Doug Kidd Honored

Doug Kidd was honored on January 4th by PEMS, Panhandle Emergency Medical Service, and the Clarendon EMS. Doug was honored for saving the life of a ten year old boy.

On September 3, 1989, two boys were swimming in Lake Greenbelt while Doug and a friend were fishing. Doug was watching the boys and noticed that they were in trouble. Without hesitation Doug went in after them. He pulled the ten year old boy out and sent his friend for help while he continued looking for the other boy. He was unable to find the other boy.

The PEMS presented Doug with a Director of Citation Award which is given to lay citizens who perform life saving acts. Only eight of these awards has been given in the Panhandle. The award was presented by Leland Lewis, executive director of PEMS. Mr. Lewis was accompanied by his secretary Joyce Cheeks.

Cattlemen Call For Investigation

The Independent Cattlemen's Association (ICA) today called for federal investigations into rapid and unexplainable price increases of two fuels vital to agriculture. ICA said prices over the last 30 days have risen 100 percent for propane and 50 percent for diesel.

ICA President Bob Nunley of Sabinal asked U.S. Senators Lloyd Bentsen (D-TX) and Phil Gramm (R-TX) to seek congressional investigations into the price increases. He said the investigations

may show that price increases were nothing more than price gouging by oil and gas producers in response to high demands for fuel during the frigid weather that enveloped most of the United States last December.

Nunley also asked that if the investigations show that profiteering by oil and gas middlemen exists, that they be required to rebate the price increases to their customers. "Although the prices for the two fuels have increased exorbitantly, we have seen no corresponding price increase at the wellhead," Nunley said. "This fact leads us to conclude that this is a case of middlemen gouging their customers in times of emergency. It is also possible that oil and gas producers are acting in collusion to take advantage of their consumers during times of need."

ICA member David Gisler of Victoria, who also owns Independent Propane, Inc., a distribut-

ing company for liquefied petroleum, said he has been told by his suppliers that Texans would have to pay inflated prices for propane because their customers up north were suffering shortages and were buying supplies at vastly increased prices. Gisler said he expected a 10- to 15-cent per gallon increase, but instead was hit with a 50-cent increase in a span of 30 days.

Chamber to Repair Sign

Clarendon's "welcome signs" were badly damaged by winds last spring. Now the Chamber of Commerce is rebuilding the signs.

The sign will have an orange border, with an orange sun and clouds. The letters that spell Clarendon will be white with black/brown borders. The background will be yellow.

Global Walk Coming Through Area

A world-wide movement will be holding a walk through West Texas, as part of a march around the world. The marchers are attempting to call attention to current practices that are damaging the environment, wasting precious natural resources and tearing apart the sense of community worldwide. They oppose the worldwide practice of wasting billions of dollars on military spending that could be better spent on humanitarian and environmental needs. The effort is officially called, "A Global Walk for a Livable World."

Phase I of the walk will cross the United States from Los Angeles to New York, passing near the north edge of Donley County.

Phase II will go through Great Britain, Belgium, West and East Germany, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Greece, Egypt, Israel, India, China, and Japan.

Those who participate in the project intend to spread the word that responsible people should be more concerned with community, less with conspicuous consumption.

They will pick up litter along the route, and plant trees to remind everyone of the need for reforestation.

IRS Has New Taxes on Farmer

A new law requires employers to withhold income tax from cash wages paid to farm workers. You must now withhold income tax from farm workers on all cash wages paid after 1989 that are subject to social security taxes. This

rule is part of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989 recently passed by Congress.

Ask each affected farm worker to submit a completed Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate. Make it effective

the first payday after you receive it. If an employee does not give you a valid Form W-4, withhold as if he or she is single and claiming no withholding allowances. You can use the income tax withholding tables in the January 1990 Circular E, Employer's Tax Guide, to figure the amount of income tax to withhold.

You can order Forms W-4 and Circular E by calling the IRS forms number, 1-800-424-3676.

Additionally, we are sending supplies of the form and publication to the extension service agents at the state level that are supplied with Publication 225, Farmers Tax Guide.

November Economy Is Good News

Tax receipts indicate that Texas had a good November and Donley County did better than the state as a whole.

