From cover to cover, the Bible is

filled with declarations of God's love

for His people. One of the most

be found in the names He gives to

His followers. Let's look at three of

those names given to us by the Lord.

First, "Ye are my witnesses. . .

witness. What a compliment! Secondly, Jesus said in the Sermon on the Mount, "Ye are the salt of the earth. (Matthew 5:13)" Again, what a tremendous compliment. Salt was so valuable in the ancient world that it was occasionally used for money. God values His people. It was often used as a preservative. God wants us to keep society from becoming rotten. Salt gives flavor. You as His child are intended to give flavor to the otherwise bland, tasteless existence of those around you. Salt is a thirst-inducer, and His people ought to make the world thirsty for the

Water of Life--for Jesus Himself. The third name we will consider is found in the very next verse, Matthew 5:14. "Ye are the light of the world." Can you imagine a world without electricity? What would we do without light to guide, to signal, to warn? We are to provide that illumination to those among whom He has placed us. That God would trust us with such a noble task is thrilling beyond measure. And when we consider that when Jesus says, "Ye are the light of the world." He gives us the very same name He has taken for Himself in John 8:12. we should fall on our knees in humility and thankfulness like we've never done before. Think of it! Jesus gives me His own name! Halleluiah!

Finally, it is the promise of the Lord in Revelation 2:17 that, "To him that overcometh will I. . . give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written ..... '' Numerous interpretations of this verse have been offered, but one cannot help being reminded of several individuals in the Bible who received new names which indicated a new relationship with their Lord. For example, Abram becomes Abraham, and Saul becomes Paul.

Have you entered into that joyful, new intimate fellowship with the Lord? Would you hear Him bestow upon you the honor of becoming His witnesses, His flavoring in an insipid world, His light to help guide those stumbling along the way? Accept His way, and accept the name--the compliments--from Him whose name is above all names.



In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.






### 1947 and 1948 classes hold reunion

Safety belt use up in past six up," he said.

"We're very encouraged by the increase in safety-belt use," Trietsch added. "Public education is important in getting people to understand why they should use seat belts, but it seems some people have to believe they really might get a ticket before they'll change their behavior," he said.

Laredo showed the most startling change, increasing compliance by 17.7 percentage points between January and June, followed by El Paso with a 17 point rise and Tyler with a 14.3 point increase. All three cities recently have made substantial increases in enforcement. Laredo, Tyler and Austin participate in a federally funded program to encourage safety-belt enforcement. Austin has the state's second hightest usage rate at 72.8 percent, while Corpus Christi takes top honors with 83.3 percent.

"The bottom line is that safety belts save lives, and making Texas highways safer is what we're out to accomplish," said Trietsch. Several state agencies, including the highway department, have adopted the national goal of achieving 70 percent usage of safety belts and child-safety seats by 1990.

Fleas attack both man and animals and often become a major problem during the summer months in Texas. The tiny pests cause annoyance and discomfort and can also spread certain diseases, a major one being bubonic plague.

Adult fleas cause the most problems as they have piercing sucking mouthparts and suck blood, said Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent. Adult fleas may live from two months to two years. After each blood meal females lay four to eight eggs, which hatch in two to three weeks. They may deposit as many as 500 eggs in their lifetime.

Flea control may be difficult due to the circumstances under which the pests occur. Home infestations are often discovered a short time after a pet has been taken out of the home. Immature fleas have completed development and, with the absence of the normal host, turn to man for their life-sustaining blood meal.

Satisfactory control of fleas for any length of time depends on these factors: Both adult and immature fleas must be eliminated from the home and yard by proper chemical control and sanitation measures, such as replacing infested bedding materials and cleaning carpets and stuffed furniture; Pets must be rid of fleas by using registered chemicals. In the case of rate or mice fleas, these hosts must be eliminated; Reinfestation must be prevented by protecting pets with flea collars or other preventative chemicals during times of likely infestations.

Chemicals registered for indoor flea control include Bayson, Cygon, diazinon, dursban, and malathion. Treat animals' bedding or remove the bedding and replace with new material. Good coverage is necessary for good control.

To control fleas on host animals, use dursban, lindane or Vapona on Dogs, and Korlan, lindane, malathion and Phosmet on cats. Since some of these cehmicals have specific restrictions, be sure to read the label prior to use. Some compounds may be harmful to greyhounds and whippets. Don't treat nursing puppies or kittens or animals that are ill said Gooch

### **Control white** grubs in lawns

White grub control in lawns is important during the summer sea-

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil now and are starting to swarm in late evenings. Females are laying eggs and white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of grasses in home lawns. Once grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken, said Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in south Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Donley County will need to treat between August 1 and


15. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns, said Gooch. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square foot of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon, Dursban or Dylox provide adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock them down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil

Apply diazon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square foot to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding, said Gooch. Contact Ronald Gooch for further information.







#### NOTIFICATION



The city of Hodley purchases its water from Greenbelt Water Authority. This water source has been found to be well below acceptable limits for lead. Regular tests are conducted to aintain this. The Texas Health Department and the City of Hedley are working together to provide a safe and potible public water source. The city of Hedley has in the past removed all known lead piping from its distribution system and will be on the look out for any load piping remaining.

If your drinking water is determined to have high levels of lead, or if you suspect lead contamination, you can do the following to minimize exposure: 1. Flush each cold water fauces




