#### Thornberry votes for rural health funds

WASHINGTON, D.C. - US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) voted last week for legislation that will provide rural hospitals, nursing homes, home health care agencies, and other key providers with more than \$35 bil-

Thornberry said that the relief money is in response to the way the 1997 Balanced Budget Act was implemented. It contained broad guidelines that agencies filled in with specific regulations.

According to a press release, the regulations squeezed far more money out of payments to hospitals, home health care agencies, and other providers than was ever expected or intended.

Efforts for relief were included earlier this year in legislation passed by the House of Representatives on October 26, but the Senate failed to act on the measure.

"I'm glad to see this bill pass," Thornberry said. "It got caught up earlier in election-year politics, but I'm glad we were able to put all that behind us and get this package

'While it's not everything everybody wanted, it will be a boost for rural communities and something that should help a lot of hospitals, nursing homes, and other health care providers as we head into next year."

The legislation, which was included as part of the FY 2001 Appropriations for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies, passed the House by a vote of 292 to 60. # US should keep Electoral College

Well, thank goodness! We can now say with finality that Gov. George W. Bush of Texas will be the next president of the United States of America. It was a long time in coming, but with the vote of the Electoral College on Monday the last nail was driven into the coffin of the Gore 2000 campaign.

The vice president gave a pretty good speech last Wednesday. I actually thought he was going to cry at the beginning. I can't say that I blame him. I probably would have been emotional in his place, too.

President-elect Bush also gave a good talk in the chambers of the Texas House of Representatives. With the state's highest Democratic office holder, Speaker Pete Laney, introducing him, our nation saw the respect Bush has earned from the people of Texas. I also took particular pride in the camera angles that showed former Texas President Sam Houston looking over Bush's shoulder. Somewhere the old general -who was once talked about for the American presidency - must be smiling upon seeing a Texan ascend to the nation's highest office.

It is a good day for Texas, especially in light of the way the national Democrats have maligned our great state and portrayed it as a third world country during the

There are still some folks - most notably Jesse "Loud-mouth" Jackson - who will never see Bush as a legitimate president, thanks to the fiasco in Florida. That's an irritation to those of us who support the Texan. But I suppose I can't be too critical of Jackson. If Gore had won with dimpled chads, I personally would have ádvocated secession. (Now, I would be happy to let Florida secede if they promise to take Jackson with them.)

We've learned many things over the course of all this election mess. For one thing, we've learned that the Texas Capitol looks great on television. It's a magnificent structure, and it seems as though every major news network used it as the backdrop for their reports.

We've also learned that the interior of the Florida state house looks horrible on television. That blue carpet and those apparently Formica desktops... Egad! And the place doesn't look any bigger than a nice sized living room. It was another high point for the Lone Star State when Bush made his address and showed what a first rate House chamber looks like.

And we've also learned about the Constitutional process for electing a president. People who couldn't even spell "Electoral College" two months ago are now experts on whether the thing should be kept, modified, or scrapped. You can put me in the first category. Keep it. Don't mess with it, don't modify it, and don't "fix" it

Now, I know what you Democrats are saying. "Well, that's easy for him to say. His guy got elected without the popular vote thanks to that darn thing.'

Unfortunately for you, I'm on record six years ago as being in favor of the Electoral College. I wrote a paper in graduate school that argued on behalf of the College. (Not an easy position to take when there wasn't much "scholarly" material to support such a stance and when facing a liberal professor who hadn't purchased a new suit since the Kennedy administration.) I also would have been just as quick to defend the College if the situation had been reversed. I wouldn't have been happy, mind you, but I would have defended it nonetheless.

What has been shown with great clarity since the election is how the smaller states depend on the Electoral College to have any voice at all in the vote for president. Just look at the map of states each candidate won. It looks like a Bush landslide, but because Gore captured New England, California, and – for some reason – New Mexico, he very nearly came out on top.

But what isn't talked much about - if at all - is the role of the Electoral College in our constitutional union. Article IV, Section 4, of the United States Constitution guarantees to the states "a Republican Form of Government." That just knocks out every argument on behalf of "democracy" that the enemies of the College like to make. We don't live in a democracy, as I have stated many times. We live in a republic, a system where the people are ultimately sovereign, but where they do not directly run the government.

The federal government was established by the states, and originally, the states themselves had direct representation at the federal level. The members of the House of Representatives were elected by the people, and Senators were appointed by the legislatures of the several states. That was changed - mistakenly I believe - by the adoption of the 17th Amendment, which provided for the direct, popular election of Senators.

Today, the Electoral College is really the only way in which states have a direct role in the federal government. Each state chooses its Electors in a manner prescribed by that state's legislature. The Electors then choose the president. It is a lesson in federalism and a reminder that the states created the federal government, not the other

Doing away with the Electoral College and replacing it with a national presidential election would have the effect of relegating 50 sovereign states to the status of 50 federal districts. It would trample on the rights of the states to conduct their own elections and undermine our

republican form of government. Yes, our Electoral College is an antiquated system from the 18th century. But so is our Constitution, so is the Bill of Rights, and so is the Declaration of Independence. The principles and thoughts this nation is founded upon are very old indeed. They are ideals that have stood the test of time. There is nothing better with which to replace them. Let us not be drawn to the populists' Siren song of "democracy" - not when republicanism has served us so well for more than two centuries.

#### **Unemployment** tax rates drop for Texans

AUSTIN - Texas employers are receiving Unemployment Insurance tax rate notices in the mail this month, and the news is good - the rate is going down.

The 2001 average tax rate that the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) will assess employers is 0.94 percent, down from 1.02 percent in 2000. The rate reduction results from fewer UI benefits payments in 2000 than in 1999.

Further, the amount of UI benefits paid but not charged to particular employer declined from 1999 to

The average experience tax rate for 2001 also has dropped - to 0.75 percent from 0.85 percent in 2000. The experience tax rate is based on benefits paid to former employees and charges to the employer's account. These charges are called chargebacks.

TWC administers UI taxes and benefits under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act. Qualifying claimants who are terminated from their jobs through no fault of their own receive weekly payments that are a portion of their salary for a specified period of time.

In the meantime, recipients are required to actively seek re-employment. Benefits expire when the claimant re-enters suitable employment or when the specified payment period lapses, whichever occurs first.