Sales tax receipts for Texas were up 10% over 1988. Donley County receipts were up 14.99%. Clarendon sold 13.86% more than the previous year. Howardwick was up 25.67%. No figures were reported for Hedley.

Other area cities were generally up, as well. Armstrong County (Claude) was up 22.89%. Childress was up 11.39% Dickens was up 52.10% Gray county was up 10.78%, with McLean up 22.8%. Hall County was up 14.85%, but most of the expansion was in Memphis; Estelline was down 9.32%, Turkey down 7.65%. Canadian was up 3.75%. Hutchinson County (Borger, Fritch, Sanford and Stinnet) was up 21.90%. Potter was up 10.67%. Randall, 9.33%.

Not all Texas cities were so fortunate, however. Carson County (Groom, Panhandle, Skellytown and White Deer) decreased by 6.40%. Only Panhandle equaled last year's sales. Collingsworth county also suffered. Wellington's receipts were down 2.88% from the previous year.

Area-wide figures are slightly deceptive in that the previous period (1988) was depressed for many counties--not including Clarendon. Yet increases are welcome in all of the towns.

Several trends seem to be emerging in the area. First, virtually everyone in the region has begun to realize that local prosperity can be maintained only if residents band together and work hard on economic development. Second, people are learning that towns can do something about their economy.

Little Dribblers Hold Pre-Season Meeting

The Clarendon Little Dribblers Assn. held its pre-season meeting on Nov. 13th & Dec. 3rd, 1989 at the Family Life Center. Those present: Phil Stroud, Pat Robertson, Mike Williams, Johnny Floyd, Eddie Hankins, Derlene Graham, Donna Knorpp, Jan Campbell, Theresa McClellan, John Adams, Jay Gage, Kyle Hill, Rene' Stroud, Bryan Denney, Scott Hankins, and Renee Shields.

The 1989 financial statement was presented and approved. The organization has a bank balance of \$276.18 and \$50 in petty cash, giving a total of \$326.18 to begin the 1990 season.

The group discussed combining the boys and girls programs and having one account for the purpose of bookkeeping, rather than keeping separate accounts on each. Motion was made to combine the two programs and keep one set of books. Motion carried.

The group discussed organizing an independent association rather than renewing our charter with "Little Dribblers." This issue was discussed at some length. Motion was made to form an independent association. Motion passed with a unanimous vote. "Clarendon Little Dribblers Assn." is now to become "Clarendon Dribblers" and this will be the official name for the 1990 season.

Officers were elected for the coming year. The officials elected were: President - Phil Stroud; Vice-President - Renee Shields; Secretary/Treasurer - Susie Shields; Boy's Player Agent - Mike Williams; and Girl's Player Agent - Theresa McClellan.

President Stroud then appointed committees for the 1990 season: Fund Raising-Derlene Graham, Donna Knorpp, Jan Campbell; Teams/Equipment/Uniforms-Mike Williams, Theresa McClellan; Coaches/Referees-John Adams, Johnny Floyd; Scheduling Practices & Games-Eddie Hankins, Pat Robertson. Pres. Stroud asked Donna Knorpp to check on insurance with Knorpp Insurance Agency.

The group went over the youth basketball rules for the 1990 season and made revisions. Rules are to be reviewed and made clear to all coaches and referees during the pre-season coaches workshop in January of 1990.

The group discussed age brackets and division of leagues for the upcoming season. Motion was made to open the program to all children in the 3rd grade through the 6th grade, with the following divisions: Girl's Junior League (3rd & 4th Grade); Girl's Major League (5th & 6th grade); Boy's Junior League (3rd and 4th grade); and Boy's Major League (5th & 6th grade). Motion was carried with a unanimous vote.

After a special committee session, the Fund Raising committee determined that player fees, charged to all children upon signing up for the program, would remain at \$10 per player for the 1990 season. Businesses throughout our community will be asked to make a donation to the program again this year. The Fund Raising committee will coordinate this effort during the last week of January 1990.

