Five College Courses Offered by Television

Clarendon College will be offering five courses via television this fall for the first time in its history. Freshman English, American History, American Government, Introduction to Business, and General Psychology will be broadcasted over Channel 2 (non-cable) and TCA Cable Channel 3 in Amarillo. Interested students should consult their local cable companies to determine on which channel KACV-TV will be broadcasted.

These courses are equivalent to on-campus courses and are fully transferable. Clarendon College is planning three registration days, August 24-26. Students may sign up for TV courses at the registration office on the campus of Clarendon College on these days. Students will be required to come to a general orientation session at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, August 29th. The first televised course will begin on Monday morning, August 29th.

Exams will be given on three or four dates during the semester. Students must come to campus for the exams. County Clerk Seeks Home for Marriage Licenses

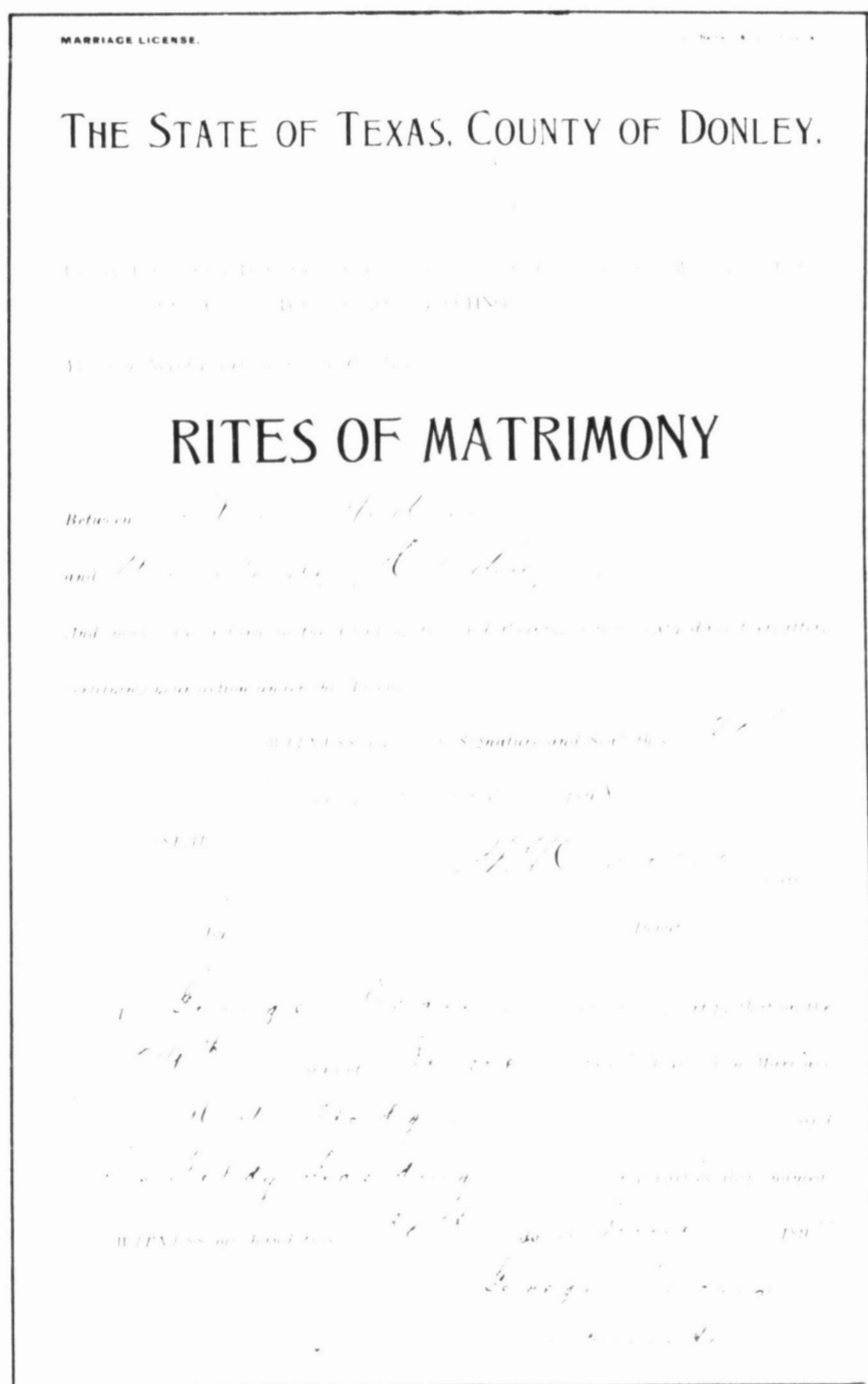
County Clerk Fay Vargas has a problem. She has too many marriage licenses. In fact, she has two drawers that are full of licenses that were never picked up by the newlyweds. And some of those newlyweds were married back in 1880.

