# Homeland Security first step in US defense

Recently, we celebrated Veterans Day - a day that honors our nation's many military veterans. It is on this day that we as a nation are to reflect upon the personal sacrifice and courage of those involved over the years in the struggle to protect our liberty. 

# City - county alliances aren't always ideal


Kudos to local fireman Patrick Robertson, who finally said what really needed to be said. (See story on page one.) Was it courage that led Robertson to make that emphatic statement to the mayor and board of aldermen? Or was he simply fed up with what one friend of mine calls "more typical D.C." - a localized synonym for what most Texans call B.S. In any case, Robertson did not just hit the nail on the head - he drove it clean through the board.

"Donley County is the damnedest place I've ever seen," Robertson said. "The county doesn't want to do anything that might benefit the city, and the city doesn't want to do anything that might help the county. But 85 percent of county residents live in the city!"

I'm not sure about his math, but the sentiment is 100 percent accurate. I've attended a lot of meetings of both the city aldermen and the county commissioners over the last six years, and each always seems to think the other isn't paying its fair share of something. This most recent deal with the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department is just one example. Earlier this year county commissioners were wondering how much "county" time Justice of the Peace Jimmy Johnson spent on "municipal" court duties. Last year, it was the city saying the "county" was not paying enough for the municipal "airport."

There seems to be a lot of overlap or of co-mingling of funds where local services are concerned. The fact of the matter is that often times one entity ought to be the responsible party. I suppose the thought is that by combining the resources of local governments things can be done more economically. But is it really more economical? Don't all of us - the taxpayers - end up paying for it one way or another? And don't most of us live in the city anyway?

Case in point: Up until two years ago our local ambulance service was run by a hodgepodge board created by the city, the county, and the hospital district. Each entity contributed funds to the service, and each one had a say in running the thing. Logic says that the hospital district - under whose authority the ambulance service was created anyway - should really have sole control and



responsibility for the service. After all, it is a medical service. But it took literally years before the hospital board realized that fact and finally took over that whole responsibility

Look at the city and county today. The county gives the city approximately \$28,000 per year for the operation of the city-county library. It originally was a "city" library, but somewhere along the lines somebody said, "Hey, let's join forces." Now we have a situation where everything the librarian wants to do has to be cleared by both the board of aldermen and the commissioners' court. I don't envy Mrs. Blackerby's situation there.

The county also pays \$500 per year to the "municipal" airport, and the "Clarendon" fire department says it gets \$16,999.92 per year from the county in monthly installments of \$1,416.66 each. Then the county turns around and charges the city \$100,000 a year for police protection through the sheriff's department. That money doesn't go to the sheriff's office or to deputies' salaries; it just goes in the county's general fund.

None of this makes much sense. Why not just reduce the police protection contract to \$54,500 annually and let the city take care of and provide funds for "city" functions? If rural fires are sticking in the craw of the city fathers, set up a nominal fee to charge the county for each rural fire. But don't cut off training for firemen just to make a statement. That's shortsighted.

The reality of the situation is we are all in this together. Yes, county residents enjoy some benefits at the expense of city taxpayers. They drive on city streets and enjoy the security of our streetlights when they are in town. They may even enjoy a picnic at City Park. But county residents also pay taxes for things such as county offices, healthcare facilities, schools, and the college, which are all located right here in the county seat.


When it makes sense - such as one central trash facility or police protection - the city and county should join forces to provide an improved service for all citizens. Another thing that makes sense is a contract having the justice of the peace serve as municipal judge.

Some functions, however, should remain separate.

Clarendon is the county seat; and as such, it will always enjoy more convenient county services than rural residents by the simple fact that county offices are right here in town. But if Clarendon wants to be a progressive, growing city, it must provide municipal services to its citizens and visitors - services including good city streets, a city library, a municipal airport, and a city park to name a few. And it must do so without whining whenever someone from outside the city limits briefly enjoys those amenities.

### And one more thing...

The city fathers are right in one respect, though: County residents really should have the courtesy to use the county dump rather than fill up a city resident's or businessman's trash bin. It's just not neighborly to stuff another man's Dumpster.



# Reduce junk mail to help cut back on trash

For the past nine years, the State of Texas has used November 15, Texas Recycles Day, to acknowledge the many efforts being made across the state to reduce the amount of trash going into the state's landfills. Recycling and waste reduction programs are alive and well in the Texas Panhandle. In recent years, they have begun to make a noticeable contribution to the waste reduction goals of the Panhandle communities that support them.

This year, as part of its annual Panhandle Environmental Partnership Award Program, the PRPC is recognizing two Panhandle communities that have proven to be top-achievers in the arena of waste reduction. During the past 12 months, residents of City of Canadian topped all other Panhandle communities by recycling on the average 259 pounds of trash per person. As a result of their city-wide yard waste diversion program, the City of Dalhart was able to prevent 332 pounds of grass and wood waste per capita from going into its landfill.

Texas Recycles Day is not just an annual event. It is a day to recognize and promote efforts that should be ongoing year-round. Surveys have indicated that over 85 percent of Texans support the concept of recycling. Yet the percentage of people that actually recycle on regular basis is considerably less. Some people may think their lives are simply too fastpaced to take the time to recycle. However, with a little bit of effort, even busy people can make a significant yet painless cut in the amount of trash they generate. They can start by reducing the amount of junk mail they receive. So often, that mail gets

thrown away unopened anyway. Here are a number of things that everyone can do to lighten their load on their mail carriers, garbage haulers, and maybe even their own even if they have to do so by mail. pocketbooks. · Send a letter requesting that your


### War continues

The Broncos fought hard but couldn't get things rolling against the good 4A team. The Broncos had three players in double figures and their free throw shooting percentage was good at 55.


Coach Wade Callaway in his first year at the helm of the Broncos is optimistic about his team's ability despite the loss to Dumas.
