Services for William Hobart Moffitt, 90, of Hedley were Friday, May 27, at 2 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church in Hedley with Rev. James Carter, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Clarendon, Don Stone minister of the church of Christ and Rev. Bryan Knowles pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hedley officiating. Interment was in Rowe Cemetery under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home of Memphis.

Mr. Moffitt died Wednesday, May 25 at Hall County Hospital following a lengthy illness. Mr. Moffitt was born in Corsicana, Texas in 1897 and moved to Hedley in 1917. He married Mary Pauline Crawford on December 23, 1923 at Clarendon. She died in 1970. They had one son Jerry that died in 1934. He owned and managed Moffitt Hardware in Hedley since 1946.

Survivors include one brother Robert Lincoln Moffitt of Pampa, one sister Ruby Beckler of Hedley, 2 sisters-in-law, Melba Moffitt of Pampa and Loyce Moffitt of Amarillo and several nieces and nephews.

Recycling drive to benefit historical commission

Donley County has the oldest surviving town, Clarendon, in the Texas Panhandle. So much of our heritage and historical artifacts have gone to West Texas State and Texas Tech Museum. The Donley County Historical Commission and the Saint's Roost Museum have been working tirelessly trying to save and preserve this history for Donley County citizens for generations to come.

A Donley County historical Commission spokesman stated, "we are trying to preserve our heritage. Like many organizations there never is enough money to do our projects. The Commission has placed a cotton trailer, which was donated by Horace Green, on the vacate lot owned by Junior Spier, east of the post office for aluminum cans.

If you would like to donate your aluminum soft drink cans such as Coke, Dr. Pepper, Sprite and etc. as well as beer cans, this money will be used to help the Commission with their projects.

Studies show that area residents are throwing away over \$1,000,000 worth of aluminum cans each year.

Recycling began modestly in 1970 and records indicated that six beverage cans were recycled for each person in the U.S.. However, this picture changed dramatically as 157 cans were recycled for each U.S. Citizen by 1987.

The Donley County Historical Commission is that you help them preserve Donley County Heritage by depositing your aluminum cans and scrape in the trailer provided.

Faith Saddlery opens new business

Jeff Anderberg and Larry Coats have started a new business in Clarendon, right behind Biven's Pharmacy. They are making saddles and tack.

Both young men are originally from Nebraska. Coats comes from eastern Nebraska, while Anderberg grew up in the sandhills of western Nebraska. Each man ran his own custom show in Nebraska before attending TSTI, where they met. Later, the partners worked for Texas Saddle here in Clarendon. They still do contract work for that firm, and Texas Saddle cuts some leather for the new shop.

Coats and Anderberg produce several saddles per week. One man can make a simple saddle in 15 to 20 hours. Obviously, fancier saddles require more labor. By working steadily, one man might finish a fancy custom saddle in a week.

A saddlemaker begins by selecting an appropriate saddle tree. A shop in New Mexico builds the trees and ships them to Faith Saddlery. The tree is the foundation for the rest of the saddle. The craftsmen place various layers of leather over the tree, & attach a variety of hardware. The final layer may be elaborately tooled, or it may be fairly plain.

Faith Saddlery prices their saddles quite competitively. Retail, a good saddle might sell for as little as \$750, but a show saddle could cost as much as \$2,000.

The new firm also repairs worn saddles.

Faith Saddlery should be good for the city of Clarendon. By "exporting" saddles, the partnership brings new money into the local economy. They also provide the area with a picturesque business that should help to attract tourists. Such tourist

are worth hundreds of dollars per head to Donley County and its residents. Certainly Faith Saddlery is appropriate for this area.

Anderberg and Coats welcome visitors. (although it would be considerate to telephone first). And their new venture is very welcome in Clarendon.

Helpline for eye care

If you know a disadvantaged elderly person who needs medical eye care, ask them to call this toll-free Helpline: 1-800-222-EYES (1-800-222-3937).

Eligible callers will be referred to a nearby eye physician and surgeon (ophthalmologist) who will provide the care at no out-of-pocket cost.

The National Eye Care Project (NECP) is sponsored by the state society of eye physicians and surgeons and the Foundation of the American Academy of Ophthalmology. It is designed to make medical eye care available to persons age 65 or older who might otherwise not receive critical care to preserve their sight.

To be eligible, a person must be: --age 65 or older. --financially unable to pay for the care.

--In addition, the person must not currently be the patient of an ophthalmologist who is providing medical eye care.

