## Clarendon gets new VFW post

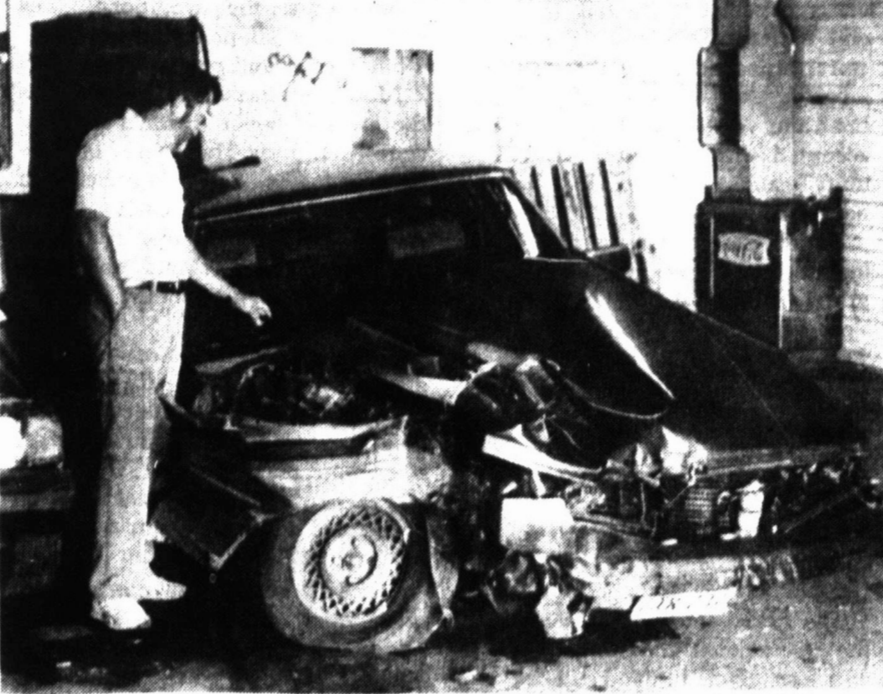

## Burlington Locomotive smashes local auto

A Burlington unit train loaded with coal smashed into a car just east of Clarendon about 3:30 p.m. Sunday. The automobile was totaled.

DPS officers Ray Burch and Jerry Morris investigated the crash, and said that "high weeds were the main cause". David Lowrie, who was driving the automobile, stated that he did not see the on-coming train. According to both the driver and the DPS, the Toyota Cressida was stopped at the time of impact.

Fortunately there were no serious injuries apparent. There were four people in the car. Passengers were Paula Lowrie, Nathan Lowrie and Donald Gooch.

The Lowries reported that the train crew stated that they saw the accident developing a few seconds before impact, but were powerless to stop the train in a short distance. Such trains may carry as much as 10,000 to 12,000 tons of coal, in addition to the weight of the locomotives and cars. Even at relatively slow speeds, such weights generate tremendous inertia, and can not be stopped in short distances. Patrolman Burch stated that the train was not exceeding the lawful speed of 49 mph.

Patrolman Burch suggested that county residents exercise extreme caution at all railroad grade crossings.

A deadline date for the family histories to be in the office of The Clarendon Press was never set. Well that time has come...the final deadline date will be October 1. That is the absolute date for these family histories.

There will be very few books printed over the reservation list. If you wish your history in the book, or want to purchase one of them, you must make that reservation by Sept. 1.

If you need help in writing your history, the staff of The Clarendon Press and some very able volunteers will be happy to help you with your history. But please don't wait any longer. The time is now.

Helen Woody, owner of The Clarendon Press has sold the newspaper and will be leaving Clarendon in January to join her husband J.C. in Nevada. Helen stated, "I started this book, and I do not want to leave Clarendon until this book is finished. It takes about six weeks to get it published, after all the information is in the Curtis Media office. This deadline would make the book available at approximately Christmas time.

We told Curtis Media when we took this project on, that we would only do it, if we could work at our pace, that it would be slow, as we all were busy people and had many other things to do.

For the people who went right to work, got their reservations and history done early, we know that it has been a long wait. We appreciate your patience.

The first thing we need to do is get the reservations reserved for your book. Then we can take that list and see who has not got their histories finished and we will be able to help you.

others will be helping us finish. School will be starting soon and Jean and Mary Beth will be busy, if you need help or have any question please contact us.

Most of the family histories so far, have been from people who used to live in Donley County. The present residents have not been too active in getting their histories written, but since there was no deadline, everyone supposed they had lots of time to finish.

