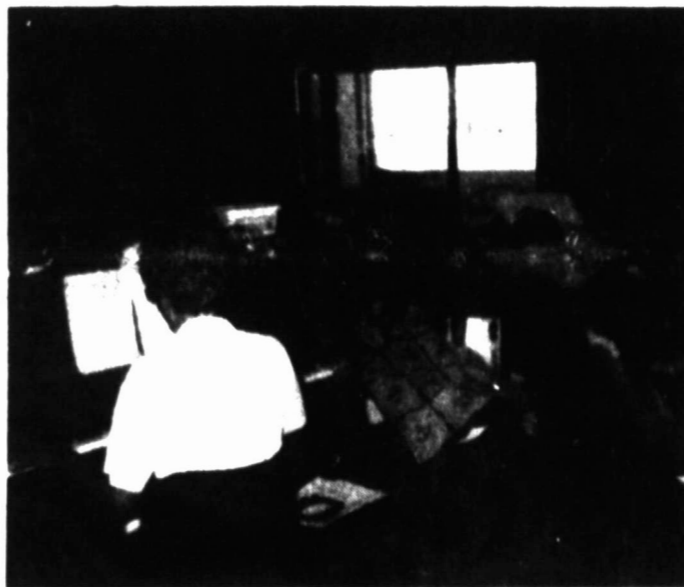

## Leadership Awards Given

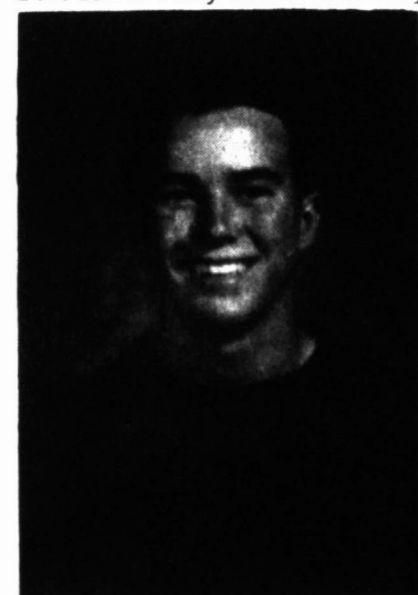
Chad Campbell and Greg Collins have been awarded the national *I Dare You Leadership Award* in recognition of personal integrity, balanced living, and potential for leadership. This honor is to be presented by Mr. Kelsey, principal, in April.

The *I Dare You Leadership Award* is made available each year by the American Youth Foundation in cooperation with Principals, Headmasters, and 4-H County Agents across the country. The award was first offered in 1941 by William H. Danforth, founder of the Ralston Purina Co. in St. Louis, who dared young people to achieve their highest potential and to influence others through lives of service. The award takes its name from the book, *I Dare You* written by Mr. Danforth, in which he commends the balanced life of mental, physical, social and spiritual development as the backbone of leadership.

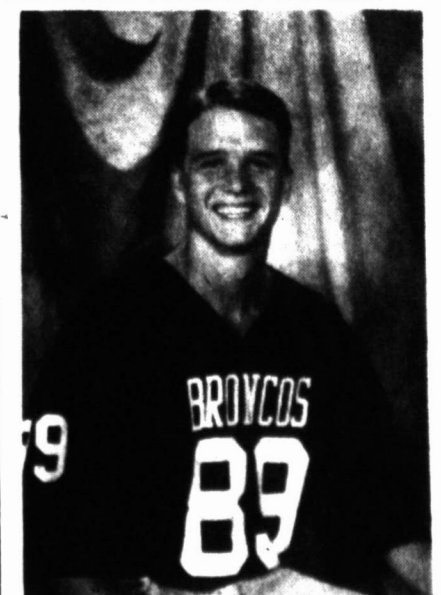
In addition to a Certificate of Recognition, Campbell and Collins receives a copy of Mr. Danforth's inspirational book, *I Dare You*, and a scholarship opportunity to attend the American Youth Foundation's National Leadership Conference at Camp Miniwanca in Michigan or Camp Merrowista in New Hampshire. Over 8000 schools and 4-H programs participate in the *I Dare You Leadership Award* each year.

In 1924, Mr. Danforth helped establish the American Youth Foundation, a non-sectarian, not-for-profit organization committed to the service of youth through summer camps and leadership conferences.

**Minutes of the March 11, 1993 Meeting**

The Board of Trustees of Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District met in regular session on March 11, 1993 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration building. Members present were President Todd Knorpp, Vice-President Johnny Floyd, Secretary Fred Clifford, Phil Fletcher, Wayne Hardin, Derlene Graham, and Lynne Williams. None were absent. School officials present were Mike Word, Junior High and Elementary Principal, Solomon Kepley, High School Principal. Others present were Tom Jarboe, Donna White, Regina Wooten, Mac Devin and Earl Hartman. Minutes of the February 11 meeting were read. Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Lynne Williams to approve the minutes with a correction that Mr. Solomon Kepley, High School Principal and Michael A. Word, Junior High Principal receive and additional \$2,500 per year salary, and not as previously stated, \$2,500 per year compensation. Passed 6-0.