Eye glasses, prescription drugs, and hospital care are not provided by the program.

More than 215,000 persons have called the NECP, and thousands have been treated for potentially blinding eye diseases. The number to call: 1-800-222-3937.

County changes fees

Faye Vargas, Donley County Clerk, states there have been some changes this year in fees and waiting periods in getting records, such as birth, death, warranty deeds, power of attorney, deeds of trust, abstract of judgements and marriage licenses. Effective January 1, 1988 the waiting period for getting married is 72 hours from the time of issuance of the marriage license. The license is good for 30 days and the fee for the license is \$25.00. \$12.50 of this fee goes to the State Children's Trust Fund and the other \$12.50 remains in the county.

Certified copy of a birth or a death record costs \$7.50 for the first one and \$2.00 for the second one if issued at the same time as the first.

Recording fees for warranty deeds, deeds of trust, abstract of judgement, power of attorney, et al will be \$3.00 for the first page, \$2.00 for each part or additional page.

The County Clerk's office is open Monday thru Friday except on holidays, and is located in the courthouse annex.

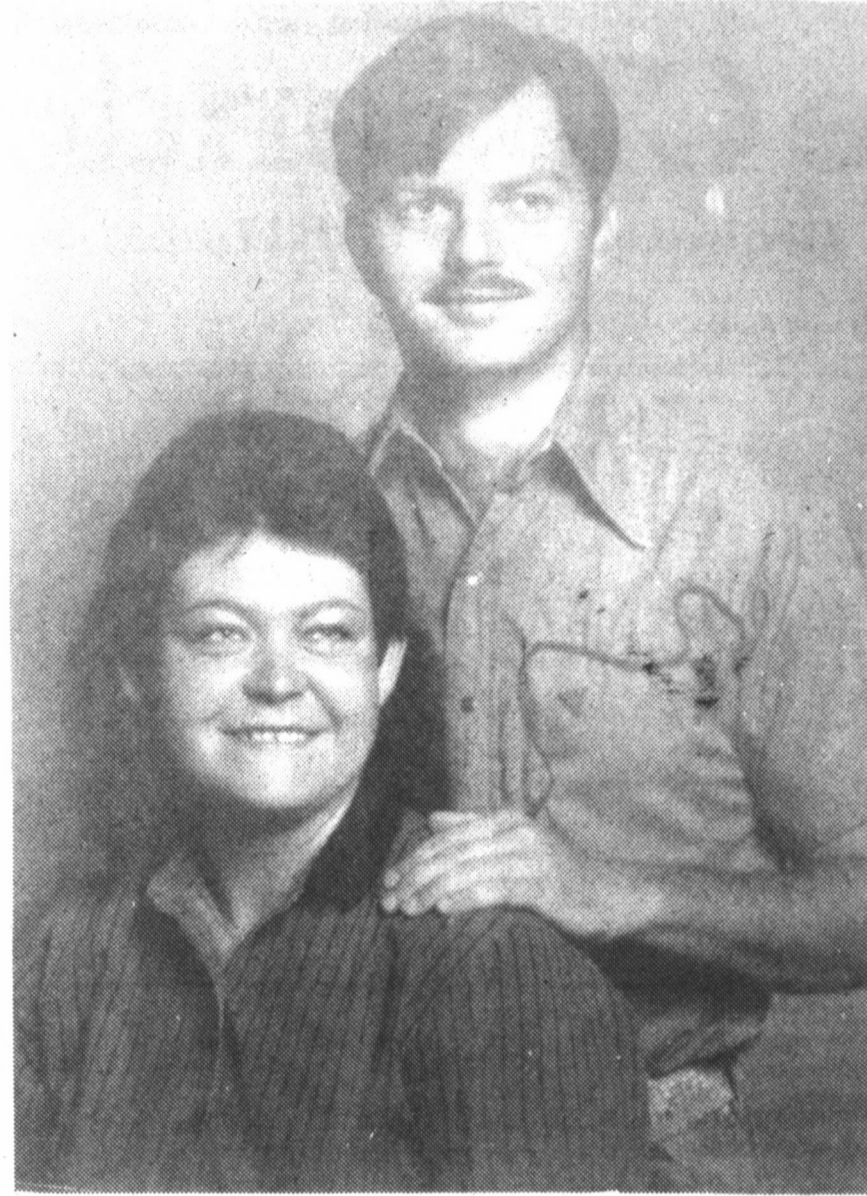
The prospective groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don D. Thornberry of Clarendon.