We would like to impress upon the citizens of the county. This book is not for just old timers, the pioneers, or the people who have lived here a long time. This book is to be a record of the people who have lived in the county at one time or another, regardless of how long. If you have only been here a few months, a year, two, five, ten, or was born here, this book is to preserve and record your existence in Donley County. It is to be a record that your children, grandchildren and great grandchildren can trace your history in Donley County fifty or hundred years from now.

So many people think that just because they have not lived in the county very long that this is not for them. This book is for anyone who has ever lived in Donley County. So, if you want your history recorded, please contact The Clarendon Press at 874-2259 and make your reservation deposit. The deposit is \$20 per book. We do not know at this time what the total cost of the book will be. The least it can be will be \$27.00 and the most \$49.50 plus the tax. 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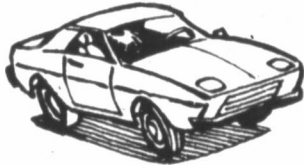

#### Notice of Effective Tax Rate

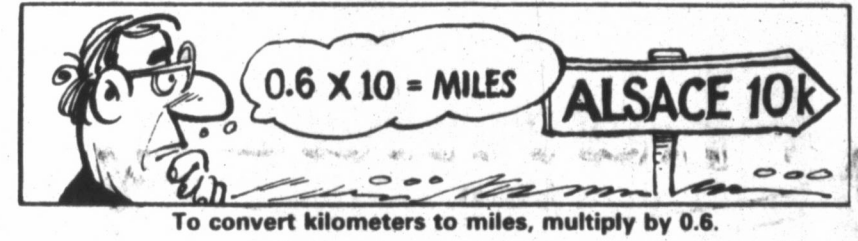
This notice concerns 1988 property tax rates. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. Compare it to the tax rate the taxing unit proposes for this year. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

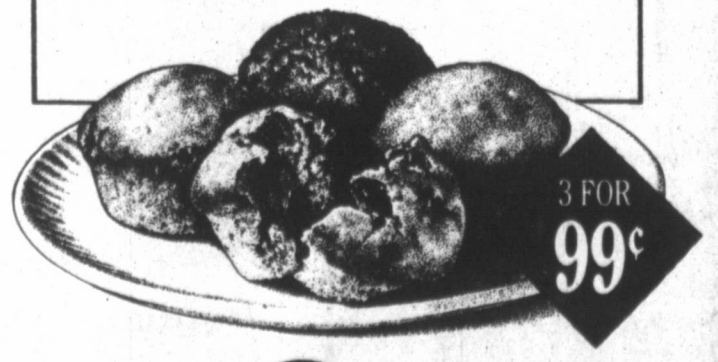

There being no further business, meeting was adjourned.

