Library Receives Videos

The Burton Memorial Library has recently received 23 new and uniquely valuable videos from the Chicago-based John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. The videos are part of the MacArthur Library, a special collection of quality film/video productions dealing with areas of MacArthur Foundation interests such as health, peace and international cooperation, and world environment and resources.

The MacArthur Library is a follow-up gift from the Foundation to more than 2,000 public libraries that are participating in The MacArthur Library Video Classics Project. This project has enabled the Burton Memorial Library to obtain 10 popular PBS series in videocassette form through the outright grant from the Foundation. In November, 1988, the library received 85 videos which included PBS video productions such as "The Jewel in the Crown" and "Nova".

Titles in the new collection include "The Day After Trinity," an Academy Award-nominated documentary on the life of J. Robert Oppenheimer and the development of the atomic bomb, "Amazonia: A Celebration of Life," which studies Peru's tropical rain forest and the threat posed to it by deforestation, and "Hearts and Minds," an Academy Award winner for Best Documentary which presents a provocative examination of the U.S. involvement in Viet Nam.

Currently the Burton Memorial Library houses 110 videos which are available free of charge to residents of Donley County.

Census Workers Needed

The U.S. Census has issued a call for Donley residents to apply for temporary jobs.

Census work will last between two and eight weeks for most workers. They will receive \$5.00 an hour plus mileage for any official use of a private vehicle.

Applicants for the temporary positions must be 18 years old or over, a U.S. citizen, have a valid drivers license, a social security card and take a written test.

The work consists of driving or walking in designated areas of the county to follow up on addresses that do not respond to the census questionnaire. Office jobs that will be filled are those of data transcriber and clerks.

The census benefits all Americans. Reapportionment of the U.S. House of Representatives and redrawing of legislative district boundaries are based on census figures, while census numbers are used to distribute federal, state and local government funds to provide assistance to communities for housing, health and human services programs.

County residents interested in applying for the temporary positions should contact the census district office at 3501-H.W. 45th, Amarillo, Texas; (806) 354-3700. The Bureau of the Census is an Equal Opportunity employer.

Rates Increase Slightly

Advertising rates for *The Clarendon News* will go up as of February 1st, at approximately the same rate as inflation.

"We regret that this is necessary," said Bob Williams, editor of the paper, "but our printing costs have gone up in 1989 as have other costs. Experienced editors and the Texas Press Association unanimously advise a small increase at the first of each year. That is much better than postponing price increases and then having to make a huge jump in prices."

Published rates for advertising are going from \$2.67 per column inch to \$2.75. There will be a charge of \$1 for each tear sheet.

"We want to keep our ad rates as low as possible," said the editor, "our low rates encourage people to advertise who could not afford to do so otherwise. We prefer a lower rate and higher volume."

The Clarendon News generally has a relatively large number of ads, which allows the paper to print more pages each week. The more ads, the more news stories the paper can print.

"And our rates are still a bargain," said the editor. "Just compare our 1990 rate with the 1989 published rates for area papers. Canadian charges \$2.99 per SAU inch. Childress is \$2.88; Dumas is \$3.85; Groom is \$3.28; Memphis is \$2.80. Paducah charges \$2.99; Panhandle runs \$2.73; Quannah \$2.99; Shamrock \$3.46; Silverton \$3.17; Spearman \$4.20, and Wellington \$3.05. Many of those have smaller circulation and higher rates."

The Clarendon News is located at 103 S. Kearney.

Farmers Union Convention To Be Held

The Texas Farmers Union will hold its 86th annual state convention in Dallas, with Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower keynoting the opening night of the three day meeting. Family farmers and ranches from across the state will attend the session from Thursday, January 25 through Saturday, January 27 at the Harvey Hotel-Addison, in Dallas. The convention begins at 8 p.m. on January 25.

In addition to Hightower, other featured speakers will be National Farmers Union President Leland Swenson, former Governor, and gubernatorial candidate, Mark White, and State Comptroller Bob Bullock. Seminars will be conducted by TFU on critical farm issues of the 1990's important to both producers and consumers. Those sessions will focus on marketing, new and existing loan programs, updated production techniques and other pertinent information.

