## Post Office to adjust hours

The Clarendon Post Office will adjust retail hours beginning February 13 says Postmaster McCombs. Operating hours are being reduced to help meet the Postal Services' reduction in operating expenses as required by Congress' Deficit Reduction Act. This Act requires the Postal Service to trim \$1.245 billion from its operating budget.

Nationwide, post offices have been ordered to reduce retail hours by 10 to 12 percent. Rather than close one afternoon a week as many areas are doing they have chosen this daily reduction as the least disruptive to service.

The new hours will be: Monday through Friday 8:30 to 4:00, Saturday Closed.

Community colleges prepare students for transfer to a four-year college or university; train them for new careers or update their skills for existing jobs; and enable them to master basic English, reading and math skills. 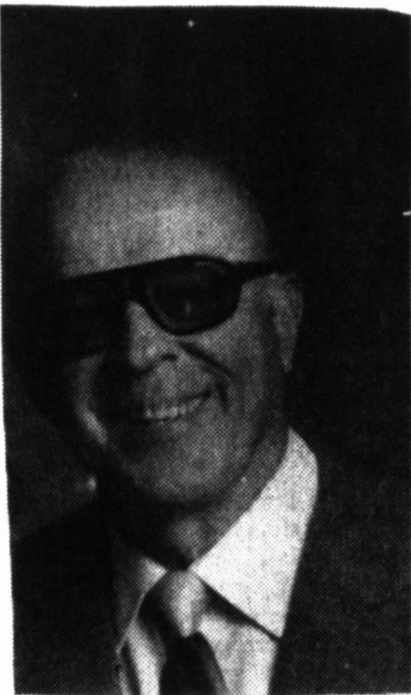

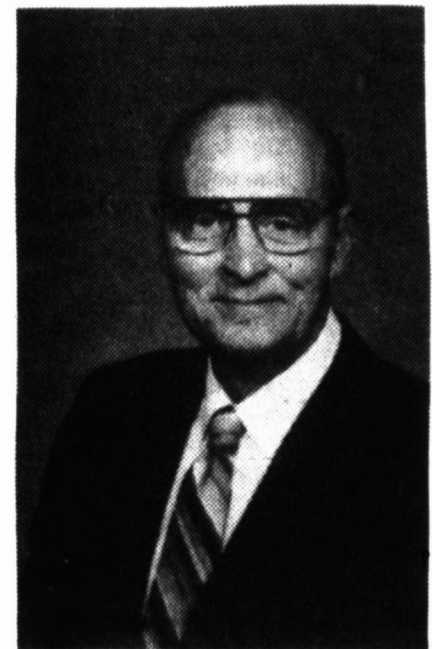

**Facts and Myths about the Elderly**

Myth 2: 'The Elderly live better than others.'

Those who proclaim that most of the elderly are living in economic bliss are ignoring, deliberately or otherwise, not only the millions of elderly Americans living in or at the edge of poverty but also the millions more who, by any reasonable definition, are economically vulnerable.

Approximately 8 million elderly Americans fall into the "economically vulnerable" category. When they are added to the 3.5 million elderly men and women officially counted as poor, it should be clear that all the talk about the "greening of the aged" is off the mark. The plain fact is that 11.5 million elderly Americans are poor or economically vulnerable. That is 42 percent of the total elderly population. The situation is particularly precarious for certain groups of older Americans, such as elderly

blacks. In 1985, more than seven out of every 10 or 71 percent of black aged 65 or older were either poor or economically vulnerable.

The elderly have fewer chances to increase their incomes. Older Americans who do find jobs are likely to work at low pay, or part-time, or both. In 1985, about two-thirds of all elderly workers worked part-time or during only part of the year. Moreover, one out of five of the older workers being paid at hourly rates in 1984 earned the minimum hourly wage of \$3.35 or less.

The elderly have exceptionally high out-of-pocket health care costs. The sad fact is that, because of skyrocketing health care costs and the absence of truly comprehensive insurance coverage, the elderly today spend the same proportion of their incomes on health care as was the case before Medicare and Medicaid were established, two decades ago. Many people mistakenly believe that Medicare covers all of the health care costs incurred by the elderly. Actually, however, Medicare currently covers only about 4 percent of these costs. And because these costs are so high, it is not uncommon for the lower-income elderly today to pay extraordinarily high percentages of their total income for health care.

Second, the elderly must normally pay premiums, coinsurance charges, and deductibles for those services that Medicare does cover. These costs have soared. The deductible for hospital care, for example, has increased by 155 percent in just the past six years, from \$204 in '81 to \$520 in '87.