The licenses have collected in the County Clerk's office as a result of the procedure that the state uses to record weddings. Young lovers go to the County Clerk's office, pay a fee and get a license. After the wedding, the minister, judge or justice-of-the-peace returns the license to the county, and the secretaries record the marriage in county records. If the couple have included a self-addressed envelope, the license is then returned to the newlyweds. Or, the couple may come by the county

clerk's office and pick up the marriage document.

Sometimes, however, the couple did not include an envelope and postage nor come by to pick up the paper. That leaves the County Clerk with the original marriage license. In other cases the partners are both long since dead. However, their descendants may want to retrieve the marriage documents.

The County Clerk's office is working on a list of names on unclaimed licenses and would be glad to return the sheets to the proper families.

Large Turnout for Election

Despite the discomfort of an unusually hot Saturday afternoon, city voters turned out in large numbers to determine the nature of Clarendon's city government. Although officials did not know the exact number of registered voters, they reported that 464 citizens voted in the election.

Voters rejected the idea of a city manager. One-hundred-fourteen voters endorsed a change, while 356 opposed it. In terms of percentages, 24.26% favored the change while 75.74% feared it.

There were 94 absentee ballots, but these were not counted separately.

A program focusing on ideas for improving the local economy will be held October 4, 1988, at the Texas A & M Research Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, Amarillo.

