Texas spring turkey season set

The Texas spring turkey hunting season is scheduled April 2-24, reminds Dr. Jack Payne, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Although statewide in scope, the hunting season traditionally features greater populations of turkeys in portions of the Edwards Plateau, the Rio Grande Plain and East Texas. Payne, who is headquartered at Corpus Christi, reminds,

Only the male turkeys may be harvested during the hunting season, he cautions.

Recreational hunting is big business in Texas, with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department selling 1,130,630 resident hunting licenses in 1986. Visiting hunters to Texas bought 19,376 non-resident licenses, which include small game, during that period.

In 1986, 144,832 hunters killed 48,525 turkeys, an increase from 1985, Payne notes. During the '86 spring turkey season, 72,744 hunters killed 37,605 turkeys.

Payne adds that the wild turkey is an all-American bird which originally was found only in North America. It was so American that Ben Franklin proposed it for the national emblem.

"Fortunately for the turkey hunter, the eagle was picked," Payne says.

Hunters should check with their local game wardens concerning any special regulations relating to the spring turkey season in their area. Payne reminds.

There's still time to soil test

It's not too late to collect soil samples for testing to determine fertilizer needs for this year's crops.

Collecting soil samples now and getting them tested can help farmers get a jump on the spring rush at soil testing labs, says County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Once fertilizer needs are determined, farmers can place their orders, Gooch says. Again, by ordering early, they can avoid the spring rush. Also, fertilizers usually cost more in the spring when demand is greater and supplies are tighter.

With fertilizer at hand, farmers can begin application when field conditions permit. This minimizes spring planting delays because of tight dealer schedules and reduces the potential for moisture loss just prior to planting, explains Gooch.

