Pam Fletcher attends State Conference

Pam Fletcher, County Treasurer, joined some 200 other elected officials for the 16th Annual County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas A&M University, April 18-21. The program is designed to educate county treasurers on a wide range of responsibilities to include investments, cash management, record keeping, reporting and disbursements of county funds. Participation in this seminar enables county treasurers to achieve and maintain certification as required by state law.

The seminar commenced with a legislative hearing on April 18. Members of the House Committee on County Affairs heard testimony from numerous county officials on issues affecting the office of county treasurer. The interim charges of this House Committee include possible reorganization of the structure of county government and the possible abolition of the county treasurer's office.

Pam Fletcher explained, "The treasurer is the chief financial officer for the county whose function should remain separate from those of the auditor." In most counties where the office of county treasurer has been abolished, the responsibilities were given to the county auditor. "This eliminates the checks and balance concept which is vital for a sound financial operation within the county," explained Pam.

County treasurers who successfully complete the four-day training receive twenty (20) hours of continuing education credits from Texas A&M University. The annual seminar is one of the educational programs sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Three Clarendon College sophomores were presented with awards at the 1988 Graduation ceremonies Friday night.

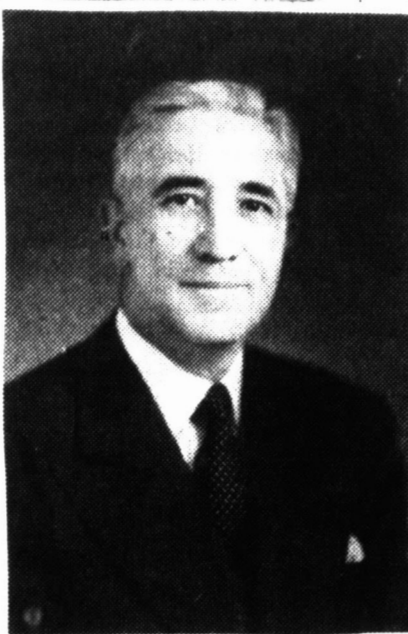

The Donley County 4-H K-9 Korp, in conjunction with the City-County Rabies Clinic and Deyhle Veterinary Services, will provide their annual heart worm exam, dipping service, and Parvo vaccination.

The clinic will be held Friday, May 13, 1988, in the back of Deyhle Veterinary Services (large animal clinic) from 3:30-5:30 p.m. The cost of services are as follows: dipping \$8.00 Ex-Par, 21 day residual, kills fleas, ticks and lice; heart worm direct exam and filter exam \$7.00; rabies \$6.00 vaccination plus \$1.00 for city tag for a total of \$7.00; Parvo vaccination \$7.00, distemper vaccination \$8.00.

ALT to present Cinderella

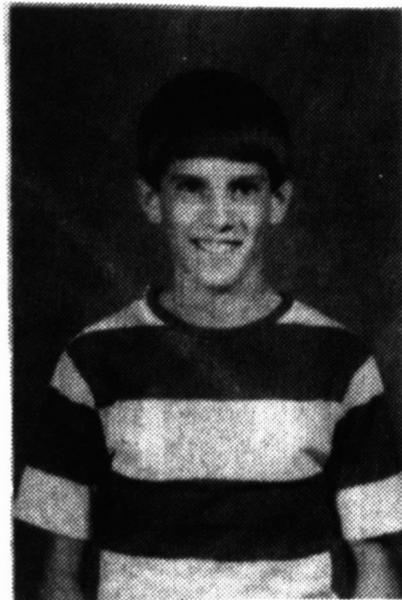

Children under 12, may bring four cans of food to the matinees and will be admitted at discount prices. All canned items will go to the High Plains Food Bank.

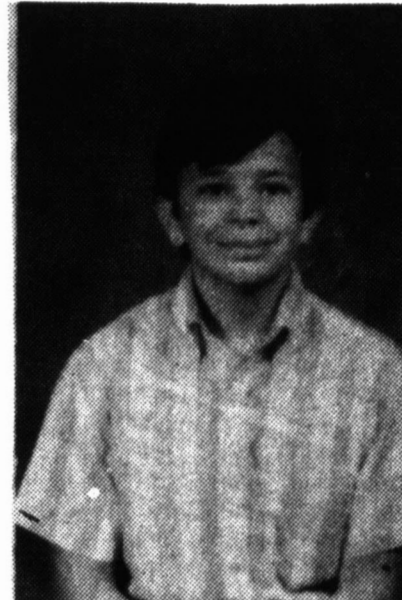

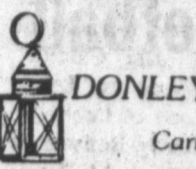
Scott completes basic training



Started in both basketball and track as 2 time All District and All Region selection in basketball as Carey also reached the State Basketball Tournament in 1936. He continued his basketball career at East Texas State as top scorer of 1938 undefeated frosh team, leader of Lions 1939 and 1940 Lone Star Conference Champs as well as Texas AAU Champs in 1940. 1941 AAU Meet high scorer and First Team Texas All Stars selection. He by passed an offer from Chicago of the NBA to become a

