Tax Delinquents

Listed

The Donley County Tax Appraisal District has released its annual report on delinquent taxes. There are \$122,052.63 in delinquent taxes for 1991, and \$284,599.62 from previous years. These also add up to \$406,652.25 in back taxes. Penalties and interest would generate an additional \$233,317.82. If all of this money were collected, area taxing entities would have \$639,970.07 in revenue that is owed, but not paid.

Virtually every area entity is short-changed by tax evaders. The City of Clarendon is owed over \$45,878. Hedley has \$2,621 in taxes not paid. The Clarendon Schools should have \$154,930 more than they now have and Hedley Schools' figure is \$24,097. The County should have an additional \$82,968. Taxpayers owe the hospital district \$49,757 and the college district

Some taxpayers think that they can get away with not paying their taxes, but that is a form of selfdeception. All taxes will eventually be collected, and delinquents may sometimes pay more in penalties than the initial tax bill. No real property can be sold with a clear title until someone pays the taxes. And the State of Texas has provided serious penalties for habitual shirkers. Many of the accounts have a notation, "plus court costs." Back taxes may also damage a person's credit rating.

Although one would expect that many of those who owe back taxes would be poor and elderly, but from the list, that does not appear to be the case. In fact, many of the overdue accounts are owed by prominent citizens.

The top ten accounts on the tax books total \$148,188.15 and range from \$35,461.97 to \$7,028.45.

The delinquent tax report-and most tax records--are matters of public record. As such, these records are available inspection by anyone who is interested. In fact, some places publish their delinquent tax records in the newspaper, (although neither the Appraisal District nor the paper is ready to resort to that at this time.)



Escapee Captured

The Donley County Sheriff's Department recaptured an escapee just after midnight Tuesday morning near Giles. The prisoner, Donald Ray Green, 30, had escaped from the Hall County jail September 9. He was being held on charges unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Law Officers Active in August

Area law enforcement officers had their hands full in August. There were 11 cases of driving while intoxicated and seven cases of public intoxication. Two probations were revoked. There were three instances of disorderly conduct. Two brothers were taken into custody for burglary of a building, once of whom was re- arrested for a second time some ten days after the first burglary. Seven young men were arrested in the course of the month for criminal trespass. Two were arraigned on charges of attempted murder and two on unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. There was one arrest for felony theft, one for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, one case of indecent exposure, once charge of possession of a controlled substance and one case of assault on an officer.

Altogether there were 42 arrests. There were 207 prisoner days-in-jail. Nine accidents had to be investigated and deputies served 12 papers. There were seven fire calls, 36 ambulance calls and 16 traffic tickets.



Dizziness and Vertigo Affect Millions

Many individuals believe that dizziness and vertigo are the same problem, or that dizziness is a mild form of vertigo. Actually, these are similar but different conditions. Together, dizziness and vertigo affect about 20 million Americans.

Public Notice

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$445 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$5 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the



NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the states constitution. Under prior statutes (S.B. 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,760.45 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statue (S.B. 351) that same rate now provides \$4,704.08 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.7802 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The following article was written in the 1940's by Laura V. Hamner and published in the Amarillo newspaper.

Talks to Teens of yesterday, today & tomorrow

By Laura V. Hamner

Dear Teens of All Ages:

These are busy days for me. Absorbing, exhausting days. I am finishing a book or am struggling to finish it. Just as I feel that my task is about done, up bobs a meeting that I must attend - or some other interruption. Last week I flew to Dallas on Tuesday, to Jackson, Miss., on Wednesday home on Saturday and again at work on that book. Some day, some welcome day, I shall sit back, read that book, and wish I had written it differently. Writers are never satisfied

Ruby Cook, of McLean, has done me a great favor. She wrote this story for my column: Mrs. Felix Jones, owner and operator of Kate's Cafe on McLean's Main Street, this week was elected McLean's Mother of the Year. This is indeed an honor since Mrs. Jones has no children of her own, and doubly an honor, since it was really the children of the town who elected her. And youngsters, you know, have a pretty good first hand information about what it takes to make a "mother".

Kate's Cafe might well be called Teen's Canteen. Probably a hundred boys daily come to the cafe, sometimes to talk to Kate, sometimes to buy a candy bar, or perhaps one comes because of sheer loneliness, because he has no other place to go and he knows he's welcome

What do these kids like about Kate that made them work to give her the highest honor it was possible for them to give her? Kate likes them-and they know it. It is doubtful if any five people in McLean have given as much time to young boys as has Mrs. Jones. Time is the most precious commodity that can be given a boy. And so few people have time to give to children - even their own. Kate always has time for them, time to listen to their problems, time to listen to their stories, time to dicker about which penny candy bar is better to buy, time to serve a glass of water-with no other order-to wipe off the counter where the glass had left a wet ring, to wash the glass and put it away, and with never a chirp of disgruntlement.

