## DONLEY PIONEER EXPIRED SUNDAY

J. G. McDougal, President Of Hedley Bank Resided In Donley 37 Years

J. G. McDougal, 66, co-founder of the town of Hedley and president of the Security State bank there, died in a Memphis hospital Sunday morning at 1 o'clock.

A resident of Donley county for 37 years, McDougal was prominent in civic affairs and was one of the founders of the bank of which he was president for 25 years.

He was born January 12, 1872. He moved to the Indian territory from Kemper county, Mississippi, in 1890 and to Texas in 1901. He married Miss Mattie Pyle about 30 years ago. She died in August, 1938.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist church in Hedley Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. M. E. Wells, pastor, officiating. Interment was made in the Hedley cemetery.

Survivors include three brothers, Dr. L. L. McDougal of Boonville, Miss., T. S. McDougal of Wasilla, Alaska, and S. E. McDougal of Guntown, Miss.; one son, Tom McDougal of Hedley, and two grandsons.

## City and Community Xmas Tree To Be Held December 22

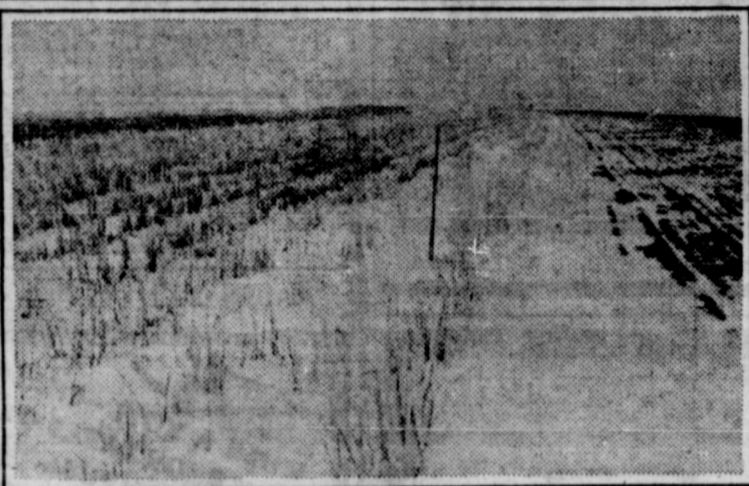
A community Christmas tree, for the benefit of Clarendon needy families, will be held on the court house lawn at 6 o'clock, Thursday, December 22nd.

## Hold Snow Where It Falls



Snow held on the ground where it falls means more moisture for crop and grass growth in the Spring. Terraces, contour furrows, grain stubble and strips of vegetation all catch and hold the snow. If the ground is smooth and there is no obstruction to hold the snow, it is swept into gullies, ditches and drifts by the force of high winds. Stubble on this terraced field in a Soil Conservation Service demonstration area is holding the snow on the land.

## LELIA LAKE CREEK WATERSHED BEING TERRACED BY SCS

The soil conservation service, through the CCC camp at Memphis is co-operating with the farmers of the Lelia Lake area in controlling the watershed of Lake creek. The regional office of the SCS made a detailed soil survey of about 35,000 acres, during August, as a basis for planning treatment of the individual farms.

Engineers of the Memphis camp have been at work since September 1, making topographical maps of the individual farms. They have completed half the work.

Work on aying out the constructing terraces started last week by engineers of the CCC camp, and a contractor with a 60 horsepower tractor and 10 foot blade.

The work by the SCS is being done in co-operation with county agent H. M. Breedlove and a committee of interested citizens of the Lelia Lake community. John Howard is chairman of the organization.

## LEADING CITIZEN DIES SUNDAY IN MINERAL WELLS

A. H. Baker Was a Resident Of The Panhandle More Than a Half Century

Death Monday morning wrote the final chapter in the book of life of one of Clarendon's most beloved characters, A. H. Baker, 69, whose life story was a colorful edition of pioneer hardships and uncertainties.

Mr. Baker, the one time buffalo hunter and wild horse catcher, died in Mineral Wells at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Henry Tice, after a prolonged illness. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. R. S. McKee, assisted by Rev. J. Perry King at the Presbyterian church at 3 p. m. here Tuesday.