Mike Williams determined that sign-up would be the week of January 22nd-26th. President Stroud set the next meeting of the organization for Sunday, January 28th, at 1:00 p.m. which will be the Coaches Pre-Season Workshop. Meeting Adjourned.

Fire Department Urges Caution

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department reminds all county residents that they should be extremely cautious in and around grassy areas within the county due to the extremely high fuel load and very dry conditions. With no appreciable moisture having fallen in the past several weeks and several windy days, conditions are perfect for a major disaster if a fire breaks out. The exceptionally warm weather has even further complicated conditions.

According to fire department personnel, it takes almost nothing to start a fire in grassy areas. A carelessly tossed cigarette, the muffler of a vehicle, "controlled" burning, or even the sun shining on a bottle laying in the grass, particularly when winds are high and static electricity causes fires to start and spread rapidly, all create high fire problems. The National Weather Service and the Texas Forest Service recently rated the Panhandle of Texas as "Extremely Hazardous" in regards to the fire potential. With conditions this dry, even a small fire can spread to structures and vehicles and other valuable property and ignite those things in only seconds. Fire tends to move very rapidly in warm and dry conditions, particularly if there is any wind at all and can get completely out of control in a very short time.

Fire safety and consciousness is something that county residents should practice all the time but particularly when conditions exist as they do now.

The forecast calls for cooler and wetter conditions to move in as the end of the week approaches but it would take many days of cool wet weather to significantly lessen the fire potential that now exists. Therefore, citizens should not become careless if we have a few days of drizzle, rain, or snow.

To report a fire, county residents are reminded that the emergency number for all areas of the county is 874-3533. This is the same number to call for the ambulance, and law enforcement agencies as well. This number is for all county fire departments.

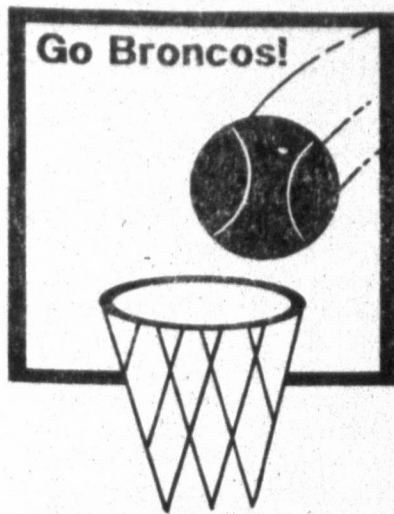

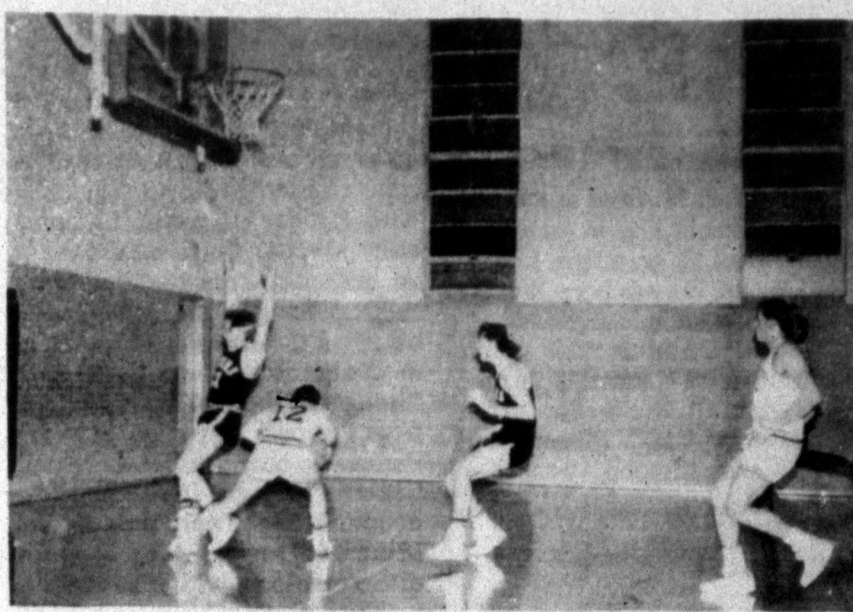

Boy Scout Saves Life

Robert Harrington wouldn't be alive today if it weren't for the fast actions of Peter Paul, a 16 year-old Eagle Scout who lives in Edinboro, Pa.