Deductibles are front-end charges and must be paid directly out of pocket, if they do not have a "Medigap" insurance policy.

Moreover, even after the deductible has been paid, Medicare normally pays only 80 percent of all "reasonable charges" billed.

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## Antacids May Interact With Other Medicines

More than a half a billion dollars is spent each year for antacids in the United States alone. Although antacids are sometimes used as a source of calcium, the majority of antacid use is for heartburn, indigestion, and stomach ulcers.

There are a number of interactions that antacids may have with other medications. Because the antacids are alkaline in nature, they often lower the acidity of the stomach. This reduction in acidity causes many drugs, such as aspirin, penicillin, levodopa, pseudoephedrine, and sulfadiazine, to be absorbed faster than they would be ordinarily. The more rapid absorption can lead to increased side effects.

The aluminum, magnesium, and calcium in many antacids may also bind and, therefore, inhibit the absorption of such drugs as tetracycline, digoxin, and phenytoin. This delayed or inhibited absorption may interfere with the effectiveness of these drugs. Antacids have also been found to alter the acidity of the urine, which is important to the excretion of certain drugs such as quinidine.

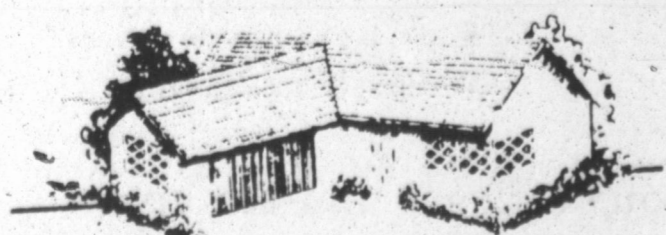

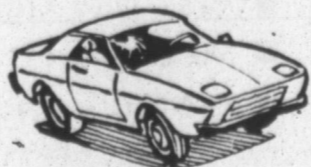

### Health Hints for Today

**Influenza** is of epidemic proportions in Texas. It has certainly been bad in Donley County. Although many of the younger people with the flu are getting by reasonably well, those forty-five or older are frequently becoming very ill with a high complication rate with pneumonia. Those sixty-five or older who haven't taken the flu vaccine are at extremely high risk. Several have required hospitalization, but no deaths in our county as yet due to the influenza or its complications. Not only those over sixty-five should have the vaccination, but I'm recommending it for anyone at high risk or for those over forty-five if they are working with the public.

**Pink Eye** is epidemic in school. It is easy to diagnose. The white part of the eye is red and watery, and the eye is usually matted together in the mornings on arising. An antibiotic eye ointment will usually clear it promptly. Gastroenteritis or **Intestinal flu**, and **strep throats** appear to be on the decline. Christmas vacation helped slow down these potential epidemics.

Earlier in the winter I told some of you to watch for an influenza epidemic and get your vaccination if necessary.

Do it now.

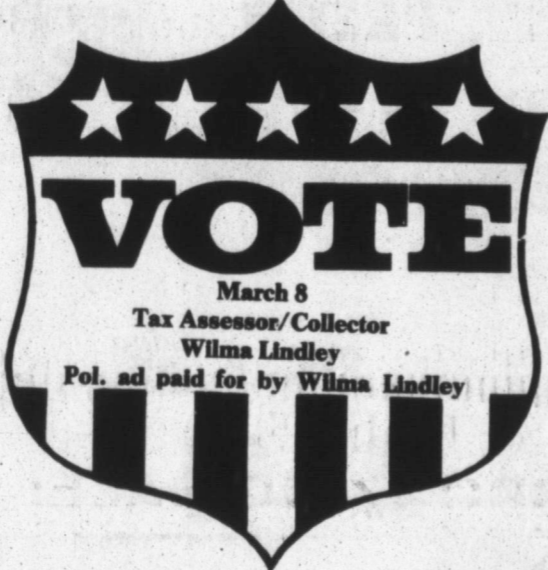

It's not much on theology, but it sure gets you in the gut, doesn't it?



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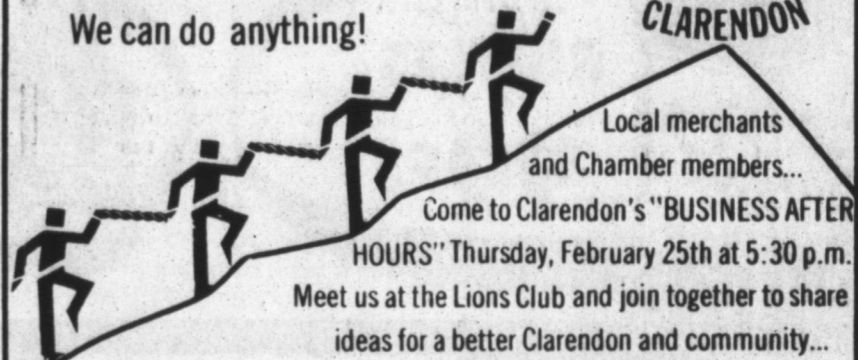

Medicare has been a godsend to older Texans (and to certain disabled persons who qualify) but it doesn't pay 100% of all medical bills.

