Extension Service Addressing County Issues

In 1986 the Donley County Extension Service, along with counties throughout Texas, initiated an important process called the Long Range Extension Program. This program involved people in the county coming together in one central place and determining the most critical issues that faced their county for the next four years. This was done in all counties in Texas.

In Donley County many of you will remember serving on the task forces that help develop critical issues for Donley County. After each task force had developed critical issues in their area, (either Agricultural and Natural Resources, 4-H and Youth Development, Community Development, or Home Economics), they met as one group and identified the eight most critical issues for the 1987-1990 Long Range Extension plan. These issues included: Agricultural Profitability, Enterprise Diversification, Water Conservation, Leadership Development, Economic Development, 4-H Curriculum, Nutrition, and Health.

The Extension agents and committees then took these issues and developed a four year Long Range Plan to address some of these issues identified.

One area of great importance to the county, since Donley County's economic base is dependent on agriculture, was Agricultural Profitability. In this area the major emphasis for the last three years has been on Range Management, Cotton Production, Cotton Insect Control, Crop and Livestock Marketing, Natural Resources, Stocker Cattle Management, Boll Weevil Monitoring, Fruit Production and 4-H Livestock Project Management. There have been approximately twenty-five educational programs (seminars, tours, field days, etc.), assisting farmers and ranchers with improving production practices and learning new practices that can be used in this area. Over 1,300 have participated in Extension programs in the last three years and there have been seven hundred and fourteen office visits and 1,920 phone calls made or received related to this area.

Demonstration work on goldaster and snakeweed control, mesquite control, soil fertility, stocker cattle, cotton variety test, wheat variety test, and sorghum variety test have been conducted in support of this area.

There is no doubt that Agricultural Profitability will continue to be important to Donley County, and will likely be on the top of the list for the next Long Range Extension Plan, which will be developed this year.

The Extension Service will again call upon many community leaders - farmers, ranchers, businessmen, teachers, housewives, etc. - to help determine critical issues for Donley County for the 1991-1994 planning period. The meeting that will be held to discuss these issues is set for March 27, 1990, at Clarendon College at 7:00 p.m. Many folks will receive invitations to participate, but anyone interested is welcome to come and participate or observe.

U.I.L. Meet Scheduled

Students from Clarendon Junior High and Elementary School will travel to Memphis on Friday, March 23, to compete in the University Interscholastic League Spring Literary Meet.

Second and third graders Lindsay Green, Tracy Hankins, Carey Thornberry, and alternate Sara Newhouse will compete in Storytelling. For this contest the youngsters will listen to a story and then tell it to a panel of judges.

Entered in Personal Writing are third and fourth graders Chandra Ford, Christina Wootten, and Nichole Wendlandt. Candi Hoggard and Walker McAnear will serve as alternates. These students will write an essay expressing their feelings or experiences on topics given them by the director of the contest. They will have two hours to complete the essay.

Melisse Campbell, Chandra Ford, Jennifer Roberts, and alternate Kasi Ashcraft have earned the right to compete in Spelling 3-4. These students will spell sixty words which are pronounced at the rate of five words per minute.

Picture Memory is a contest for fourth and fifth graders in which students identify famous paintings and correctly spell the name of the painting, the artist, and the country the artist is from. Clarendon's entries this year are Liza Tull, Margaret McNabb, Corey Knorpp, Stephanie Floyd, Melisse Campbell. Carye Adkins and Marian Seale are the alternates.

Jason Lee, Amy Thornberry, and Kathryn Ritchie hope to bring home first, second, and third place ribbons for Expressive Writing 5-6. Jana Breitling serves as alternate for the team. Expressive Writing is a contest in which student attempt to get a message across to an audience. They have two hours in which to write.

Dictionary Skills 5-6 is a new contest this year. Students will answer forty objective and short answer questions taken from the Houghton Mifflin Intermediate Dictionary. They must complete the test in twenty minutes. Fifth and sixth graders representing Clarendon are Kristy Hankins, Louis Ellerbrook, Scott Bivens, and alternate La Shawn Travis.

Amy Thornberry, Jacob Smith, Lashonda Smith, and alternate Jason Lee will compete in Spelling 5-6. They must spell 90 words which are pronounced at the rate of five words per minute.

Representing Clarendon in Oral Reading 5-6, Scott Bivens, Jason Lee, and Liza Tull will read "Seeing Things at Night," "Father Loses Weight," and "The Smack in School." Lynn Hearn serves as alternate.

Evan Williams, Josh Shields, Kathryn Ritchie, and alternate Charlie Holt have worked hard to represent Clarendon in Listening Skills 5-6. Students will take notes while listening to selections drawn from language arts, fine arts, natural sciences and social studies. They will then take a ten minute test over the selections. The test covers identifying the main idea and supporting details, drawing conclusions, distinguishing fact from opinion, and other listening skills.

