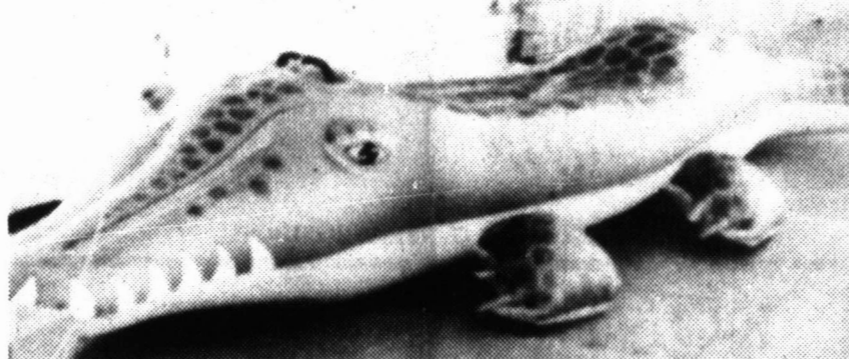

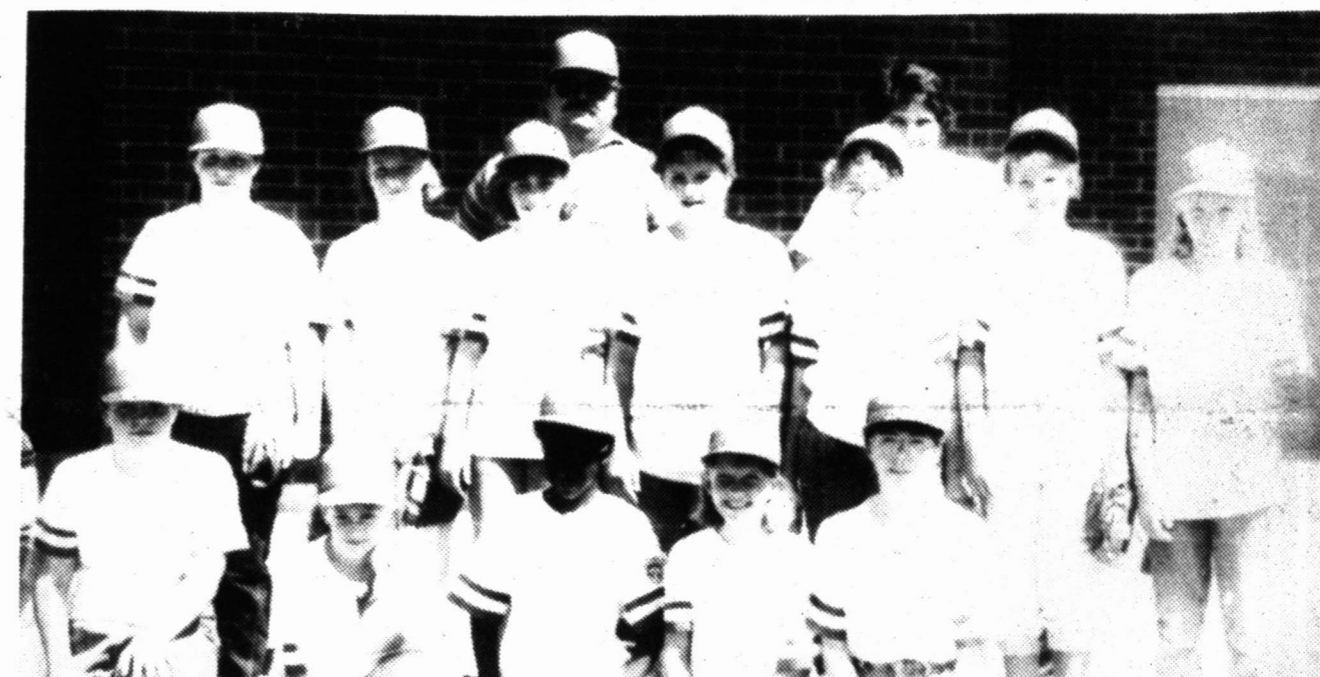

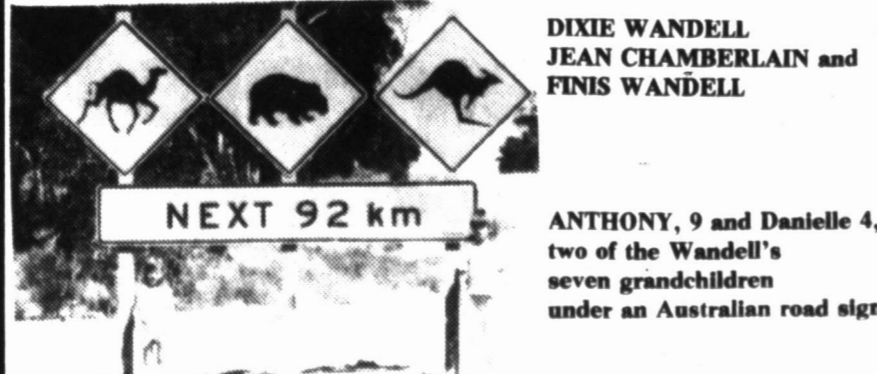
Services Held for Jesse Lee Wood

The Finis Wandells Visit Clarendon

Australia is a member of the Commonwealth of Nations and is a federation composed of six states. At the opening of the 20th century most of the Australian people had come from the British Isles or were of British descent.

