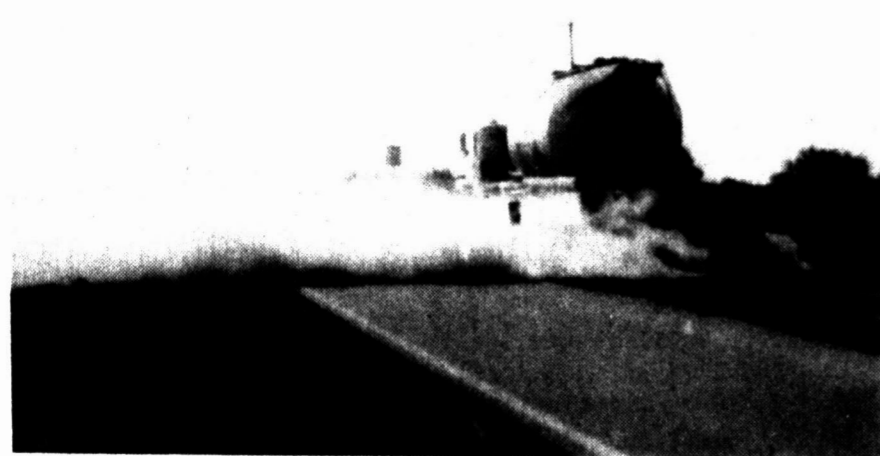

Cotton Bug Workshop Set

The Donley County Extension Crops Committee invites area cotton producers to a Cotton Insect Scouting Workshop which will be held in Donley County on June 29, 1990. The workshop will start at 8:30 a.m. at the Paymaster Gin where producers will assemble. At 9:00 a.m., farmers will go out and look at area cotton fields with Emory Boring III, Extension Entomologist, and learn insect sampling techniques, identification, and control alternatives for early

insect problems. As the group tours and checks fields, they will work toward Hedley and end up at the Lions Club Building around noon for lunch and a short program. Lunch will be sponsored by Mobay, and they will discuss cotton insect control products.

Loan Program Set for Friday

A conference which will help farmers, operators of small businesses and rural communities learn where and how to find financing will be held here June 22 by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Federal and state officials, bankers and representatives of several agencies will address the question, "Where's the money?" for business and agricultural financing.

The program will be from 9 a.m. until 4:45 p.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd., West. It is sponsored by the Extension Service and the Potter County Extension agricultural committees.

Many agricultural producers, business persons and leaders in smaller communities throughout the Texas Panhandle and surrounding areas aren't sure of what help is available, or what steps to take to obtain financial help, said Jim Smith, Potter County extension agent.

Financing holds the key to development of our rural communities, as well as to the survival of farms and small businesses, said Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension Service economist and management specialist.

Following a welcome by Amarillo Mayor Keith Adams, U.S. Rep. Bill Sarpalius, D-Texas, will discuss work of the House Small Business Committee. U.S. Rep. Glenn English, D-Okla., will explain activities in the House Rural Development Committee.

Sources of financing will be outlined by Terry Harman, state director of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service. Loan programs available through the Small Business Administration will be covered by G. Till Phillips, deputy regional administrator of SBA.

Work of the state's Rural Economic Development Commission will be reported by Dr. Zerle Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and chairman of the commission.

Loan programs available through the Farmers Home Administration will be explained by John Kirchoff, assistant state director. Those available through the Texas Department of Agriculture will be outlined by Richard Salmon, TDA business development specialist.

The state legislature's perspective on business and agriculture financing will be presented by State Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, and Rep. John Smith, R-Amarillo.

Loan programs of the Texas Department of Commerce will be explained by Reagan Houston, TDC director of finance.

Venture capital and how it works will be explained by Jim Cook, senior vice president of First National Bank of Amarillo. Programs of the Amarillo Economic Development Corporation will be outlined by Richard Brown, its chairman.

Commercial ag loan programs and requirements will be covered by Bill Snure, vice president of First National Bank of Amarillo. David Ellis, senior vice president of Amarillo National Bank, will discuss commercial business loans and regulations.