Paul was in Constantia Oct. 13 when Harrington, 34, of Bernhard's Bay, severed his jugular vein in a motorcycle accident.

Paul covered the wound with his bare hands. He controlled the bleeding until an ambulance arrived and a helicopter to take Harrington to the hospital.

He told the story to Staff Writer Amber Smith.

We have a house up there on Oncida Lake, in Constantia. My parents have had that place for 20 years. We went up there last weekend to fix a furnace.

We used to live there, and I was in a Boy Scout Troop. I talked to one of my friends, and he goes, "We're having a camp-o-ree this weekend." I said, "Can I come along?" Friday was when we left for the camp-o-ree.

We were just getting everything ready at Kurt's house (Kurt Schindler in the scout master of Troop 700.) My friend and I were in the car, waiting for him to get in the car so we could go.

He comes out and asks me, did I see the accident?

I had heard, like, a screeching noise and then a little thud. That happens sometime when someone forgets to take a turn, so it didn't cross my mind. I was so excited for the camp-out.

I got out of the car and went down the road a little bit. I saw the guy. I saw the car. I saw the motor-

cycle. He was over in someone's yard, about 50 feet from his bike.

Once I saw that, I knew he must be really hurt. He wasn't moving or anything like that.

He kind of had blood around his beard. He was kind of, like, groggy. He was in shock, is what it was.

I just applied direct pressure (with my hand) to his neck.

You could see where blood was coming out, between the clavicle and the jaw bone.

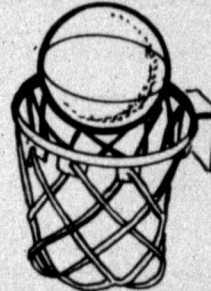
I took his pulse, to see how his heart was beating. It was real fast, and kind of weakish.

He kind of, like, grunted a little bit.

In scouts we were taught first aid. And then I'm also with the ski patrol here at Mount Pleasant. We learn to use whatever tools we have available.

My adrenaline took over. It was just happening, and then I forgot everything else. It was a reaction. It triggered a little switch in me. It just happened. Nothing else crossed my mind. You're more worried about the person than what's going on.