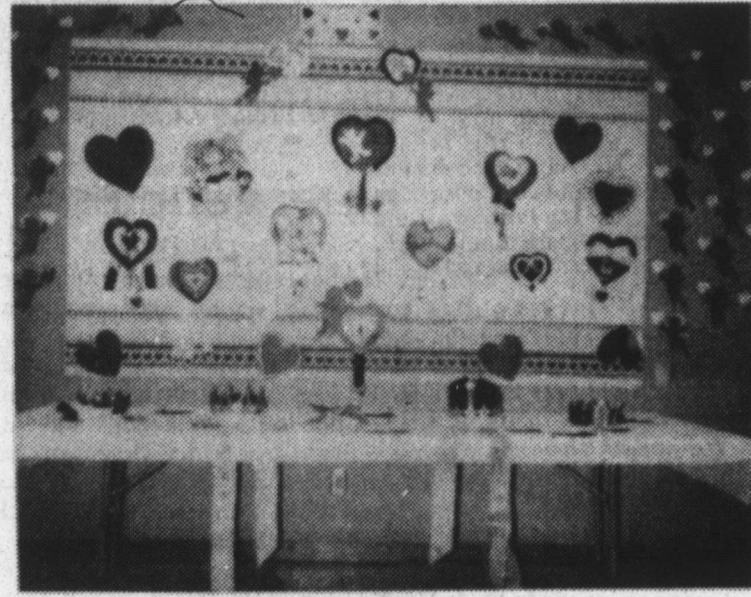
The gaps in medicare can be very expensive. Medicare supplemental insurance—or Medi-Gap insurance—is offered by many companies to fill the gaps.

But be careful when buying Medi-gap insurance. Things to ask about include:

•Pre-existing illness exclusions. The Texas Board of Insurance sets a 6 month maximum exclusion for pre-existing conditions.

•The right to renew. You should have the automatic right to renew unless the company cancels all policies of that type in the state.

•Short-time enrollment periods. Never fall for "once in a lifetime offers." If the company is reliable, the policy will be available tomorrow at very similar terms.

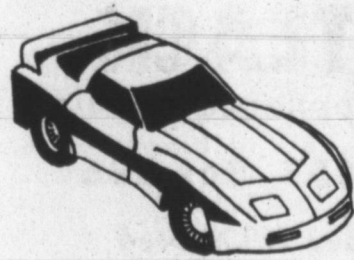
If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

January 1 of each year is the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1.

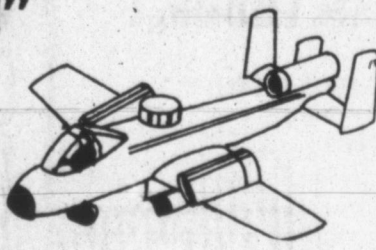

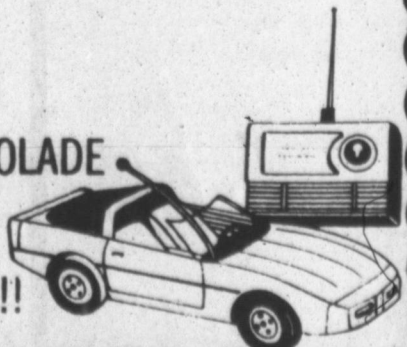

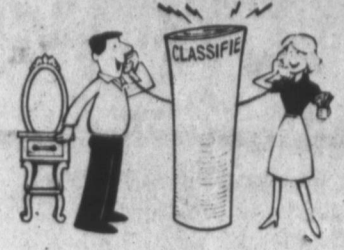

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met on February 9, 1988 in the Board Room, City Hall at 7:00 p.m. Members present were Mayor David Davidson, Aldermen James Thomas, Benny Osburn, Gene White and Steve Smith. Absent were Alderman Bubba Newhouse. Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards, Charles SoRelle, Jerry Chambliss, and James Sharrar.

Minutes of the January 26, 1988 meeting were read and approved.

An ordinance providing for discounts for early payment of property taxes was passed.