Loans through the Production Credit Association will be explained by James Van Pelt, Amarillo PCA president. Services of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission will be told by Perna Strickland, PRPC director.

Ag loan programs and requirements of the Federal Land Bank will be covered by Greg Loyd, manager of the Amarillo Federal Land Bank.

Don Taylor, director of the Small Business Center at West Texas State University, will show how to prepare a business plan.

TO ALL FORMER AND CURRENT INTRASTATE WIDE AREA TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE (WATS/800) SUBSCRIBERS:

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has instituted a Class Action Lawsuit seeking judicial approval of a settlement reached in Docket No. 7297, an inquiry of General Counsel of the Public Utility Commission of Texas into possible overcharges which occurred between September, 1976, and February, 1987, due to rounding practices, on bills of intrastate WATS/800 customers sent by Southwestern Bell and other telephone companies which concur in Southwestern Bell's tariff. The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Claim Forms And Additional Information

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

Cancer Screening Clinic

A clinic will be held in Clarendon on Monday, June 25, 1990 from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic. Exams are done by appointment only. Locally, for more information, contact the Medical Center Clinic at 874-3760.

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination of the breasts every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age: 35-40 - One baseline mammogram; 40 to 50 - a mammogram every 1 to 2 years; over 50 - yearly mammograms.

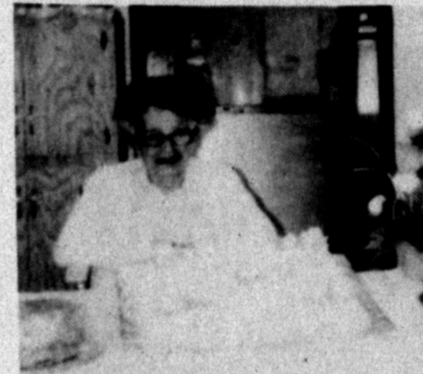

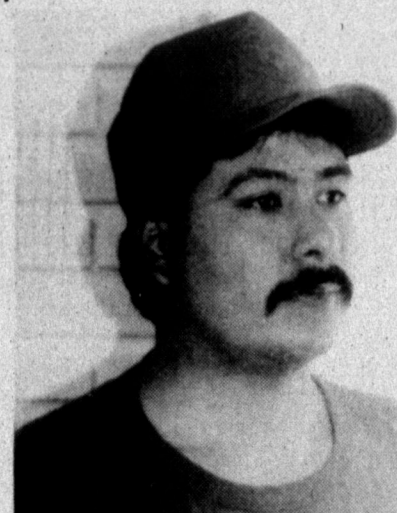

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Contact Dermatitis From Outdoor Plants

Summertime outdoor activities can be spoiled by a brush with poison ivy, poison oak, or sumac. June and July are peak months for contact with these plants and the skin inflammation that follows. It has been reported that as many as 8 out of 10 persons are sensitive to poison ivy alone.

Blisters resulting from exposure to these plants are caused by a chemical in the plant sap called *urushiol*. Once this chemical contacts the skin, it begins to penetrate in a matter of minutes. Usually within two days, a rash develops which is followed by blistering, redness, and itching. After a few days the blisters become crusted and begin to scale. If there are no complications, the condition begins to clear in about 10 days.

If exposure to plant sap is suspected, exposed areas of the skin should be washed immediately. A mild rash may require nothing more than soaking in cool water. Home remedies that help dry oozing blisters include wet oatmeal or a solution of baking soda. Calamine, a mixture of zinc oxide and ferric oxide, reduces inflammation, stops oozing, and promotes healing. Topical medicines containing local anesthetics such as benzocaine may help alleviate pain. Hydrocortisone cream or spray usually relieves redness and itching.

