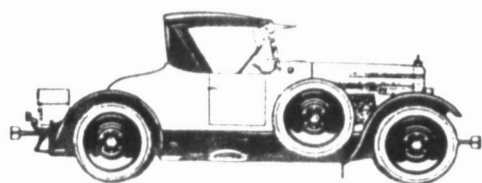

Train Misses Car on Ayers Street

According to a witness, Clarendon nearly had another automobile-train collision on Ayers Street. The near-miss occurred at the site of two other recent tragedies.

Late in the afternoon of June 7, Connie Dromgoole watched as a small, dark sports car approached the tracks from the north, slowed down, then crossed in front of a westbound mixed freight train. Apparently the driver did not see the approaching locomotives.

The train missed the car by roughly two feet.

Rick Hayes, son of James and Kay Hayes, was seriously injured in a collision at the same intersection on July 5, 1991. Althea Shaller died from injuries in a wreck at the same spot on October 31, 1988.

The Federal Railroad Signal Administration turned down funding requests to place signals at the intersection in 1988, 1989 and 1990. Finally, in early 1991, after considerable public protest, the Railroad Signal Administration finally approved funding for crossing signals on Ayers Street. The Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation then filled out the necessary papers and passed the project on to the Burlington Northern Railroad.

In late July, 1991, Burlington Northern offices in Fort Worth estimated that the signals should be in place in about a year. That estimate should be fairly accurate. Railroad officials in Wichita Falls report that all of the necessary equipment has been ordered for some time, and that it is beginning to arrive at the railroad. Construction is expected to begin fairly soon.

Whether or not there are signals at the intersection, every driver should regard every crossing as a dangerous area. Complacency kills.

Commodities will be distributed on June 18, 1992, from 9:00 a.m. until 12 noon in the Panhandle Community Services office located in the Donley County Courthouse.

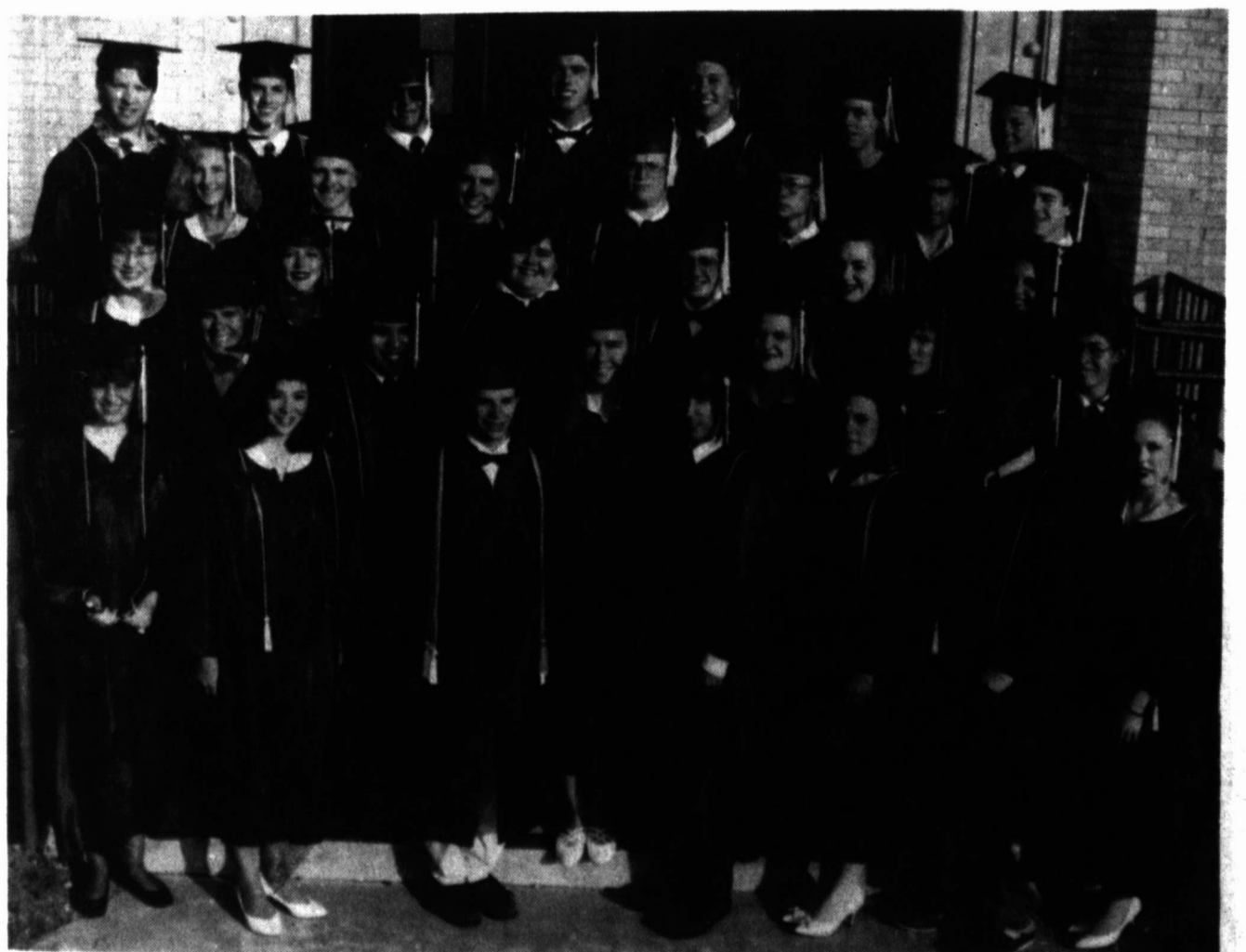
Commodities will be distributed on June 18, 1992, from 1:30 p.m. until 2:30 p.m. in the Hedley Senior Citizens Building in Hedley.