"The decade of the 1990's will bring new challenges to Texas family farmers and ranchers, but we still face many of the same old problems," stated TFU President Joe Rankin. "During the 1980's, we saw a decline in the number of family producers in Texas, many of whom were forced out of business for economic reasons which were beyond their control. We believe our state and national governments need to focus on preserving the family farm and ranch as a cornerstone of our free enterprise system," Rankin added.

Mrs. Reeves was born in Marysville. She married George Washington Reeves in 1921 at Marysville. He died in 1968. She moved from Cook County to Clarendon in 1940 and then to Amarillo in 1969. She was a homemaker and a member of the First Baptist Church in Clarendon.

Survivors include two sons, Glenn Reeves and Winfred Reeves, both of Amarillo; five grandchildren; nine great-

grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews.

Loans Available

The Texas Housing Agency announced Tuesday it will make available \$48 million in below-market home financing on December 4 to assist first-time homebuyers in their quest for home ownership.

To take advantage of the below-market rate financing, borrowers must purchase a house which has been foreclosed upon by a lender or acquired by the Texas Housing Agency.

"By limiting these funds to foreclosed properties we are providing a two-fold benefit: assisting low- to moderate-income families in the market for a home, and helping the economy by reducing the surplus of foreclosed houses," explains THA Executive Administrator Tom Adams.

The interest rate on the majority of the funds is 8.68 percent. A ten percent set aside of funds at an interest rate of 7.68 percent is available for properties acquired by the Texas Housing Agency. The average price of these homes is \$32,000.

Adams said there are approximately 350 homes around the state that are eligible for purchase under the 7.68 percent program. He also adds that a majority of these properties are in good repair with recent cosmetic improvements. In addition, there are thousands of lender-owned properties to select from for the 8.68 percent financing.

According to Adams, you are eligible to apply for the low interest rate loan if you:

1. Have not owned a home within the past three years;
2. Earn no more than 115% of your area's median income;
3. Can make an earnest money payment upon signing contract of approximately \$500;
4. Can make a down payment of 3-5 percent of the home purchase price;
5. Can meet FHA underwriting guidelines; and
6. Purchase an eligible home from Texas Housing Agency or a foreclosed home from a participating lender.

To obtain the addresses of eligible properties for the 7.68 percent interest rate, individuals must

contact one of four management brokers who manage the homes. The names and phone numbers of the brokers, along with information on the 8.68 percent program, can be obtained by calling the Texas Housing Agency at 512/472-7500; or toll free at 1-800/792-1119.

The Texas Housing Agency was created by the Texas Legislature in 1979 to provide affordable housing opportunities for low- and moderate-income families. The Agency fulfills its purpose, in part, by issuing tax-exempt bonds to finance single- and multi-family housing throughout Texas. The Agency's programs are self-supporting, receiving no state or federal tax revenue. This newest cycle of mortgage funds is expected to finance over 1,400 homes.