Noble-Garrison to exchange vows

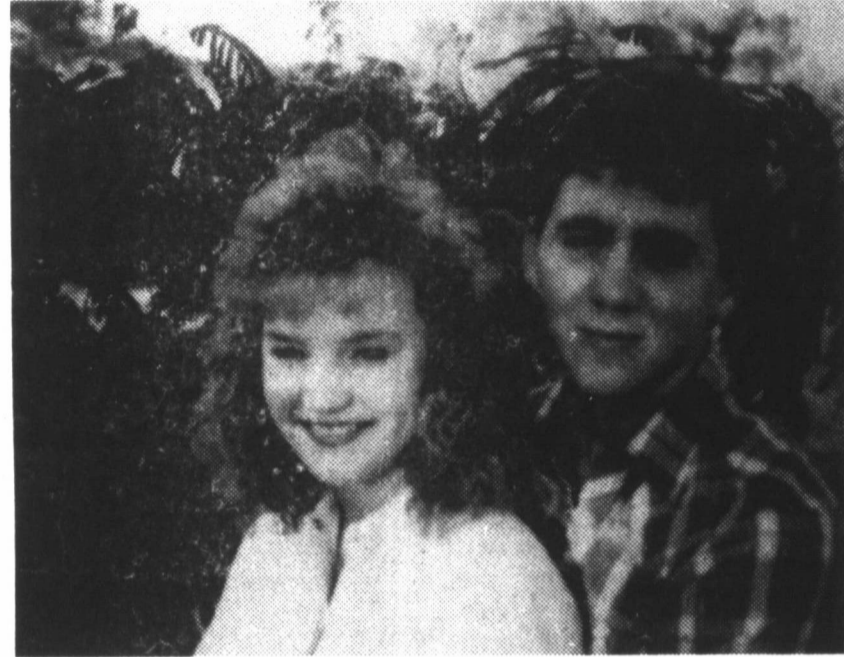

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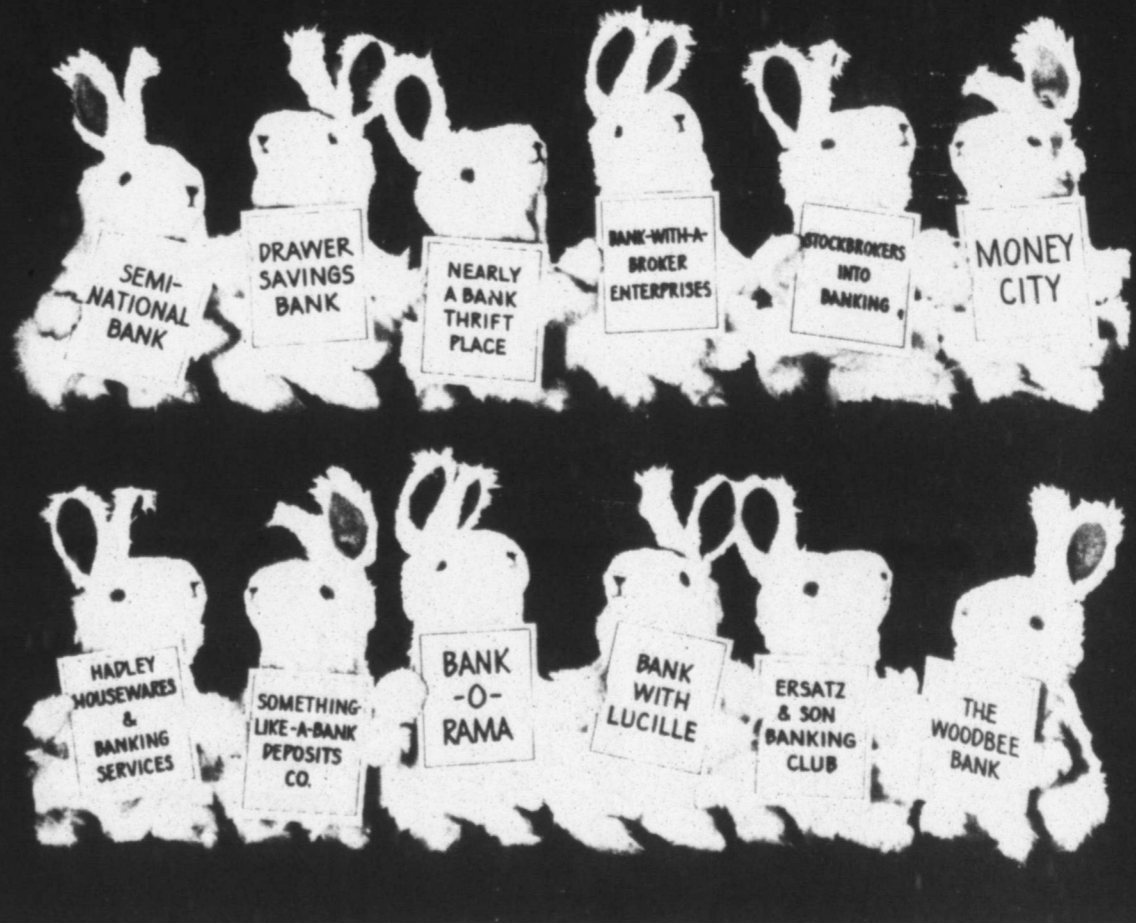

