## Defensive Driving Course

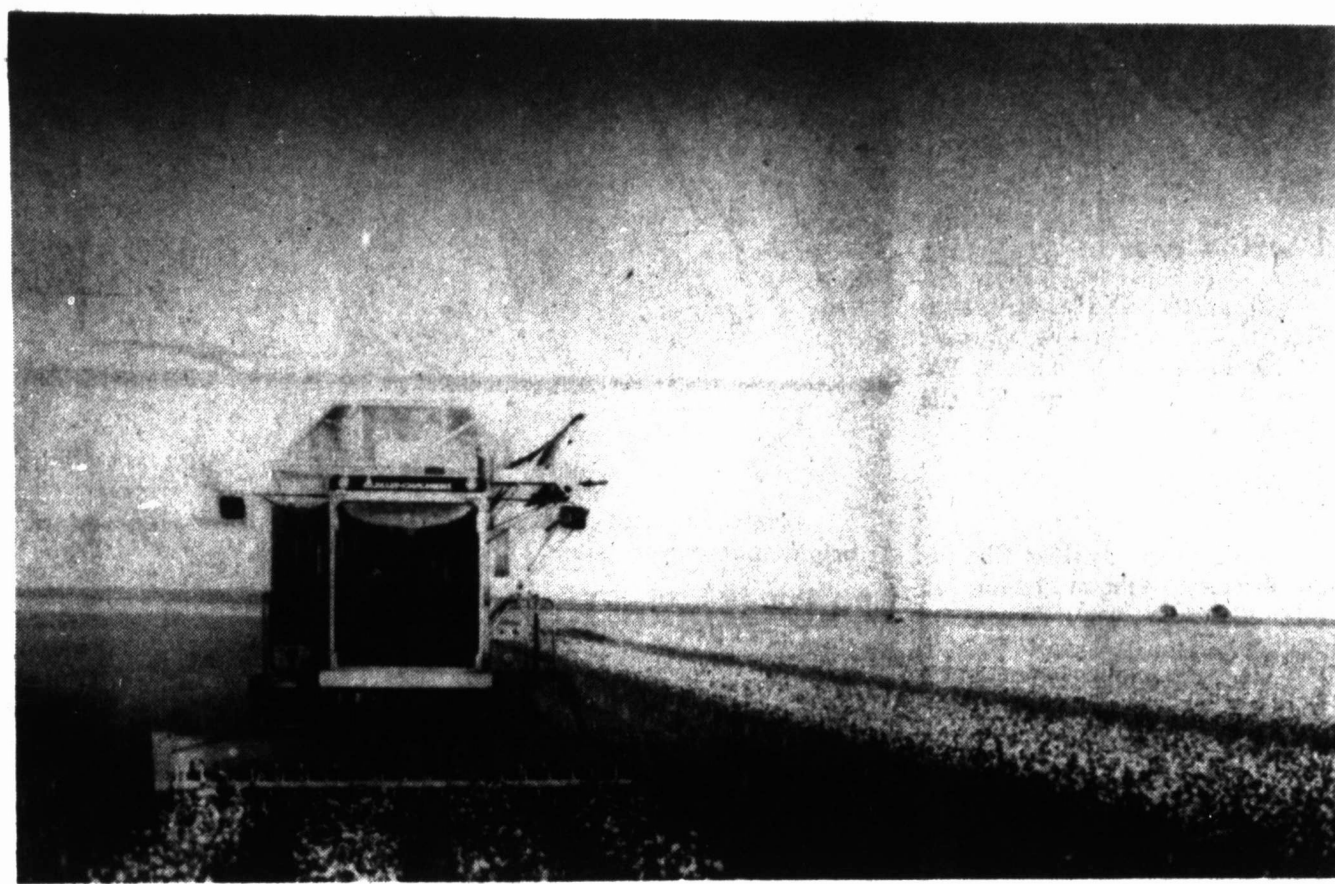

## Library Accredited

The Burton Memorial Library was recently accredited as a member of the Texas Library System for State fiscal year 1988-1989, according to Williams D. Gooch, Director and Librarian of the Texas State Library. "We are pleased to award the certificate of system membership in recognition of the efforts this community has made in providing public library services," said Gooch. "It is a symbol of having achieved a level of excellence."