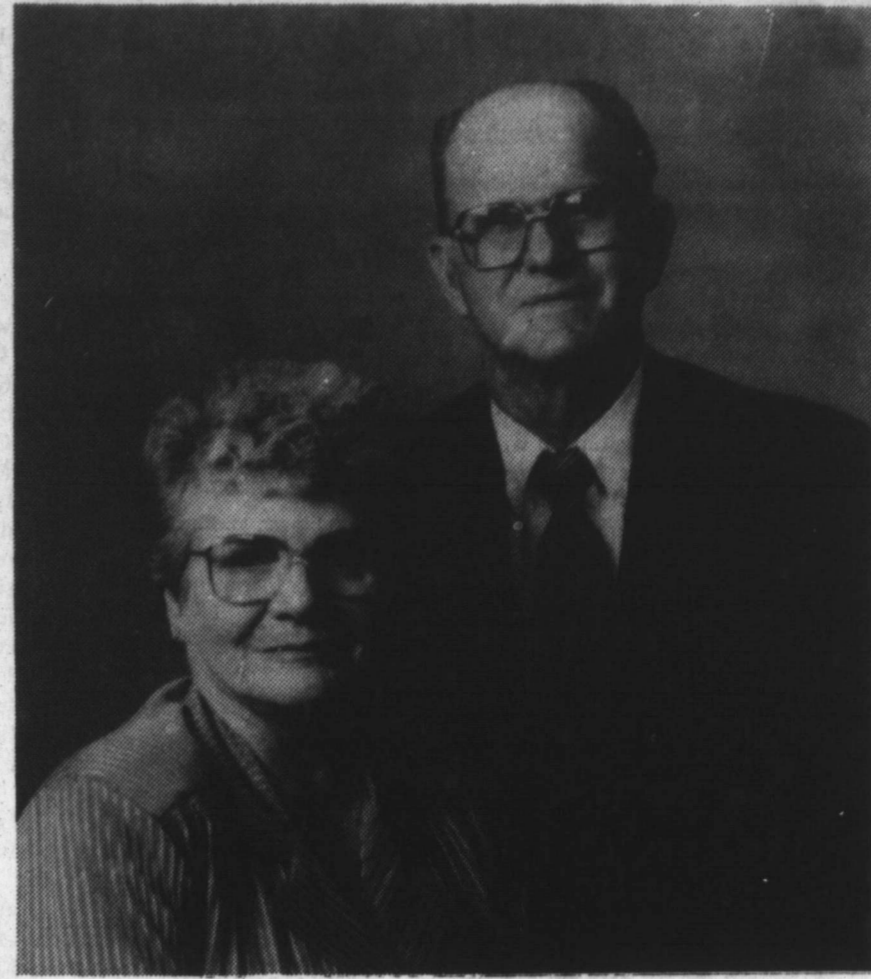

**Medicines for Anxiety**

Anxiety is sometimes defined as an "apprehensive uneasiness or fearful concern." Fortunately, most individuals are able to work through most periods of anxiety. However, when anxiety lingers or becomes excessive, medications referred to as *antianxiety agents* are sometimes prescribed.

The most commonly used antianxiety medicines are in the chemical class referred to as the *benzodiazepines*. About a dozen benzodiazepines (e.g. *chlordiazepoxide*, *diazepam* and *triazolam*) are now commercially available and widely used. The dose of benzodiazepine varies from person to person, depending on differences in metabolism and distribution rates. For some persons, the medicine may be needed for only a few weeks. For others, the length of therapy may need to be longer.

Nondrug approaches to stress and anxiety (exercise, hobbies, and job changes) are sometimes effective. When these are not possible or fully effective, physicians may prescribe an antianxiety agent. While benzodiazepines neither "cure" anxiety nor benefit all individuals equally, they are usually well tolerated when used for short periods of time.

This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Deuteronomy 6:7-9

**GOD'S COMPLIMENTS**  
By Jon Leggett

From cover to cover, the Bible is filled with declarations of God's love for His people. One of the most thrilling expressions of that love is to be found in the names He gives to His followers. Let's look at three of those names given to us by the Lord.

First, "Ye are my witnesses. . . (Isaiah 43:10)." What a marvelous change it will make in the life of the church when we finally realize that being a witness is not primarily taking on a task—often a dreaded task—assigned by the church of knocking on doors and going through some presentation we are not comfortable with. Of course, there is a place for such formal contact with the community by the church. But there seems to be an unspoken cry among so many Christians, "I'll never get good at this!" In this passage, God tells us we ARE—not we could someday become—His witnesses. In that forty-third chapter of Isaiah, he reminds His people of all that they have experienced of His love and power, and that they are privileged to share that experience, in word, in attitude, in action, with everyone around us. God allows me to be a part of His great plan. I'm His

witness. What a compliment!

Secondly, Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount, "Ye are the salt of the earth. (Matthew 5:13)" Again, what a tremendous compliment. Salt was so valuable in the ancient world that it was occasionally used for money. God values His people. It was often used as a preservative. God wants us to keep society from becoming rotten. Salt gives flavor. You as His child are intended to give flavor to the otherwise bland, tasteless existence of those around you. Salt is a thirst-inducer, and His people ought to make the world thirsty for the Water of Life—for Jesus Himself.

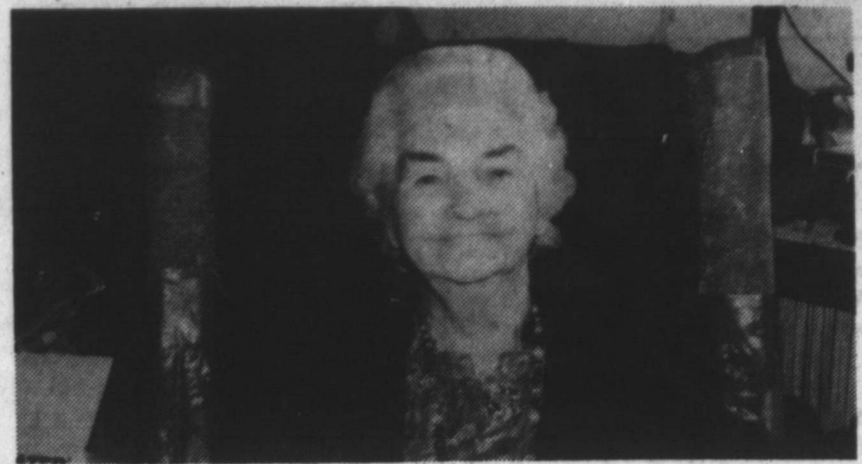
The third name we will consider is found in the very next verse, Matthew 5:14. "Ye are the light of the world." Can you imagine a world without light to guide, to signal, to warn? We are to provide that illumination to those among whom He has placed us. That God would trust us with such a noble task is thrilling beyond measure. And when we consider that when Jesus says, "Ye are the light of the world." He gives us the very same name He has taken for Himself in John 8:12, we should fall on our knees in humility and thankfulness like we've never done before. Think of it! Jesus gives me His own name! Hallelujah!