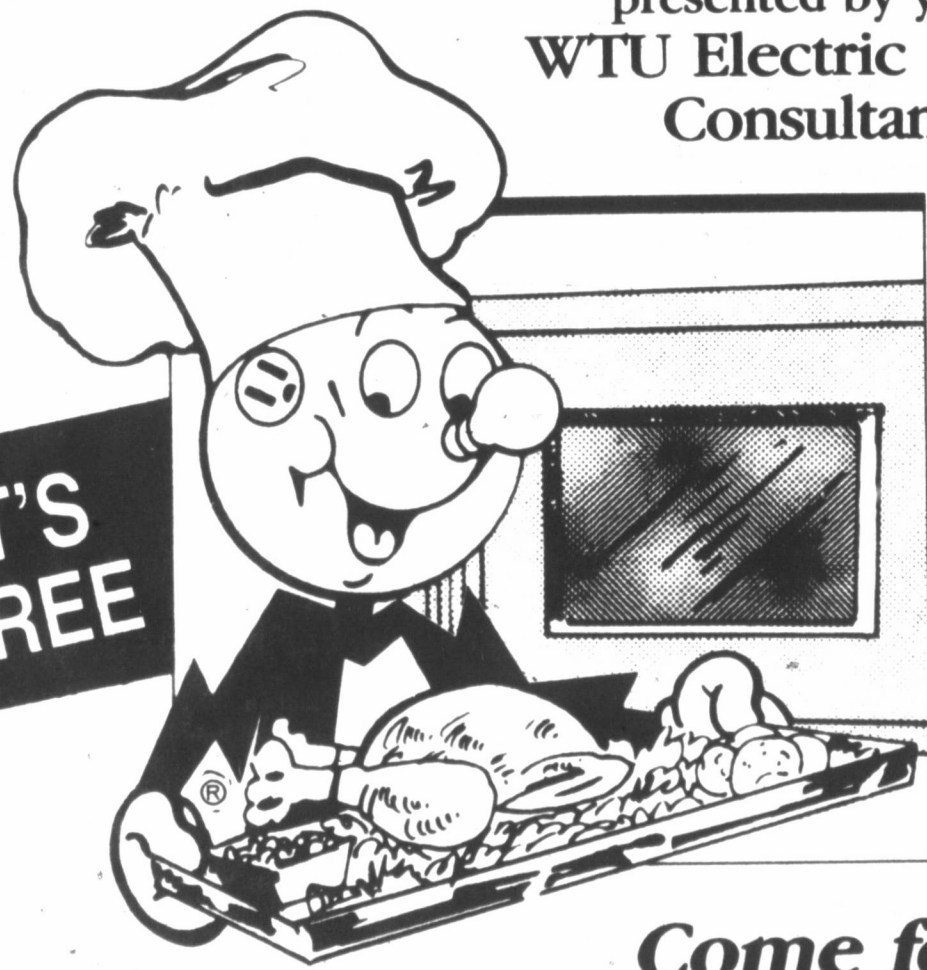

Cholesterol Lowering Drugs

The liver makes all the cholesterol the body needs for building cells and digesting food. The "extra" cholesterol comes from our diets. Recently the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute called for every adult to be tested for cholesterol. The Institute feels that the average level of 215 in middle aged Americans is too high. Approximately 40 million Americans have cholesterol levels that are above 240. A new cutoff of 200 for middle aged adults has been recommended.

A new group of drugs called "enzyme inhibitors" have been shown to cause significant reductions in blood cholesterol levels. The first enzyme inhibitor medication was approved in September by the Food and Drug Administration. This new medicine, called *lovastatin*, will be aimed at the several hundred thousand individuals who have inherited a high blood cholesterol tendency from their parents and those who have difficulty controlling cholesterol with dietary measures alone. Enzyme inhibitors work by interfering with an enzyme in the liver that is necessary for the production of cholesterol.

Fruit trees need annual "Lube Job"

Have you given your fruit and nut trees their annual "lube" job? This refers, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale insects, points our Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

Why control scale insects?
The answer is simply to save the tree. If a scale insect such as the San Jose scale or white peach gets started, it could kill your tree.

Dormant oil can be purchased at many different stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 40 deg. and 70 deg. F. Do not apply if a freeze is likely within 48 hours after application, and do not apply after the tree has budded out, cautions Gooch. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying flowers and

leaves could cause leaf burn and flower drop.
Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your tree will probably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil, suggests Gooch.