Solving problems in their heads without benefit of paper, pencil, fingers, or toes is the specialty for Josh Shields, Amanda Ballard, Jacob Smith and alternate Evan Williams. These students are entered in Number Sense 5-6.

Competing for Clarendon Junior High School, Greg Collins, Beth Barbee, and Jennifer Simpson will write in the Ready Writing 7-8 contest. They will select one of two topics given them; then they have two hours in which to write an essay of an expository nature. Chad Campbell is the alternate for the team.

Richard Corder, Tim Landon, and Charlie Smith will compete in the Number Sense 7-8 contest.

Spellers Deana Nazworth, Lisa Hill, Stacy Alexander, and alternate Amy Koontz seek honors in Spelling 7-8. They will spell 120 words pronounced at the rate of six words per minute.

Stacey Alexander, Tim Landon, and Charlie Smith will compete in Calculator 7-8.

Science 7 features Beth Barbee, Jennifer Simpson, Julie Altman, and alternate Mandy Floyd. Entered in Science 8 are Darren Spier, Greg

Judging by the quality of their presentations, I believe Clarendon schools will be well represented by these students. Meeting adjourned.

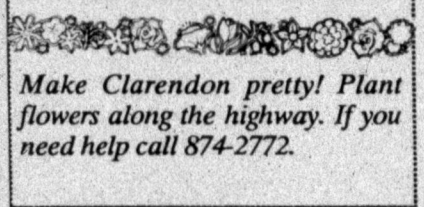
Issues Identified

Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

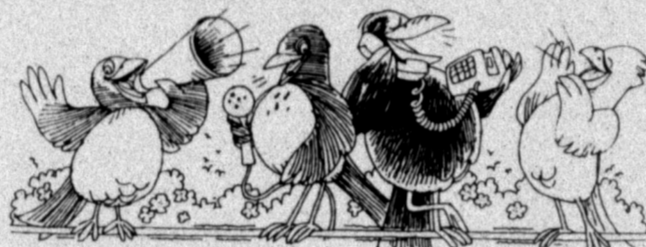
have meanings. But something very real suggested itself in that sleepy, weepy night wandering of my feeble mind.

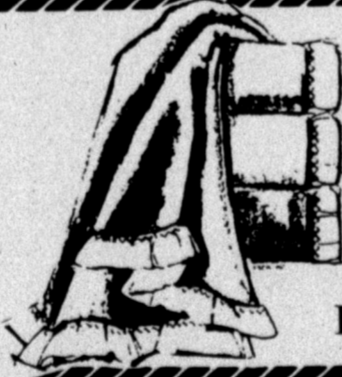

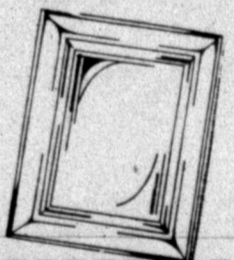

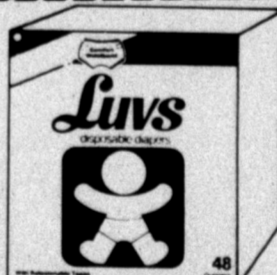

Workshop Set

A workshop on using futures and options markets to manage agricultural price risk in cotton will be held in Clarendon for area producers on April 9 - 10, 1990. The educational workshop consists of approximately 12 hours of training on the application and use of futures and options markets. Material presented will include an introduction to how futures markets operate and how to use them. The use of commodity options as price insurance will be discussed. Other topics include how to figure your local price for future prices; how to work with a broker; market prospects for cotton; and when to use different pricing strategies.

The group will work examples using futures and options to gain an understanding of how to forward price using these markets. Agricultural prices vary more today than in the past. Also, the margins between production costs and prices are very tight. Selecting an acceptable price and "locking in" can reduce price risk and enhance cash flow substantially.

For example, cotton prices have varied by over a \$100 per bale during recent marketing seasons. In most years, a profitable price can be established by skillful market analysis and pricing plans. Often, the attractive price level happens far ahead of harvest.

Pre-registration by April 2 is necessary to complete plans for the workshop. The registration fee is \$25 for the workshop; and spouses are encouraged to attend (\$25 fee covers both). Two comic strips lassoed my attention this week. One, *The Quigmans*, shows a man with his left fist in his mouth, a match held to the elbow of the same arm. The caption explains, "Bob makes a vain attempt to get high on himself."

The other, called *The Born Loser*, has a man lying on the analyst's couch. The doc gives his client the old "good news/bad news" line, then elucidates, "Your building a good sense of self-worth. Unfortunately, that indicates that you're losing touch with reality."

