Buckle Up Week Set

May 21-28 is Buckle up America! Week. As vacation season begins, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts reminds motorists that buckling up is still the best way to arrive home safely -- even in cars equipped with air bags.

In fact, the theme for Buckle Up Week is "Belts and Bags - A Winning Combination." "Many Americans believe that air bags will protect them in a crash, even if they don't buckle up," said George R. Gustafson, coalition spokesperson and president of Texas Safety Association. "They're dead wrong. The air bag and safety belt are made to work together."

Some facts about air bags, safety belts, and traffic in Texas. --Air bags deploy only in frontal crashes. They don't work in side-swipes or rollovers. Working alone, they are only 20% to 40% effective in preventing death and injury. --A lap/shoulder belt and air bag, used together, can be as much as 55% effective.

--If you don't have an air bag, don't worry. That lap/shoulder belt,

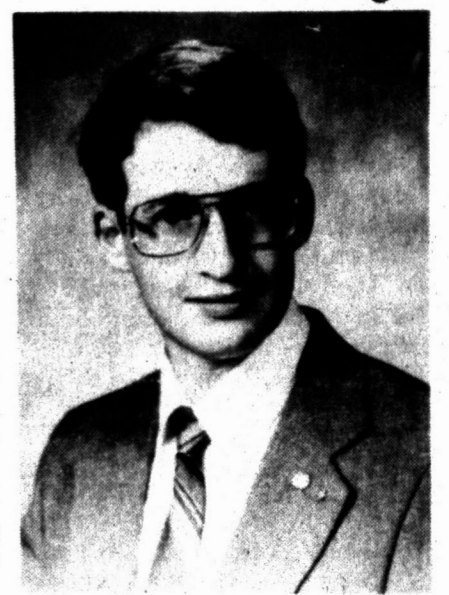
Coke Party Held

Fishing Report

Texas Parks & Wildlife department reports that fishing at Lake Greenbelt is fairly good. The water is clear, 63 degrees, 2 feet above normal level; black bass are fairly good in shallow water to 4 1/2 pounds on minnows, water dogs and some lures; crappie are beginning to move into shallow water to 12 fish per string on minnows; white bass are easy to find early and late surfacing, mid day fish go to 20 feet of water and are hard to find; catfish are fairly slow; walleye are good to 6 pounds on spinners and minnows.

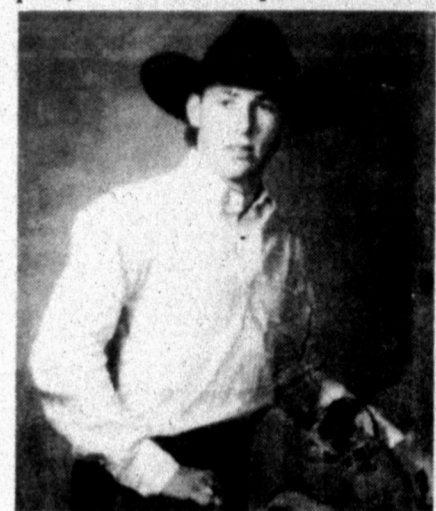

Senior Citizens

Yesterday's children, a non-profit corporation devoted to serving the interests of the Panhandle's senior citizens, is using the past to build for the future.

The "graying of America" is an established fact. more than 60 million Americans will celebrate their 65th birthdays within the next two decades. Recognizing that steps must be taken now to assure that the needs of those senior citizens will be met in the next century, yesterday's Children has undertaken the quest to build and develop a heritage park on the outskirts of Amarillo.

The plan centers around the development of an authentic turn-of-the-century Western town. Borrowing on the concepts used in places like Silver Dollar City in Branson, Mo., Sturbridge Village in Mass. and Williamsburg, Va., workers will be dressed in period costumes and engaged in live demonstrations of the crafts, industries and activities that marked the Panhandle's history in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

Increasing evidence of the tourism potential of the Panhandle's Western heritage should make this park a tremendous drawing card for visitors and contribute significantly to the expansion of the local economy while establishing a permanent fund to benefit the region's older residents.

Claudia Benedict, director for the Amarillo Senior Aides Employment Program said, "I think a heritage is an excellent idea since federal funds for senior citizens programs are so stagnant at present and will probably continue to be in the future. This project has the potential of helping not only the elderly, but the entire economy of the area.