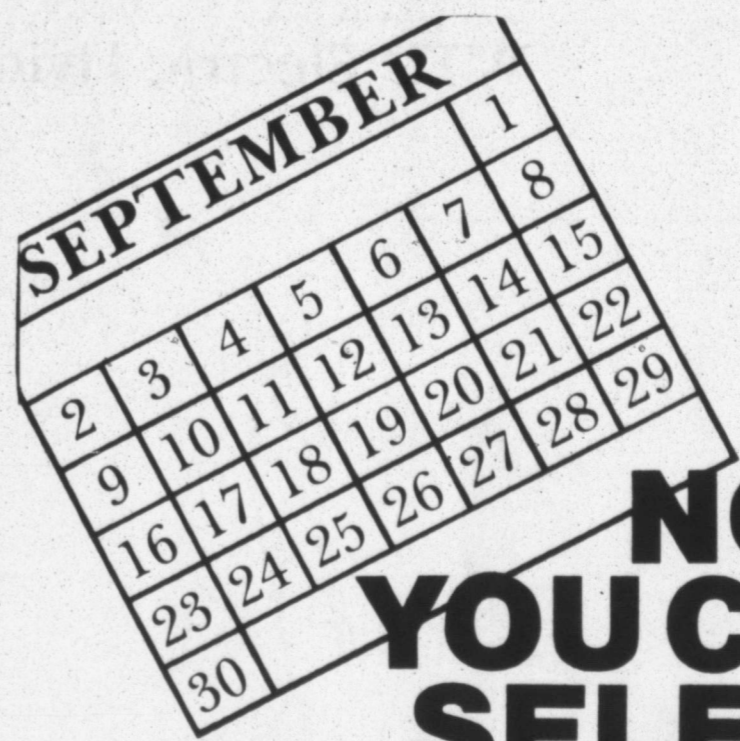

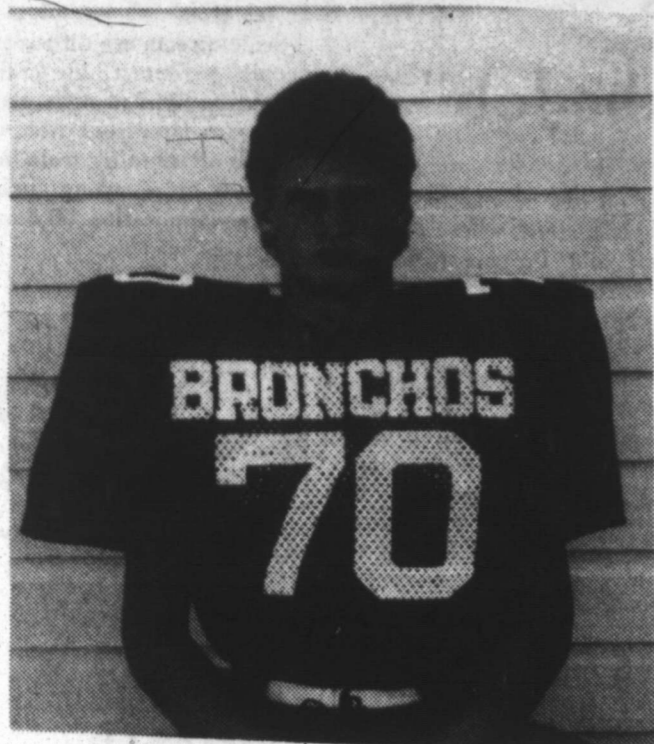

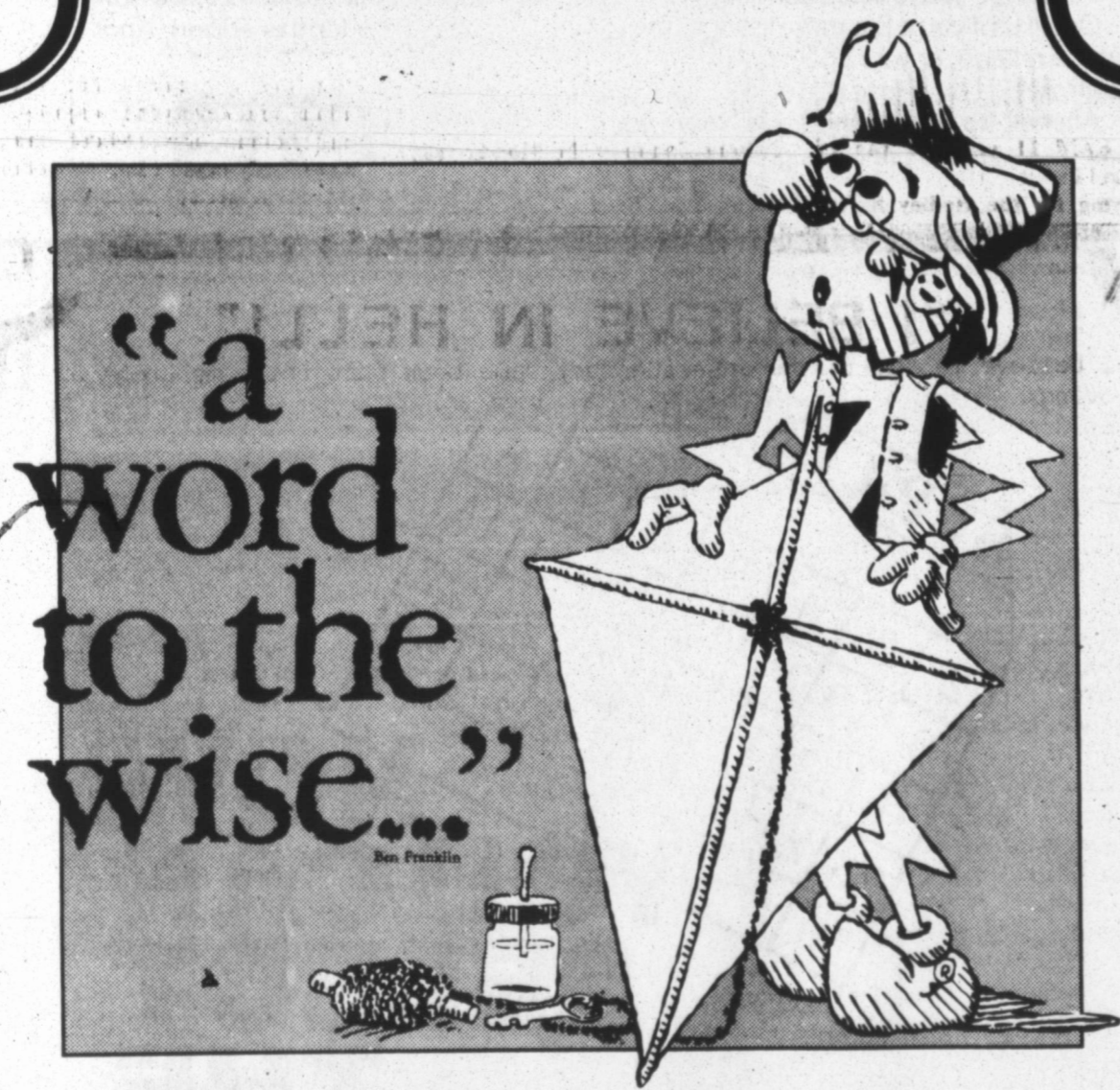
Underwater photographer at Clarendon school