Those attending the casket were A. L. Chase, C. J. Douglas, A. J. Parker, W. A. Land, Roy L. Clayton, J. C. Estlack. In charge of the flowers were Mmes. Reagan Bryan, Alfred Estlack, A. J. Parker, Regan Bain, Ben Buck.

A Clarendon resident since 1916, Mr. Baker was a former druggist and for two terms a District Clerk. At the time of his death he was interested in the real estate business.

Born in Grand Prairie, Mo., in April, 1869, He averaged attending school four months each year until he was 14. Deciding to seek his fortune in the glamorous West when still a boy, he earned a livelihood in the Panhandle by gathering and selling buffalo bones, and catching and selling wild mustangs.

Arriving in Sherman County to make its second citizen, he resided there until the death of his father caused his return to Missouri.

Marrying his schoolyard sweetheart in Missouri, Baker returned to Texas with his young bride where they established a dugout residence on his Hutchinson County claim. The mother pool of the Hutchinson county oil field now flows from the homestead.

Baker is credited, by many historians, with having roped the last wild buffalo on the plains of Texas.

In talking of his last buffalo hunt, recently, he said, "It was in the spring of '83 when we got the last herd. Lee Howard, Charles Green, and I were working for Buffalo Jones, a Lawrence Kansas, banker-cattleman whose hobby was a buffalo ranch."

"We sighted 13 in a group, including calves, and trailed them for 23 days. It was rough country and the animals were getting wild from so much hunting."

"The roping wasn't so much trouble. We just rode in, cut them out like cattle, and hobbled them until we could ship them to Kansas. The worst part of it was that all but five died before Jones received them."

"This, the last herd of wild buffalo in the Panhandle was caught near the XIT pasture on Coldwater creek, north of where the town of Stratford now stands."

Besides his wife, he is survived by three children, Robert of California; Mrs. Marion Cox of Panhandle and Mrs. Henry Tice of Mineral Wells.

Others winning special ribbons awarded the ten high individuals in order named were Brooks, Silverton; Adams, Byers; Lemon, Byers; Vaughn, Tulla; Routh, Friona; Cole, Pampa; McIroy, Claude and Edmondson, Tulla. Donnell, Silverton, led the alternates with 397 to 396 for Parker of Tulla.

R. B. Galloway, poultry specialist of the Hardeman-King Feed Mills, Amarillo, was the judge for the show. Galloway stated that the local show was probably the largest in this territory outside of the Tri-State Fair, Amarillo.

E. V. Quattlebaum, Clarendon producer, paced the sweepstakes with four first places. Quattlebaum won first for the best parti-colored pen, best parti-colored hen, cock and pullet.

C. C. Ayers, Lelia Lake, was second in the sweepstakes with the best solid colored pens, cock and pullet. The best solid colored cockerel was awarded to Claude Primrose with a White Langshan. Otis Naylor's buff won the best solid colored hen.

For the best 20 birds in one variety, Junior Spier with a flock of Rhode Island Whites won first.

Fort Worth and Denver railroad officials estimated this week that a wide swinging steam shovel dip, that crashed into the two Clarendon water tanks as the freight train on which it was being transported sped past the depot early Sunday morning, resulted in several thousands of dollars property damage.

The shovel equipment was lashed to a flat car on an east bound train. The dip swinging wide caught the west tank first practically demolishing the structure. The second tank was also greatly damaged and damage to boxcars, in the yards, before the train could be hauled, was also reported.

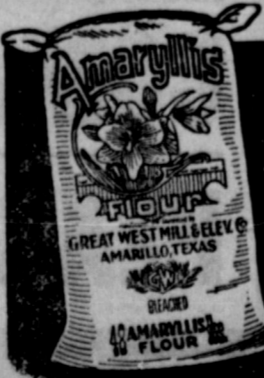

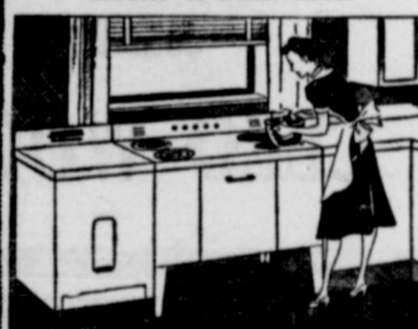
