Crane Sightings Should Be Reported

Endangered whooping cranes may be making their annual appearance in Texas now as they migrate from their Canadian nesting grounds to their winter home on the Texas Gulf Coast.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials asks persons who spot any of the rare birds to avoid disturbing them and report

USFWS officials said the cranes apparently had another excellent production year, with 12 to 18 chicks adding to the flock at the nesting grounds at Wood Buffalo National Park in the Northwest Territories. The migrating flock, including the yearlings, numbers about 145 birds, officials said.

The past five years of good

production are encouraging to state and federal biologists, since only 16 whoopers survived in the wild 48 years ago.

Adult whooping cranes are white with black wingtips and red forehead. In flight, the bird's long neck is held straight forward and their long black legs extend beyond the tail. The adult's wingspan may be more than seven feet, and whoopers stand as tall as five feet. Juveniles have white and rusty brown body feathers and black

Texan Saw Stars Fall

66It looked like millions of stars were shooting down to the ground," Julia Palmer Roberts remembered from the great meteor shower of 1834.

"Julia Roberts had been born in Shelby County in deep East Texas in 1820, and she was a teenager the night that the stars fell.

"We were eating supper, when suddenly I decided to go out on the front porch and get a drink of water," she related many years later. "When I opened the door, I was startled by streaks of fire flying in every direction." The night sky looked almost as if it were on fire from the scores of falling stars.

Near the house was a pig sty, and from the teenager's perspective, "it seemed like most of the stars were falling right on top of our hogs."

Julia screamed for her father, and the whole family rushed onto the porch to witness the celestial spectacle.

"For a moment Father gazed at the scene of falling fire," she remembered. "I could see his face as the flashes lit up everything, and it had a look I shall never forget."

The father advised his family that undoubtedly the world was coming to its end. "We had better have a little prayer meeting," he said. They knelt together in the light of the falling stars, and, as Julia recalled,

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"Father asked the Lord to help us."

When I first read Julia Roberts' story of the night of the falling stars. I thought to myself that a phenomenon as prominent as the one that she observed must have been seen by others. I went to my friend, Don Garland, who operates the planetarium at the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History, to ask him about it.

"It was definitely a meteor shower that she saw," Don responded. "It was not a single event, but one that lasted for some duration...We know from the date what happened. We can trace it back to a particular meteor shower called the Leonids.'

Not being an avid star gazer, to me this sounded remarkable.

Don continued, "This is a meteor shower that takes place every 33 years." He went on to explain that at this interval the earth intercepts the debris from the ancient comet, Temple, and as Don put it, "the meteors fall like rain."

"Every 33 years this happens in the middle of November, around the 17th at least the 16th, 17th and 18th. We can pin her remembrance to a three-day span in 1834," he said.

I asked Don whether Mrs. Roberts' story was exaggerated, and he said it probably was not. "The most recent occurrence of the Leonids was in 1966," he stated. "It was reported that there were at least 2,000 meteors a minute....No doubt what they were seeing in 1834 was of equal intensity. It definitely would have made an impression on them. It would on me if I saw that many of them."

"What about the next time?" I

"There will be three sleepless nights for amateur astronomers in 1999 when they come again," Don answered. "I can guarantee that we will be out with our lawn chairs."

Since I've been here, I have completed welding school at the vocational college here. Now I'm enrolled in the industrial maintenance associates degree program. I also take courses through Indiana University by correspon-

I'm not incarcerated for any hideous crime. I had a problem with drugs but with counseling, I've overcome that and realize my foolish mistake. I'm just trying my best to put my life in order again.

I hope you can find it in your heart to publish my letter somewhere in your paper. Perhaps it would spark an interest in someone, anyone who may have known the pain of loneliness I live with constantly. I regret I cannot afford to pay for publishing because I only earn ten dollars a month while going to school.
