Carter for his fiscal stewardship and administrative leadership during the three years he pastored this church. Then, Rachael Butler presented a booklet of personal letters of commendation to Rev. Carter, written by various church members.

A money tree, prepared by Carol Hinton, Viola Bones and Lockie Pitts, was given to the Carters, after which Jamie Deyhle read the poem she composed, a copy of which is reprinted at the end of this article.

1988 TEAMS results for grades 1,3,5 and 7

Students in grades 1-3-5 & 7 were tested in three subject areas: mathematics, reading and writing.

The students in grade one scored 91 percent mastery on the math section; 79 percent on the reading section; and 91 percent on the writing section.

The third grade students scored 93 percent mastery on the math section; 98 percent on the reading section; and 67 percent on the writing section.

The fifth grade students scored 89 percent mastery on the math section; 92 percent on the reading section; and 89 percent on the writing section.

The seventh grade students scored 100% mastery on all three parts of the exam.

A reception will follow the wedding to honor the couple in the home of Chauncey and Ann Hommel. All family and friends of the couple are invited to attend.



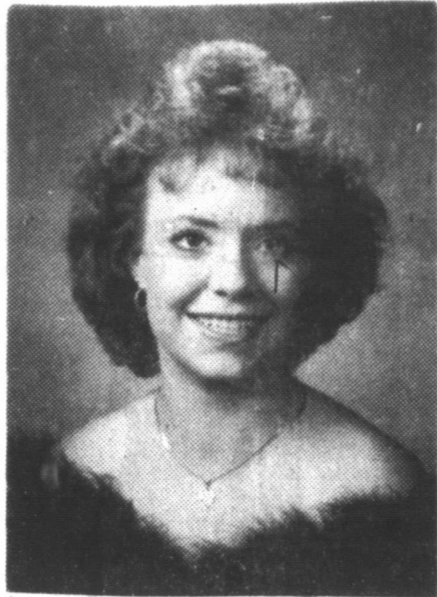

More than 2,000 Texas Tech University students qualified for the academic honors lists at the end of the 1988 spring semester.

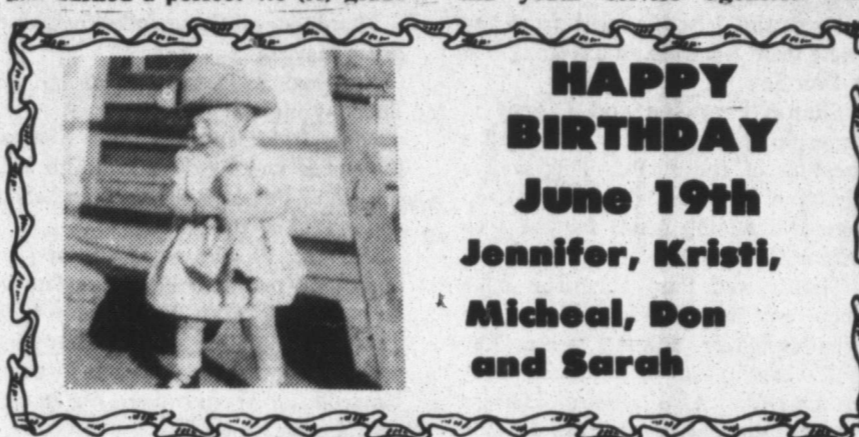
Students on the President's Honor List earned a perfect 4.0 (A) grade-

STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

Rx Hand Eczema

One of the most difficult-to-care-for skin conditions is "hand eczema." This is a persistent inflammation of the skin of the hands and arms (a so-called "dermatitis"). In a recent issue of *Dermatology News*, Dr. Howard Maibach at the University of California Medical School, San Francisco, commented on the diagnosis and treatment of this condition.

Hand eczema is very often caused by contact with irritants in the home or associated with one's work (e.g. chemicals such as herbicides, cleaners, and solvents.) Dr. Maibach suggests that those who encounter known or suspected irritants make a habit of wearing gloves. Surprisingly, some individuals will be sensitive to rubber gloves or the powder that is sometimes placed inside gloves. Polyvinyl type gloves may cause less irritation or no irritation in persons who are sensitive to rubber.