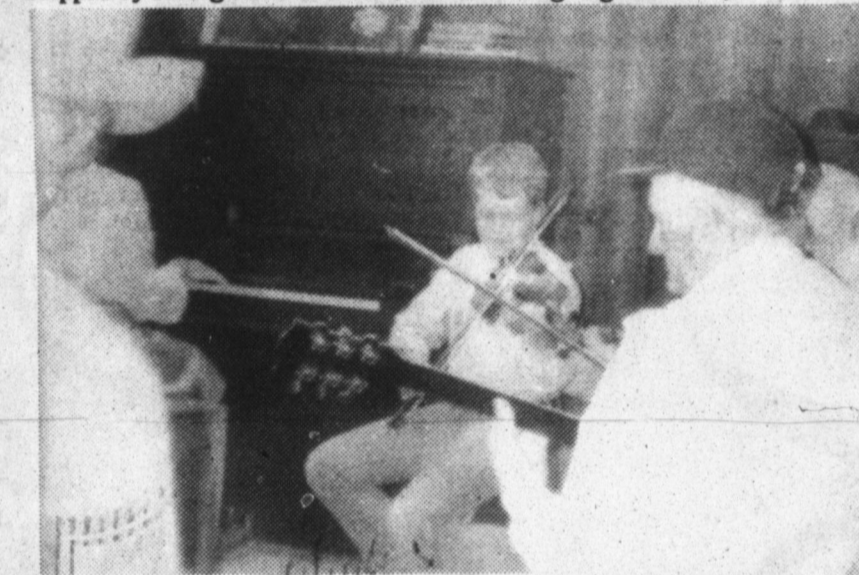
Old fashioned hog killing

If you became 65 or disabled during 1987, you may qualify for additional property tax exemptions on your homestead. If you bought a different home during 1987 you may need to file a new homestead exemption application. Applications should be filed by May 1.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you will not need to reapply for 1988.

Farmers and ranchers who need to apply for productive valuation must do so by May 1. Applications are available at the Appraisal District Office.
