## Comptroller Releases Figures

The State Comptroller of Public Accounts has released the sales tax figures for the Fourth Quarter of 1992. Donley County retail trade was up by 1.6 per cent over the comparable period in 1991, but was off by -0.6 per cent in industrial sales.

Figures for the state as a whole were +9.6 per cent for retail and +4.5 per cent for industrial sales.

Urban areas seem to have done better than rural ones, but there were numerous exceptions to such a generalization.

West Texas Counties generally did not fare as well as those in the politically potent eastern half of the state.

Area counties appear typical of West Texas as a whole.

In retail sales, six area counties showed increases, while six showed decreased. However, the industrial report was far less favorable. Two area counties increased their industrial sales; 10 counties slid to lower levels than the year before.

### Retail Sales

Armstrong County (Claude) was off, with a -16.2 per cent. Briscoe county was down, -15.3 per cent. Carson plunged, -70.0 per cent. Childress climbed 8.9 per cent, while Collingsworth County edged up 3.2 per cent. Gray County skyrocketed 237.1 per cent, while Hall County sank -9.6 per cent. Motley County retail sales sank -28.5 per cent. Retail sales in Wheeler swelled slightly at 1.6 per cent.

The Amarillo area reported dramatically divergent directions. Potter County was up 8.4 per cent, while retail sales in Randall dived -44.9 per cent.

### Industrial sales

Industrial sales bring money into a county from outside. In such sales, Armstrong was off -3.4 per cent, Briscoe declined -2.7 per cent, Carson dropped -57.2 per cent and Childress slipped -7.8 per cent.

Collingsworth bucked the trend with a slight increase of 2.2 per cent. Gray County shot up 112.6 per cent.

Hall County burrowed down -14.5 per cent, while industrial sales in Motley were off by -13.6 per cent. Wheeler settled by -2.2 per cent.

The Amarillo area did not fare well. Both Potter and Randall County were down, -0.7 per cent and -25.5 per cent, respectively.

## Puckett Principal To Say Goodby

When Bill Hill retires this spring after 33 years with the Amarillo Independent School District, secretaries at Puckett Elementary School will have to change the stationery for the first time in the school's 16-year existence.

Principal Hill was there to greet Puckett's opening-day students and staff in 1977.

"But I'll tell you what was thrilling," Hill recalled. "Three years ago having the opportunity to hire one of my former pupils at Puckett who came back as a teacher."

Louessa Hinnant, now Louessa Stroppe, is a Puckett third-grader instructor. As a student, she, too, was on hand the day the school opened. Hill agrees the school, a few blocks west of Amarillo High School, still looks new.

"The kids have worked hard to keep it really nice. They're really proud of their building," Hill said.

Pride in education as a profession led Hill to teaching.

"I went into teaching because I wanted to help children - to make a difference in their lives. I have wonderful memories both as a teacher and administrator.

"Getting to watch our young people grow up, become responsible citizens and contribute to our community - that's satisfying to me," he said.

"I've thoroughly enjoyed working with the students, teachers, staff and parents. At Puckett, everybody focuses on one thing: the students - socially, academically, emotionally and any other needs a child has to help develop into that All-American type we all want our kids to be."

Hill counts a high percentage of former students who have gone on to colleges and universities. Graduates include many local community leaders and professionals.

The Memphis-born, Clarendon-reared Hill graduated from Clarendon High School and attended Clarendon Junior College, then Howard Payne University at Brownwood, Amarillo Junior College and West Texas State University. His WT diplomas on the wall attest to degrees in English, physical education, education, sociology and government.

Hill's career with the AISD led from teaching communication arts and PE at Avondale Elementary for two years, to seven years "teaching everything" at Western Plateau Elementary, to three years as principal at Will Rogers Elementary, two years as principal at Wilson and three years as principal at Mirabeau B. Lamar Elementary before transferring to Puckett.

Team captain, Larry Thompson of Munday, Texas brought an eight member team which consisted of himself; his three sons, Todd, Trey and Tyler; Brand Cude; Fred Henry; Jay Hart and Martin Poindexter. Together they racked up enough total points to win the team championship.

A traveling trophy was awarded to Thompson Ranch by Bill Cornett, President of the Outfit, Inc. in closing ceremonies Saturday night. Trophy saddles and Bronze sculptures were awarded to each member of the winning team.

