Thompson Ranch Takes Crown


The Thompson Ranch, with headquarters in Knox County, Texas claimed its second ranch rodeo championship at the final performance of the 1993 Cowboy Roundup, USA, Ranch Rodeo, held in Amarillo, Texas, May 21-22.

With standing room only capacity crowd at the new outdoor rodeo arena located at the Tri-State Fairgrounds in Amarillo, the rodeo saw 14 ranches complete in six events which were chosen to depict actual ranch working conditions. Thompson Ranch successfully defended its 1992 Championship performance, becoming the only ranch in the history of the event to win back-to-back championships.

Puckett Principal To Say Goodby

When Bill Hill retires this spring after 33 years with the Amarillo Independent School District, secretaries at Puckett Elementary School will have to change the stationery for the first time in the school's 16-year existence.

Principal Hill was there to greet Puckett's opening-day students and staff in 1977.

"But I'll tell you what was thrilling," Hill recalled. "Three years ago having the opportunity to hire one of my former pupils at Puckett who came back as a teacher."

Louessa Hinnant, now Louessa Stroppe, is a Puckett third-grader

instructor. As a student, she, too, was on hand the day the school opened.

Hill agrees the school, a few blocks west of Amarillo High School, still looks new.

"The kids have worked hard to keep it really nice. They're really proud of their building." Hill said.

Pride in education as a profession led Hill to teaching.
"I went into teaching because I wanted to help children - to make a difference in their lives. I have wonderful memories both as a teacher and

administrator.

"Getting to watch our young people grow up, become responsible citizens and contribute to our community - that's satisfying to me," he said.

"I've thoroughly enjoyed working with the students, teachers, staff and parents. At Puckett, everybody focuses on one thing: the students - socially, academically, emotionally and any other needs a child has to help

develop into that All-American type we all want our kids to be."

Hill counts a high percentage of former students who have gone on to colleges and universities. Graduates include many local community leaders and professionals.

The Memphis-born, Clarendon-reared Hill graduated from Clarendon High School and attended Clarendon Junior College, then Howard Payne University at Brownwood, Amarillo Junior College and West Texas State University. His WT diplomas on the wall attest to degrees in English, physical education, education, sociology and government.

Hill's career with the AISD led from teaching communication arts and PE at Avondale Elementary for two years, to seven years "teaching everything" at Western Plateau Elementary, to three years as principal at Wilson and three years as principal at Mirabeau B. Lamar Elementary before transferring to

Comptroller Releases Figures

The State Comptroller of Public Accounts has released the sales tax figures for the Fourth Quarter of 1992. Donley County retail trade was up by 1.6 per cent over the comparable period in 1991, but was off by -0.6 per cent in industrial sales.

Figures for the state as a whole were +9.6 per cent for retail and +4.5 per cent for industrial sales.

Urban areas seem to have done better than rural ones, but there were numerous exceptions to such a generalization.

West Texas Counties generally did not fare as well as those in the politically potent eastern half of the state.

Area counties appear typical of West Texas as a whole.

In retail sales, six area counties showed increases, while six showed decreased. However, the industrial report was far less favorable. Two area counties increased their industrial sales; 10 counties slid to lower levels than the year before.

Retail Sales

Armstorng County (Claude) was off, with a -16.2 per cent. Briscoe county was down, -15.3 per cent. Carson plunged, -70.0 per cent. Childress climbed 8.9 per cent, while Collingsworth County edged up 3.2 per cent. Gray County skyrocketed 237.1 per cent, while Hall County sank -9.6 per cent. Motley County retail sales sank - 28.5 per cent. Retail sales in Wheeler swelled slightly at 1.6 per cent.

The Amarillo area reported dramatically divergent directions. Potter County was up 8.4 per cent, while retail sales in Randall dived -44.9 per

Industrial sales

Industrial sales bring money into a county from outside. In such sales, Armstrong was off -3.4 per cent, Briscoe declined -2.7 per cent, Carson dropped -57.2 per cent and Childress slipped-7.8 per cent.

Collingsworth bucked the trend with a slight increase of 2.2 per cent. Gray County shot up 112.6 per cent.

Hall County burrowed down
-14.5 per cent, while industrial sales
in Motley were off by -13.6 per cent.
Wheeler settled by -2.2 per cent.

The Amarillo area did not fare well. Both Potter and Randall County were down, -0.7 per cent and -25.5 per cent, respectively.

A traveling trophy was awarded to Thompson Ranch by Bill Cornett, President of the Outfit, Inc, in closing ceremonies Saturday night. Trophy saddles and Bronze sculptures were awarded to each member of the winning

Cowboy Roundup, USA, which included the ranch rodeo, is hosted annually by The Outfit, Inc., with generous corporate sponsor support from Coors Brewing Company, Great Western Distributing





by Jim Talbot Medicare Limits on Physician

If you're on Medicare, here's a story that could happen to you. You're visiting your son in another state and become ill. You call your son's doctor and discover that she doesn't accept assignment on Medicare claims. What does this mean and what can you do? Should you reach for a doctor who accepts assignment on Medicare claims?

Not necessarily.
When physicians accept assignment on all or some of their Medicare claims, they agree to charge no more than the amount Medicare approves for each service they offer. Since Medicare will pay 80 percent of the approved charge, this means you be responsible for paying only 20 percent of the approved charge. Physicians who don't accept assignment can charge more than the Medicareapproved amount, but because of a new law, they are limited in the extra amount they can charge you. This year, the most they can charge for Medicare covered services is 115 percent of the Medicare approved amount. For example, if the Medicare fee schedule amount for treatment by physician who don't accept assignment in the local area is \$100, the physician who treats

The U.S. Government created the Small Business Innovation Research Program to stimulate innovation and provide opportunities for small businesses to compete for federal research and development dollars. The SBIR program is extremely competitive and is one of the few hard-dollar sources of funding for research. The most successful program participants have been those who make the SBIR program part of their overall business strategy.

SBIR Program awards are given to diverse technologies including: manufacturing process control, aquaculture, avionics, navigation, education for the handicapped, solar energy, optical computing, bioremediation, advanced composite materials, space propulsion systems, parallel processing software, environmental monitoring, medical devices, and many more.

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