Finally, it is the promise of the Lord in Revelation 2:17 that, "To him that overcometh will I . . . give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written. . . ." Numerous interpretations of this verse have been offered, but one cannot help being reminded of several individuals in the Bible who received new names which indicated a new relationship with their Lord. For example, Abram becomes Abraham, and Saul becomes Paul.

Have you entered into that joyful, new intimate fellowship with the Lord? Would you hear Him bestow upon you the honor of becoming His witness, His flavoring in an insipid world, His light to help guide those stumbling along the way? Accept His way, and accept the name—the compliments—from Him whose name is above all names.

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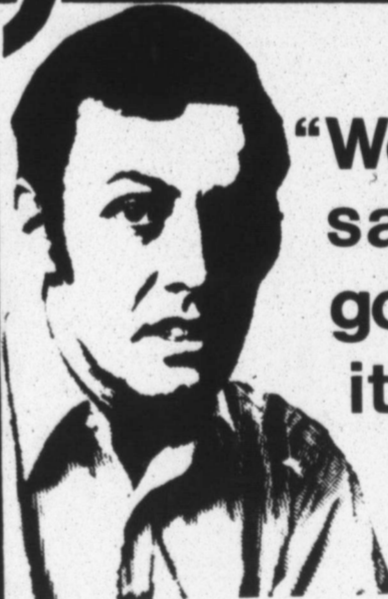

Mr. and Mrs. Don Williams and children had supper with his parents the Horace Williams at Panhandle Sunday evening.

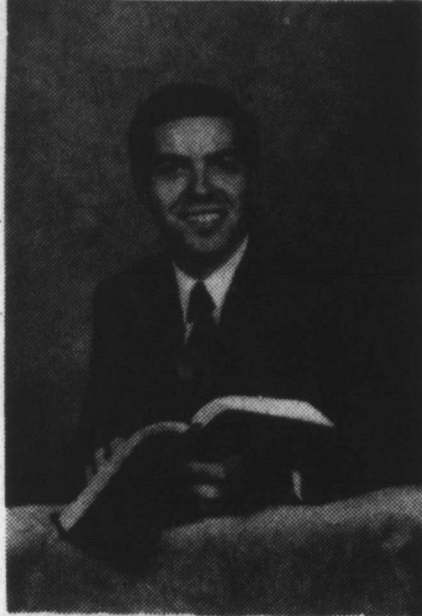

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns, said Gooch. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square foot of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon, Dursban or Dylox provide adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock them down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square foot to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding, said Gooch. Contact Ronald Gooch for further information.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

- If your home or water system has lead pipes or
- If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- If the home is less than five years old, or
- If you have soft or acidic water, or
- If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

The city of Hedley purchases its water from Greenbelt Water Authority. This water source has been found to be well below acceptable limits for lead. Regular tests are conducted to maintain this. The Texas Health Department and the City of Hedley are working together to provide a safe and potable public water source. The city of Hedley has in the past removed all known lead piping from its distribution system and will be on the look out for any lead piping remaining.

If your drinking water is determined to have high levels of lead, or if you suspect lead contamination, you can do the following to minimize exposure:

1. Flush each cold water faucet until the water is as cold as it will get before using the water from this faucet to drink or for cooking. This is especially important if the water has sat in the pipes for several hours. Please remember other household water use such as toilets, bathing, and laundry will flush water thru the pipes and reduce the time the tap should be flushed.
  2. Do not use hot tap water for drinking or cooking. Hot water dissolves lead faster than cold water. Especially avoid using hot tap water to make baby formula. If hot water must be used for drinking or cooking, use cold water after flushing the tap and heat.
  3. Make certain only materials conforming to the federal law regarding lead content are used for any plumbing repairs or new plumbing work in your home.
- If the City becomes aware of any source of lead contamination within the City's distribution system, corrective measures will be taken.