A really hungry boy can always get a candy bar, a dish of ice cream, or a hamburger at Kate's even though he has no money. She keeps no books on these credit accounts, but declares the boys always pay. Many a boy has put his arms around Kate's shoulders and expressed his appreciation. "I just love you, Kate," he often says.

The boys are considerate of Kate's busy hours, too. They never congregate when she has customers and is serving meals. But when there is a lull between meals, Kate's Cafe becomes "home" to the boys, a place to loll and talk. What do these kids like about Kate that made them work to give her the highest honor

becomes "home" to the boys, a place to loll and talk.

On many occasions when it is time to close the cafe for the night but the room is filled

with teen-age boys, boys who have no place to go, boys who need companionship and are finding it in the cafe, Kate locks the outside door, admits no more customers, but stays on perhaps an hour or an hour-and-a-half, to let the boys talk themselves out.

Another qualification that Kate has as a "mother" is the fact that the cafe and the

money she makes from it are not the most important part of her life. Many a time, Kate Jones

has locked the door of the cafe and gone to sit up with a sick child.


Almost any afternoon when there are no customers, Kate will be found in a small room off the cafe where she keeps her sewing machine - making a dress for some little girl.

Teenagers and sub-teens are not the only people Mrs. Jones mothers. Any stranger, without funds, can get a meal at Kate's Cafe. Those out of work and down on their luck can also establish credit until luck turns for them. Oil men who come into town use the cafe as a

relaxing place, while enjoying a cup of coffee or a plate of flapjacks.

Oldsters go to Kate, too, for the same reason teenagers go there. John Sublett, a beloved resident of the town, said of Kate, "Well, Kate mothers me, and I am 82."

I wish I knew Kate. I wish I was as kind and useful a woman as Kate is. Each of us should learn a lesson from her life.



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
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

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 8 proposes constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass laws to authorize the State of Texas to operate lotteries and to enter into a contract with one or more legal entities that will operate lotteries on behalf of the State of Texas.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the total amount of bonds that may be issued by the Texas Water Development Board to provide wholesale and retail water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. The proposed amendment increases the maximum principal amount of the bonds from 20 percent to 50 percent of the \$500 million amount authorized by article III, section 49-d-7, of the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment would increase the maximum aggregate dollar amount of bonds that the Texas Water Development Board could issue from \$100 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass eneral laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educa-tion loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interests.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

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

OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 5, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 114 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize home rule cities having a population of 5,000 or fewer inhabitants to amend their city charters by a majority vote of a city's qualified voters at an election held for that purpose. The amendment makes clear that home rule cities that have declined in population below the population required to initially adopt a charter may nevertheless continue to amend their charters.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to Texas Depar Transportation to expend money, from any source available, for the costs of the turnpikes, toll roads, or toll bridges of the Texas Turnpike Authority, provided that any monies expended from the state highway fund shall be repaid to the fund from tolls or other turnpike rev-

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Land Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board, the purchase of lands, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such moneys would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment would also authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board for the benefit of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund, the making of home mortgage loans, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such moneys would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment gives the legislature power to implement the amendment and to delegate such duties and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it deems necessary.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the invest-ment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of a maximum of \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the bonds are to be used to acquire, construct, or equip new prisons and substance use felony punishment facilities, mtal health and mental retarda-

tion institutions, and youth corrections institutions, to repair and renovate existing facilities of those institutions and to acquire, repair, or renovate other facilities for use as state prisons or substance abuse felony punishment facilities. The \$1.1 billion is in addition to the \$900 million currently authorized by the constitution to be expended on bond issues for facilities of correctional and mental health and mental retardation institutions. The bonds would constitute a general obligation of the state. The bonds and interest on the bonds would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in a sinking fund at the end of the preceding fiscal year that is pledged to payment of the bonds

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment fa-

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow a county, junior college district, or municipality to exempt tangible personal property from ad valorem taxation if: (1) the property is acquired or brought into the state in an enterprise zone to be forwarded outside the state, (2) the property is assembled. stored, repaired, maintained, manufactured, processed, or fabricated in the enterprise zone, (3) the property is transported outside the state not later than 175 days after being acquired or brought into an enterprize zone, and (4) the person who acquired or brought the property into an enterprise zone is a qualified business. A county, junior college district, or municipality may exempt such property by entering into a written agreement with a qualified business that states the duration of the exemption and the terms on which the exemption is granted. Any action to exempt property must be taken before April 1 of the first year in which the property would otherwise be taxed. The term "enterprize zone" means an area that (1) has been designated as such by a state agency responsible for economic development, and (2) has pervasive poverty, unemployment, and economic distress. The term "qualified business" means a business that meets the qualification established by general law. and requires that the qualified business is actively engaged in a new business in the enterprize zone or is expanding a business that is already active in the enterprise zone. An enterprise zone is created to foster economic develop-ment in an area of pervasive pov-erty and unemployment.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the exemption for ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would establish a Texas Ethics Commission with the powers and duties provided by law. The commission would consist of eight appointed members selected as follows: two members of different political parties appointed by the governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house of representatives from each major political party; two