naval aviation cadet upon college graduation in 1941 and awarded Wings of Gold and commission as Ensign in 1942. He flew 170 combat missions in the Pacific and was awarded Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Ribbon with 7 Battle Stars, 2 Distinguished Flying Crosses and 3 Air Medals. He held numerous postwar assignments including Pentagon posts with Joint Chiefs of Staff. He was awarded Secretary of Defence Joint Service Medal upon retirement from the Navy in 1968. Cmd. Redwine and his wife, former Darryle Jane Price, live in McLean and have one son, Dr. William J. Redwine, a dentist in Richmond, Va. Mr. Redwine is the brother of Opal Borden, uncle of Glenda Hawkins and Regina Wootton.

Prevention and Treatment of Bed Sores

Bed sores affect many hospitalized patients and are estimated to occur in up to 40 percent of all nursing home patients. Sores most commonly develop when there is pressure against the skin, over an area of bone (e.g. hip).

Prevention: Changing body position every few hours is reported to be the best way to prevent bed sores. Ripple mattresses and foam rubber cushions have provided protection in many patients who cannot be moved easily. A pressurized "glass beads box" placed under the patient has also been reported to be helpful. Other preventative measures include water beds, air-filled pads that distribute a person's weight over a large surface area, and silicone gel pads.

Treatment: Treatment of bed sores includes debriding or cleansing the affected area, disinfection, supporting the growth of new tissue, and proper nutrition. Medications commonly used include enzyme-containing products to aid in the removal of dead tissue, topical antibacterial solutions such as povidone-iodine, hydrophilic polymers for absorbing skin moisture, and nutritional supplements such as zinc and vitamin C to aid in tissue repair.

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Etiquette ...

Who, What, Where & When

The bride and her parents decide the type wedding, the date, hour and place. The bride selects the attendants' dresses, but these are paid for by the attendants. The bride may provide the accessories if she chooses. She does, however, select a gift for each.

The clergyman who is to perform the ceremony must be consulted about the date and hour of the wedding and the time of the wedding rehearsal. At this time he may set a date to go over the wedding vows with the bride and groom and especially any regulations concerning the wedding.

Ushers should arrive at the church about an hour before the ceremony. If ushers are not acquainted with relatives and close friends who have invitations to sit in the reserved sections, a person familiar with these details may be there to assist in these duties. They are fully instructed at the time of rehearsal of any special requests made by either the bride or groom's parents. It is the duty of the bride's parents to see that the groom's parents, if they are from out-of-town, have an escort to guide them to the church and to the reception, to prevent any delay.

The bride's mother may ride to the church with her husband and the bride, or with the bridesmaids, or she may be escorted by a close member of the family.

The bridesmaids meet at the home of the bride, at which time formal bridal photographs are made of this group. The bridesmaids are then taken to the church in a group.

The bridegroom and best man arrive about 20 minutes before the service and meet the minister in the vestry. The best man has the ring, marriage license and the minister's fee.

The last one to arrive at the church are the bride and her father. She is instructed to wear her engagement ring on her right hand. If the bride wears long gloves in the ceremony, the seat of the glove on the ring finger is opened so the wedding ring may be placed on the finger.

In servicing the bridal party, all flowers should be delivered to the place of the wedding. Each corsage and boutonniere is pinned on by her florist. The mother's corsages are the first to be pinned on. The bridesmaids are given their bouquets and are shown how to carry them. The bride is the last one to receive a bouquet.

Should the weather be bad the wedding party may dress at the church.

Garden wedding plans are sometimes upset by rain, or other elements of nature. Secondary arrangements must be made at the garden scene in order that decorations may be moved indoors without confusion in case of rain.

Custom and etiquette through the years have divided the financial responsibilities of the groom and the bride's parents. The groom provides the bride's bouquet, the mothers' corsages, the boutonnieres, and the going-away corsage for the bride. Generally, the bride selects the flowers for her bouquet. The flowers and colors of the corsages for the mothers should harmonize with their attire.

The groom should visit the florist previous to the wedding date to discuss the prices concerning these pieces. With the corsage to the mothers, he should enclose his personal card. The going-away cor-

sage is often a part of the bride's bouquet, for sentimental reason and economy. During the groom's visit to the florist is an excellent time to make the suggestion that the florist be allowed to design a special going-away corsage as a surprise to the bride, with a card inserted with the inscription, "May I be the first to call you Mrs. John Jones? - Love, John."

