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
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

Allergic reactions can be so mild that they are hardly noticed or so severe that they become life threatening. Reactions can occur from exposure to things that we eat (milk, eggs, strawberries), inhale (molds, dust, plant pollen, feathers), ingest (some antibiotics), or contact (poison ivy, cosmetics, household detergents). Substances that penetrate the skin such as insect venom may also cause allergic eactions

These substances, which are called allergens, cause the release of histamine and other chemicals in the body. Allergic symptoms often include a swollen, itchy, runny, or stopped up nose; tearing, red, swollen eyes; and, sometimes, coughing, wheezing, and sneezing.

Allergy relief begins with the avoidance of known allergens. Nonprescription medicines for allergy include the antihistamines and decongestants. Antihistamines, which block the effect of histamine, help reduce swelling and itching. They are usually more effective if before exposure to allergens. Decongestants cause a shrinkage of

about 20 cents per toot, but should be recovered in a short period of time through savings on your water-heating bill.

The second measure that should be taken is air leakage reduction. Air leakage in a typical house accounts for 25 to 30 percent of the home's heating and cooling costs. When this air loss is reduced your heater runs less, saving energy and money. Weatherstrip and caulk where you find leaks around doors and windows.

Also, check for leaks in some of the not-so-obvious places. To restrict air leakage around light switches and electrical outlets, gasket sealers are available to place between the wall and the cover plate. Insulate the backs of attic doors, and weatherstrip around the door frame. Stuff insulation in the gaps in floors and walls around plumbing lines that enter the house. Replace broken and cracked windows; seal small cracks in glass with duct tape if replacement is too expensive.

The third tip is to be sure your heating system is operating efficiently. Arrange for a maintenance inspection by a heating system specialist at the beginning of each heating season. For a small fee, the service person will check for any malfunctioning parts, which will ensure that your system is operating properly. Once the system is operating daily, be sure to change the filters once a month.

The last energy saving measure involves your winter lifestyle. You can lower the thermostat setting to 68 degrees F and keep yourself 7 warm by wearing warm clothing. At night, you can set the thermostat

"Winterizing" **Your Home**

With winter fast approaching,

it is time to prepare your home to resist those colder temperatures. A few simple energy-saving measures taken now can keep you warmer this winter, while saving money on your heating bill.

The first "winterizing" task is to be sure your insulation levels are adequate. The Texas Energy Extension Service recommends at least R18 insulation in the wall and at least R27 in the attic. Adding insulation to your walls is difficult and usually not cost effective, but increasing the level of insulation in the attic can be done by a do-it- Energy and Mineral Resources. yourselfer. Use a ruler to measure the thickness of your attic insulation. If you have less than 8 inches of batt insulation or loose-fill cellulose insulation or less than 10 inches of loose-fill glass fiber or mineral wool insulation, then you probably don't have R27 in your attic. By bringing your insulation up to the recommended levels, you can save significantly on your heating bills.

When checking your insulation level, also check to see if the attic is properly ventilated to avoid moisture buildup in the insulation. Putting plastic bags or other devices over turbine ventilators in the winter is not a good practice because it hinders attic ventilation and moisture control.

Remember, insulation is not just for walls and attics. By insulating your hot-water pipes, you keep the heat from escaping into the cooler air. This pipe insulation will cost back to 55 degrees F and use an electric blanket. An electric blanket can run all night for less than 10 cents. If possible, stay in the warm areas of the house. North walls and windows are typical cold spots.

When you're going to be in one particular room for along time, turn the thermostat way down on the main heating system. Use space heaters or a fireplace to heat the room you're in or use a lap blanket when you're going to be in one spot for a while.

A word of caution about fireplaces: they are not very efficient heating systems. When used while the normal heating system is operating, they often consume more energy than they save because air heated by the main system is drawn into the fireplace and escapes up the chimney. When used alone and with proper air control dampers, the fireplace can be a viable alternative to the normal heating system and can save significantly on the heating bill.



State Teachers Association. A recent spate of teen suicides in the Dallas, Austin and San Antonio areas has prompted TSTA to. publish thousands of informational brochures for Texas parents as well as its 95,000 members. The brochures alert teachers and parents to warning signs exhibited by students who may be contemplating suicide.