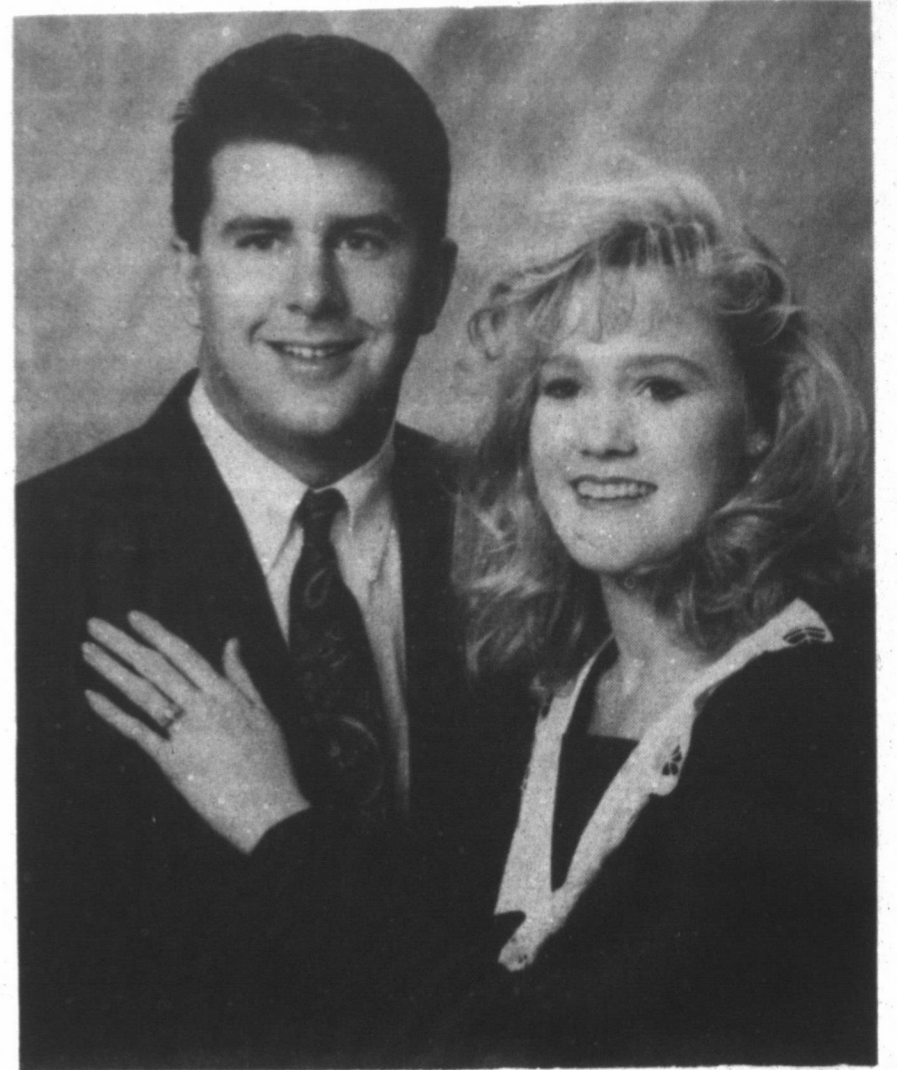

Dosing Errors With Children's Medicines

According to the National Council on Patient Information and Education, almost half of American children do not take their medicines as prescribed, even when the conditions being treated are serious. Many medication errors are caused by parents. One of the most recent warnings issued to parents comes from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The warning has to do with possible overdosing of children who are taking nonprescription liquid medicines for cough, cold, or flu symptoms.