The bride's parents assume the financial responsibility of the floral decorations at the rehearsal dinner, decorations at the wedding, and reception, attendant's bouquets, corsages for house party, soloist, organist, and transportation for the

bridal party to and from these activities.

There are times when the groom is not financially able to furnish flowers in keeping with the wedding that is planned by the bride. In such cases, the bride's parents may assume part of this responsibility, which they should suggest during the final consultations with the florist. In some instances, the groom may wish to assume the responsibility for all floral expenses of the bridal party (leaving the expense of the church decorations for her parents) if he is financially able and the bride's parents are in moderate circumstances.

Plan Shower List With Care

Bridal showers are given by intimate friends in honor of the bride, whom they wish to shower with gifts. The number of showers should be limited, to spare the bride's time and her friends' pocketbooks.

Immediate members of the bride's family - or the groom's should not give a shower. This includes mothers, grandmothers and sisters. Aunts or cousin members of the bridal party, co-workers, or most friends are all eligible hostesses. There are exceptions. When a bride comes from a foreign country and knows no one here except her groom and his family, they may properly plan a shower. But ordinarily, for her immediate family to do so is in poor taste.

Members of both families, attendants and close friends are invited to showers. The hostess is wise to discuss the guest list with the bride.

By doing so, the bride who is given several showers can divide her friends so that no one needs to go to too many showers or produce too many gifts.

Others invited to the shower are older relatives and family friends.

When a shower is given by a fellow worker or a member of a club to which the bride belongs, it is perfectly all right for the hostess to ask only the office personnel or the members of the club.

Types of showers include kitchen, linen, lingerie, bathroom, pantry, gardening, recipe and paper. A shower, can of course be a combination of all the above.

Shower invitations are always informal and are usually written guests are called personally.

It is most important that the hostess provide the guests with the necessary information about colors,

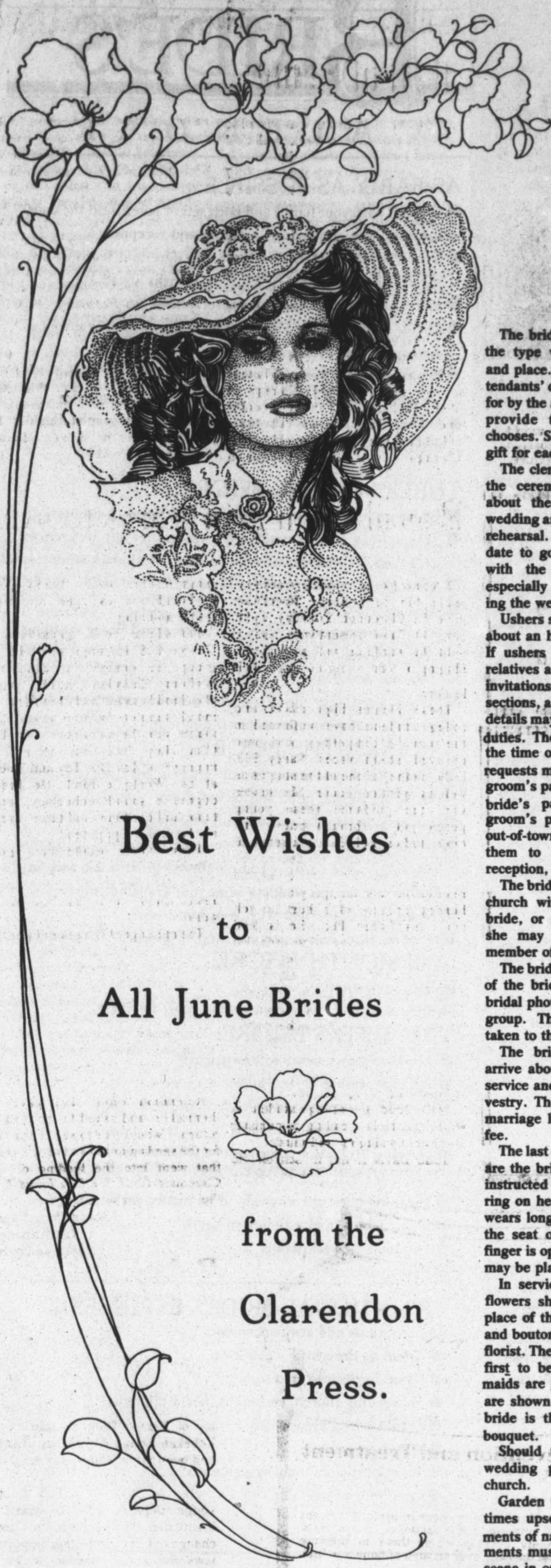
sizes and styles so helpful to them as well as to the bride.

Decorations are almost always in keeping with the theme of the shower.

A shower should not last more than two hours. Gifts opening, presents and a few minutes to relax and chat will more than fill the time.