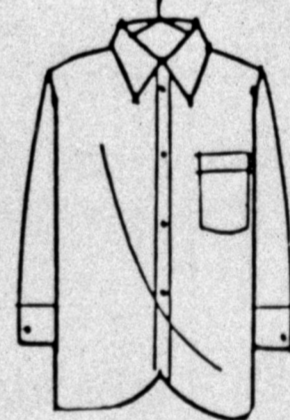

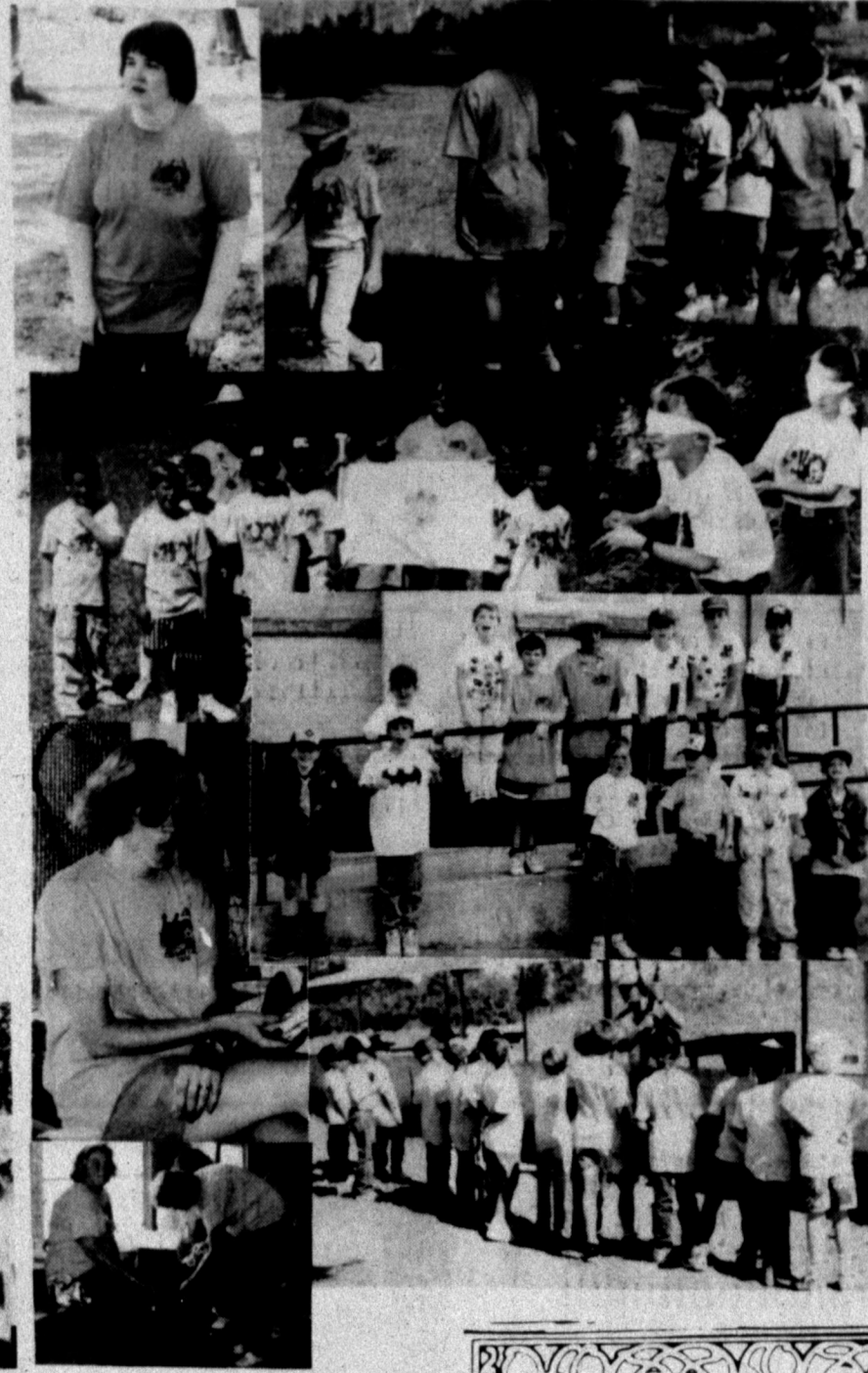

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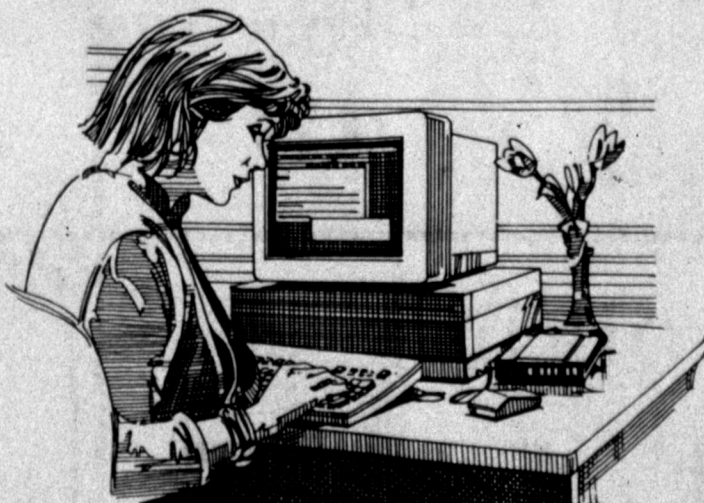
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Hedley News