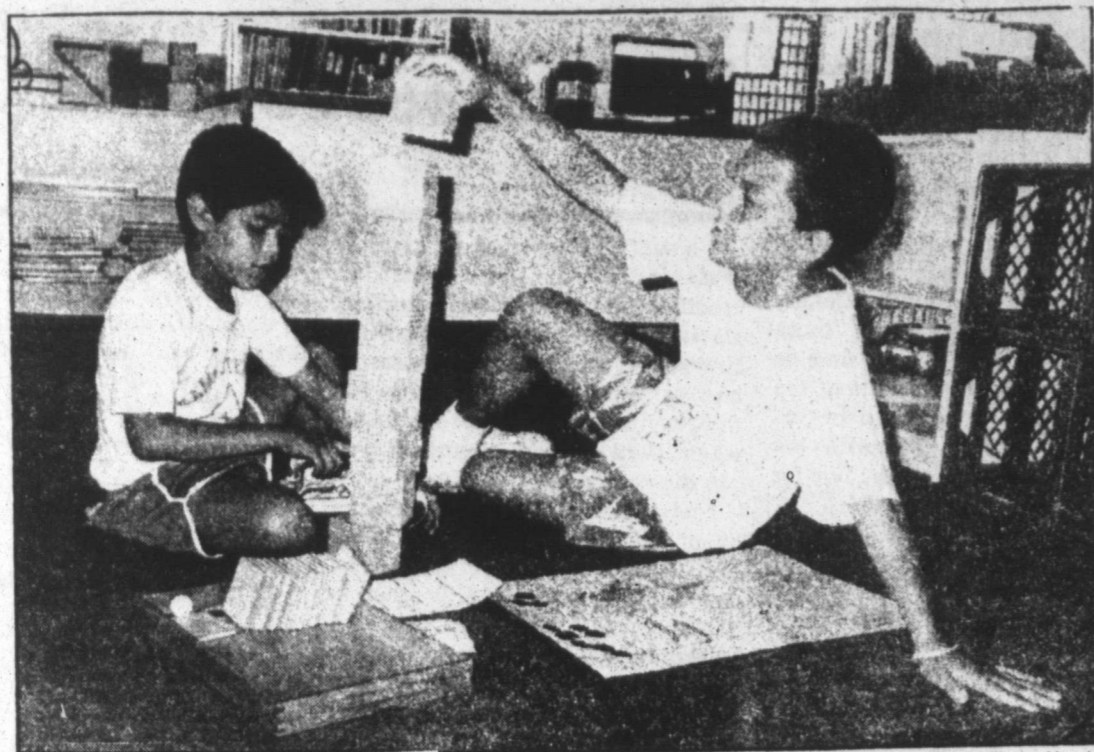

Program lets kids help kids improve skills

Seven year old Roberto Reyes came to the Shelton School's special nine-day "Kid to Kid" tutoring program because he thought he'd get to go swimming.

He will get that chance when the program ends Friday with a splash party and picnic but not before he has mastered four-digit division and improved his reading skills.
"Kid to Kid" is a pilot program being tried this summer by the Shelton School, a private nonprofit

school in North Dallas for learning disabled children. Eight Shelton students in the sixth through eighth grades are tutoring nine learning disabled students, ages 7 to 10, from Carver Elementary School in West Dallas. They have been meeting at Shelton from noon to 3 p.m. weekdays since July 5.

"Some of the Carver students can't read, one 9-year-old couldn't count to 100 and others can't recognize their letters or numbers," said Carol Utay, head of Shelton's middle school. "There skills are so low yet none of them is in a DISD special education program."

Utay paired the Carver youngsters, who also attended the DISD summer school session that ended last week, with the older Shelton students for intensive one-on-one tutoring in math and English. Seven Shelton teachers, all trained in the multi-sensory approach to learning, also are working with the students.

"It's great," Utay said of "Kid to Kid". "I knew it would work when the Carver students came back the second day. None of them has missed a day since we started."

The Shelton School provides van transportation to and from West Dallas for the program being underwritten by Gene Teague, Jane and Jack McNairy, Susie Beeman, Linda Casey, Hardy England and David Martineau.

"The children have made such progress," Utay added. "They've really clicked with math. There were tremendous gaps in their learning but we're filling those in. Our own kids have grown through all of this, too. They seem more self-confident and are surprised to find they have some teaching skills. I'm not sure who 'Kid to Kid' is helping more, our students or the Carver students."

The Carver students seemed most excited about their new skills with three- and four-digit division. "I'm doing four-digit division with remainders now," said a beaming Victor Cardell, 9.

The Shelton teachers claimed they've learned a lot, too, including a new appreciation of what it's like to be a teacher. "I've learned not to give in and tell them what a word is when they're reading," said Barbara McNairy. "I've learned patience," offered Keith Williams, "and to be sure Victor hears me when I tell him something."