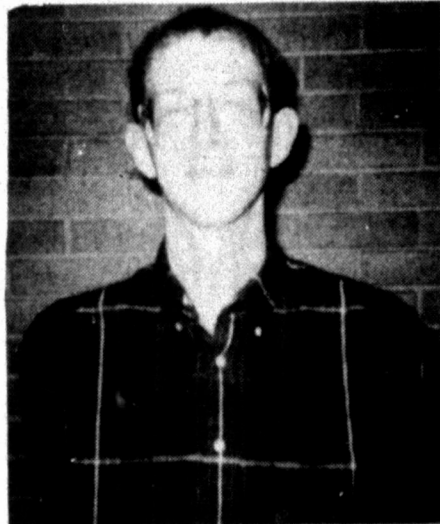

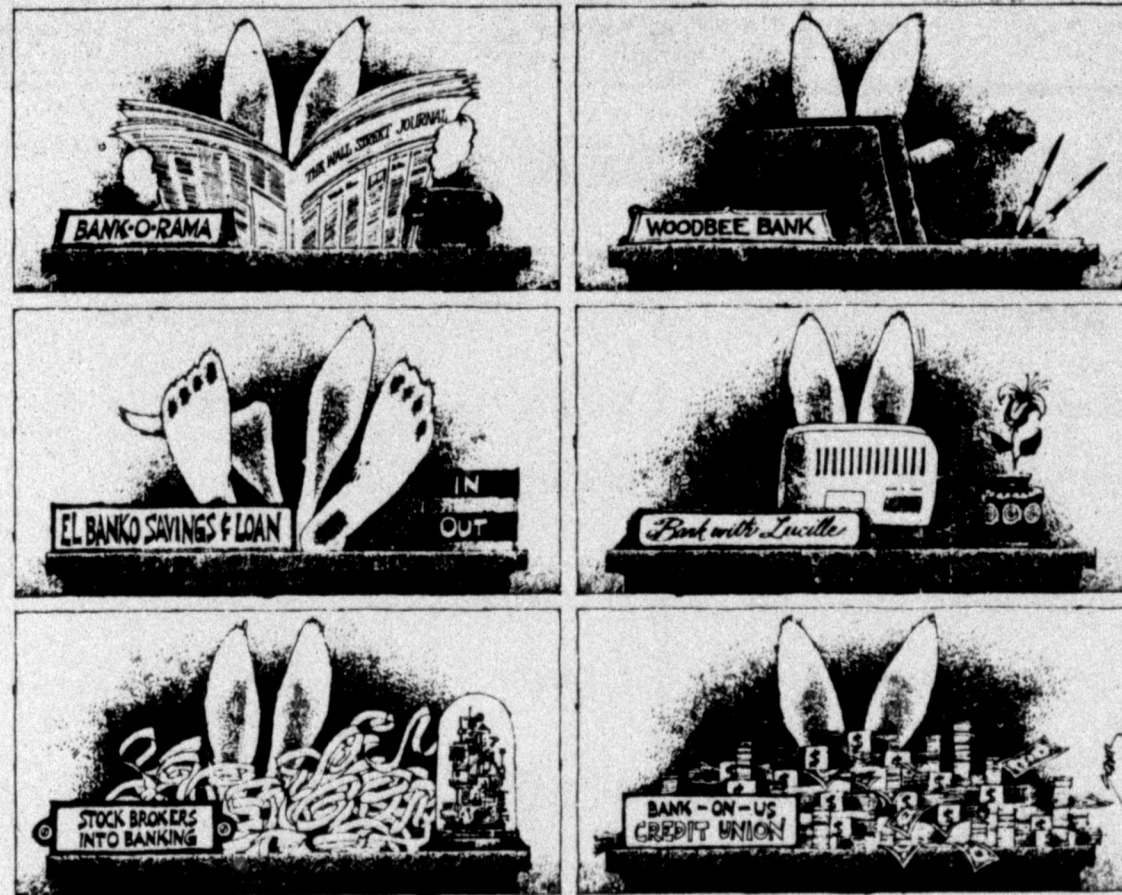

Blood Thinner Medicines

Blood thinners (also called anticoagulants) are powerful medicines that change the clotting properties of blood. They interfere with the formation of fibrin - a complex protein which makes up a part of clotted blood. Blood thinners are used in an attempt to reduce the adverse effects of blood clots associated with the development of heart attacks, strokes, and kidney disease. While blood thinners do not actually dissolve existing clots, they are valuable in preventing the formation of new clots. They also prevent existing clots from getting larger.

Heparin is a blood thinner medicine given to many hospitalized patients. It is given by injection. The most commonly prescribed oral blood thinner is warfarin.

When taking blood thinners, always follow the prescribed dosage schedule exactly. Contact your physician if doses are accidentally missed. Also let your physician know about other medicines you are taking, including over-the-counter medicines. Avoid aspirin and aspirin-containing products. Tell your doctor if you become pregnant. Report signs of bleeding such as frequent nose bleeds or black, tarry stools. Consume alcohol sparingly, or not at all.

