

Myers Awarded Scholarship

Shannon K. Myers was awarded an \$8,000 four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo 4-H Scholarship recently in special ceremonies at the Texas 4-H Roundup in College Station.

Shannon, daughter of Carolyn and Johnnie Myers of Lakeview, was an active member of Donley County 4-H clubs for eight years. She served as county council chairman and district vice chairman. She was a member of the Texas 4-H Council and won first place with her Dog Care and Training demonstration at district contest. She received the Danforth "I Dare You" and Gold Star awards.

Shannon was also a leader in her high school and is named in "Who's Who Among American High School Students." She served as class vice chairman, Future Homemakers of America chairman and science club treasurer. She was also drum major for the Memphis Cyclone band.

Shannon, who plans to major in agricultural communications at Texas Tech University, was one of fifty Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Scholarship winners honored.

The 4-H scholarship recipients were chosen by members of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation. The selected students all demonstrated academic excellence and strong leadership skills throughout their high school careers.

The show also will award fifty four-year, \$8,000 scholar ships at the Texas State FFA Convention, July 11 in Lubbock. All 4-H and FFA recipients must pursue a degree in agriculture or life sciences at a Texas College or University.

The show is the world's largest donor of agricultural scholarships, with scholarship funding provided by revenues earned at the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Since awarding it's first scholarship in 1957, the show has provided more than \$21 million to more than 2,700 Texas youth pursuing an education. Additionally, the show has committed more than \$1.15 million in educational funds for the upcoming school year.

Included in this commitment are the metropolitan scholar ships to be awarded at the Million Dollar Scholarship Luncheon on June 21 in Houston; the Area Go Texans scholarships, presented at rodeo performances during the 1990 show and school art scholar ship, awarded to the recipient selected during this year's art contest.

Fire Warning Emphasized

Just one mistake and you could burn many acres of grass and/or other property and end up paying or if you are under age, your parents could end up paying for your mistake or mischief.

It is unlawful to pop fireworks inside the city limits and if you start a fire on someone else's property inside or outside the city, it is a violation of the law, plus you could be forced to pay for any damage resulting from a fire you started. Keep this in mind if you feel you must pop fireworks. With the high fire danger conditions at this time, a spark can be out of control in

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

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Claim Forms And Additional Information

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

Fireworks Can Cause **Injuries**

Sometimes the Fourth of July bombs bursting in air" are the last things a child's eye will ever see. Last year more than half of all fireworks-related eye injuries happened to children, warns the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness.

Fireworks injuries of all kinds soars 10 percent in 1988, up to a new total of 10,200. Eye injuries in particular tend to be severe. In one study, 40 percent of the reported when attempts are made to relight cases caused permanent eye damage, visual disability or destruc-

"No fireworks are safe in children's hands," said Mr. William Carpenter, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Society. "Even sparklers, which burn at temperatures of more than 1800 degrees F, can cause serious burns to the eyes and skin, and can easily ignite clothing. Sparklers along accounted for more than half of all fireworks injuries reported last

While a number of states have banned the private use of fireworks. most still permit Class C devices to be used. This category includes pieces that contain no more than 50 mg of black powder. Bottle rockets, roman candles and sparklers are common examples. Together these have caused the overwhelming majority of serious injuries to the eyes.

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness warns against the private use of fireworks. Unfortunately, the range of state laws and illicit market make fireworks readily available. If you are going to use

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

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

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Seal Abandoned Wells For Safety

Abandoned wells are a serious hazard. They drew national attention in 1987 when heroic efforts rescued little Jessica McClure who had fallen into an unsealed abandoned well in her backyard in Midland, Texas.

The greatest hazard of abandoned wells, however, isn't that they might trap children and small animals that fall into them. Such instances are rare. More commonly, these wells serve as potential routes of groundwater contamination. An old well can allow runoff water to flow directly down to an aquifer, often carrying fertilizer and chemical residues into the groundwater.

Merely capping a well is not enough to prevent it from becoming a problem. Instead, the well must be sealed or plugged to be made safe. Sealing begins by removing any pumping equipment and clear ing any

obstacles and debris that have entered the well. When obstructions have been cleared, the well can be sealed by filling it with cement from the bottom of the well to within two feet of the surface.





College Mound, a Kaufman County community so small migrate between water-bearing layers and possibly degrade high-quality Terrell. The day was, however a day when College Mound boasted a greater population than its present day nearby county seat.

The community traces its origins to the first half of the 1840's when a number of families from Tennessee, Indiana and other states settled in the vicinity. Among these families were those of John Beck and his five married daughters.

One of the first activities of the settlers was to organize a union church to serve all denominations. Over the years some groups built their own churches or merged with other, leaving the College Mound church in the hands of the Methodists. Today community member still gather there to worship in a beautiful 1897 wooden sanctuary.

The name of College Mound comes from a natural hill just north of the church, today decorated by an unpainted farmhouse. In the early days of the settlement, a visionary from the East came to the neighborhood seeking a site on which to found a "college," and he chose that prominent point. At that time "college" denoted almost any school that taught more than the most basic subjects.

The Easterner returned home to raise funds for the proposed venture, but he died without achieving his goal. Thus the school never come to College Mound, but the name stuck, and it remains today.

Peaceful though College Mound is today, it was not necessarily that way in the past. Stories still told in the town include one about an incident when the church congregation was still meeting to worship in the log cabin.

Two saloonkeepers from the nearby Elmo community sat down in the church intent on disrupting things. After the service began, the bartenders began talking back and forth, disrupting the worship. The the proceeding and asked the men cause any more trouble.

From outside the church an unidentified man appeared at the door. 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



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
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