Cowboy Roundup, USA, which included the ranch rodeo, is hosted annually by The Outfit, Inc., with generous corporate sponsor support from Coors Brewing Company, Great Western Distributing

Company, American Tobacco Co., Tony Lama Boot Company, Lusky's Western Stores, Amarillo Chamber of Commerce and Fifth Seasons Inn of Amarillo. Queen Stapleton and Al Cunningham served as co-chairman of the Rodeo Committee for the Outfit. Stapleton was instrumental in the expansion of the number and type of events, and in moving the event to the new facilities.

Fourteen ranches competed for the championship. Historic ranches tracing their origins to Spanish Land Grants, early day cattle barons and 19th century land syndicates were represented. The fourteen ranches combined control over 5 million acres of ranch land in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Cowboy Roundup, USA took place over two full days, and included sheep dog trials, a chuckwagon cook-off, cowboy poetry, ranch team roping, trade show, Craig Cameron horse breaking demonstration, ranch horse auction, cowboy crafts & collectibles, washer pitching and a rodeo show and dance with Ricky and the Red Streaks, a nationally known show band that headlines each year at Las Vegas, Nevada during the National Finals Rodeo and the Frontier Days Rodeo at Cheyenne, Wyoming. Ed Montana with the Coors Cowboy Band entertained at each of the rodeo performances.

Other winners in the ranch rodeo were: Second Place Ranch, Four Way Cattle Company of Oldham County, Texas. Third Place Ranch, Hitch Ranch of the Oklahoma Panhandle. Among Hill's proudest moments at Puckett are accepting two prestigious awards with his staff: the 1990 Exemplary Performance Award for placing among the top 5 percent of schools in Texas academically; and the 1992 Governor's Council on Excellence Award for performance and effort, which included a cash stipend of \$72,224 for school equipment and improvements.

With his wife of 37 years, Mary, he will leave for a new home at Canyon Lake, 12 miles from New Braunfels, this summer.

Mary will retire after 30 years in education, the last seven as dean of student services at WT.

The Hills have two grown children: Trent, director of development at Stephen F. Austin State University at Nacogdoches, will accept his doctorate in August from North Texas State University; Phyllis Redus teaches in the Canyon Independent School District at Valleyview Junior High School.

The Hills intend to apply their 60-plus years of educational experience to both private and university consulting.

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### Minding Your Own Business

**The Free Lunch Myth**  
One of the first things I learned when I entered the business world was: Never pass up a free lunch. Years later, I learned one of life's greatest lessons: There are no free lunches.

In business, education, government or personal matters, there are no free rides and no free meals. The promise of something for nothing, with rare charitable exceptions, is a false promise.

Right now, politicians are propagating a subtle, but vicious myth in Washington and in some state capitols around the country. The myth is that when our government gets involved in providing services to deserving citizens, the services are free.

Recently, while standing in line at the grocery store, I overheard two local folks discussing the national healthcare issue. Both were employed, but apparently their employers were unable to provide healthcare coverage to their families.

The first stated that he would be glad when the new administration started providing free medical benefits. The second person agreed immediately and stated that her family had no coverage because they simply provided could not afford it. Both expressed the opinion that the federal government should provide basic healthcare coverage for them.

Someone pays  
Unfortunately, there is a wide-spread misunderstanding of how government programs really work. Before we go on, let me remind you there are no free lunches.

Please allow me to review Free Enterprise Economic 101. First, government revenues come from taxes. Some of these taxes are highly visible to every employed American. The federal income taxes and FICA or self employment taxes we see stripped out of every paycheck are visible examples.

Other taxes are nearly hidden. For example, we seldom think about the thirty four cents per gallon gasoline tax as we fill up our tanks. We are usually not aware of value added manufacturing taxes, corporate income taxes and other subtle little tariffs that are levied by the federal government.

Where do these taxes come from? Ultimately, all taxes come from "we the people" or more accurately "we the employed people." The root source is profitable business. All government-revenue comes from profitable business and their employees.

### Social Security News

Medicare Limits on Physician Charges

If you're on Medicare, here's a story that could happen to you. You're visiting your son in another state and become ill. You call your son's doctor and discover that she doesn't accept assignment on Medicare claims. What does this mean and what can you do? Should you reach for a doctor who accepts assignment on Medicare claims? Not necessarily.

When physicians accept assignment on all or some of their Medicare claims, they agree to charge no more than the amount Medicare approves for each service they offer. Since Medicare will pay 80 percent of the approved charge, this means you be responsible for paying only 20 percent of the approved charge. Physicians who don't accept assignment can charge more than the Medicare-approved amount, but because of a new law, they are limited in the extra amount they can charge you. This year, the most they can charge for Medicare covered services is 115 percent of the Medicare approved amount. For example, if the Medicare fee schedule amount for treatment by physician who don't accept assignment in the local area is \$100, the physician who treats

you cannot charge you more than \$115. When you get your Medicare statement it gives the Medicare approved amount for each service.