The financial statement for the month of February, 1993 was approved by board action, 6-0.

Bills incurred by the Clarendon Public School and the Business Office plus addendum were presented. Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Wayne Hardin that bills be allowed and ordered paid, 6-0.

Presentation by Tom Jarboe, [Texas Association of School Boards], discussed progress made in selection of school Superintendent and also the requirements and future responsibilities of board members in the near future, reminding the board that March 19, 1993 is the deadline for application.

Lynne Williams requested status of Mrs. Aleta Thompson's and Mrs. Paulette Kidds' situations. No progress as Mrs. Thompson's case not as yet ratified by Commissioner of Education so no answer can be arrived at as yet. Mrs. Kidds situation will be discussed at later time.

Motion by Lynne Williams, seconded by Johnny Floyd to approve the Special Programs bulletin (EHBD Local) as presented. It concerns tutorial, remedial, and compensatory--presented by Mr. Word. Passed 6-0. CISD Board members cast secret ballots for E.S.C. Board members. Motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Phil Fletcher to approve local textbooks as presented for local adoption by the local textbook committee. Passed 6-0.

Motion by Johnny Floyd, seconded by Fred Clifford to settle the election date as May 1, 1993 for two positions, to appoint Willard Skelton as election judge, to appoint Cula Jo Trout and Mary White as absentee election clerks. Passed 6-0.

Open forum. Very brief. Delayed approving calendar for the 1993-1994 school year at the request of school administration.

Break taken. Board meeting re-opened and President Knorpp read required statement and then declared board was going into executive session and asked all visitors leave board room at that time, 8:25 p.m. (3/11/93).

11: Back into regular session from executive session. Motion by Fred Clifford, seconded by Wayne Hardin to renew the teaching contracts of Elementary and Junior High School Teachers as listed in teacher recommendation for 1993-94 school year. Passed, 6-0.

Motion by Derlene Graham, seconded by Phil Fletcher to renew the contracts of support personnel with each to receive 10 1/2 month contract for 1993-94 school year. Passed 6-0.

Motion by Johnny Floyd, seconded by Phil Fletcher, to table contracts to all extra curricular personnel, as listed, until a special meeting to be called for March 16, 1993 at 7:30 p.m. Passed 6-0.