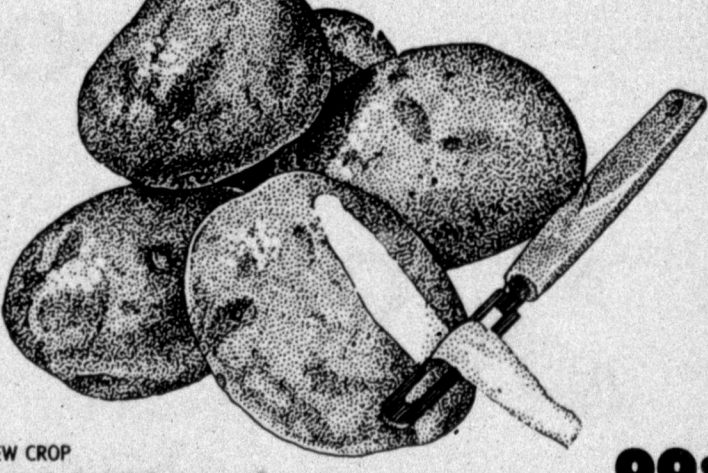

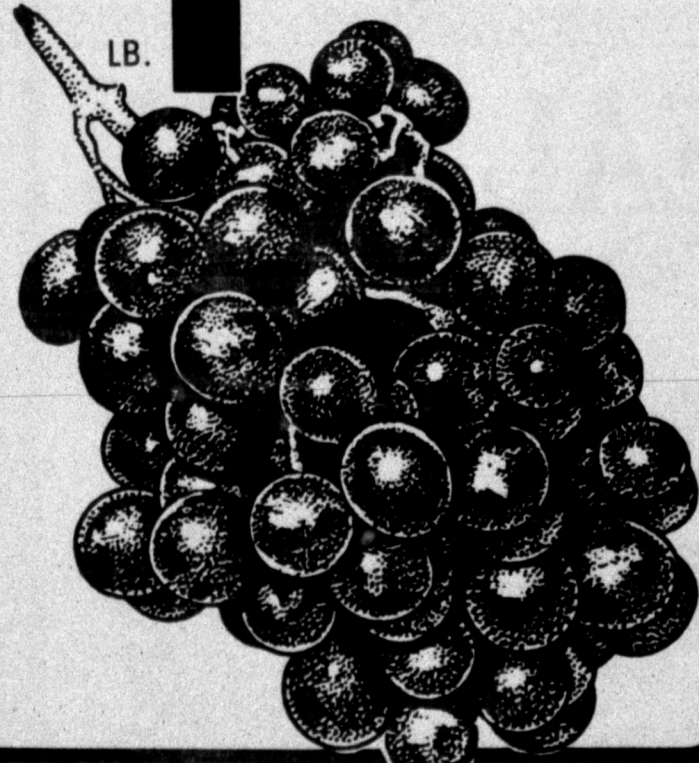

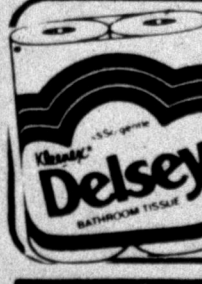

Close to 100 cotton producers and others interested in cotton are expected to attend the Cotton Production Seminar in Hedley, Tx. on Thursday, Jan. 18. The Seminar is sponsored by the Donley and Collingsworth Extension Service and will start at 10:00 a.m. at the Hedley Lions Club Bldg. Some of the areas to be addressed will be boll weevil control strategies, im-

proving cotton yields, pesticide safety, spray equipment adjustments and problems.

Lunch will be catered by "Sam Hill" Pit Bar-B-Q and will be sponsored by: Stamps Spraying Service, Inc., Memphis Compress Co., George Ferris Flying Service, Evans Fertilizer, First Bank & Trust, Paymaster Gin, Clarendon Gin, West Texas Gin, Security State Bank, and Donley County State Bank.

Cotton continues to be strong in the fiber market. During the past 14 years, cotton's market share of fiber use has increased from 33 percent to 49 percent.

A survey by Cotton Incorporated indicates that the cotton seal, featured on a wide variety of products made of at least 60 percent of U.S. upland cotton, is recognized by 73 percent of adult Americans. This makes it one of the most recognizable trademark symbols in the nation.

According to a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture report, the use of cotton modules as a temporary field storage of seed cotton continued to increase in most states in 1988-89. About 53 percent of the 1988 cotton crop was ginned from modules, while 51 percent of the 1987-88 crop and 45 percent of the 1986-87 crop was ginned from modules.

Instant Christianity?

We live in a terribly busy world these days, and manufacturers have done their part to help us by marketing a vast array of instant products.

Instant cocoa, instant pudding, instant tea, instant oatmeal--isn't it wonderful?!

Instant mashed potatoes, instant soup, minute rice--well, maybe "wonderful" is too strong a word.

Instant gravy, instant coffee--yuck! Not everything, it seems, lends itself to being "instant-ized."