By 1940 net immigration amounted to 594,000, some 421,000 of these immigrants were assisted by the passage assistance program provided by the Australia government. World War II temporarily curtailed any substantial increase in immigration but the events of the war, particularly in the Pacific area, encouraged a new and more constructive approach to the question of population building. More manpower was needed, it was increasingly felt, not so much to settle the land but as to increase the nation's industrial strength. A long term immigration program provided a steady stream of immigrants at the annual rate of 1 percent of the population, or initially 70,000 persons a year. Australia became one of the world's most highly industrialized nations, but remained its most sparsely populated continent.

That population, coupled with an increasing drug problem in the United States prompted Finis Wandell and his wife, Dixie and 3 daughters ages 6, 7 and 8, to decide to immigrate to Perth in Western, Australia.

Finis was born in Clarendon on September 21, 1932, the son of Kelly Chamberlain. As a very small boy, he and his brother moved to Colorado Springs with their mother. It was there in Colorado that Finis graduated from high school, attended college, married and had three daughters.

Finis sold his development business in Colorado Springs, Colo. and on faith packed up his family and

moved in 1965. It took him some three months to find a job. He went to work for Beech Aircraft Co. After a few years he started his own business. He tried several different things before finally deciding on the Wholesale Video business.

Western, Australia is approximately a million square miles, roughly the size of Texas, Alaska, California and Great Britain, but only about 1.3 million in population. Finis and his partner travelled some 9,000 miles per month, which covered their 92 Video agents.

Their daughters, Becky, Florance and Linda became naturalized citizens of Australia, but Finis and Dixie chose to keep their American citizenship. "Australia has the friendliest people in the world", Finis stated, "and if given a choice of becoming an Australian citizen or leaving the country, we would certainly become Australian citizens. We love the country. We retained our American citizenship because it is much easier to travel out of the country, in Europe, Asia and the States." Since their retirement four years ago, the Wandell's have travelled a great deal.

They have travelled four times around Australia. Almost all of the population is around the edge of the country. Very few people, compared to the population, live inside the interior. One of their favorite places to visit is Bali, Indonesia. To travel to the United States, through Europe, then return to Australia thru Asia you literally travel around the world.

About 10 years ago, Finis and Dixie moved to Geraldton, this is a city of about 20,000 up the coast from Perth. They have a home on the ocean front and Finis enjoys lobster fishing.

Dixie stated, that Australia today,

is much like what the United States was 50 years ago, if you live in the smaller less populated areas, but if you live in one of the large cities, it is like all large cities anywhere in the world. Real Estate, unemployment, medicine and medical facilities are much cheaper than in the United States, but food and income tax are higher. They pay a minimum of 37% income tax, but medical treatment is only about a tenth as high as the states, they have a form of socialized medicine. There is no social security as it is known in the States, but they have a flat rate for each citizen or couple as they reach the age of 65, not being that old the Wandell's did not know exactly what it was, but thought it was in the neighborhood of \$120.00 a week. Based on the population, Australia has a very low rate of senior citizens.

It is winter in Australia, that is why they are traveling at this time. The hottest months in Geraldton are January and February with an average daily temperature of 96 degrees, while the coldest months are August and September with temperatures ranging from 40 for a low at night to 60 during the day time. It never freezes.

The Wandell's daughters are married and between them they have 7 children. Dixie and Finis do not have any kind of Australian accent, but they stated that the girls were very Australian and would never consider moving back to the States to live.

Finis and Dixie usually purchase a car when they arrive in the United States, and sell it before leaving for home. They find it very difficult trying to remember to drive on the right side of the road.

The Wandell's are visiting with Jean Chamberlain, and other relatives in Clarendon and plan on visiting family and friends in Oklahoma City before going onto Colorado Springs which is Dixie's family home.

The Christian's Gauge

Making a visit to any large foundry where the boilers are kept going at full force, you would never be able to tell how much water there was in a boiler because it is impossible to look into. But you would be able to tell how much water the boiler contained by an

instrument which is attached to the side of the boiler. Along side is a small glass tube which has some fluid in it. If this glass tube is half full of liquid, then there is an indication that the boiler is half full of water; if the glass gauge indicated that there is no water in the glass, then we can depend that there is no water in the boiler. The little glass gauge is the indicator for the large boiler.

How can people tell whether we love God, our fellowman or even ourselves? They can never look within our hearts and get the answer; it is only by our outward actions, the works that we do as Christians that people are able to tell how much or how little our religion amounts to. Our love for God is indicated by the works of love in which we engage. There are people who are constantly looking at the Christian's gauge.

4-H Congress Focuses on Legislative Process

4-H members attending the 1988 Texas 4-H Congress in Austin July 19-22 will get a firsthand look at the legislative process and will actually develop bills to present to the Governor.

