The Quartet is composed of four musicians who are principal members of the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra, as well as teachers at West Texas State University.

First violinist Dawn Harms received a Bachelor of Music from the New England Conservatory and a Master of Music from New York State University at Stony Brook. She has performed internationally, not only in the U.S. but in Europe, Israel, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Romania, as well. In 1983, Ms. Harms gave her Carnegie Hall debut with the Stony Brook Trio.

James Lyon, second violinist, is from Kentucky, where he performed with several critically acclaimed musical groups and taught at two universities. He is a graduate of the North Carolina School of the Arts and Eastman School of Music (with distinction). Mr. Lyon has recorded

for Pro Viva records and is currently the Concertmaster of the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra.

Amy Brandfonbrener, violist, received her Bachelor of Music degree from the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia and her Master of Music degree from the New England Conservatory in Boston. She has also studied in Italy and toured Europe with a quartet from the Curtis Institute.

Brian Manker, cellist and newest addition to the Quartet, earned a Bachelor and Master of Music (with distinction) from the New England Conservatory of Music. Before coming to W.T., Mr. Moanker was affiliated with Emory University and was winner of the 1985-86 New England Conservatory Concerto Competition.

Clifford is finalist for National Scholarship

Trisha Clifford has met the rigorous requirements for Finalist standing in the 1987 National Merit Scholarship Program, a distinction that places her in a very select group representing fewer than half of one percent of American high school seniors.

for the National Merit Scholarships.

The Merit Program receives neither federal nor state funding. It is privately financed by grants from over 600 independent sponsors who share the goals of National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). Even though this nationwide academic competition is the largest of its kind, NMSC's funds are limited and we will be able to offer Merit Scholarships in 1987 to only about 44 percent of the Finalists.

The process of selecting approximately 6,000 Merit Scholars from 13,500 highly qualified Finalists is now underway. Trisha and every other Finalist is being considered for one of 1,800 National Merit \$2000 Scholarships. These are single-payment awards which are offered on a representational basis in proportion to each state's high school senior class. Winners of an allocated number of "National" awards are chosen in open competition among all Finalists in a state.

Approximately 4,200 other Merit Scholarships will be offered, but only Finalists who meet an award grantor's preferential criteria will be considered for them. Corporate organizations will provide about 1,400 Merit Scholarships for Finalists who are children of company employees, residents of plant communities, or students who have career interests a sponsor wishes to encourage. Colleges and universities will finance the remaining 2,800 Merit Scholarships, and every Finalist who receives such an award must use it at the sponsor institution.

Last fall, Trisha's name was included in a nationwide news release that identified some 15,000 Semifinalists in the 1987 Merit Scholarship competition. By publicizing the names of each year's Semifinalists, NMSC hopes to increase public awareness of the academic accomplishments of exceptionally able young men and women. The nation's higher education institutions eagerly seek to enroll able students, and the announcement focuses the attention of college officials on high performers in the Merit Program.

"We would like everyone to know what an honor it is for Trisha to receive this prestigious nomination," added Hayes.

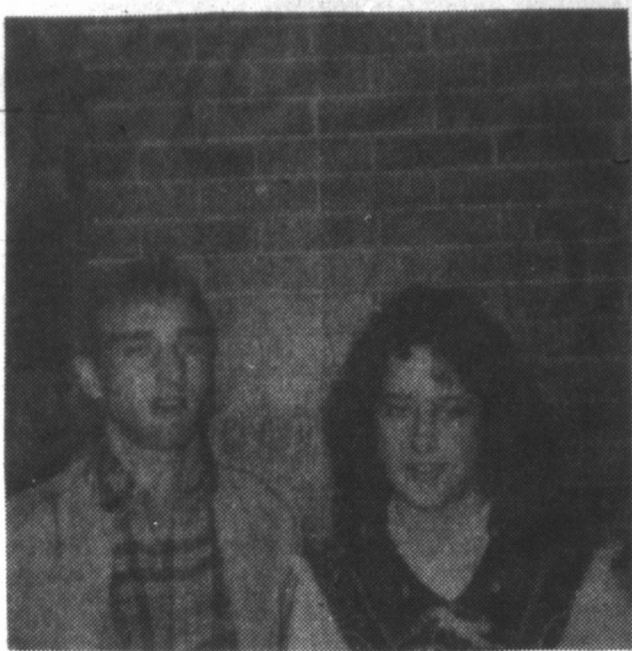

The bill on "Retirement Funds" is proposing to reduce the state contributions to the Teacher Retirement System Funds from 8% to 6% for a period of six months from March-August, 1987 using approximately \$3,000,000 for emergency needs of the state and in addition, Governor Clements proposes lowering state contributions from 8% to 7.2% for the next biennium using approxi-

mately 45.6 million more to fund state needs without raising taxes. These issues will affect all of us.