According to Maibach, anyone who develops hand eczema before the age of 15 has a "good chance of developing a chronic case" of the condition. He goes on to recommend the use of high potency, topical corticosteroids on a short term or intermittent basis to break the chronic cycle of this condition. Although corticosteroids of this type require a prescription, hydrocortisone cream is available on a nonprescription basis.

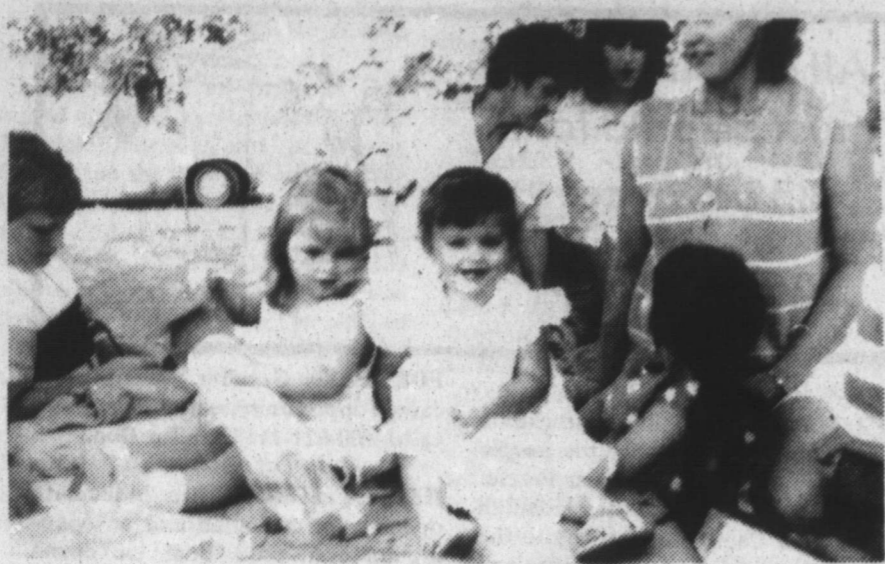

Deuteronomy 6:7-9
KODHESH HA-KODHASHIM

The high priest moves silently through the catacombs that lie under the northern corner of the temple mount. Alone he carries a brazen vase of blood and burning incense. As he reaches the veil, he ties a sturdy rope around his right ankle and drops the other end out to waiting Levites. If his mind isn't pure, and his sins blotted out, he will die as he enters, and the others will have to pull his body out by the rope.

With a deep breath of apprehension, he pushes his body around the veil and enters the Kodhesh Ha-Kodhashim.

Kodhesh Ha-Kodhashim: Hebrew for Holy of Holies. The place where Almighty God would meet mankind. The place most feared by the people of Israel. The place where God resided among His people.

One day a year, "The Day of Atonement", the high priest would enter the holy of holies to sprinkle blood on the judgement seat to cleanse the nation of Israel of their sins and prepare them for the next year.

Mount Moriah and the Temple of God--the most holy place to the Jew. The Holy of Holies, the holiest place in the Temple itself. A place set apart by God. And "The Day of Atonement", the holiest day of them all.

Day after day, month after month, and year after year, people search endlessly for that one thing, that one love, that one puzzle piece that will fill the emptiness inside them. Every man and woman is born with a longing to find God. A place where they can look upon their Maker. A place where they can be alone with God.

In 1 Kings 8:22, 23, 27, Solomon dedicates the first Holy Temple. On the foothills of that same Mount Moriah, called Golgotha, Jesus Christ the Son of the Most High God became the last and final sacrifice needed for sin. On that last great Day of Atonement, Jesus died for the sins of a lost and dying world, and split the veil of the temple in two, from the top to the bottom, opening the way for each of us to enter in. In John 10:9, Jesus said, "I am the door."

So ask Jesus to come into your heart today. Let God's Holy Spirit reside in the temple of your heart. Let Jesus be your door to real joy and peace.

Trust Jesus and His shed blood and you, too, can enter into the Kodhesh Ha-Kodhashim.