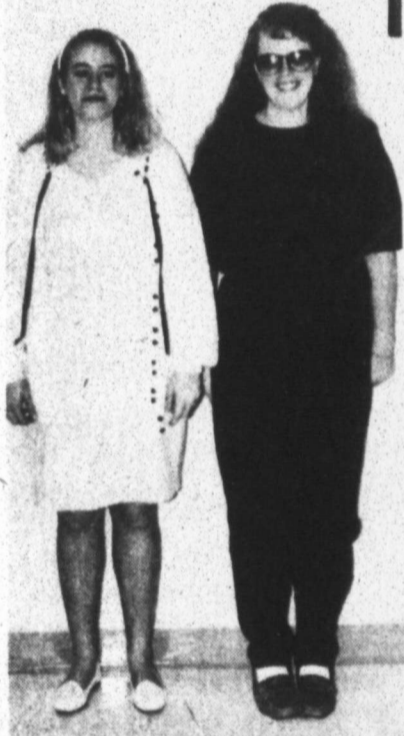

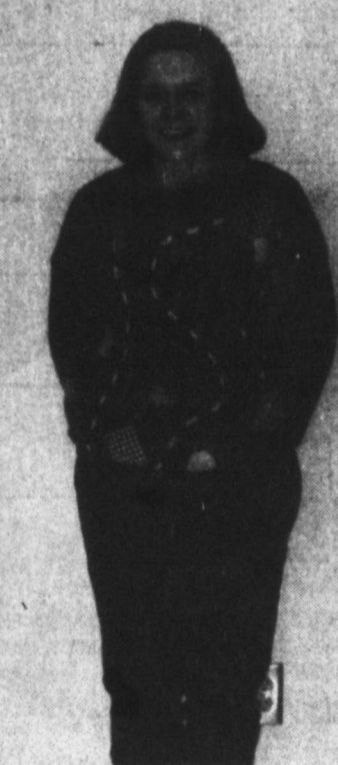

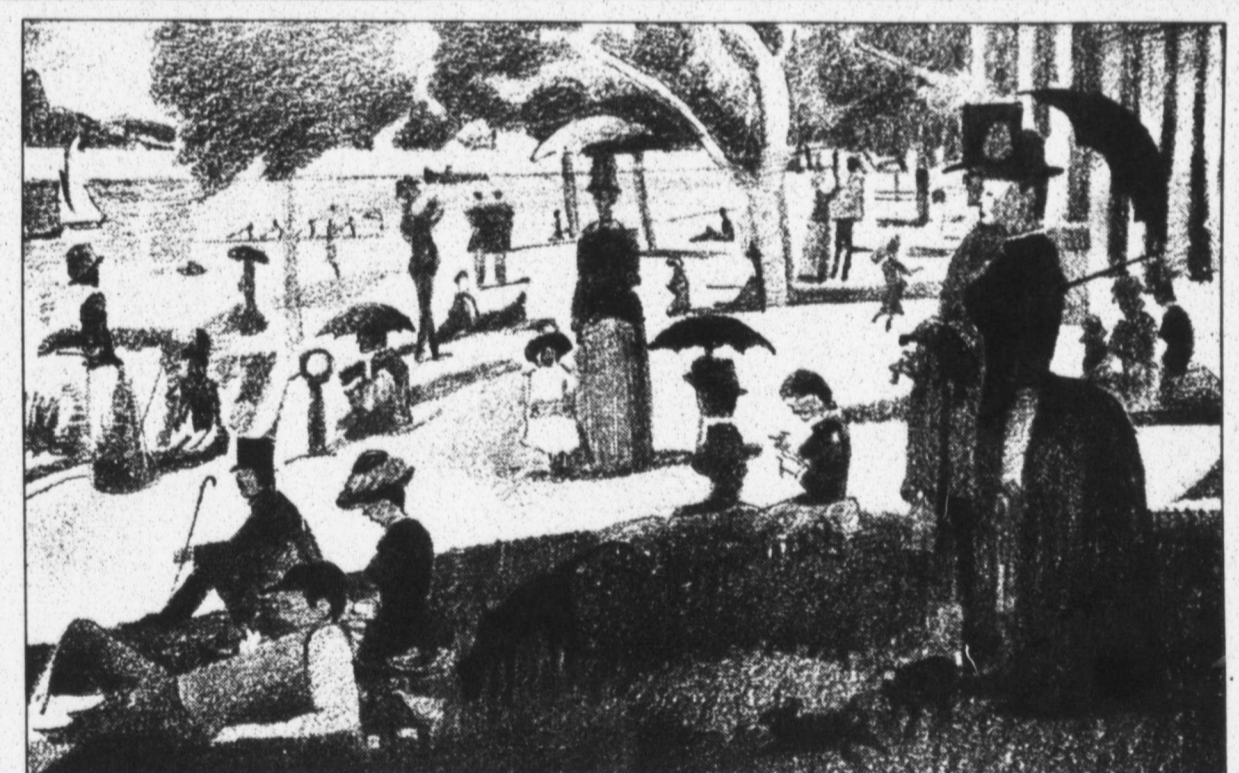

We have all heard the phrase lately, "practice random acts of kindness." I have been fortunate to be on the receiving end of this thought by an individual in your town. I would like to publicly thank Mr. Cal Thomas and his wife for what they did for me.

Last evening a friend and I took my husbands duly pickup to a large store in Amarillo to have four new tires put on the back of the truck. As I was leaving the parking lot, Mr. Thomas was entering. He very quickly flagged me down to tell me the tires were about to come off the back of the truck. I had only driven the truck from the side of the garage, a few yards to the exit. Therefore, I had not driven far enough to realize the problem. I returned the truck to the garage, visited with the manager concerning the problem, and was assured it had been corrected. I circled the building once more to exit. Mr. Thomas was waiting in his wrecker in front while his wife shopped. As I stopped to thank him for his help and explain that the tires had just been put on the truck minutes before his warning, he asked if I would mind if he checked them himself. As he stood behind the truck and watched it drive forward, he explained the problem had not been corrected as I thought and they were indeed about to come off the truck again. Upon further examination with the light from this truck, lug nuts began to fall off in his hand. Mr. Thomas then told me to go get the manager and bring him to the parking lot so he could explain the problem. He discussed the situation with the manager, reattached the lug nuts with the hydraulic gun from his truck, and again had me drive the truck forward to check the tires. Again, the problem still existed. At this point Mr. Thomas said he was not giving up until the problem was fixed and that meant he was removing all 4 rear tires for further examination. In front of the store, in the cold dark parking lot, Mr. Thomas jacked up the truck and began removing all the tires while his wife held a light for him to see by. Upon doing this, he discovered the rear duty tires had been switched. The inside tire was on the outside and the outside tire was on the inside. This had not allowed proper alignment of the pilot, therefore the tires would never have fit securely and properly. The store had remounted the tires incorrectly. An hour and twenty minutes later, Mr. Thomas finished the job that the store had done incorrectly. Mr. Thomas would not accept payment from me. 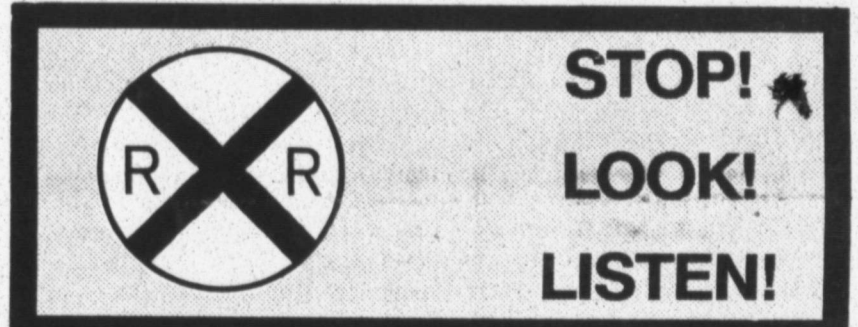

