
John Sarich honored by Masonic Order

The Clarendon Post Office will adjust retail hours beginning February 13 says Postmaster McCombs. Operating hours are being reduced to help meet the Postal Services' reduction in operating expenses as required by Congress' Deficit Reduction Act. This Act requires the Postal Service to trim \$1.245 billion from its operating budget.

Nationwide, post offices have been ordered to reduce retail hours by 10 to 12 percent. Rather than close one afternoon a week as many areas are doing they have chosen this daily reduction as the least disruptive to



Many people mistakenly believe that Medicare covers all of the health care costs incurred by the elderly. Actually, however, Medicare currently covers only about 4 percent of these costs. And because these costs are so high, it is not uncommon for the lower-income elderly today to pay extraordinarily high percentages of

> Second, the elderly must normally pay premiums, coinsurance charges, and deductibles for those services that Medicare does cover. These costs have soared. The deductible for hospital care, for example, has increased by 155 percent in justthe past six years, from \$204 in '81 to \$520 in '87.

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



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

Health Hints for Today

By R.L. GILKEY, M.D., D.A.B.F.P.

Influenza is of epidemic proportions in Texas. It has certainly been bad in Donley County. Although many of the younger people with the flu are getting by reasonably well, those forty-five or older are frequently becoming very ill with a high complication rate with pneumonia. Those sixty-five or older who haven't taken the flu vaccine are at extremely high risk. Several have required hospitalization, but no deaths in our county as yet due to the influenza or its complications. Not only those over sixty-five should have the vaccination, but I'm recommending it for anyone at high risk or for those over forty-five if they are working with the public.

Pink Eye is epidemic in school. It is easy to diagnose. The white part of the eye is red and watery, and the eye is usually matted together in the mornings on arising. An antibiotic eye ointment will usually clear it promptly. Gastroenterities or intestinal flu, and strep throats appear to be on the decline. Christmas vacation helped slow down these potential epidemics.

Earlier in the winter I told some of you to watch for an influenza epidemic and get your vaccination if necessary.

Do It now.





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

The best way to acquire a fund for emergencies is to make saving a

Regular savers end up saving far more than occasional savers, even when they set aside a small amount at a time, says Nancy Granovsky, a family economics specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural **Extension Service.**

According to the specialist, there are several ways to get started on a savings plan: -Every payday put money into a

savings account first, before paying other expenses. -Have a protion of your earnings

deducted from your pay and deposited directly into a savings account. -When you pay off a loan, save the

amount of the old payment instead of putting it back into the budget for spending.

-Put your change in a home bank or jar. When it's full, deposit the money in the bank.

It's advisable to have a fund to draw on in case of unemployment or a financial emergency. You may want to build a fund of 2 to 6 months take-home pay, an amount equal to your fixed expenses for a year, or some other amount appropriate for your financial situation.

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon deems it necessary to have a declared policy regarding the expense of collecting delinquent taxes due the City of City

of Clarendon, and WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expenses

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon:

Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, and additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owned) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Section 2: In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the Donley County Appraisal District in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent

Should the City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing cash consideration shall be in lieu of the taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, and easement or franchise taxes aforesaid, then the City agrees that it will apply so much of said payment as may be necessary to the satisfaction of the Telephone Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, and

easement or franchise taxes. SECTION 8. NO EXCLUSIVE PRIVILEGES CONFERRED BY THIS ORDINANCE

That nothing herein contained shall be construed as giving to the Telephone Company any exclusive

SECTION 9. SUCCESSORS AND

That the rights, powers, limitations, duties and restrictions herein provided for shall inure to and be binding upon the parties hereto and upon their respective successors and

SECTION 10. PERIOD OF FRANCHISE

That this agreement shall be in full force and effect for the period beginning with the effective date hereof and ending Five (5) years after such date.
