## Primary (Baby) teeth

## When the baby is born, the primary teeth are already formed but primary teeth are already formed but haven't erupted through the gums yet. Usually the first baby tooth to erupt into the mouth is one of the erupt into the mouth is one of the lower front teeth (incisor). It peeks hrough at about six months of age. A mother shouldn't feel that her child is abnormal, if it does not get that tooth first or if it comes in sooner ar that tooth first or if it comes in sooner or later than six months. When the baby begins to get his first baby teeth, the gums may become swoilen and tender. He will drool to excess. Farmers forced to transfer asset to creditors to satisfy debts no longer have to pay alternative minimum
taxes on recognized capital taxes on recognized capital gains.
"This was serious tax liability that was forcing many farmers into bankruptcy to reduce their tars liabibankupcy
lities,", points out Dr. Wayne
Hayenga, economist and attorney Hayenga, economist and attorney
with the Texas Agricultural Extenwith the Texas Agricultural Exten-
sion Service, The Texas A\&MM University System. President Reagan signed the special exemption bill into law in late April. Since it's retroac-
tive to Dec. 31, 1981, some farmers may have a tax refund coming.
Regarding the liability faced by Regarding the liability faced by
farmers in forced tansfers ofese farmers in forced tansfers of assets.
Hayenga cites a typical situation. A Hayenga cites a typical situation. A
farmer who bought most of his 500 acres in the 1960 s and 1970s for an
average of $\$ 300$ per acre was forced average of $\$ 300$ per acre was forced
to borrow heavily on it in the early to borrow heavily on it in the early
1980s because of operating losses.

He owes $\$ 1,300$ per acre and can't meet deht obligations with current accept the land in lieu of foreclosure. This triggers capitil gains of
$\mathbf{S 1 , 0 0 0}$ per cere -. or $\$ 500,000$. Of this $\$ 1,000$ per acre -o or $\$ 500,000$. Of this
amount, 40 percent or $\$ 200,000$, is amount, 40 percent or $\$ 2200,000$, is
tanabele as ordinary income. A farmer may have losses to carry forward and other deductions to offset this ordinary income. However, the other 60
percent of the gain which was excluded - $\$ 300,000$ in this case (less a $\mathbf{3} 40,000$ deductible eeremption), becomes a "tax preference item"
subject to an alternative minimum tux of 20 percent.
"This rule was designed to impose at least some tax on the wealthy," Hayenga points out. "Inadvertently
it traps farmers who it traps farmers
out of business.'
According to hayenga, the forced-
out farmer in this example would be out farmer in this example would be
subject to 20 percent tax subject to
$\$ 260,000$ ( $\$ 300,000$ patcent minus the
gain $\$ 40,000$ exemption). That's a tax bill of $\$ 52,000$. If the farmer deeds back the property and then is forced into
bankruptcy, subsequent bankruptcy will not erase the tax bill.
"So the special eximption for
farmers will relieve this tax burden farmers will relieve this taxt burden and possibly keep some
ruptcy," says Hayenga.