The Shelton School wants to offer "Kid to Kid" again next year if it can get the money necessary. "We would like to have this group from Carver back and also expand the program to help more children," Utay said. "The need is definitely there."

Scottie Sommers is one of the tutors and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Sommers and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Wright of Clarendon.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Page and he was married to the former Donna Sellers and the couple had two sons, Jason and Kyle.

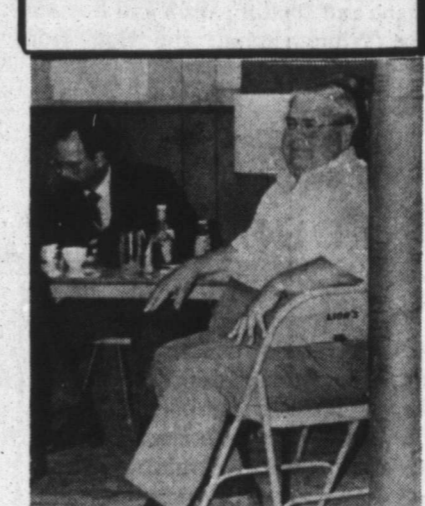

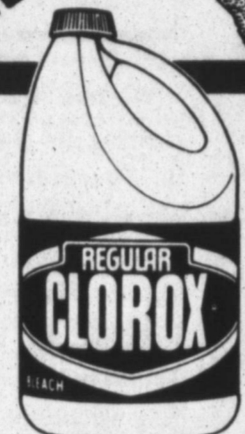


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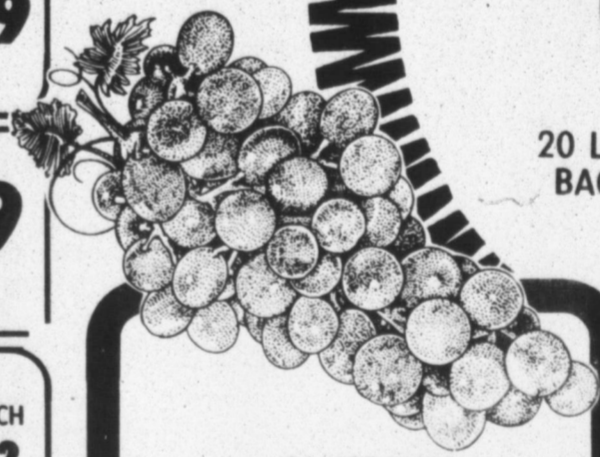
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Indians Invade Camp Cibola

Snakes Alive!

Sanctuary couple gets overrun by rep By Kelli Thomerson

Snakes have been a nuisance in the Sanctuary area for quite some time, yet one family thinks the reptiles have gone a little too far.

Jimmy and Janet Carter's yard has been invaded by what seems to be copperheads during the last week and a half. Jimmy has killed 22 snakes as of last Friday, 14 in just one night.

That's way too many snakes, Janet said, and they are killed just too close to the house.

"The 14 that were killed (June 30) were scattered around the house, but nine were within three feet behind the house," she said.

It's certainly unusual to the Carters, who have lived in their house on Ash Creek Drive in Sanctuary for the past eight years. Janet said she has never seen as many snakes in one summer, let alone one week.

"We would usually kill two or three a summer, but nothing like this."

It all started Wednesday, June 29, when Jimmy killed a snake by their swimming pool with a pool pole. The next night was when it seemed like an invasion.

"It took him about a hour and a half to kill the 14. They were everywhere. You couldn't even walk outside."

Janet said her husband kills the snakes with a .22 pistol loaded with rat shot. The previous night he had killed three snakes. All were laid out on the side of the driveway.

Janet said her neighbors have not had the problem she has had. "Some have killed maybe three, but some haven't had any."

For their first try to ease the problem the Carters bought snake repellent and poured it around the house on Wednesday night, June 30. She said the next night the snakes were crawling in it.

"Those snakes were swimming in it. And it says on the label they will not cross over it. I called the County Extension agent in Weatherford and he said the repellent was a waste of money."