The Burton Memorial Library is a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System and serves citizens in Donley County. Burton Memorial Library had to meet strict criteria, such as hours of access, professional staffing requirements, number of library materials and local per capita support to become an accredited member. Libraries must apply and qualify for membership annually.

System membership provides a variety of services to local patrons and library staff. Among the services are reciprocal borrowing privileges at other member libraries, availability of talking books (cassette tapes) and large print books, access to a 16 mm film collection, and professional librarian services.

Local hours of services are Monday, 1-5 p.m.; Tuesday through Friday, 9-5 p.m.; Saturday, 9-12 p.m.

## British Biker Likes Clarendon

Ricki Merloo, a young man from Harlow (Essex) England, visited Clarendon last week on his 18,000 mile tour of the United States. The likable fellow planned to camp out at Lake Greenbelt, but accepted an invitation to stay with Chuck Ekleberry. Ekleberry brought him to visit at The Press, and gave him a quick tour of the area.

Rick started his tour in Washington, D.C., gradually moving up the coast to Boston and Rhode Island. From there he turned inland to Montreal, and on west to Chicago. His subsequent itinerary included Mt. Rushmore, the Great Salt Lake, Bonneville, Yellowstone and Seattle. From Oregon he travelled down the West Coast to San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego. He was not overly impressed with Las Vegas: "It's so synthetic. No reason for it to be there but gambling." But the Grand Canyon was one of the most significant sights on the tour, even though he lost his camera in the Colorado River. Between the Grand Canyon and Clarendon, Rick saw Arches National Park, the Four Corners and the Petrified Forest, as well as Gallup, New Mexico. He reports that camping out for a month feels like a year!

Rick's tour is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, but it has been tiring. He has averaged about 300 to 400 miles per day, with some days running as much as 700 miles.

Rick reports that Americans are friendlier and nicer than he had expected, but that many resorts treat tourists like a herd of cattle. Of course, treating tourists like cattle is not restricted to this country.

The worst event of the trip occurred in Niagra Falls, just as the trek began. A rock punched a hole in the motorcycle's oil pan, and there were no repair facilities available. Some one suggested plugging the hole with an brandname epoxy/aluminum patching compound. The emergency repair worked.

His next especially memorable moment came when he got to see the Space Shuttle land in Nevada. "There was an amazing atmosphere there." Alcatraz was also impressive.

Rick headed East after leaving Clarendon. He plans to see Florida and perhaps the Bahamas. After that, he will ride the bus north to New York. He will leave the U.S. from Washington. No doubt his friends in Clarendon are unanimous in saying "Have a safe trip. And come back to see us."