Today "come and go" showers are becoming more popular. During this type gifts picked out in advance by the bride are purchased by guests and sent to the shower location. These gifts are displayed in an attractive manner accompanied by the name of the person who purchased the gift for the couple.

Guests may wish to bring their gift in person or may simply come to the shower, chat with the bride and other guests, enjoy some type of refreshments then depart.

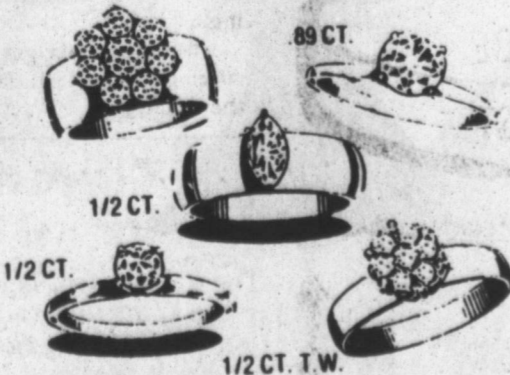

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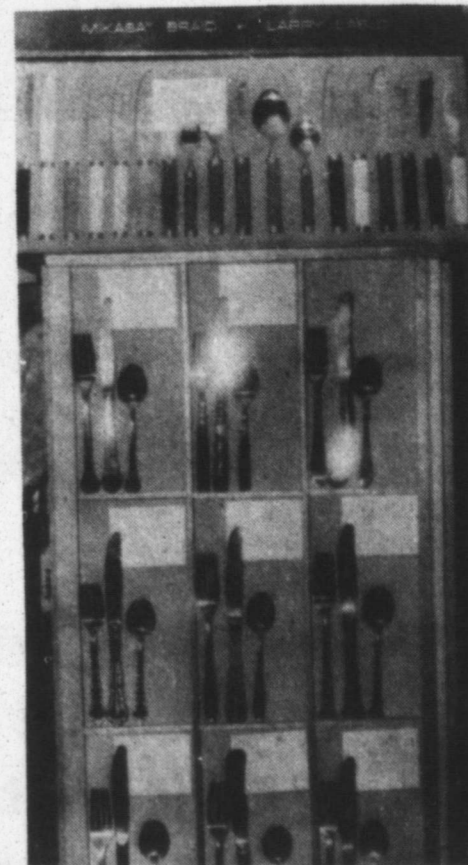
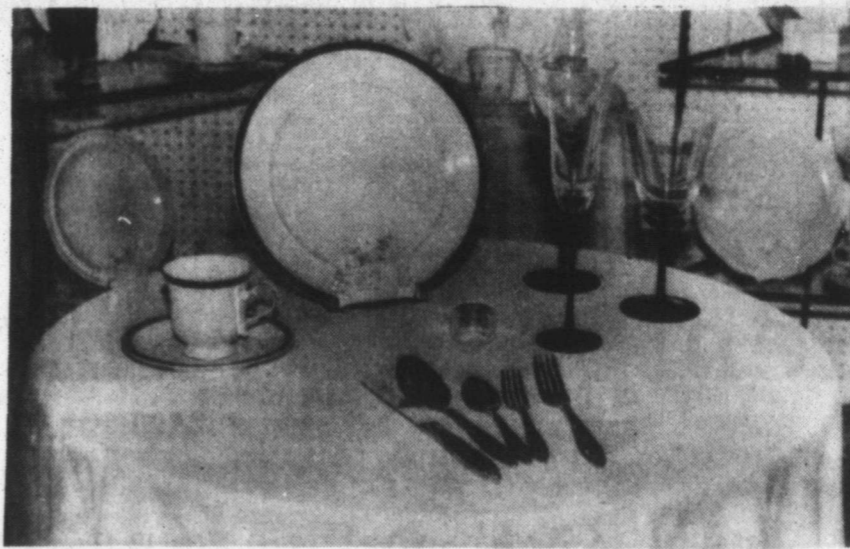

Consult Florist Early

The flowers in the church are as elaborate or as simple as you choose. Harlan's Flowers will assist with every detail of the bridal bouquet and the decorations at both the church and the place of the reception; however, your clergyman's advice can be most helpful in choosing those for the altar and chancel.

Whether or not you have flowers on the ends of the pew depends on the size and formality of the wedding.

Flowers for the church and reception should be ordered as soon as possible. The date, type of wedding, and the color of the bridesmaids' dresses are some of the things the florist will need to know in advance.

In most parts of the country, all flowers, including her own bouquet, are part of the bride's responsibilities.

At the reception the only flowers are a background of greens for the receiving line and an arrangement or two for the bridal or buffet table. Even these are not necessary if space is limited or if the wedding cake is used as the central decoration. At receptions where the guests are seated, there may be a small flower arrangement on each table.