Janet wonders if maybe there is a den around their house, but the smallest snake Jimmy has killed was about 14 inches long, she said.

"There have been no babies."

Tom Woods, director of the Fort Worth Nature Center, said there couldn't be a den in the area. Woods said the Carters' problem was probably an abundance of food supply, such as rodents, and several places available to hide. He said if those factors were controlled they might go away, but still it was hard for him to believe the numbers the Carters have seen.

"I have never heard of a concentration like that," Woods said. Sheri Williamson, a member of the

North Texas Herpetological Society, said if it were rodents it would be a serious and most obvious problem, especially for that many snakes.

"There can't be enough to attract that many," she said.

There are other things to consider, Williamson said, such as habitat destruction, low supply of water or too much water.

"I know some areas have gotten a lot of rain which flooded out the snakes," she said.

Janet, however, said that when there is heavy rain and the creek they live near overflows, there still aren't as many snakes.

"Even during the real wet years, when the rain washes them out of their holes, we hadn't seen this many."

Williamson said that since copperheads are not social animals the snakes the Carters are killing might be non-venomous look-alikes, such as hognose snakes.

"Copperheads are not social animals, especially not in that density. Some snakes are less likely to repel each other, but not these. Only when they have to den together do they tolerate each other."

Williamson said she would like to see the snakes, and if they aren't copperheads at least some of the Carters' fears will be lessened. Janet said she would be happy to oblige and hopefully can return to a normal life.

"I'm afraid to leave the house before noon when it gets so hot. It's getting really spooky."

Jimmy is the son of Clara Mae Carter of Clarendon. He works for Charlie Pride. The snakes were all copperheads.

Representative Foster Whaley of Pampa, a former county Extension Agent and currently a state representative from the High and Rolling Plains, has been named a "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture for 1988" by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

One of seven Texans selected the honor, Whaley was nominated by county agents in the Panhandle District of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The award is presented annually to outstanding leaders in agriculture and related industries who have supported educational programs conducted by the Extension Service, said Syd Conner, Garza County Extension Agent and President of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. The award recognizes contributions made by these leaders to improving levels of living and economic growth in their communities, counties, state and nation.

Representative Whaley received his award at a special banquet during the TCAA annual meeting August 7-10 in Fredericksburg.

This "Man of the Year" has a long history with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, having served for 27 and one half years as county Extension agent in Armstrong and Gray counties.

THE STUPIDEST MAN IN THE BIBLE?

The Book of Judges chronicles a fascinating era in the history of Israel, a time between the death of Joshua and the rise of the monarchy. Thirteen judges served Israel—twelve men and one woman. Most of them we hardly remember—Gideon and Samson are two notable exceptions—and most of them, while basically good people, operated under some handicap or defect. Typical in this respect, yet having a flamboyance all his own, was Israel's ninth judge, Jephthah.

they won't mix.

Jephthah's story is found in the eleventh and twelfth chapters of Judges. There we read that he was the illegitimate son of Gilead and an Aramean harlot. He was disinherited and driven by his half-brothers into a sort of exile. He "gathered vain men" about him (Judges 11:3), and organized them into a superb fighting force. When the Gileadites were threatened by the Ammonites, they turned to him for help. In spite of their hostile treatment of him earlier, Jephthah helped his people defeat Ammon, and became Judge over Gilead.

But Jephthah is best remembered for his terrible vow. In Judges 11:30-31, he promises the Lord that, if He will give him the victory over the Ammonites, he will offer up as a burnt offering "whatsoever cometh forth of the doors of my house to meet me, when I return in peace." Verse 34 tells us that his daughter—his only child—danced out to meet him following his victory.

Much time has been spent arguing whether Jephthah actually slew his daughter as a sacrifice. Many commentators say that the construction of verse 31 in the original language permits the belief that he dedicated her to a life of celibacy and seclusion in the service of the sanctuary. No matter. It was a rash vow, the results of which were not what Jephthah, his daughter, nor God really wanted.

What a strange story! What an odd character! What can this account possibly teach modern Christians? There must be something of value for us in Jephthah's experience, for we find his name in that great roll call of the faithful in Hebrews 11, right along side Noah, and Moses, and Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, and a host of other "greats" of the Old Testament.