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Four Medicines for Glaucoma

Glaucoma, a condition of increased pressure from fluid build-up within the eye, is the leading cause of blindness in the United States. Eye specialists commonly use one or more medicine groups to treat this condition. Each group has its own specific advantages and disadvantages.

Beta Blockers: These medicines reduce eye pressure by slowing the production of aqueous fluid within the eye. *Timolol* was the first of the beta blockers used in glaucoma.

Adrenalin-Like Agents: *Epinephrine* and related compounds are thought to ease eye pressure by improving eye fluid drainage.

Cholinesterase Inhibitors: *Physostigmine, demecarium bromide, and echothiopate iodide* cause drainage of aqueous fluid from within the eye for prolonged periods of time (several days for some of these drugs).

Direct-Acting Miotics: *Pilocarpine* and related medications reduce eye pressure by causing certain eye muscles to contract, which open the canal that drains fluid from the eye.



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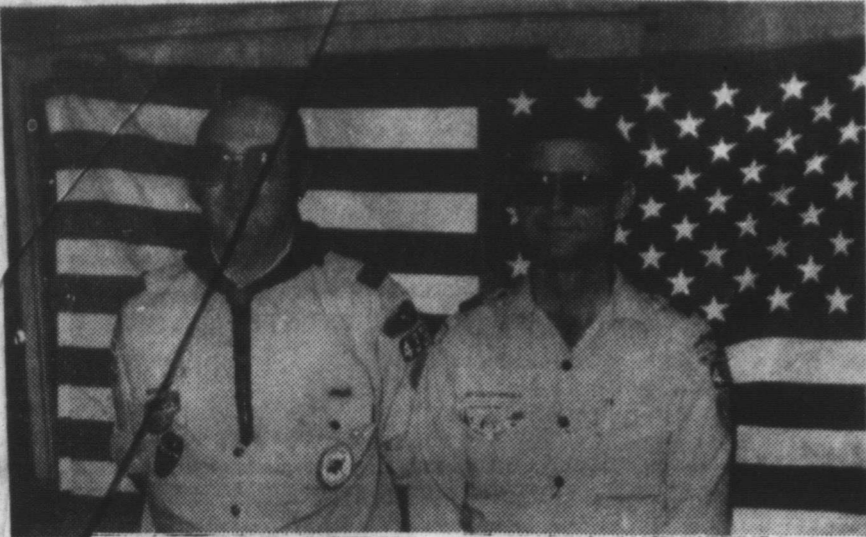

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
3. if the home is less than five years old, or
4. if you have soft or acidic water, or
5. if water sits in the pipes for several hours

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing. The Greenbelt Water System has no lead pipe in its system. According to the latest State Health Department Chemical Analysis (March, 1988) the Greenbelt Water System contains less than 0.02 parts per million (ppm).

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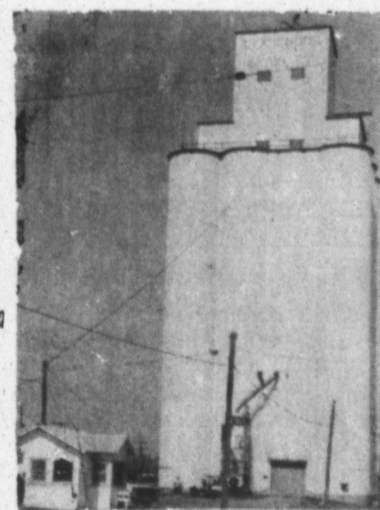
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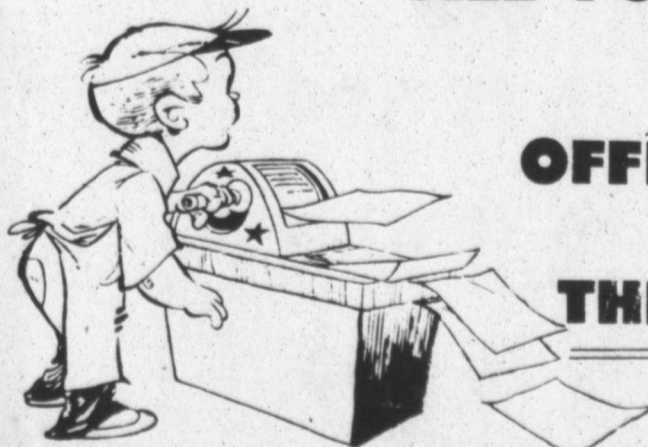