I like the two strips for a couple of reasons. First of all, they have lots of pictures. Beyond that, they both offer a pretty good perspective on the current craze over self-image. We all suffer from negative self-concept, and even the blissful bludgeoning of Norman Vincent Peale cannot remove the idea. Dr. Thomas Harris, in his famous book *I'm OK--You're OK* states that 100 per cent of us leave childhood with our personal sense of worth on the debit side of the ledger. Of course, he attributes this to error on our part; a false interpretation of the data.

I have never written a book on psychology, and I do not have a goatee, but I wish to propose a counter-theory. Could it be that we all feel badly about ourselves because we are all bad? If the entire race votes unanimously in favor of our own execution, shouldn't we pay some attention?

Romans 3:23 (a quote, by the way, from a book much older than Harris', and a better seller in the bargain) states simply, "All have sinned." It does not say anything about "perceptions," but states a fact. And the Bible tells us that this reality will not go away just because we chant a positive mantra, "I'm OK." It takes reality to remove reality, which brings us to the "realist" thing this world has ever known: the cross and the empty tomb of Jesus Christ.

The attempt to get high on yourself only sets fire to your soul. A good sense of self-worth often argues for a bad sense of honesty. Salvation in the name of Jesus, however, makes us right, and then teaches us to feel right.

Property Tax Renditions

Almost everyone with personal Property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of March. All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the prior year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, motorcycles, and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

January 1 of each year is the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1.

I am interested in the opinions of s area resident about what we need to do to prosper in Clarendon. I am not qualified to tell you what we need, but I want to listen. [If I were smart, I would be rich instead of tall, dark and handsome.] Call me, write or come by and share your insights with me.

The Chamber is currently working to bring in new businesses that are tourist-oriented. We want to bring money into the community from outside.

This policy is not a reflection an any business that serves only local residents, but it appears that any new service, or supplier of merchandise who will depend entirely upon people from Clarendon/Donley County to support it, is in for a struggle. We have a limited population in this area, and any new business of that type that springs up here will probably divide the sales

from some existing business in Clarendon, consequently courting the demise of both businesses. There may be one or two exceptions that I hope someone will discover and pursue.

God has placed many limitations upon me where prophesy is concerned, (or the "ability to read between the lines" to quote Bill Stavenhagen) but it seems to me--and to many area people--that we would all be better off if we looked for manufacturers or processors who could work and provide jobs here in Donley County while selling to a much wider market. Using this criterion, it seems that the possibilities are limited to selling to tourists or selling by mail order or to manufacture or process here and ship to distributors or retailers outside Donley County.

Parts of each dollar that comes into Donley County will be handled by 7 people before its influence on our economy disappears. Please let your Chamber know how you feel.

I have talked to some people who explained what happened to the bra factory and the sheet factory that located in our area a few years ago. According to them the big factories had trouble getting enough employees in Memphis, or Sharmrock and were having trouble finding enough qualified people to meet their production quota and maintain a good quality control. Consequently, the big factory lost its contract and closed. The loss of that big payroll threw the local economy into convulsions. For this reason, some believe that if we are to have a stable economy with steady growth, we need to have 10 to 20 small businesses that employ 5 to 8 people instead of one factory that employs 50 to 150 people.

If you would like to establish a business in Clarendon, we at the Chamber would like visit with you, to listen to your views and help you find the help that you need to get started. Your plans will be held in strict confidence.

Or better still give them a subscription to The Clarendon News. The Chamber plans to print information in the paper on a regular basis, and the letter to the editor may also be of interest to them.

Notice is hereby given that LIGHTHOUSE ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (The "Utility") intends to reduce the agricultural processing rate available to cotton gins, grain elevators, and other seasonal agricultural processing services. Gout: Diet Not The Answer

The condition we commonly refer to as "gout" results from the excessive accumulation of uric acid, one of the end-products of metabolism. When the body does not properly process uric acid, crystals of the acid called sodium urate deposit in and around the joints. An acute attack of gout results when these crystals irritate and inflame one or more joints. The big toe is one of the first joints affected.

Early writings refer to gout as the "disease of kings," because it was incorrectly believed to be caused by a rich diet. Actually diet has little to do with either the cause or the treatment of this condition. For the most part, gout is controlled with medicines that lower uric acid levels.

During the acute phase of gout, medicines are often prescribed to reduce inflammation and relieve pain. Three medicines commonly used for this purpose include colchicine, indomethacin, and phenylbutazone. All three can cause stomach upset.

During the chronic phase, the emphasis of therapy is on lowering uric acid and sodium urate levels. This is achieved with such medicines as allopurinol and probenecid. Colchicine also may be used during the chronic phase.

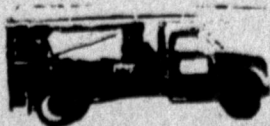