Flowers for the church and reception need not be all white; they are often mixed with yellow, pink or seasonal colors and frequently are chosen to blend with the bridesmaids' dresses. When choosing your flowers, consider the season. Harlan's will help you choose a flower that will be appropriate to the season and to the materials and styles that the season suggests.

Flowers for home weddings can be similar to those used in a church or chapel; however, they can be a little more simpler and less in number.

Extra candleholders in various shapes can be supplied by the florist if the church supply is limited.

Harlan's will make suggestions as to appropriate aisle decorations. If aisle ribbons are used, Harlan's can

supply these. Harlan's will need to know the number of rows or pews that are to be included in the bride's and groom's reserved section of the church, so he can make necessary decorations.

The bridal bouquet may be any color the bride prefers. The traditional bridal bouquet was formerly white with a touch of green, but

many other colors are now used and are just as appropriate.

Colors of the corsages of the mothers, honored guests, and relatives should harmonize with their

costumes. White, although permissible, is seldom used, especially if the bride is wearing all white.

Attendant's bouquets should harmonize with their costumes, and they may also be same or contrasting colors. Usually honor attendant's bouquets are a different color or larger than those of the other attendants.

RECEPTIONS: A PIECE OF CAKE

The type of reception or breakfast held depends on the formality of the wedding.

The reception or breakfast following an ultra-formal or formal wedding may be held at home, in a large room or suite of rooms at a private club or hotel, in a garden, or in the garden or home of a relative or friend.

Decorations should create a proper setting for such an occasion.

Receiving lines are a must for ultra-formal or formal receptions.

Positions in the receiving line are as follows: bride's mother, groom's father, groom's mother, bride's father, bride, groom, maid or matron of honor, and bridesmaids in the order they walked in the processional. The best man and groomsmen are generally not part of the receiving line.

Semi-formal wedding receptions may be held at home or in a garden, in a room or suite of rooms at a club or hotel, in a church parlor, a rented hall or private dining room in a restaurant.

Decorations are more modest. The receiving line is the same as that of a formal wedding.

Informal weddings receptions don't have receiving lines. The bride and groom receive well wishes of their friends and relatives during the

reception.

It is not obligatory, but some couples like to have their friends sign a guest register to have as a memento of the occasion. If so, the book is placed on a table near the entrance or at the end of the receiving line. A member of the family, a friend or one of the bridesmaids (if they are not included in the receiving line) stays beside it to remind each guest to sign.

The wedding cake is a must at all wedding receptions, no matter how small or informal the reception may be. The bride and the groom traditionally cut and share the first slice of wedding cake even at the most informal reception.

The first slice is cut from the outer part of the lowest tier. The bride and groom usually use a decorated cake knife to cut the first slice, the groom placing the right hand over the right hand of the bride as they cut together.

The bride's cake is a white cake with elaborate icing. The cake is sometimes placed as a centerpiece on the bridal table.

The icing is almost always all white although a current vogue finds icing entirely or partly of color, often to match the gowns of the bridesmaids. Pastel flowers in soft pink or yellow are lovely, because these are de-

licate, feminine colors. The cake may be in the shape of a heart, molded into a wedding ring or the traditional round two or three-tiered cake.

The groom's cake is a almost always a dark fruit cake or chocolate cake placed on a separate table from the bride's white cake.

The size of the cake vary according to the number of guests invited to the reception. The groom's cake should be ordered the same time as the bride's cake.

Memphis Bakery-the closest bakery to Clarendon-will be happy to help with your reception planning.

Other items placed on the bride and groom tables may include bridal napkins, match folders, candelabra and tapers, coffee and punch appointments in the bride's chosen colors.

At the end of the reception rice bags are often passed out by two or three young girls. These bags may be filled with rice, rose petals, confetti or bird seed in the shape of squares or rose petals. Pastel tied with satin ribbon are a favorite. Flowers may be added to give a prettier effect. These tiny bags are given to each guest just before the bridal pair leaves the place of the reception.

The contents of the bags should be thrown outside.

After the bride and groom have finished the reception and before they change into their going away clothes, the bride throws her bridal bouquet in the traditional manner to her assembled bridesmaids.

After tossing the bridal bouquet, the bride removes her special blue garter and gives it to the groom. He then tosses it to his ushers and bachelor friends.

Music

Traditionally the procession enters the church to Wagner's Wedding March, "Here Comes the Bride" and leaves the church to Mendelssohn's Wedding March, "Midsummer Night's Dream."

There are many hymns or marches of more religious nature that may be substituted for the traditional processional and recessional. Some brides have their own special favorites they may wish to be played instead.

An organist will help choose selections for a church ceremony. If the ceremony is at home, music can be provided by a record player.