The project, which began as just a dream is picking up speed and support. Economic Consulting Services, a California firm with an international reputation in the development of recreational

projects, has been engaged to conduct a feasibility study. Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo is involved in the design of the park and the development of promotional materials.

The Plum Creek Brigade, a locally based group whose members are dedicated to practicing endangered arts such as rifle building, fabrication of period clothing and blacksmithing, is enthusiastic about the project. The group has made a cash contribution in addition to pledging its support.

"The public is hungry for information about its past," said Brigade Captain Mike VanDeventer. "People especially are interested in the history of the area where they live. A heritage park, such as the one envisioned by Yesterday's Children will help preserve the Panhandle's past, while providing jobs, stimulating creativity and helping this area capture a larger share of the tourist market."

Teresa Parker Boles, granddaughter of Chief Quanah Parker also is enthusiastic about the project. "It will bring back memories of the old days that are fading away," she said. "We need it for the young as well as the old."

A variety of activities are planned throughout the Panhandle in the coming months to raise funds for the project. A group of volunteers have begun work on a collection of recipes. A limited number will be bound in hand-tooled leather. Other projects include the creation of a Panhandle heritage quilt, craft demonstrations, barbecues and a host of other activities that will provide communities with a taste of the flavor planned for the park.

Dr. Hughes spoke of the advantages for Clarendon and Donley County in forming the organization, since we are rich in pre-recorded history, Paleo-Indian, Archaic Indian, Historic Indian, as well as ranching, and pioneer history. The benefits of forming the Archeological Society would be that it would compliment the Historical Society

and help tourism in recognizing Clarendon as a significant landmark.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 5 at 8:00 p.m. in the First Christian Church basement (Third and Gorst). All interested parties are urged to attend and bring ideas for future meetings.

Take With Plenty of Water

Increasing one's intake of water often is recommended with health problems such as kidney stones or urinary tract infection. Water is "good medicine" in combination with a variety of commonly used medicines including sulfonamide anti-infective agents and the bulk-forming laxatives. In addition to making swallowing easier, water makes these medicines safer and can increase their effectiveness.

Sulfonamides primarily are used for urinary tract infections. However, if there is a deficiency of water in the body, only small amounts of urine are formed. The result is an increased tendency for the formation of sulfonamide crystals in various parts of the urinary tract. Drinking additional water helps prevent the formation of sulfonamide crystals.

Bulk-forming laxatives may contain methylcellulose, polycarbophil, or psyllium. Each of these agents relies on the presence of water in the large intestine for its action. The Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs indicates that each dose of bulk laxative "should be taken with a full glass of water (at least 8 ounces)."

Minister Search Begins

Nominations are being sought for the most outstanding rural minister of Texas for 1990. "The rural minister might be considered an unsung hero, and where that's the case, his associates can bring some special recognition to him," said Dr. David Ruesink, a sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Ruesink said the award is given annually by the Progressive Farmer Magazine during the annual Town and Country Church Conference, scheduled for October 1-2, 1990, at Texas A&M University. The conference is an Extension Service educational program for

rural and small town ministers and lay leaders. To be eligible for the award, Ruesink said, a minister must have served for at least two years a congregation in a rural community or town of less than 10,000 population. Ruesink said nominations should focus on how the minister has made a difference to his church and community. "Show how the minister's leadership has helped bring the people together to fulfill their community and religious needs," he said. Ruesink said 53 rural ministers were nominated last year. The winner was the Rev. Larry Castillo-Wilson, who helped organize relief efforts for victims of a tornado that devastated the West Texas Community of Saragosa. Ruesink said

all nominees are recognized, and the top minister is named at the conference. Nominations should be sent by August 1, 1990 to Texas Rural Minister of the Year Committee, Department of Rural Sociology, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843-2125. 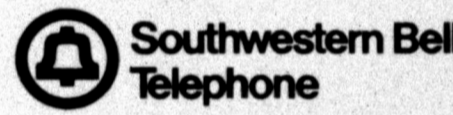

Crop and Livestock Reports Given

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1990 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock inventories. State Statistician Dennis Findley emphasized that information and advanced planning. Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their marketing plans. "There are many uncertainties facing agriculture," Findley added, "and accurate, reliable figures will give producers a chance to make sound production and marketing decisions during the coming year." Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1990 planted acreage report will be released June 28 and the U.S. cattle inventory will be released July 27. To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. Individual reports will be combined with other reports to state estimates. "Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.