This year's Congress is aimed at helping our youths get a better understanding of how legislation is developed and how it moves through the Senate and the House of Representatives, said Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent. More than 500 4-H members

between the ages of 15 and 19 are expected to attend the Congress, which will be at the Capitol Marriot.

Attending the four-day event from Donley County will be Shannon Myers.

The annual Congress is designed to be a leadership and citizenship development experience for older 4-H members, said Gooch.

In addition to developing legislation, the youths also will learn about the lobbying process. Along with a complete tour of the capitol, they will also spend some time at the LBJ Library.

Insect Infestation in Fields

Donley County cotton producers should be checking their fields for insect infestations, according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Light to moderate infestations of bollworms were found in fields this week. Treatment may be justified when counts average 5,000 or more small worms per acre or 8 to 10 percent of the plants are infested.

Check the entire cotton plant, as small bollworms and eggs are being found in all areas of the plant, not just in the terminal area.

Continue to check the fields twice a week in order to detect bollworm eggs and small larvae early.

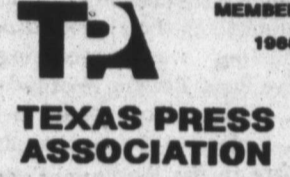
Light infestations of boll weevil are also being found in some cotton fields. Boll weevils are found in most areas of Donley County this spring using the Pheromone traps. Check Boll weevil infestations by examining 100 squares at least one third grown, taking squares from at least four representative locations in the field. Control measures are suggested when 25-30 percent of the squares are punctured and adult weevil are found.

Cotton insect guides are available from the County Extension Office.

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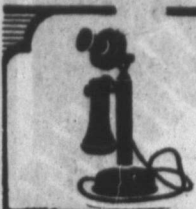

Deuteronomy 6:7-9
From Glory to Glory

"Changed from glory into glory, Till in heaven we take our place, Till we cast our crowns before Thee, Lost in wonder, love, and praise."

--from the hymn "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling," by Charles Wesley

I began my latest in this series of articles talking about mountains, and I still have mountains on my mind. Actually, I suppose I always have mountains on my mind, especially this time of year, when folks begin thinking of long weekends in cool Colorado. This week, I am thinking about a stretch of highway running west and north of Walsenburg which, thankfully, seems not to have been "discovered" by tourists. So grand, so stunningly beautiful is this drive, that it seems to me that it provides an excellent parable of what the Christian life should be.

As one leaves Walsenburg westward, he is surrounded by low mountains and beautiful ranch country. The first twenty-five miles takes the traveler through three tiny villages, two of which nestle under huge trees along the valley of Huerfano Creek. To this point, the mountains and the ranches have been a feast for the eyes, the villages a fascinating step back in time. But as one continues from the village of Gardner, he realizes that all of this has been mere prelude to what lies ahead.

As the route turns more to the northwest, then almost north, it enters the West Mountain Valley, with the low West Mountains on the east, and the valley floor and the much-higher Sangre de Cristo Range to the west. I've always thought "West Mountain Valley" was as understated a name as one could imagine, somewhat akin to calling a village above the Arctic Circle "Cool City". This valley certainly gets its share of mountain showers, and is as lush and green as anyplace I've ever seen.

Off to your right in the Sangre de Cristos are Crestone Needle and

Crestone Peak (both higher than Pikes Peak), Gibson Peak, Baldy and countless others almost as high forming a skyline of almost incredible beauty. Complementing the peaks, and making them seem still higher, is the valley floor dropping away from the roadway, greener than any well-watered city park, and looking just about as manicured. Every twist and turn of the road, every popping out from behind an embankment, produces a vista more glorious than the last. If one could ever become drunk from too much scenery, this would surely be the place to do it.

How is this a parable of the Christian life? I realize that I would never qualify as a writer of travelogues, and that I'm probably being much too dramatic, but what I'm trying to say is this: Every vista along this route seems to be more glorious than the last. In II Corinthians 3:18, Paul speaks of our being "... changed... from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord." When we walk in trusting obedience with the Lord, life becomes better and better, more like Him, more like life in Heaven. It does NOT necessarily become easier. Life in Christ, like the road in the Wet Mountain Valley, has its hazards. The route we have been describing is designated State Highway 69 on maps, but one is startled to find a number of miles of dirt road about halfway between Walsenburg and Westcliffe. Like life, the road has its ups and downs. True to its name, the valley can get very wet. Brief but heavy rain or snow showers can get come up practically every time I have traversed the route, and usually when I was on the unpaved stretch. And it never fails that, even though you may not have seen another human for miles and miles, when you get to that unpaved portion, here will come someone with the biggest four-wheel-drive rig you ever saw, driving at twice the speed limit, throwing rocks and gravel all over you and your car.

The devil will see to it that there are road hazards all along your life's path, but the Lord gives strength to travel on.

Finally, HOW are we changed "from glory to glory"? The full text of II Corinthians 3:18 says, "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from Glory to Glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord." I have heard it said that men living in the High Country became like their beloved mountains:

tough, rugged, impervious to the forces of nature swirling around them. This verse says to us that, by fixing our eyes upon Jesus, we become more and more like Him, changed into His image. That's worth tackling any hazard the devil throws in your path!