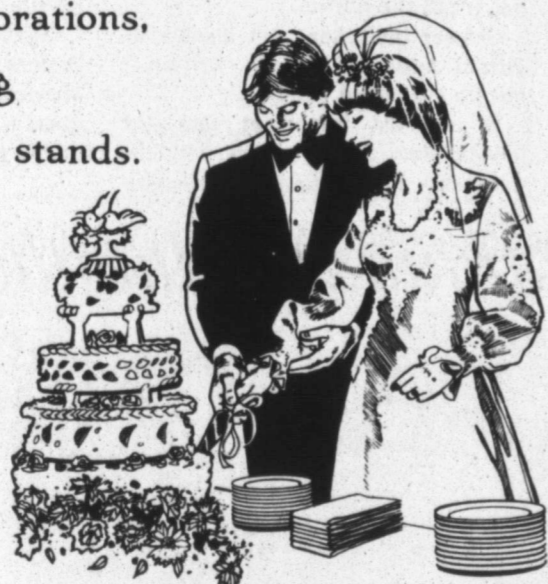
At a church ceremony, organ music is almost always played while the guests assemble.

Music at the reception may be provided by anything from a 10-piece band to a record player.

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BRIDE'S CALENDAR

- Visit your clergyman to reserve the date and learn of any special requirements. (At least six months ahead.)
- Plan the reception and make reservations.
- Decide on attendants, and select what they will wear as well as your gown and accessories.
- Begin making a guest list with the help of groom's family. A wedding guest and gift record file will prove invaluable.
- Make arrangements for flowers, music and photographs. Begin making plans for your new home.

THREE MONTHS BEFORE:

- Order invitations, announcements and thank you notes.
- Select china, silver, crystal, etc., and register gift preferences with your favorite department and local Hallmark store.
- Make an appointment with your doctor.
- Have portraits taken.
- Finalize arrangements with the caterer and order wedding cake separately if necessary.
- Purchase wedding ring and gift for the groom.
- Check newspaper deadlines for announcements. Include groom's hometown newspaper if different.

TWO MONTHS BEFORE:

- Write thank you notes for all gifts as they are received, including shower gifts, and record them.
- Address invitations and announcements.
- Order imprinted napkins and purchase necessary paper party products, place cards, wedding album, guest book and any accessories for the wedding from your Hallmark store.
- Make an appointment with your hairdresser.
- Shop for your new home and your trousseau.

 - Choose attendants' gifts and plan party for them.
- ## TWO WEEKS BEFORE:
- Send announcements to newspapers.
 - Arrange seating for reception.
 - Arrange transportation to church and reception.

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Choose Bride's Attendants Carefully

The average formal or semi-formal wedding party includes four to six bridesmaids and also ushers. There may be more ushers than bridesmaids; the number is often determined by the 'one usher for 50 guests' rule. The attendants are invited to serve soon after the engagement is announced.

Since they are invariable relatives or close friends, no one should refuse the honor when asked to be an attendant.

The bride's closest sister is almost always chosen for the position of maid of honor. If the bride has no sister near her age, a cousin or best friend should serve. A matron may be chosen instead of a maid of honor, and on rare occasions there are both a maid and a matron of honor. In this case the maid takes precedence, holding the bouquet and serving as a witness.

Formerly bridesmaids were literally unmarried; now they may be either single or married contemporaries of the bride, usually the groom's sister or close friends of the bride.

Bridesmaids are responsible for paying for their costumes and seeing that they are properly fitted. A

considerate bride will think of her bridesmaid's pocketbooks when she chooses their dresses.

Junior bridesmaids are between the ages of 10 and 14, and too big to be flower girls and too small to be bridesmaids. Their duty is merely to walk in the procession.

Flower girls are often a young relative of the bride between 4 and 7 years old. She walks directly before the ring bearer in the procession and directly behind him when they leave the church. The flower girls should be dressed in childlike style in a matching color of bridesmaids.

Ring bearers are small boy relatives between the age of 4 and 7, and possibly the son of a close friend. The most appropriate dress is short pants with Eton jacket, preferably white but occasionally navy. Small editions of the ushers' costumes are not in good taste.

The ring bearer immediately precedes the bride in the procession.

Train bearers and pages may be included, but the presence of too many children can be distracting in the wedding party.

The best man, often a brother or cousin, can be a friend or even his

father.

The duties of a best man are numerous, especially relieving the groom of as many details and responsibilities as possible.

The best man must see that the groom is dressed on time, has his wedding ring and clergyman's fee, see that the couple's luggage is in the car, etc.

The best man enters the chapel from the vestry immediately after the groom and stands behind the groom and slightly to his left, in such a position that he can conveniently give the wedding ring to him when

the minister calls for it.

At the end of the service, relatives may walk down the aisle with the maid of honor or leave through a side door.

Ushers may be brothers, relatives of the groom's age or friends. If the bride has brothers of the same age, they are usually included. There should be one usher to every 50 guests, and their responsibility is to see that all guests and family members are seated, insofar as possible, where they wish to be.

