## Wheels for Life Bike ride fights Childhood Cancer

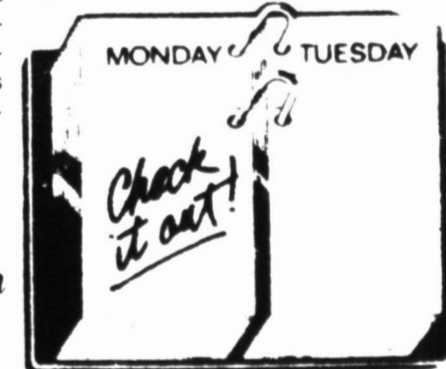

## Open Bass tourney

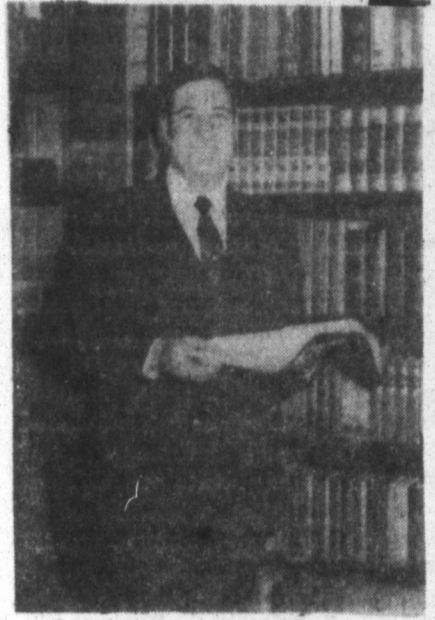

## From The PEN of PASTOR PINION



### "DEFILEMENT OF THE APPETITE"

Last week we saw how Nebuchadnezzar attempted to "Chaldeanize" Daniel and his companions by re-teaching them to think like the world. We must beware our thought patterns because, "as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he". Most all sin is conceived in the mind before it is committed.

The second attempt to defile Daniel was through his appetite. In Daniel 1:5 we find that it was appointed to Daniel a portion of the kings meat and wine. At a glance we might ask ourselves what would be so bad about this. To understand it we must understand the culture of the Babylonians. They were vile and excessive in their daily lives. Gluttony and drunkenness was as natural to them as the sun rising in the east. It is also significant to understand that often the meat the king ate was first offered to idols. In Acts 15:19,20

the council of Jerusalem instructed the new gentile christians to abstain from "pollution of idols". It is also obvious that Daniel understood that to be pure before God demanded total abstinence from strong drink. (alcohol is a depressant) it opens a person to the influence of Satan. Consider how many vile crimes are committed while intoxicated. Daniel refused to be polluted by this wanton life of appeasing the flesh.

In I Corinthians 9:24-27 Paul likens the christian life to the discipline of a runner in training for a race. If we are to remain a fit vessel for the Master we must not give over to worldly appetites that cause the flesh to be in control. Rather we are to bring our body under subjection that whether it be gluttony, drunkenness or immorality we refrain from the lust of the flesh. This is achieved by yielding to the Spirit and determining that we will live not under our control, but under His.

## Public hearing on 65-mile-an-hour speed limit set for May 1

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has scheduled a public hearing to receive public views and comments on proposed action raising the maximum speed limit on rural portions of Interstate highways in Texas to 65 miles per hour.

The hearing is scheduled for 9 a.m. Friday, May 1, in the first floor auditorium (Room 101) of the Dewitt C. Greer State Highway Building, 11th and Brozos streets, Austin.

The public hearing is the first legal step necessary to consider changing the speed limit in Texas. After the public hearing, the commission will review testimony. If the commission decides to change the limit, the order

would be filed with the governor. If he concurs with the order, he will issue a proclamation. The earliest effective date would be eight days after the filing of the commission order with the governor.

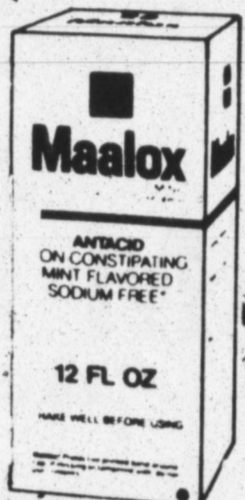

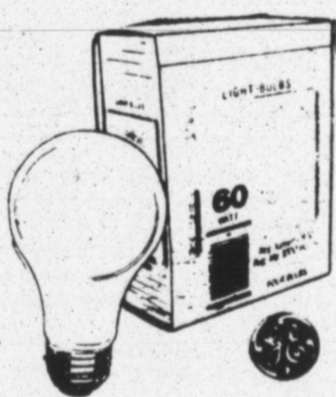

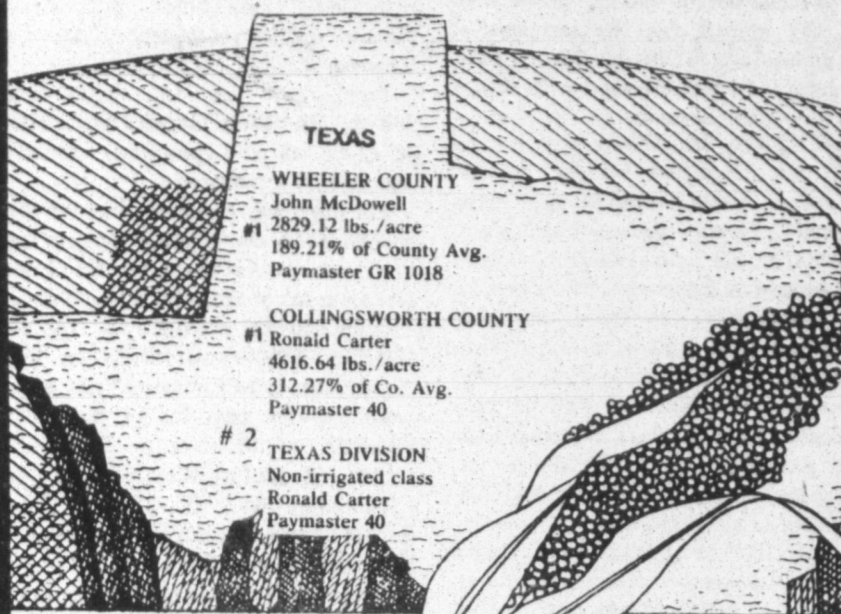

### Sleepless Nights

Difficulty falling asleep or staying asleep is one of the most common of all complaints. Sometimes the cause of sleepless nights is clear (a crying baby or other source of noise in the home, pain, depression due to loss of a loved one or excessive napping during daytime hours. At other times the reason is not clear. Problem sleep that does not respond to nondrug approaches or an over-the-counter sleep aid should be evaluated by a physician, because the prob-

lem could be a symptom of a more serious condition.

Some individuals have found that obtaining moderate exercise during the daytime hours is helpful. Relaxing in a warm bath or reading before bedtime are effective sleep inducers in others. Drinking a glass of milk may also bring on sleep, perhaps due to the amino acid *L-tryptophan* that is present. Studies have shown

that this particular amino acid may be useful in increasing total sleep time.

A nonprescription sleep aid may also be helpful. Virtually all of these products contain an antihistamine such as *diphenhydramine* or *pyrilamine*. Drowsiness is a side effect of the antihistamines. This "side effect" becomes the major therapeutic effect when these products are used as sleep aids.
