Jones makes quilt to honor Methodist Church Centennial

Mrs. Madelyn Jones, a well known Howardwick resident, renowned throughout the county for her ability to make beautiful quilts and has won several prizes with them, has made a 36 x 50 inch quilt hanging, depicting the front of the First United Methodist Church which is celebrating their centennial year in 1988. The quilt will hang on display in the sanctuary.

The Committee on Special Activities and Entertainment asked Mrs. Jones last summer if she could consider quilting something to help the church celebrate this centennial year.

Mrs. Jones gave the project much thought and then drew a small scale design, when satisfied with the design, enlarged it to scale. The quilt is blue with purple, orchid and yellow with red and blue border blocks in between to make the border have a stain glass look. The quilt has a cross quilted through the middle of the cross section. On each side of the cross at the top is alligned a Dove on one side and an Angel on the other. She designed the quilt to depict the front of the church building in every small detail even to putting the words "Methodist Episcopal Church South" as it was called when the building was built in 1888. The building still has that inscription across the front.

Clarendon EMS honored in top four services in Texas Panhandle

The annual meeting of the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System, Inc. (PEMSS) was held on Thursday, January 14, 1988 at the Amarillo Psychiatric Pavilion auditorium at 7:00 p.m. Attending from Clarendon were Becky Lane, Paramedic, JoDee Mincey, Paramedic, and Jim Mincey, EMT.

At the meeting, it was revealed that the top four services in the Texas Panhandle were Clarendon, Wayside, Amarillo, and Dalhart. Dalhart EMS was named the top service in the Panhandle and received the award. During the meeting and banquet, Leland Lewis, Executive Director of PEMSS gave a presentation on the four top services. During the Clarendon presentation, he highly praised the job that Clarendon is doing within its service area and reviewed their accomplishments for 1987. He commented that "Clarendon is known as the service whose patients always arrive in stable condition at the Emergency Receiving Center and they are well known for their ability to handle critical cases." He also mentioned the new fire station/EMS project as being second to none of any facility in this or any other area. Joyce Cheek, Executive Secretary of PEMSS remarked that the show of community support for Clarendon's nomination was overwhelming from the number of letters, calls, and signatures on the petitions which were sent to them although they weren't too surprised by the community support since Clarendon always had had the total support of its residents and the residents of the surrounding area.

PEMSS comprises the 25 counties of the Panhandle and consists of 51 separate ambulance services and 89 emergency vehicles. PEMSS is looked to as one of the top EMS systems in the country and is the largest both in geographical area and number of affiliate services of any other system.

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These Drugs Can Cause Constipation

Although there are many causes of constipation, the lack of adequate fiber in the diet is probably the most common. Some constipation may result from taking certain medications. Drug-induced constipation can occur with both prescription and nonprescription medicines.

Aluminum-containing antacids are a major offender, especially among many older individuals. Manufacturers often add magnesium-type antacids to help minimize the constipating effects that can occur with aluminum.

Atropine-like drugs, which are often used to control spasms of the gastrointestinal tract, antidepressants, and medicines used for Parkinsonism can cause constipation by slowing the movement of the bowel. Narcotic pain relievers such as codeine and morphine can also cause a reduction in the normal movement of the intestine which results in constipation.

There are several approaches to coping with the constipation that occurs with medicines. Talk with your pharmacist or physician if you think your medicines may be causing problems.

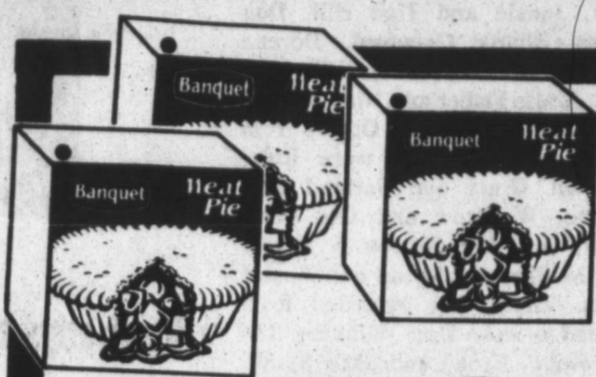

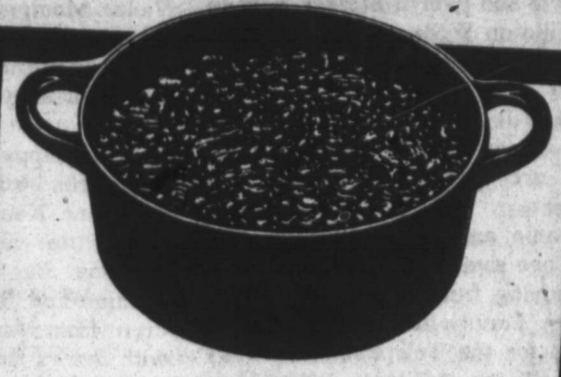