"In the latter part of his life, he was sure he was bound for Hollywood!" the younger man laughed. "And it was all due to his being in the logo for Yesterday's Children."

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

### Dribblers Play

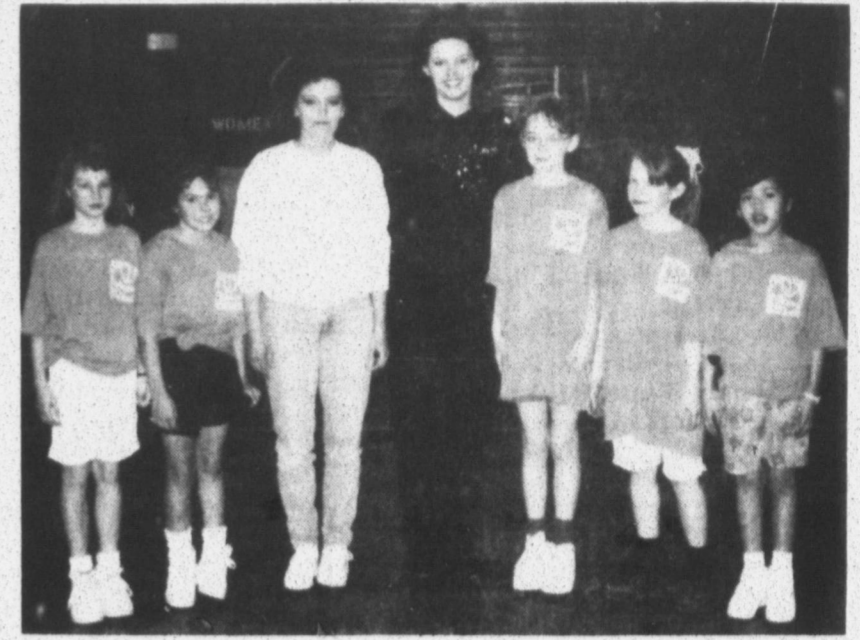

This concert is in conjunction with the PTA Open House. There is no charge for admission.

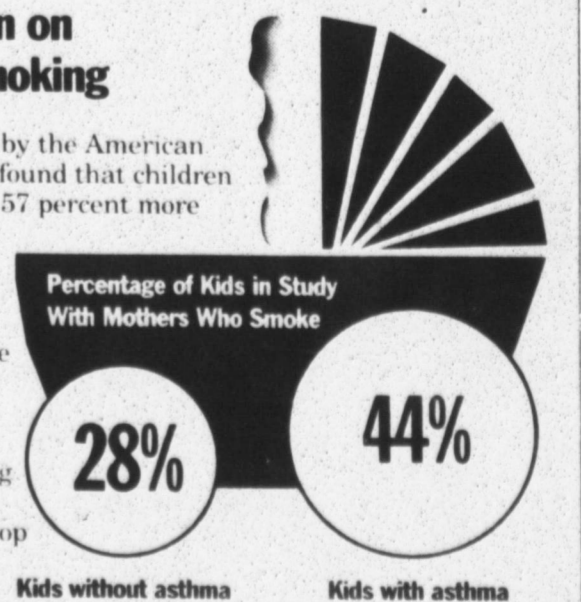

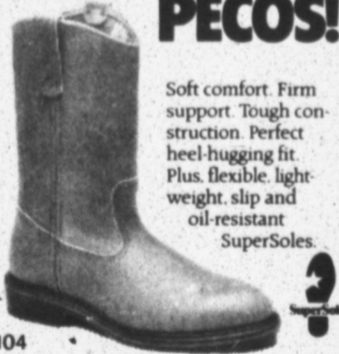