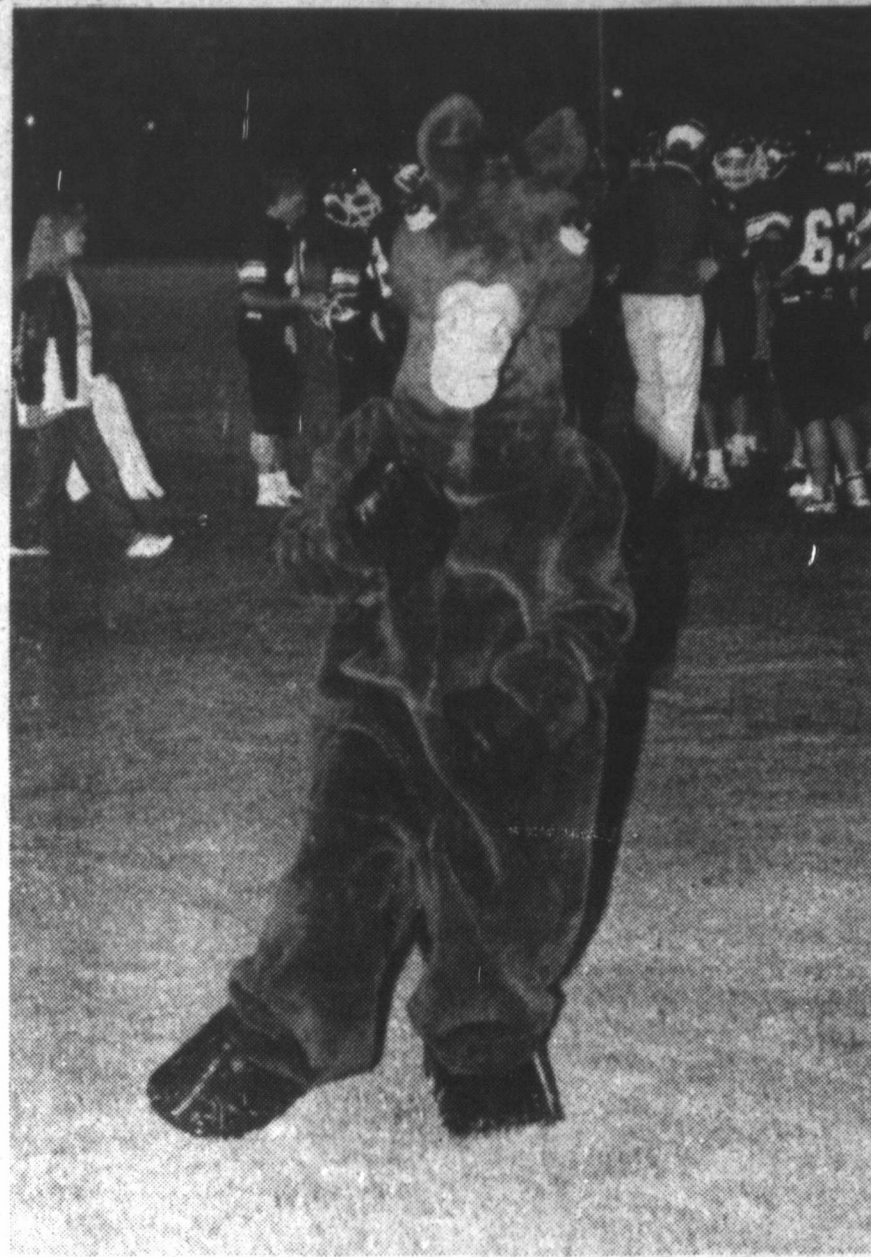

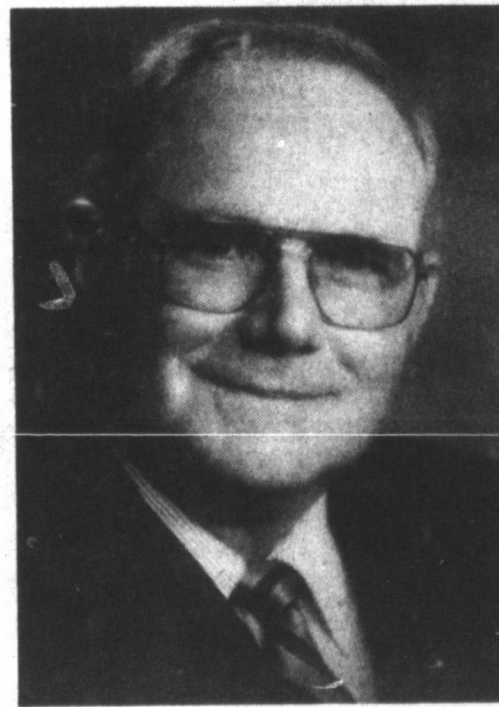

A most exciting time for many young children will be Monday, October 31, Halloween. As numerous, excited children will be combing the neighborhoods for those "Trick or Treat" delights, Major V. J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety urges motorists to be especially alert and on the lookout for youngsters who in their excitement may dart into the streets.

Nationwide each year over 8,000 pedestrians are killed and nearly 100,000 are injured. Because a pedestrian's chances of getting killed or injured are increased 800% at night, we, adults, must think of our children's safety. Major Cawthon suggests that the following precautions be observed so that Halloween will remain a happy, enjoyable time. Children should be instructed in some traffic safety tips such as to use sidewalks. Do not jay walk. Look in all directions before crossing streets. Walk, do not run. Adults should accompany children when they go trick or treating. Children should wear makeup rather than masks. Light colored, non-flammable costumes which can easily be seen by motorists should be worn. Children should carry flashlights in order to see and be seen.

Homeowners who anticipate visits from the "ghosts and goblins" should leave the front porch light on and clear any obstruction from walkways.