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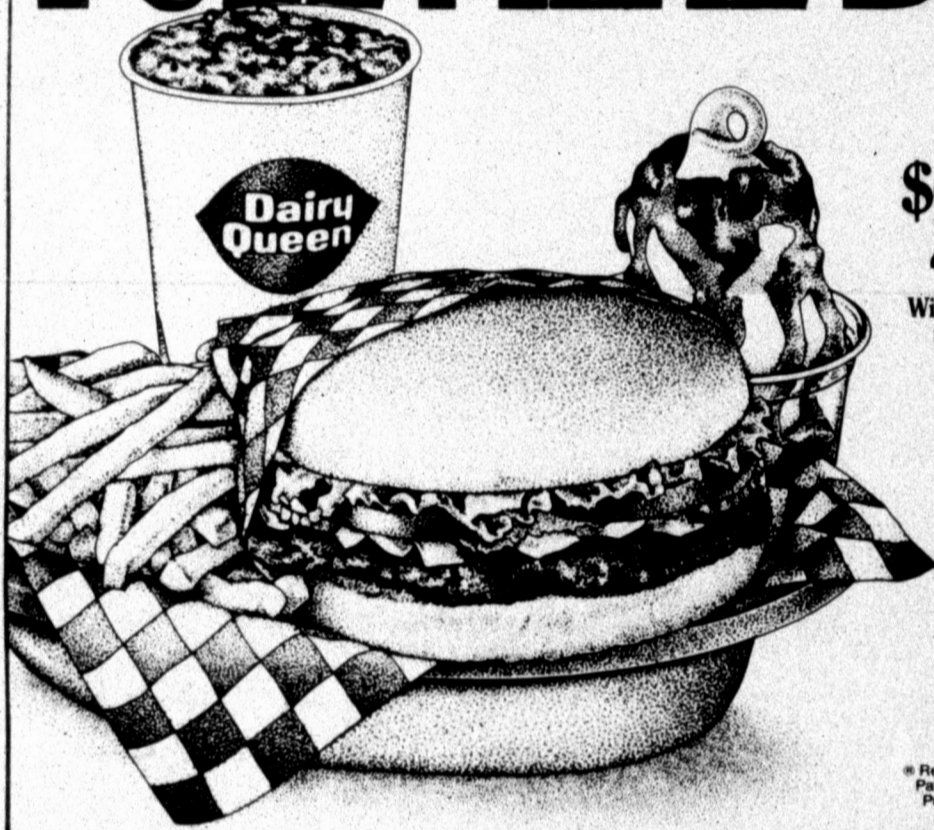

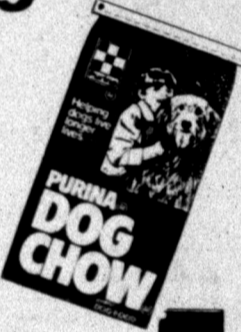

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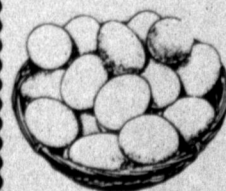