from each major political party; two members of different political parties appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house from each major political party; and two members of different political parties appointed by the lieutenant governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the senate from each major political party. A major political party is a political party required by law to hold a primary. With the exception of the initial appointees, commission members would serve for four-year terms. A member who has served for one term and any part of a second term would not be eligible for reappointment. The commission would authorized to recommend the salary of the members of the legislature and may recommend that the salary of the speaker of the house of representatives and the lieutenant governor be set at an amount higher than that of other members. If the commission recommends a change in salary, the voters would be authorized to accept or reject the salary change at the next general election for state and county officers. If the voters approve the recommended salary, that salary would take effect January 1 of the next odd-numbered year; if the voters reject the recommended salary, no change in salary would occur. The commission would set the per diem of the members of the legislature and of the lieutenant governor. The per diem could be raised or lowered biennially as necessary to pay members' costs, but could not exceed the amount allowed as of January 1 that year as a federal income tax deduction for living expenses incurred in a legislative day in connection with a member's business as a legislator, disregarding any federal income tax exception for legislators residing near the Capitol. The commission would have other powers and duties provided by the commission's enabling act (Senate Bill 1, 72nd Legislature, Regular Session). The amendment would also provide that an increase in the emoluments of the office of Lieutenant Governor would not make a legislator ineligible to serve in the office of Lieutenant Governor.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Ethics Commission and authorizing the commission to recommend the salary for members of the legislature and the lieutenant governor, subject to voter approval, and to set the per diem for those officials, subject to a limit."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the board of trustees of each statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in such manner as the board considers prudent. The board would no longer be limited to investing the funds of the system in securities.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the board of trustees of a statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in a manner that the board considers prudent."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 prooses a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to create debt by or on behalf of the state if the legislature submitted the debt question to the voters of the state in the form of a proposition and a majority of those voting approved the proposition. The legis-lature may call the election, by joint resolution approved by at least two-thirds of the members of each house, during any regular session or during any special session if the subject of the proposition is included in the Governor's proclamation for that special session. A proposition must clearly describe the amount and purpose for which debt is to be created and must describe the source of payment for the debt. The amount of debt stated in the proposition may

The legislature may enact laws necessary to implement the authority granted by a proposition. A law en-acted in anticipation of the election on a proposition is valid if, by its terms, it is enacted subject to approval of the related proposition. State debt that is created following voter approval of a proposition and that is approved by the Attorney General is incontestable for any The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature." PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 prooses a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land for which there is not a valid transfer of title from either the State or the Republic of Texas to a private party. A patent is a document of title issued by the state. On application to the School Land Board, a person is entitled to receive a patent if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school fund land, (2) the land was not patentable under the law before the adoption of this proposed amendment, (3) the person acquired the land without knowledge of the title defect out of the State of Texas or the Republic of Texas and held the land under color of title, the chain of which dates from at least January 1, 1941, (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, has claimed the land for at least fifty years as of January 1, 1991. and (5) the person, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, for at least 50 years has paid taxes on the land together with all interest and penalties associated with any delin-quency. If the applicant is denied a patent, the applicant may file suit against the School Land Board in a district court in the county where the land is located within 60 days from the date of denial. The proposed amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands, and may not be used to resolve a boundary dispute. The proposed amendment also does not apply to land found by a court to be state-owned or to land on which the state has given a mineral lesse that is in

effect when a patent is sought. A patent under this proposed amendment for land within five miles of mineral production shall reserve minerals to the state in the manner provided by law for reservations of minerals in sales to claimants of unsurveyed school land within five miles of production. An application for a patent under this proposed amendment must be filed with the School Land Board before January

This proposed constitutional amendment is similar to the version of article VII. section 4A, that was in effect between 1981 and 1990. The main difference is that under the earlier version the applicant for a patent to land had to have a chain of title that dated back to at least as early as January 1, 1932.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 pro-oses a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws to exempt proper-ty owned by a nonprofit corporation organized to supply water or provide wastewater service from ad valorem taxation. A nonprofit cor-poration would be eligible for the exemption if its bylaws provide that Misc.