As Major Cawthon stated, "Halloween can be fun, if celebrated legally and safely."

# What is Illiteracy?

The Donley County Adult Literacy Council is continuing its effort to recruit adult students who lack basic reading and writing skills. A FREE adult tutoring program is available through Burton Memorial library, which has nine certified volunteers trained in the Laubach method of teaching.

What is illiteracy? According to Laubach Literary Action based in Syracuse, New York, "illiteracy is the lack of basic listening, speaking, reading, writing or mathematical skills adults need to solve the problems encountered in daily life and to participate fully in their society". As society becomes more and more complicated, the level of skills needed for effective participation increases. Because the U.S. is a very complex society, the literacy skills necessary for involvement in American life are high.

In 1980, the U.S. Census Bureau counted 24.3 million Americans over the age of 25 who had not progressed beyond the 8th grade. Furthermore, the U.S. Department of Education estimates that 150,000 young people graduate from high school each year without being able to read their own diplomas!

An Adult Performance Level Study, commissioned by the U.S. Office of Education, tested the ability of adults 18 and over in literacy skills in five functional areas- occupational knowledge, consumer economics, community resources, health, and government and law. Based on these findings, an estimated 23 million adults, or about 1 in 5, did not have literacy skills adequate to complete everyday tasks in these five areas. Applying these studies to recent population statistics, 27 million adults are functionally illiterate today.

The Donley County Adult Literacy Council urges all citizens, especially employers, to spread the word to adults who would benefit from this program. Interested persons should call the library at 874-3685 for more information or to arrange for a tutor. These lessons are free and open to all adults residing in Donley County.

### What Part Have We?

In looking at a globe or a map, we see many different nations, countries, and lands. Usually they are separated by thin lines that represent borders. On most maps you can tell one country from another by their colors. And on some maps you can even tell one state in this country from another by the different colors given to each.

Everything in life has a distinguishable border or separation line—lines that separate them from another. Everything, that is, except the church, the followers of Jesus.

Today we hear a lot of talk here and there about how we ought to tear down the walls of separation between people, cultures, places, and beliefs. In part, I think this is a wonderful idea. I also think that Jesus will do just that one day. But we have a tendency to take this idea too far.

In John 15:19 Jesus said, "I have chosen you out of the world". It strikes me as very curious how we who call ourselves "Christian" seem never to be able to draw a line. We never seem to know when to stop! Instead of drawing the world to Jesus by our testimony, we fall headlong into doing things just like the world.

John writes in I John 2:15, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him."

Look around you this week and see if there is anything that doesn't belong among God's people. Are there any ancient rituals going on that would be displeasing to an Holy God. Isn't it time that we who call ourselves Christians draw the line?

Paul writes these beautiful words in II Corinthians 6:14-18: "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers, for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? And what communion hath light with darkness? And what concord hath Christ with Belial? Or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel. And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols? For ye are the temple of the living God! As God hath said, I will dwell in them and walk in them and I will be their God and they shall be my people. Wherefore come out from among them and be ye separate saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing. And I will receive you and will be Father unto you and ye shall be my sons and daughters saith the Lord Almighty."

Remember—we are in the world but we are not to be of the world. Let us stop the masquerade. Let's take off the mask of this world. Let's declare our borders. Let's draw the line. "And Moses stood in the gate of the camp and said, "Who is on the Lord's side?" (Exodus 32:26).

WHEREAS, certain conditions exist which represent a threat to the public health and safety; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and in the best interests of the City of Clarendon to apply for funding under the 1988 Texas Community Development Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

1. That a Texas Community Development Program application for Community Development Funds is hereby authorized to be filed on behalf of the City with the Texas Department of Commerce.

2. That the City's application

be placed in competition for funding under the Community Development Fund.

3. That the application be for \$184,600.00 of grant funds to carry out administrative costs, engineering costs, and construction costs for a water improvement project.

4. That the City Council directs and designates the Mayor as the City's Chief Executive Officer and Authorized Representative to act in all matters in connection with this application and the City's participation in the Texas Community Development Program.

5. That the City commit \$27,750.00 from its General Fund as a cash contribution to be matched with Texas Community Development Funds to be used for administrative costs, engineering costs, and construction costs for a water improvement project.