The warning is based on instances in which parents misread the measuring cups provided by manufacturers, or they misread directions on the product label. In one case, a child received three times the recommended dose of acetaminophen, a popular fever-reducer medicine. The parents measured 2 tablespoonfuls instead of 2 teaspoonfuls. The cup did not have a 2 teaspoonful marking.

According to a recent issue of *Pharmacy Times*, no serious injuries have occurred with nonprescription liquid medicines. However, two companies have pulled liquid products with dosing cups off the market voluntarily.

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Clarendon Will Be a Pit Stop

Celebrating its 10th Anniversary The Interstate Batteries Great American Race, world's greatest old car race, will make a pit stop Monday, June 29 at 4:25 PM at the Donley County Courthouse in Clarendon, TX. The Clarendon event is part of an internationally recognized 4,475 mile, 2 week, 9 state, and 48 city coast to coast dash paying a \$250,000 purse, antique car racing's largest.

The race starts Sunday afternoon, June 21st on King street in Historic Charleston and finishes Saturday, July 4th at Costa Mesa, CA (in the LA basin) according to Tom McRae, Executive Director of race organizer Greatrace, Ltd., of Dallas, TX.

The Clarendon Merchants Association in Clarendon is organizing the event. Up to 100 beautiful antique autos will spend 15 minutes each there before hitting the road again bound for an overnight stop in Amarillo. The greatest show on wheels will be enroute from Irving, Decatur and Wichita Falls as it reaches Clarendon.

There is no charge to the public nor are any passes of any kind required to see this colossal congress of classic cars. This History of the Highway collection is valued at more than \$7 million and encourages the public to view it up close and personal.

Up to 100 antique cars-dating from 1910 to 1941-bailing from 29 states and 6 countries will each make a 15 minute stop for refreshments. The field has an estimated \$7 million value with one car more outstanding than the next.

Since competitors race one minute apart it will take them at least an hour and 40 minutes to arrive in Clarendon once the first car reaches town. A definite time for the stop will be published in the near future. When it reaches Clarendon, the colorful old car caravan will be in the ninth day of its 4,475 mile transcontinental journey.

Each day's race stage covers 170 to 480 miles. For example, the stage from Irving to Amarillo is 420 racing miles. The race normally runs on back roads & two lane highways to avoid Interstates. A the fist racer enters Clarendon the last will still be 71 miles distant. The cars compete a minute apart forming a colorful caravan that's greeted by civic celebrations in 48 cities, at roadsides and in small towns where it doesn't stop.

The Greatrace is a gruelling contest of precision driving, controlled speed and endurance. Teams try to match detailed driving instructions timed to within 1/100th of a second. Each second off schedule at secret daily checkpoints is a penalty point. At the end of the day, low score wins.

Simple in concept, the format is difficult enough to master alone, yet entrants must spend a great deal of time keeping the ancient anachronisms in good repair. The onerous nature of the endurance phase of the Greatrace inspired a motto sooner of later spoken by all-"To Finish Is To Win".