The scholarship from Gamma Kappa is to be given to Donley County participants. DPS Report

Captain Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the year 1986, our troopers investigated 63 fatal accidents, 884 personal injury accidents and 1,269 property damage accidents. There were 82 persons killed and 1,328 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Brad Parker of Tulia state, "In Donley County, our troopers investigated 4 fatal accidents, 14 personal injury accidents and 30 property damage accidents in the year 1986. Five persons were killed and 25 persons were injured in these accidents."

Panhandle Health Care Coalition

There are monies provided by the 69th Texas Legislature in 1985 to make provisions for health care to the State's indigent and uninsured population. The programs are designed to not only provide health care to those who need health care, but also to cut the bad debt rate in hospitals and to save tax dollars.

The Panhandle Health Care Coalition works with counties, hospitals, hospital districts and clinics to coordinate eligibility screening, services, education and communications as well as other areas.

The grant programs are listed and summarized below:

A. Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act (S.B.1). This act clarifies responsibilities of counties, public hospitals and hospital districts in providing health care to indigent Texas residents. Counties without public facilities must provide specified health care services for residents whose incomes and resources do not exceed AFDC Program Standards but who are not eligible for Medicaid or other 3rd party coverage.

B. Maternal Infant Health Improvement Act (MIHIA) (H.B. 1023)

This act provides for prenatal care for low income pregnant women in State targeted counties of underserved population or unmet need, and for comprehensive maternity care of medically high risk pregnant women and specialized care and follow-up for high risk infants born to these women in all counties without previ-

ous programs. These women must not be eligible for Medicaid or have other 3rd party coverage.

C. Texas Primary Health Care Services Act (H.B. 1844)

This act provides funds to establish programs of high blood pressure treatment to low income persons not eligible for other forms of assistance or who do not have insurance. The program is designed to improve access to preventive and primary care services in order to reduce acute care emergency room and hospital costs.

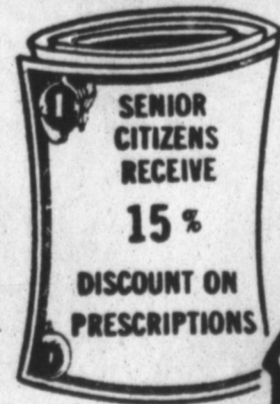
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Candida Infections

We often think of only viruses and bacteria as the causes of infections of the human body. But infections are also caused by fungi—plant-like organisms that can live on the skin, in various cavities of the body, and within the bloodstream. One such fungus that causes a variety of problems is *Candida albicans*, a true fungus that is sometimes called a yeast.

Candida infections commonly occur in the mouth (*thrush*) and in the vagina (*yeast* infection). *Thrush* is characterized by white plaques in the mouth and is common in infants, pregnant women, and debilitated adults. When the fungus grows in the vagina, discomfort and a white discharge are common signs of infection.

Candida treatment is best accomplished with prescription medicines. A variety of anti-fungal solutions and creams are available. Infections that do not respond to these preparations may require the use of *ketconazole* which is taken by mouth. Serious systemic infections, according to the medical journal *Postgraduate Medicine*, may require hospitalization and injection of medication directly into the bloodstream. Fortunately, systemic *Candida* infections occur infrequently.

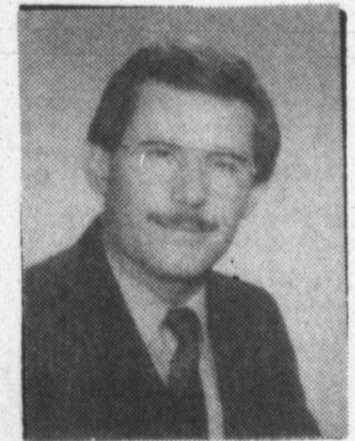
CHRISTIANS ONLY:

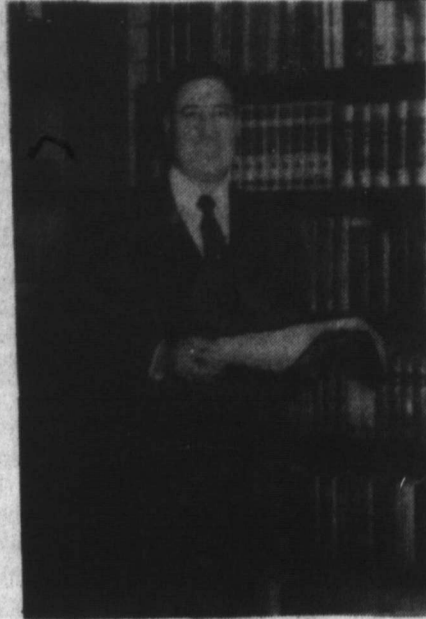

In Governor Clements' state of the state address about two weeks ago, he took aim at three items in HB 72. He favored doing away with the last of the required testing programs. The cost on the teacher testing program, if carried out, would be over 10 million dollars. He declared the appraisal system and the career ladder a total failure. Cost estimates range from 418 million dollars to as high as 600 million dollars.