First of all, we said in the beginning that most of the Judges labored under some sort of character defect. Jephthah's major flaw seems to have been rashness. We should be greatly encouraged that here is yet another Bible character that God could and did use in spite of his short-comings. Don't wait until you are without a flaw to surrender yourself to His service. Come just as you are. He can make up the short comings in your life.

Secondly, we should also take comfort in the fact that God helped Jephthah overcome the handicap of his background. God loved him and used him in spite of his being illegitimate, in spite of the hatred and scorn of his people. No one need feel despised and outcast in the courts of the Lord.

In the third place, Jephthah is found faithful in his dealings with both man and God. When Gilead calls him to defeat Ammon, Jephthah remembers his people, and in spite of the fact that he makes them "eat crow," he goes to battle for them. Furthermore, when he becomes cap-

tain over Gilead (Judges 11:11), the very first thing he does is seek the guidance of the Lord. And, as unwise as his vow was, as uncalled for as it was—God certainly demanded no such condition for victory over the Ammonites—Jephthah was true to his word. . . . I have opened my mouth unto the Lord, and I cannot go back" (Judges 11:35). We need to be careful not to promise what we can't or don't intend to deliver. Vows should not be hastily, rashly spoken. But when they are made, they should be kept. One can hardly avoid thinking here of how lightly marriage vows are taken today.

The final thing to note is that Jephthah was evidently a good father, teaching his daughter the importance of fearing the Lord. When he reveals the details of his tragic vow to her, she argues not a word: ". . . My father, if thou hast

opened thy mouth unto the Lord, do to me according to that which proceeded out of thy mouth. . . ." (Judges 11:36).

Because of his leadership of a half-outlaw army, Jephthah has been called an Eastern Robin Hood. Because of his vow, he has been called by one commentator "the stupidest man in the Bible." Perhaps. But the writer of Hebrews, inspired by the Spirit of the Lord, says, ". . . time would fail me to tell of Gideon, and of Barak, and of Samson, and of Jephthah; of David also, and Samuel, and of the prophets: Who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises. . . out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens" (Hebrews 11:32-34).

Preparing your child for the first day of school

Whether your child is a veteran of daycare and pre-school or has never attended any school before, starting kindergarten is an experience that requires some preparation.

Children sense the different expectations that go with kindergarten. Suddenly school isn't just for fun; it's serious business, said Dr. Sarah L. Anderson, a family life specialist.

A child without older siblings will have only fuzzy mental images of what school will be like. If he does have older siblings, the child may think of school as a place where the "big kids" go and where everyone already reads and writes, she said.

Some children may have fearful, stress-inducing feelings about facing this unfamiliar world, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

It's important for parents and children to plan their parting experiences and share feelings about them.

She suggests parents and youngsters make several trips to the school, play on the playground and visit the classroom if possible.

Reading children's books about the first day of school will also help a youngster get a more realistic picture of the school environment.

But the most important thing about visits or reading books is that it gives you a vehicle for talking with your child and letting him know that it's o.k. to feel scared.

According to the specialist, researchers have noted that separation experiences can affect children's behavior. Brief periods of agitation,

tantrums, withdrawal or changes in eating and sleeping patterns may occur if the child is anxious during those first few days or weeks of school.

Some kindergarteners may need a "gradual start," with a parent present in the classroom for decreasing periods of time until the child can stay on his or her own.

Although a working parent may have to use vacation days, sick leave or personal leave to do it, taking off a half a day or an hour as needed to help the child adjust can help him get off to a better start in school.

After a couple of weeks parents should also follow up with the teacher to check on how well their child is doing in the school environment. Many children love school from the first day and others will need some time, but eventually most all children adjust.

Zinc pyrithione and selenium sulfide reduce the turnover rate of epidermal cells. Shampoos which contain either ingredient can be safely used two to three times each week. According to the *Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs*, the efficacy of these products may be improved by allowing shampoo to remain on the scalp for 5 to 10 minutes before rinsing.

Salicylic acid and sulfur loosen and help remove keratin particles from the scalp.