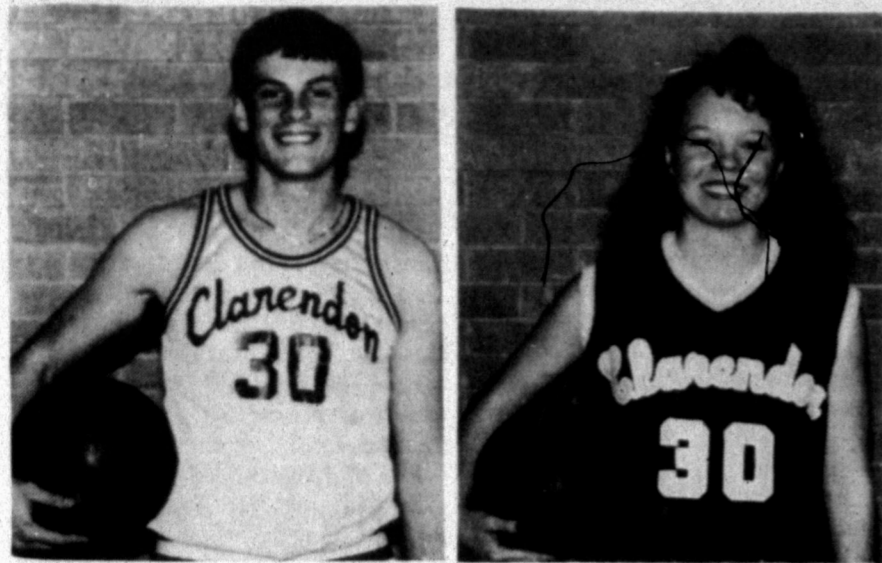

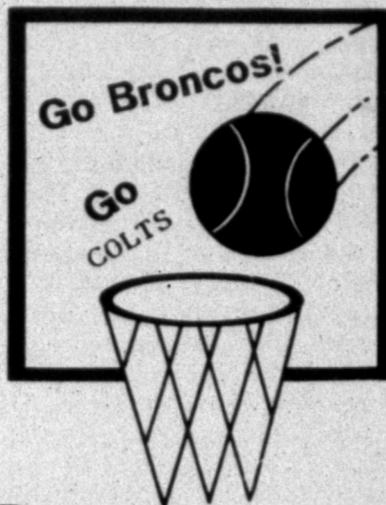

Modern Shampoo Ingredients

The first commercial shampoos contained soaps. When these shampoos were used, the soap ingredients often formed insoluble salts which remained on the hair as a dull scum. Newly formulated soap-based shampoos contain a mixture of natural oils and agents which tie up the calcium and magnesium, preventing the formation of insoluble salts. Synthetic detergents, such as sodium lauryl sulfate, have replaced the old soap ingredients. These detergents provide foaming and cleansing action while imparting luster and body to the hair.

Additional foaming agents and stabilizers are added to make shampoo products more pleasing to the user. Thickening agents such as methylcellulose also make the product more acceptable. Other shampoo ingredients include perfumes, buffers, coloring agents, and preservatives.

Conditioners are often added to shampoo products to improve the manageability of the hair after it is washed. These agents coat the hair with a small amount of lubricating material such as lanolin or glycerol. (Cream rinses help eliminate tangles and make the hair more manageable.)

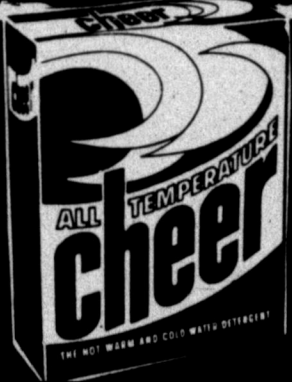

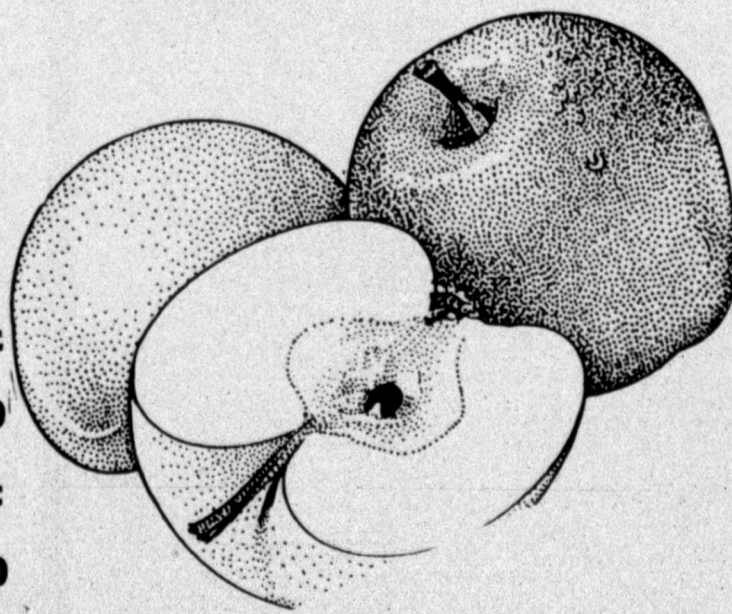

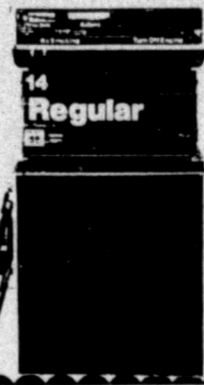