His remarks brought quick action. Bill Haley, Chairman of the House Education Committee, quickly drew up legislation to abolish testing, which I co-signed. Dr. Bill Kirby announced the appointment of a committee made up of school teach-

ers, superintendents, and other local school personnel to look into the appraisal system and career ladder. I wonder why this was not thought of when they created this one-half billion dollar monster.

Former Governor Mark White declared education a sacred cow after the passage of HB 72. Other state leaders did the same. Is there any wonder Mark White was defeated?

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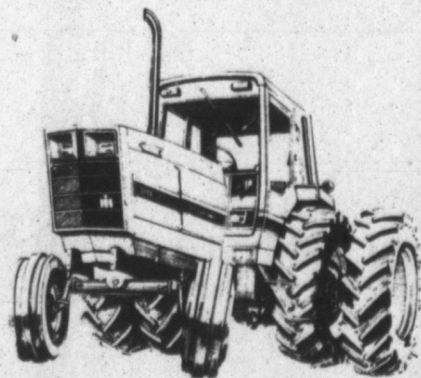


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Donley Appraisal District newsletter

The Appraisal District spent less than budgeted during 1986 and will be refunding \$5,395.00 surplus to the Tax Bodes as a deduction from the 2nd quarter allocation in March.

The cost of operating the Appraisal District doing appraisal, assessment and tax collection for 1986 was \$97,565.00 on 10,445 property parcels (\$3.65 for appraisal and \$4.90 for assessment-collection = \$8.55 total). This is a low comparative cost for this area and much lower than statewide average.

Another way of measuring the cost is to compare it with the total property tax levy. The 1986 cost of \$97,565.00 on a total levy of \$1,465,983.00 tax to be collected to help operate our schools, local government, roads-streets, city water-sewer, and emergency services; this amounts to approximately 6 1/2 percent of the levy. Man other Texas appraisal districts experience a total cost as high as 15 percent of the levy!

To put this in perspective: United Way, Community Chest, March of

Dimes spends approximately 20 percent of their collection to cover costs. This year's Heart Association leaflet reveals a 23 percent cost of fund raising and management; this includes a great amount of no cost volunteer help!

Current tax collection through December of '86 are 66 percent of the tax levy; this is much better than the

59 percent for last year. I hope this trend continues through January!

You governing board members and administrators are to be commended for conservative budgeting and consequential moderate tax rates as indicated in the enclosed supplemental data. Local tax rates are generally lower than those of the surrounding area.

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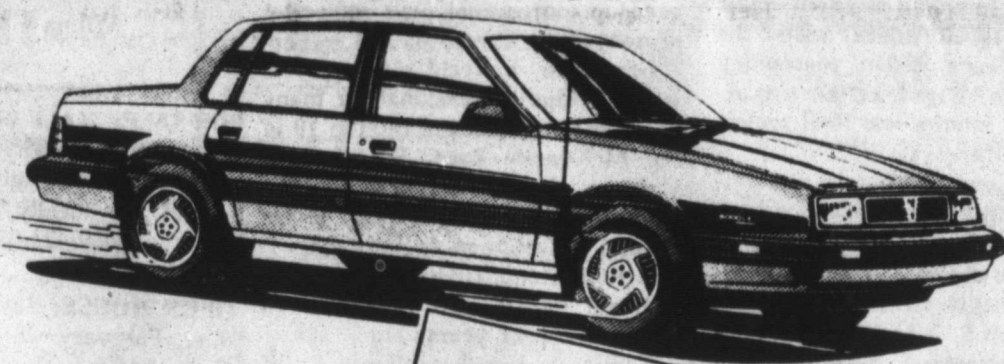
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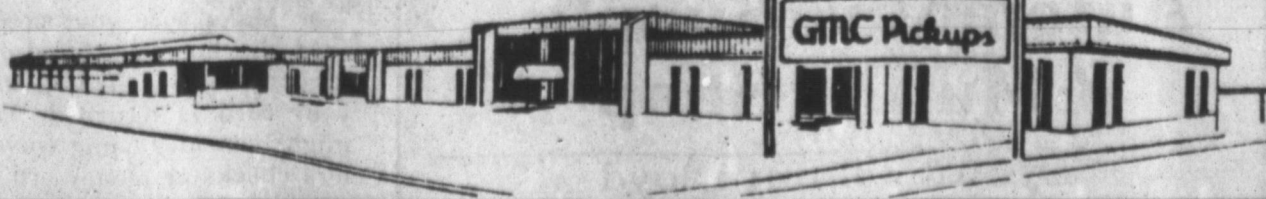

He has taught bridge in San Antonio and Amarillo and is considered one of the most knowledgeable and effective teachers in the area. He and his wife, Mildred, have competed successfully throughout the southwest in regional and sectional events. He is also co-chairing the upcoming regional tournament.