How would you like to sit through the recital of an "instant pianist," one who decided thirty minutes ago that he might enjoy "tickling the ivories"?

Or, how about going to an "instant doctor," one who began his studies a month ago. After all, he's read two books on the subject now, and he uses his anatomy text for a pillow. Surely some of it has sunk in!

No, some things just don't "instantize" easily. But, as ridiculous as the idea of "instant brain surgeon" is, I can't help wondering if some of the problems of our society don't arise from expectations just as unrealistic as those of one who would expect to receive a medical degree in only a few months.

And that some people have such expectations should come as no great surprise. Many living today cannot remember a time without shelves full of instant products, or a time without fast-food restaurants on every corner. Many have never lived without television, that arch-proponent of the fast fix. On television, wars are fought and treaties signed, marriages are broken and mended, and society's

deepest problems are identified and resolved in an hour or less. Isn't that how life really is?

The upshot of all this is, I believe, that many are unwilling to commit themselves to any situation that requires long-term devotion to a course of study, person, or cause. Studies, relationships, societal problems are supposed to resolve themselves with a minimum of bother--instantly--like they do on television.

The problem spills over into the church: "I made a profession of faith. My name's in the book. The Lord never said I had to become a theologian." Instant Christianity? "I've been baptized." Instant Christianity--just add water.

"God doesn't expect us all to be theologians." I've said that myself. I was wrong. True, He does not call us all to be seminary professors, or authors of Bible commentaries, or preachers, or even Sunday School teachers. But the word "theologian" means "one well versed in theology." God does, indeed, expect this of us. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (II Timothy 2:15).

Instant Christianity? It doesn't sound much like it. Listen again as the Word speaks:

"Pray without ceasing" (I Thessalonians 5:17).

"If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Luke 9:23).

"No man, having put his hand to the plough, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62).

Instant Christianity? No. It comes down to this: Did you ever acquire a friendship instantly? You may have begun to like a person immediately upon meeting him, but the true friendship, the fellowship, the trust, was cultivated over a long period. Jesus is that "friend that sticketh closer than a brother" (Proverbs 18:24). I want no instant, casual relationship with the Savior. An old hymn says, "I walk and I talk with the King." It takes time. Lord, grant me that time! Amen!

"In Quest Of An Activity Center"

For many years, Clarendon College has been in need of a Student Activity Center. An Activity Center would benefit students, visitors, and community members alike and would be a focal point for recreation, relaxation, so-

cial gatherings, study groups, and casual as well as scheduled activities. It is extremely important in recruiting and retaining students.

Activity centers in Texas colleges traditionally accommodate snack bars, bookstores, banquet rooms, study and recreation areas, meeting rooms, and counseling services. The possibilities are endless. One suggestion for making our activity center unique has been the inclusion of an indoor activity arena. With the ever-increasing popularity of our Ranch and Feedlot Operations Program (which is currently housed in our men's dormitory due to a lack of space) and with the myriad of agriculturally related judging contests we host, this suggestion points out a very real deficiency in our efforts to respond to the needs of our rural community. An indoor arena could house roping events, livestock shows, livestock sales, dog shows, community events, a walking and jogging area, town meetings, or special events important to the College and to the community.

Obviously, we must be selective as to what will be included in the Activity Center. This decision will be made only after recommendations have been received from special ad hoc committees made up of students, faculty, administrators, ex-students, board members, business people, housewives, and other professionals.

In order to expedite a building program, we must have an effective plan to meet monetary obligations.

We are endeavoring to find matching dollars to build such a facility. We are talking to representatives of foundations, to individuals, and to groups who may have a specific interest in Clarendon College. If donors are not found, the Center will be financed with revenue bonds. This means that only money generated by student fees such as dormitory and activity fees will be pledged to the project. NO TAX DOLLARS will be spent and NO BOND ELECTION will be held.

We want to plan carefully and build wisely to nurture and continued growth in the 90's. We know that we must make every dollar

count. If you or someone you know is interested in donating to this worthy endeavor, please contact us. Clarendon College needs a Student Activity Center to remediate a glaring inadequacy in our support services and facilities. Your help and support is vital to the realization of this project.

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
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


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