If you live in Connecticut, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, or New York, your state has laws that could further reduce your costs. In certain cases, such as for participants in the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program, physicians must accept assignment for covered services provided to beneficiaries who qualify for QMB.

If you have a Physician who doesn't accept assignment on Medicare claims and he or she has exceeded the charge limit for services you've received since January 1, 1991, contact the doctor and ask for a reduction charge or a refund. If you cannot resolve the issue with the doctor, contact your local Medicare carrier to ask for help.

Because competition is so stiff, several workshops are being held around the state to help small businesses compete in the SBIR program. The first seminar, titled "A Practical Guide to SBIR Awards and How You Can Win Them," will be held in Houston May 6. The second seminar will be in Lubbock May 18. Both seminars are co-sponsored by local Small Business Development Centers.

The SBIR program develops innovations in three phases. Phase I provides funding up to \$100,000 for preliminary research. This phase focuses on establishing the scientific merit and feasibility of an idea. Phase II is the research and development effort of the SBIR and can offer funding up to \$750,000. Only Phase I award winners can advance to Phase II. Phase III helps the businesses pursue private capital to develop the research into a commercial product.

SBIR Program awards are given to diverse technologies including: manufacturing process control, aquaculture, avionics, navigation, education for the handicapped, solar energy, optical computing, bioremediation, advanced composite materials, space propulsion systems, parallel processing software, environmental monitoring, medical devices, and many more.

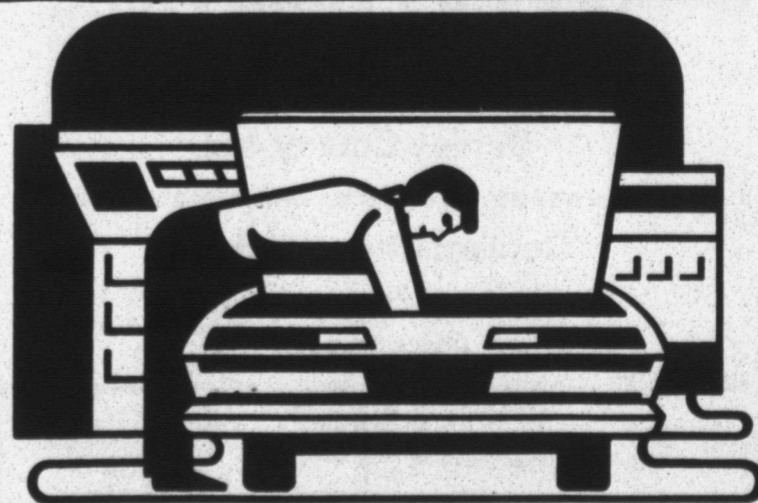

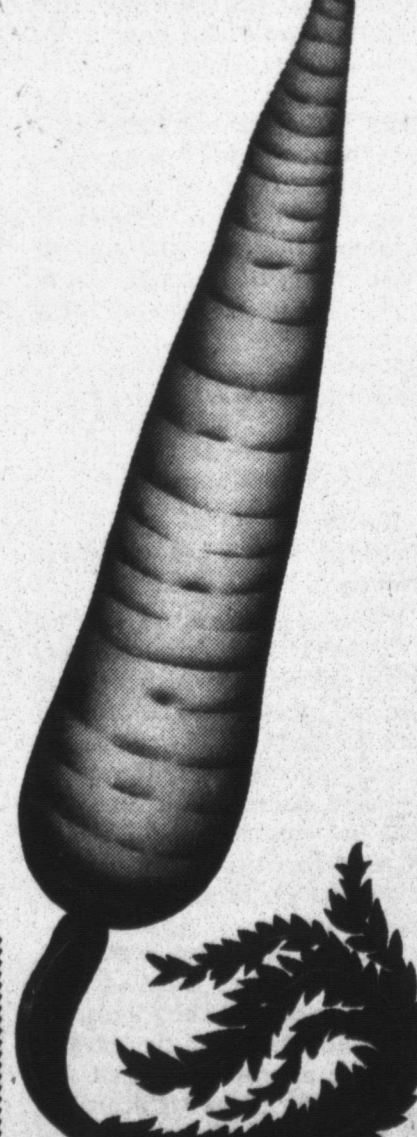

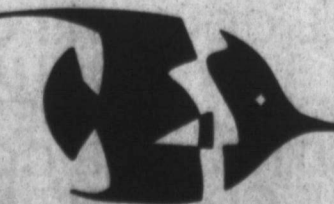