**ORDINANCE NO. 272**

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR DISCOUNTS FOR EARLY PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES.**

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon believes that property owners are entitled to a discount for early payment of property taxes levied by this district.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon that pursuant to Texas Property Tax Code Section 31.05 (b) discounts will be allowed as follows:

- (1) three percent if the tax is paid in October or earlier;
- (2) two percent if the tax is paid in November; and
- (3) one percent if the tax is paid in December.

An ordinance providing for a penalty to defray cost of collection of delinquent taxes was passed.

**ORDINANCE NO. 273**

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY TO DEFRAY COSTS OF COLLECTION OF DELINQUENT TAXES.**

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon deems it necessary to have a declared policy regarding the expense of collecting delinquent taxes due the City of Clarendon, and

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expenses.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon:

Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, and additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owned) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Section 2: In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the Donley County Appraisal District in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

**ORDINANCE NO. 274**

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR TAXATION OF ALL AUTOMOBILES, VANS, TRUCKS, MOTORCYCLES, RECREATION VEHICLES, MOTORHOMES, TRAVEL TRAILERS, TRAILERS, AND AIRCRAFT REQUIRED TO BE REGISTERED AND LICENSED FOR USE IN TEXAS OR THE UNITED STATES.**

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon recognizes the validity of the Texas Property Tax Code, specifically, Section 11.01 (a) "all real and tangible personal property ... is taxable unless exempt by law" and Section 11.25 (c) "the governing body of a taxing unit ... may provide for taxation of all automobiles."

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon that all automobiles, vans, trucks, motorcycles, recreational vehicles, motorhomes, travel trailers, trailers, and aircraft required to be registered and licensed for use in Texas or the United States shall be assessed and taxed on their market value in this tax district.

The Board next discussed the GTE franchise agreement. The ordinance, for a term of 5 years and agreeing to the sum of money equal to 2% of the annual gross receipts derived by the Telephone Company from exchange access rates as the cash consideration to be paid to the City of Clarendon annually passed.

**ORDINANCE NO. 275**

**AN ORDINANCE GRANTING THE RIGHT, PRIVILEGE AND FRANCHISE TO GENERAL TELEPHONE COMPANY OF THE SOUTHWEST, GRANTEE, AND ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, TO CONSTRUCT, ERECT, BUILD, EQUIP, OWN, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE IN, ALONG, UNDER, OVER AND ACROSS THE STREETS, AVENUES, ALLEYS, BRIDGES, VIADUCTS AND PUBLIC GROUNDS OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, SUCH POSTS, POLES, WIRES, CABLES, CONDUITS AND OTHER APPLIANCES, STRUCTURES AND FIXTURES NECESSARY OR CONVENIENT FOR RENDITION OF TELEPHONE AND OTHER COMMUNICATION SERVICE AND FOR CONDUCTING A GENERAL LOCAL LAND LONG-DISTANCE TELEPHONE BUSINESS; PROVIDING FOR CONSIDERATION; FOR PERIOD OF GRANT; FOR ASSIGNMENT; FOR METHOD OF ACCEPTANCE; FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND FOR PARTIAL INVALIDITY.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. GRANT OF RIGHT, PRIVILEGE AND FRANCHISE FOR CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF TELEPHONE PLANT AND SERVICE

That the right, privilege and franchise be, and the same is hereby, granted to General Telephone Company of the Southwest, hereinafter referred to as the "Telephone Company", and its successors or assigns, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, to construct, erect, build, equip, own, maintain and operate in, along, under, over and across the streets, alleys, avenues, bridges, viaducts and public grounds of the City, such posts,

poles, wires, cables, conduits and other appliances, structures and fixtures necessary or convenient for rendering telephone and other communication services and for conducting a general local/extended area and long-distance telephone business.

SECTION 2. SUPERVISION BY CITY OF LOCATION OF POLES AND CONDUIT

That all poles to be placed shall be of sound material and reasonably straight, and shall be so set that they will not interfere with the flow of water to any gutter or drain, and so that the same will interfere as little as practicable with the ordinary travel on the street or sidewalk. The location and route of all poles, stubs, guys, anchors, conduits and cables to be placed and constructed by the Telephone Company in the construction and maintenance of its telephone system in the City, and the location of all conduits to be laid by the Telephone Company within the limits of the City under this ordinance, shall be subject to the reasonable and proper regulation, control and direction of the City Council or of any City official to whom such duties have been or may be delegated.