TSTA President Charles Beard said three groups of Young people predisposed to suicide are those with conduct disorders, those with psychopathology, and those undergoing stress.

Beard said youth exhibiting conduct disorders, such as using drugs or alcohol or running away from home to escape pressures, may be self-destructive.

"These young people may engage in reckless driving or thrill-seeking acts as last-ditch attempts to gain attention," he added.

Youth with psychopathology, who may be clinically depressed, schizophrenic or paranoid, may be candidates for suicide.

Youth undergoing stress may appear to be well-adjusted on the surface but are often in inner turmoil over a perceived crisis in their lives. Many have experienced a deep, personal loss such as that of a parent through death or divorce and many fell overwhelmed by the pressures in their lives, such as coping with parental conflict, a family breakup, or more. Some feel ineffective in the face of an increasingly complex social environment.

We have to remember that a teen's relative immaturity and lack of emotional experiences in dealing with harsh realities or failures make him especially vulnerable," Beard said. "It is important that he be taught early in life to cope with both failures and successes."

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

Dr. Stephen L. Lemons, Director of the VA Regional Office In Waco, Texas, states, "Veterans receiving monetary benefits from the VA can be a big help in getting their VA checks delivered promptly."

By promptly reporting a change of address to the regional office, you can help us get your check delivered to the new location in a timely manner. Veterans and dependents should realize that due to computer updating procedures, the check received after submission of the change of address will probably go to the old address. Therefore, Lemons reminds veterans and their dependents to, "Notify the post office of a change of address and provide them with a forwarding address. This will insure against the check being returned to the Treasury Department and suspension of the award."

Veterans and dependents can also help the Veterans Administration in identifying their records by showing their VA claim number or social security number on the change of address form or notification submitted.

Clarendon Volunteer Fire Dept. Warns Against Winter Fire Hazards

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire

Department would like to remind all Donley County residents of some hazards that may exist in and around their homes since winter time and cold weather is once again upon us all. First is the hazard of heating

equipment. Homeowners should check and clean and inspect their heating equipment. Dirty air filters and cracks in the heat chambers of these units not only cause ineffi-cient heating and high utility bills but are a fire hazard as well. Have your unit inspected by a qualified heating specialist if in doubt. If you have space heaters, make sure all grates and guards are in place. The biggest hazard with these units is the ones that are hooked up using rubber hoses. If you have rubber hoses, particularly if they are old, they can crack, letting gas escape before it reaches the appliance. This gas will ignite at the crack and burn the hose through causing a flame to come in contact with the floor. Also, having these too near combustible materials such as drapes, bedding, etc, as well as laying wet winter clothing and footwear near them to dry are the cause of many residential fires. Keep combustible materials far away from these units and replace any rubber hoses with flex lines immediately.

Second, there have been several incidents of dumpster fires in the past few weeks probably due to people dumping ashes from their fireplaces in these dumpsters. Fireplace ashes can stay sufficiently hot for up to 72 hours to start a dumpster fire. Dispose of fireplace ashes in some place other than a dumpster. A dumpster fire is not in itself dangerous but can reach a great enough proportion to ignite grass, nearby buildings, fences, etc and can spread.

Third, every winter there are several residential fires which can be attributed to icing of regulators for those homeowners who use LP gas. This is caused when ice from freezing rain/drizzle, or snow coats

teries regularly. Many homes that have smoke detectors have at least one that does not work. It is estimated that as many as 50% of all smoke detectors installed do not work because of being dirty, or having a battery down or missing. They should be cleaned regularly and tested at least once a month. Batteries should be replaced at least every 12 months even if you don't get a low battery warning.

State Hopes Barren Land Will Bear Fruit

SARAGOSA-Iranians trying to salvage that nation's warravaged economy might find a little competition from an unexpected corner: West Texas fields where row upon row of pistachio seedlings are spreading across the plain.

Iran supplies more than 90 percent of the U.S. pistachio market, but state Land Commissioner Garry Mauro hopes Texas can nibble into that share and increase U.S. consumption of the tasty seeds

The idea for a Texas pistachio crop was born when Mauro visited Israel in 1984 with state Agriculture Secretary Jim Hightower. During the fact finding trip Mauro drove through the Negev desert.