Detail Planning Essential

Careful, detailed planning is the most essential element in arranging the perfect wedding. If your wedding is to be a small and simple affair, you and your family will be able to attend to most of the details yourself. If you are having a large elaborate wedding, you will do well to use professional help.

Etiquette is the same regardless of the size of a wedding and it is up to the bride to choose those elements which best fit into her plans, environment and financial situation.

Three to four months is an ideal period between engagement and marriage.

There are three categories of weddings: formal, semi-formal and informal. The formality necessary is related to the location of the ceremony and reception. The size of the wedding in a church may range from most formal to least formal. A ceremony held in a house always lends itself more to informality - unless the house is a mansion.

Whatever size or style of wedding you choose, it is the careful, thoughtful planning and the atmosphere that makes it beautiful. It is not how much you spend but how you spend it that matters. While a large, elaborate wedding may cost thousands of dollars, there are many ways in which you can save without detracting from the ceremony. Very often the simplest wedding is the most tasteful.

After the Wedding...

Clothing Tips

Once the honeymoon is over and the newlyweds get back to normal living, keeping up a new relationship an apartment and one's self - all at the same time - can be tedious business. Although new relationships and apartments require a cooperative effort, keeping one's self looking good is strictly a personal responsibility.

One personal grooming (and bridging!) problem that needs daily attention is clothing care. When it comes to cleaning clothing, two cannot live as cheaply as one. In fact, clothing care is one of those costs which simply doubles when two become one.

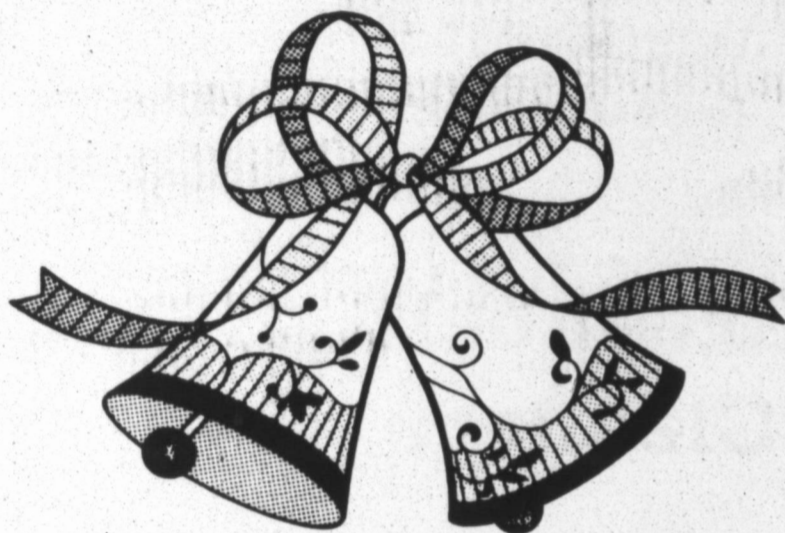
Solutions which contain alcohol, such as deodorants, lotions and perfume, can upset the dyes in delicate fabrics and cause stains. Always allow these solutions to dry before dressing.

Perspiration can leave a permanent yellow discoloration and objectionable odor if a garment is worn repeatedly. Launder perspiration-stained blouses, shirts and sweaters as soon as possible in cold-water wash.

Don't press stained or soiled clothing. The heat will set the stains and the pressure will force soil deeper into the fibers and damage the clothing.

To preserve your wedding dress you should have it professionally cleaned and boxed for storage.

- Find time to discuss financial details with your fiancée: insurance policies, checking and savings accounts, charge accounts, safety deposit boxes and wills should be revised or updated at the time of the wedding.

ONE MONTH BEFORE:

- Purchase gifts for groomsmen and the bride.
- Shop for any wedding or honeymoon attire you still need.
- Make sure needed legal papers are in order.

TWO WEEKS BEFORE:

- Set a date with your fiancée to get your marriage license.
- Confirm all honeymoon arrangements.
- Check with best man on honeymoon departure plans.

ONE WEEK BEFORE:

- Begin packing for your honeymoon.
- Present gifts to groomsmen at bachelor dinner.
- Give head usher seating arrangements for the wedding.
- Arrange to move both of your belongings to your new home.
- Write a check for the clergyman; the best man delivers it.

The audience will be dazzled by the latest creations in swimwear, bridal attire, loungewear, sportswear, etc. There may even be a few surprises!

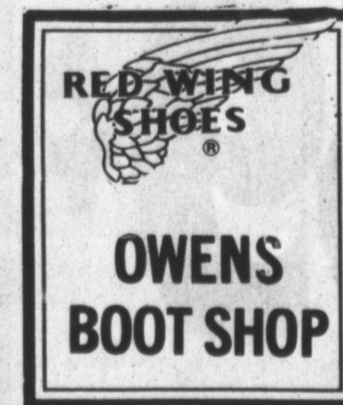
Identities of the lovely models who will be wearing these fashions cannot be revealed, so everyone come on out to the Hedley Gym on May 20 and see for yourselves.