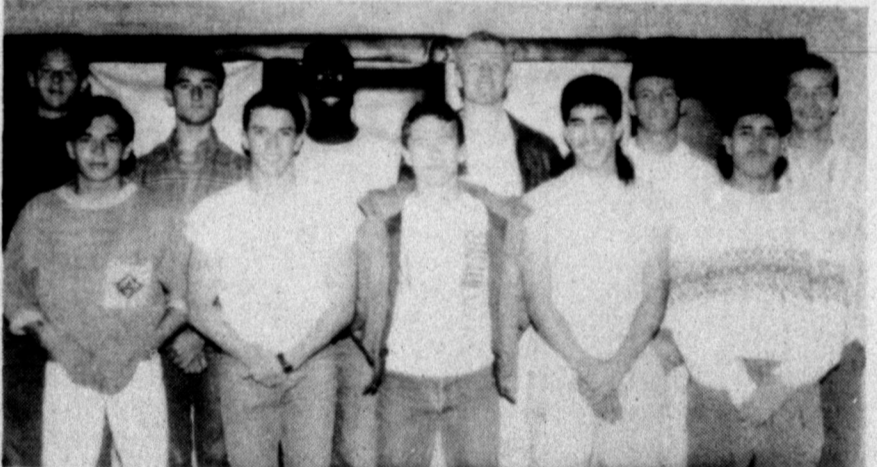

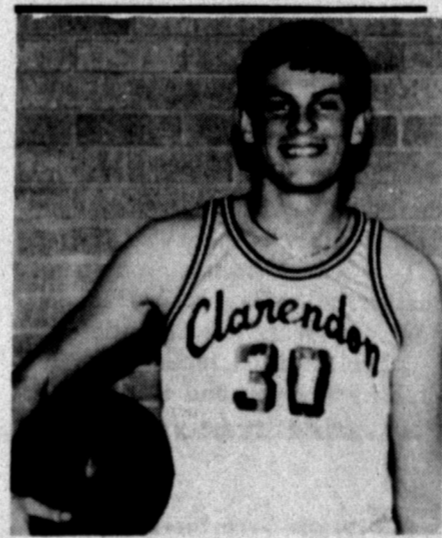
In June we raised money for camp at Texas Tech University, by having a car wash. During the

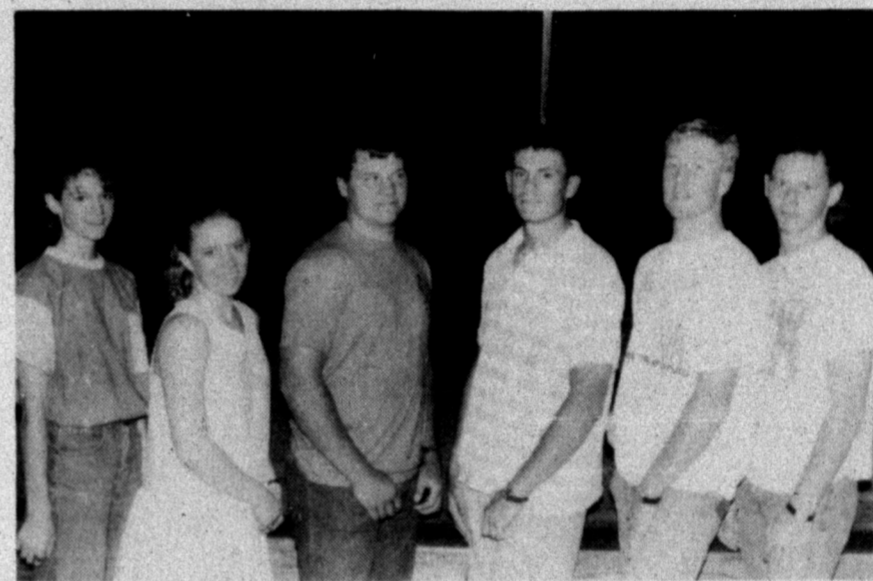