I'm driving down the road and looking out the window and wondering,"What am I doing in a place that looks like West Texas?" he said. "Then I passed a farm with tomatoes and cotton and vegetables, and I said,"Wait a minute - we don't have that in West Texas."

Actually, a lot of cotton grows in West Texas, but the land is of little use for edible crops, because West Texas ground water is too salty.

Improving Texas Economy **Reflected** in **Veterans Home** Loan Figures

Texas Land Commissioner

Garry Mauro on Thursday said the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program has doubled the dollar volume of loans to Texas veterans during the first quarter of fiscal year 1989 as compared to the same period of fiscal year 1988.

"The increased market activity reflected in these home loan figures is a welcome signal of a recovering Texas economy," said Mauro, who serves as chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board.

Mauro released figures showing that the low-interest home loan program for Texas veterans made 388 loans totaling \$7.7 million during the period, a 96 percent increase over the same quarter a year ago. The state fiscal year runs from September 1 to August 31.

The home loan program makes \$20,000 fixed-rate, low-interest loans to qualified Texas veterans to apply towards the purchase of a new or existing home. The loan can be blended with a conventional or VA home loan to provide Texas veterans with a lower overall mortgage rate.

"this is also a clear indicator that Texas veterans know that the Texas Vererans Housing Assistance Program (VHAP) is far and away the best deal in Texas for veterans searching for affordable housing," Mauro said.

Mauro said the anticipated rise in mortgage rates brought about by this week's increase in the prime rate to 10 1/2 percent will make the savings offered to Texas veterans even greater if they finance their home by combining a Texas VHAP loan with a federal VA home loan. The blended rate will give them a lower monthly payment," Mauro said.

To remedy this and keep the regulator vent from icing over, homeowners should assure that the regulator assembly has a cover and that the cover is always in place, particularly when there is a chance of freezing moisture falling. If you are an LP user and you have any questions, contact your LP gas supplier to find out if your regulator assembly is properly protected.

Fireplaces account for a fair number of residential fires in our area. Always burn the proper kind of wood in your fireplace and make sure the screen is in place and that the chimney is in good repair and far enough away from ceilings and roofs, especially those that have wooden shingles. Don't burn crossties, paper, etc, which can cause a coating to build up on the inside of your chimney that could possibly ignite.

During the next few weeks, make sure your Christmas tree is sufficiently watered and moist and that any lights you have on the tree are in good repair. When you leave home, even for a few minutes and when you go to bed, always unplug your tree lights. Also, don't have trees too close to fireplaces or space heaters which can cause a dry tree to ignite very easily.

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department recommends that you have smoke detectors installed and that you test them and replace battrees are well-suited to the sunny West Texas climate and salty water.

The upshot is that 20 acres of pistachio seedlings were planted last May in a field about three miles north of Saragosa. The trees are on Permanent School Fund land managed by Mauro's office.

Bruce Hackett, who is leasing the tract and growing the trees, said the pistachio seedlings are doing well. The plants have long, narrow, dark-green leaves. Most of them stand about two feet high.

They probably will begin producing fruit - pistachios are berries, not nuts - in three to five years.

The state owns about 800,000 acres of Permanent School Fund land west of the Pecos, and about a quarter of that land is barren. Mauro hopes to have about 7,000 unproductive acres planted with pistachios within a few years, following a profit sharing program similar to the one between Hackett and the state.

Hackett said he wants to plant 300 more acres. The cost of buying seedlings and planting, irrigating and maintaining them over five years could exceed \$1 million, he said. Hackett is leasing the land from the state for \$1 an acre per year. For the first 10 years, he'll give the state 20 percent of any profits.

It will take about 15 years for the trees to reach full size - about 15 feet high and 20 feet wide at the tops. The trees are spaced 17 feet apart, so their crowns will mesh together - allowing workers to harvest the berries by shaking every other tree.

"Since there are no discount points charged on our portion of the loan, there's also an immediate savings that averages \$5,800 over the life of the loan."

Mauro predicted that a continued rise in interest rates will have no immediate effect on the veterans home loan program since it is financed by stat bonds approved by the Texas voters.

"Since we still have \$250 million to loan at 9 percent, the savings and competitiveness of the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program will only be greater," Mauro said.


