Receipts Warn of Economic Problems

Clarendon's sales tax receipts for October dropped by 42.60%. That pulls down the payments for 1989-to-date down by .84%. This is grim economic news for the city, but many area merchants expect even worse news for the final quarter of 1989. A poor cotton crop has hurt all sectors of the economy.

In Donley County, only Howardwick was an economic bright spot. Howardwick's sales were up 311% over the previous October and up 31.65% over the year-to-date. Hedley was off by 8.97%.

Other area towns should mixed results. Armstrong County (Claude) showed a gain of 1.29% for the month and a loss of .81% for year-to-date. Briscoe (Quitaque, Silvertown) was off 14.16% for the month and 11.53% for the longer period. Carson County showed a 26% improvement for the month and a 13.99% improvement for the first part of the year. Childress was up by 2.99% and 5.38%. Collingworth County was up 19.75% and 3.90%. Dickens was up 35.22% for the month, but was down by 42.86 for the longer haul. Gray county (Pampa and McLean) was up 19.84% and 5.15%. Potter County was up 12.11% and 3.91%. Randall was up 1.39 and 5.40%. Wheeler County was off 15.20% and 1.39%.

Obviously Clarendon cannot afford economic complacency at this time. While the town was spared some of the trauma that some area towns have undergone, it is not immune to economic problems. Unless the citizens and business of the community cooperate and work hard at economic development, the situation will not improve. Clarendon will continue to lose businesses. And investments—especially real estate investments—will continue to lose value.

But Donley County has the potential to grow. Many communities with far fewer assets than this one have shown that growth in rural communities is possible. Such growth will take hard work and organization, but it is possible.

Few other areas have as much unrealized potential for tourism. There is a tremendous potential for businesses that market their products widely across the state or nation, as demonstrated by Prairie Cottage Candy Company. But development will not "just happen". Ghost towns "just happen". If Donley County continues to thrive, it will be the result of people who care enough to do something.

Dept. of Public Safety Reports on Holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimated a very low number of people to die on Texas highways in 1989, New Year's Holiday. Only 32 persons lost their lives in that 78 hours of Operation Life Save in 1989! This is the direct result of positive safe thinking, conservative driving and closer observance of the traffic laws.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the 60 counties in Region 5, said, "People are becoming more sensible and sensitive about the drinking-driving problem in Texas. Safety belt usage is up and traffic death rates are lower than they were in 1987. If this trend continues, we may see the lowest count of traffic deaths since the record high of 1981."

The continued use of all safety belts in Texas vehicles will help preserve more lives. The National Safety Council states that a person has a five to one chance of surviving in a bad traffic accident while belted in their vehicle. With judi-

icious and reasonable use of alcohol, the National Safety Council foresees a reduction in alcohol related traffic deaths.

Major Cawthon said, "The way to make this year's estimates smaller than expected is to select on sober driver per motor vehicle attending each New Year's party, hold the speed within the posted limit and insist that all persons wear safety belts when the vehicle is in motion."

While the New Year Holiday period is in effect, there will be additional Highway Patrol troopers on duty to assist stranded motorists and enforce traffic laws, so you may have a safer and happier New Year in 1990.

Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rainfall and flooding, high winds and hail, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in 321 South Sully, Clarendon, FmHA County Supervisor Debra Sanderson said today.

Donley and Armstrong counties are two of thirty-one in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive rainfall and flooding, high winds and hail, April 29 through May 17, and May 29 through June 15, 1989.

Sanderson said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Sanderson said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 17, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season, Sanderson said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It

Livestock Show To Be Held

The Donley County Junior Livestock Show is set for January 13, 1990. Of course, this is less than a month away and 4-H and FFA members are working very hard for preparation of the show.

Youths from ages 6 to 18 in 4-H and FFA are feeding, training and caring for steers, lambs, pigs and turkeys for the Donley County Show, as well as major shows in Ft. Worth, San Antonio and Houston. These youngsters have been managing some of these projects a month, while others have been for approximately seven months. Livestock projects are a major responsibility for 4-H and FFA

members, giving them an opportunity to learn about proper nutrition, health and management of their animal(s). Child Support Delinquents to be Reported to Credit Agencies

AUSTIN--Attorney General Jim Mattox announced that beginning today (December 18, 1989) his Child Support Enforcement Division is reporting non-custodial parents who owe past due child support to consumer credit reporting agencies.

"Past-due child support is as much of a debt as a past-due car payment," said Mattox. "People who fail to pay child support will now run the same risk of having their credit rating lowered as they would if they fail to make a car payment."

The Attorney General's Child Support Enforcement Division will automatically report on a monthly basis the names of non-custodial parents who have been located and who owe more than \$500 in past-due child support. The monthly report contains the amount of arrearages owed by each individual and a list of new non-custodial parents who have become delinquent.

The delinquency will remain on the person's credit record for at least seven years, beginning when the case is initially submitted.

Mattox said that reporting these names will give the Texas child support program another creative and innovative enforcement tool.

"If you have bad credit because you don't pay child support, it will be very difficult to buy a car, a house or any other big ticket item that you need credit for," said Mattox.

Mattox said that creditors should evaluate a non-custodial parent's child support delinquency before granting credit. They should know that child support is an automatic judgment; is renewable from month to month; and is not satisfied until the order expires, which usually occurs when the child turns 18. It takes precedence over other debts.

The CSDE notifies delinquent parents before their names are submitted and gives them a chance to pay their past-due amount. If the parent believes that the past-due amount is incorrect, he or she can request an administrative hearing to resolve the dispute.

"We'll take every precaution to ensure that non-custodial parent's due process rights are protected," Mattox said. "But if you owe child support, the best way to protect your credit rating is to contact your local child support office and make arrangements to pay what you owe."

Many child support cases are the result of divorce proceedings, but under Texas law child support may also be charged to unmarried fathers. With the increasing number of teen pregnancies, more and more young men are expected to have to pay roughly eighteen years' worth of child support payments as a result their sexual activities.

Pressure Sores: Prevention/Treatment

Almost half of all nursing home patients suffer with pressure sores or "bed sores." Individuals who are bedridden or confined to wheelchairs often develop such sores. Pressure sores are thought to occur as a result of lost body fat, immobility, and the loss of blood circulation to areas lying over bones (e.g., hips) where there is much pressure against the skin.

Prevention is still the best approach to dealing with pressure sores. Carefully turning the patient to a different body position every two hours is essential. Other preventative measures include the use of ripple mattresses, waterbeds, air-filled pads, or other devices that help distribute body weight over a large area. Treatment of pressure sores may include use of:

- topical cleansing and debriding agents
- antibacterial solutions such as povidone-iodine
- dressings containing hydrophilic polymers for moisture absorption
- oral vitamins/minerals (e.g., vitamin C, zinc) to aid in tissue repair