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Doorposts: Happy Birthday Israel

Deuteronomy 6:7-9

On May 15, 1948—forty years ago this week—against all odds and with lightning speed as such things go, the modern nation of Israel was formed. After 2500-year hiatus, Jews again ruled a land that was given them for "an everlasting possession" (Genesis 17:8).

A quick sketch of Israel's history reveals that one could hardly find a bloodier piece of real estate on the face of the earth. In 606 B.C., Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, pillaged the Jerusalem temple and carried the king in chains to Babylon

(II Chronicles 36). Over the next twenty years, Babylon repeatedly attacked Jerusalem, and carried off most of the population (II Kings 24 and 25). Israel would not be master of its own house again for 2500 years.

In 168 B.C., the Syrian King Antiochus IV desecrated the second temple and burnt every copy of the scriptures he could lay his hands on.

In A.D. 70, the Roman general Titus took the city after a four-and-a-half-month's siege, and the third temple, Herod's, was completely destroyed, just as Jesus had prophesied in Matthew 24. This siege has been described as the most horrible in the annals of man, with starvation, cannibalism, and disease ravaging the locked-up city. In the end, some 1.1 million people died.

The Jews rebelled against Roman rule in A.D. 132-135, and Jerusalem was literally leveled.

On and on went the nation's trauma. In 638, Arab rule began with the capture of Jerusalem by Caliph Omar. In 969, Egyptian Caliphs began their rule of the city. In 1077 Seljuk Turks captured the city. All through the twelfth and thirteenth centuries Crusaders stormed across the region trying to recapture the Holy Land. In 1799, Napoleon invaded Palestine.

These are only the more notable of the many horrors Israel and the Holy City have suffered over nearly four millenia. One can hardly find even a fifty-year stretch of history when the land and its people were not suffering some sort of persecution.

And what of the modern nation as it celebrates its fortieth birthday? Can it reasonably expect that the time has arrived to beat swords into plowshares (Isa. 2:4)? probably not. It seems a time to prepare for the rise

and fall of the last great gentile powers, to prepare for the sound and fury of the whole world in arms. "Ye have heard that antichrist shall come" (I John 2:18). This false messiah and his hellish ally will, for a short time, terrorize the earth with their ungodly power (Revelation 13). Jerusalem will fall in one last humbling defeat before she becomes "the joy of the whole earth...the city of the great King" (Psalm 48:2).

But one thing was never in doubt—the survival of Zion. Jerusalem and the Jew must be there when the King comes back. The angel Gabriel, in announcing to Mary that she would bring forth a Son and would call His name Jesus, said, "The Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David; and he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end" (Luke 1:31-33).

Glory will return to Jerusalem. Where the Great Shepherd was mocked, He must be exalted. Where there was once a cross there must be a throne. Before Him who was betrayed and beaten, every knee will bow. No triumph will compare with this.

David urged men to pray for the peace of Jerusalem (Psalm 122:6). In Genesis 12:3 the Lord told Abraham "...I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee..."

And so, we bless you, Israel, and wish you a happy, happy birthday. We pray for your peace, knowing that when it finally comes, it will be brought by the Prince of Peace himself. "Lift up your heads, O ye gates; and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in. Who is this King of glory? The Lord strong and mighty, the Lord mighty in battle (Psalm 24:7-8).

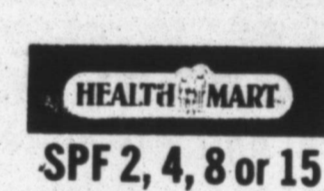

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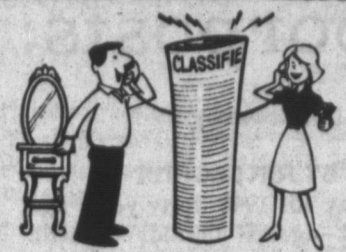

Dear Customer:
The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

1. if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
3. if the home is less than five years old, or
4. if you have soft or acidic water, or
5. if water sits in the pipes for several hours

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

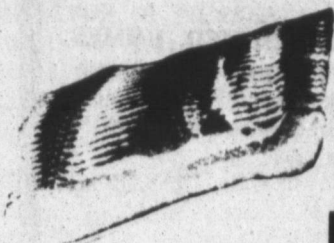

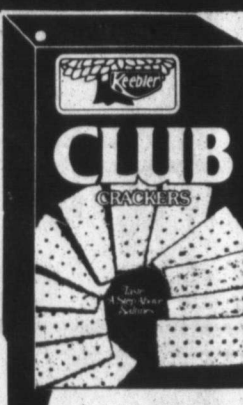