That nothing in this Ordinance is intended to add to or detract from any authority granted by the Legislature of the State of Texas to the City Council, or of any City official to whom such duties have been or may be delegated, for one year from the date the surface of said street, alley, highway, or public place is broken for such construction or maintenance shall become the duty of the City. No such street, alley, highway, or public place shall be encumbered for a longer period than shall be necessary to execute the work.

SECTION 3. STREETS TO BE RESTORED TO GOOD CONDITION

That the surface of any street, alley, highway or public place within the City disturbed by the Telephone Company in building, constructing, renewing or maintaining its telephone plant and system shall be restored within a reasonable time after the completion of the work to as good a condition as before the commencement of the work and maintained to the satisfaction of the City Council, or of any City official to whom such duties have been or may be delegated, for one year from the date the surface of said street, alley, highway, or public place is broken for such construction or maintenance shall become the duty of the City. No such street, alley, highway, or public place shall be encumbered for a longer period than shall be necessary to execute the work.

SECTION 4. TEMPORARY REMOVAL OF WIRES

That the Telephone Company on the request of any person shall remove or raise or lower its wires within the City temporarily to permit the moving of houses or other bulky structures. The expense of such temporary removal, raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the benefited party or parties, and the Telephone Company may require such payment in advance. The Telephone Company shall be given not less than forty-eight (48) hours advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes. The clearance of wires above ground or rails within changes. The clearance of wires above ground or rails within the City and also underground work shall conform to the basic standards of the National Electrical Safety Code, National Bureau of Standards, United States Department of Commerce, as promulgated at the time of erection thereof.

SECTION 5. TREE TRIMMING

That the right, license, privilege and permission is hereby granted to the Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, to trim trees upon and overhanging the streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City, so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires or cables of the Telephone Company, and when so ordered by the City, said trimming shall be done under the supervision and direction of the City Council or of any City official to whom said duties have been or may be delegated.

SECTION 6. ANNUAL CASH CONSIDERATION TO BE PAID BY THE TELEPHONE COMPANY

That to indemnify the City for any and all possible damages to its streets, alleys, and public grounds which may result from the placing therein of the Telephone Company's poles, conduits, or other equipment or apparatus, and to compensate the City for its superintendence of this agreement, and as the cash consideration for the same, the Telephone Company agrees to pay to the City annually during the continuance of this agreement a sum of money equal to two percent (2%) of the annual gross receipts derived by the Telephone Company from exchange access rates, contained in Sections 6, 36, and 37 of its approved General Exchange Tariff, charged customers within the corporate limits of the City during the preceding year. The first payment hereunder shall be made March 31, 1989, and shall equal in amount to two percent (2%) of the gross receipts derived from exchange access rates from the date of acceptance of this Ordinance to December 31, 1988; and thereafter payment shall be made annually on March 31, as herein provided.

SECTION 7. PAYMENT OF CASH CONSIDERATION TO BE IN LIEU OF ANY OTHER PAYMENTS EXCEPT USUAL GENERAL OR SPECIAL AD VALOREM TAXES

That the City agrees that the consideration set forth in the preceding section hereof shall be paid and received in lieu of any tax, license, charge, fee, street or alley rental or any other character of charge for use and occupancy of the streets, alleys, and public places of the City; in lieu of any pole tax or inspection fee tax; in lieu of any easement or franchise tax, whether levied as an ad valorem, special or other character of tax; and in lieu of any imposition other than the usual general or special ad valorem taxes now or hereafter levied. Should the City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing cash consideration shall be in lieu of the taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, and easement or franchise taxes aforesaid, then the City agrees that it will apply so much of said payment as may be necessary to the satisfaction of the Telephone Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, and easement or franchise taxes.

SECTION 8. NO EXCLUSIVE PRIVILEGES CONFERRED BY THIS ORDINANCE

That nothing herein contained shall be construed as giving to the Telephone Company any exclusive privileges.

SECTION 9. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

That the rights, powers, limitations, duties and restrictions herein provided for shall inure to and be binding upon the parties hereto and upon their respective successors and assigns.

SECTION 10. PERIOD OF FRANCHISE

That this agreement shall be in full force and effect for the period beginning with the effective date hereof and ending Five (5) years after such date.

SECTION 11. PARTIAL INVALIDITY AND REPEAL PROVISIONS

That if any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be illegal, ultra vires or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. All ordinances and agreements and parts of ordinances and agreements in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 12. ACCEPTANCE OF AGREEMENT

That the Telephone Company shall have sixty (60) days from and after the passage and approval of this Ordinance to file its written acceptance thereof with the City Secretary, and upon such acceptance being filed, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its acceptance, and shall effectuate and make binding the agreement provided by the terms hereof.
