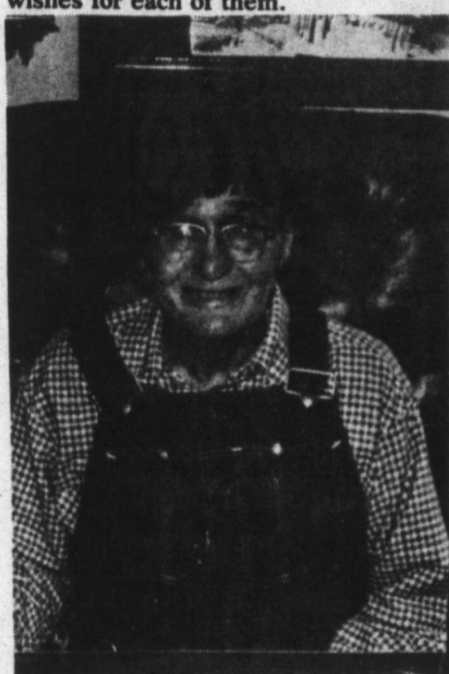
The residents of Medical Center had a wonderful time this 4th of July.

Eaton named TPA president

Roy J. Eaton, publisher of the *Wise County Messenger* in Decatur, was elected president of the Texas Press Association during the group's 108th annual summer convention in Corpus Christi, June 25-27.

Eaton succeeds Charles Schulz, publisher of the *Taylor Daily Press*, who becomes chairman of the association's board of directors.

The Texas Press Association includes 527 newspaper members. Eaton has been a director of the organization since 1981. He is also state chairman for the National Newspaper Association.

Eaton bought the *Messenger* in 1973, after working as a broadcast journalist in Fort Worth for 17 years. Under Eaton's direction, the *Messenger* has grown from a weekly publication with 2,500 paid circulation to a semi-weekly with a circulation of 6,000. The *Messenger* celebrated its 100th birthday in 1980.

Eaton began his journalism career as a part-time reporter for radio station KXOL in Fort Worth in 1956, following his freshman year at Texas Christian University. While still a student at TCU, he was named news director of the station in 1958.

He won his first statewide news association post in 1960, at age 23, when he was elected president of the Texas Associated Press Broadcasters Association. During Eaton's 10 years at KXOL, the station won 25 state and regional reporting awards.

After a decade as news director of KXOL, Eaton became assistant to the president of Fort Worth's largest Ford dealership. He moonlighted as the automotive editor of the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* for more than eight years. Eaton returned to news in 1968 as news director at WBAP, then owned by the *Star-Telegram*. He began directing WBAP's television news coverage two years later.

The bug to own his own business had bitten Eaton by then, and he and his wife, Jeannine, bought the *Wise County Messenger* in 1973 from Gene and Rose Carter. Eaton is a Wise County native.

"I know Gene was worried about me," Eaton said. "When I came up to meet the staff, I asked him if his prized Heidelberg letter press was a paper cutter."

Eaton kept his TV job and Jeannine traveled between Fort Worth and Decatur to handle the accounting chores. But in 1976 Eaton was able to leave WBAP-TV and devote full-time to his newspaper.

"A lot of people ask why on earth I would give up a career at a metropolitan television station to own a country newspaper, but it was an easy choice to make," Eaton said. "Returning to my hometown was very appealing, but owning a business of my own was even more desirable."

"Innovation and quality news coverage have been the backbone of the *Messenger's* growth," Eaton said. "I have always felt that if you covered the news well, then the listeners or readers would be there," he said. "So far, that philosophy has worked well for us."

The *Messenger* has won more than 65 awards for its news coverage. They include the 1984 TPA Sweepstakes Award as the top semi-weekly newspaper in its circulation class.

Eaton's service to his profession includes a number of organizations. He served as president of the Fort Worth chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists/Sigma Delta Chi in 1967 and is a long time script writer, actor director and producer of the chapter's widely acclaimed grid-iron dinner and show.

Eaton has also served his community in a number of ways and was named Decatur's "Citizen-

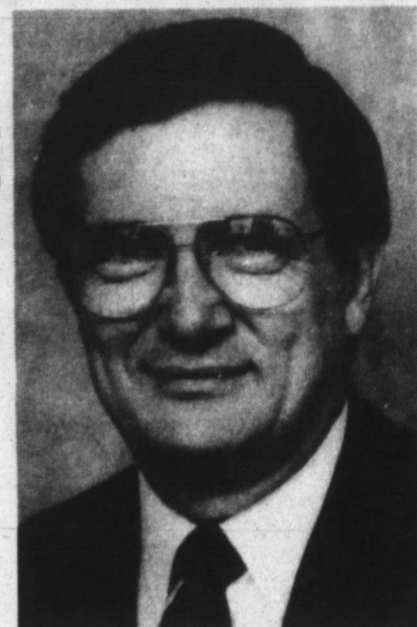

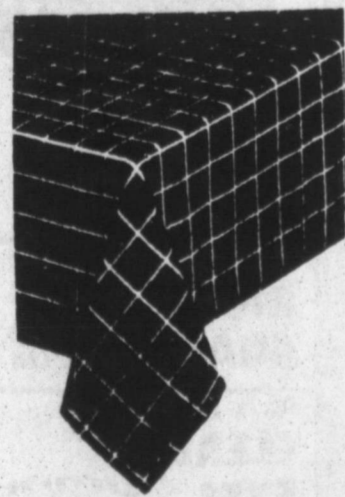

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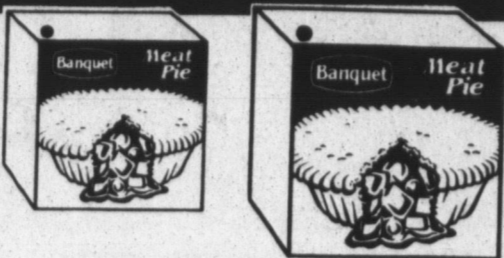