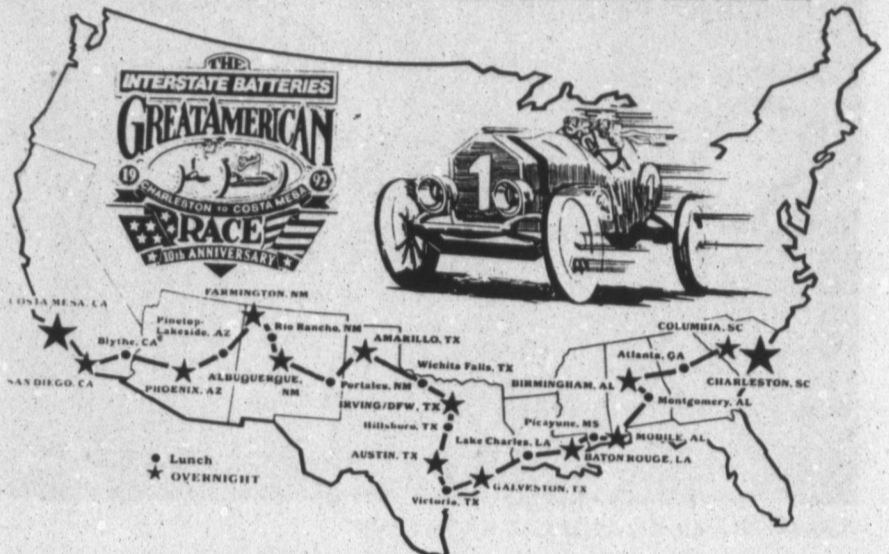
Awareness Sessions Held

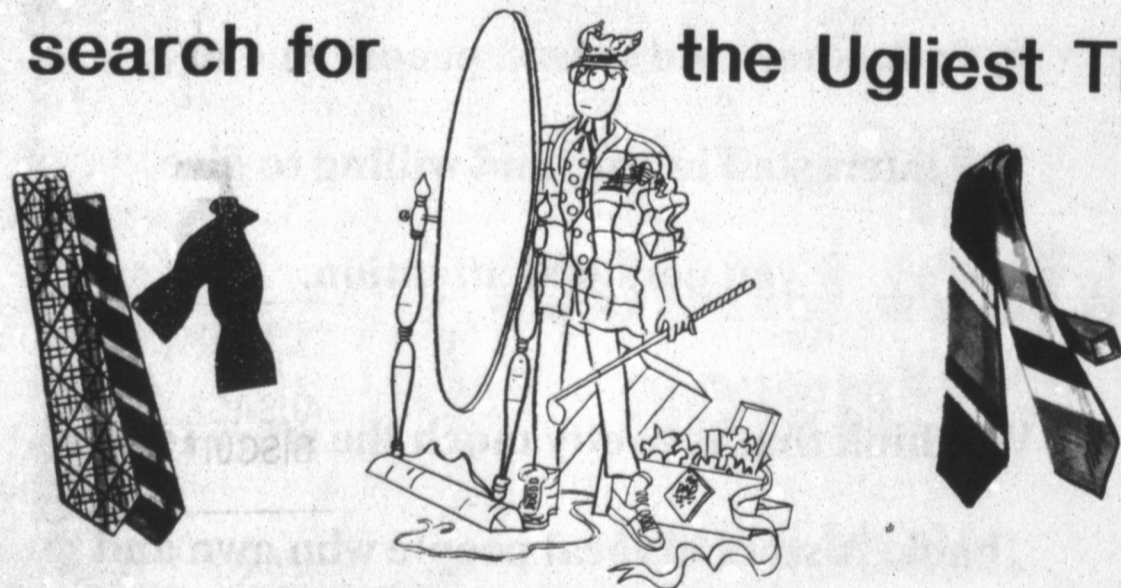

Getting More For Your 29C

Have you ever thought about traveling from here to Florida or California or maybe Chicago or New York City? or maybe just Amarillo or Childress or Lubbock? If you have, you've probably also thought about the expense involved in getting there. Whether you go by plane or bus or just drive in the family car, it costs money to travel...anywhere.

Then, there's the telephone. There are some real savings in long distance service right now. But, as you well know, a lengthy long distance call can run into several dollars in phone bills before you realize it.

Which brings me to my point. Have you ever thought of the bargain you're getting when you buy a 29C postage stamp? "What Bargain?" you ask. "I can remember when stamps were 3C (or 6C or 8C, depending on how old you want to admit being)." Consider this. A 29C stamp will carry a one ounce letter from Seattle to Miami. From Bangor to San Diego. Also, if Aunt Minnie has moved from Atlanta to Tucson to Buffalo to Walla Walla, 29C will still deliver the letter to her.

The Postal Service is undergoing some major changes. All mail was once worked by hand. Then along came the "Letter Sorting Machine", with a seventeen person crew this machine could work an amazing 30,000 letters an hour. Modern technology has developed an optical character reader (OCR) that will read the address, look up the 9-digit zip code, they spray a bar code on the letter. It can do this as many as nine times a second or up to 37,000 letters an hour with only two people! Letters worked by hand cost over \$100 per thousand to process. Letters processed by the OCR cost less than \$50 per thousand.

My next point is this. We need your help to keep processing costs as low as possible. Here's what you can do. First, if at all

possible, use a typewriter to address your mail. Typewritten mail is much easier for the OCR to read than handwriting. If you address your mail by hand, please print, legibly.

Second, use the zip + four code. Put it in the return address on everything you mail our. If you don't know what your zip+four code is, contact your local post office. They will gladly help you with it. Then, when you address mail, look for your correspondent's zip+four in their return address and use it. Ask them to use theirs in their return mail. These are simple things, but they can have a great impact on how your letters are handled in the mail stream.

Help us keep that 29C Stamp one of the best bargains around.

Fund-Raising Workshop Planned

Today, more than ever, nonprofit organizations are turning to foundations and corporations for support of special projects. But, the secret to success is in the asking. Each year monies earmarked for grants both by corporations and private donors go undistributed, due partly to a lack of expertise in proposal writing, according to Dr. Don Umlah of Phoenix, Arizona.

This summer nonprofit groups again will have an opportunity to learn how to fund projects successfully. The Texas Historical Commission has announced the dates for its 1992 Texas Fund-Raising Workshops to be held in six locations across the state. Cosponsored by Preservation Texas, the popular two-day seminars are now in their 14th year of teaching representatives of nonprofit groups, including heritage organizations, the fundamentals of foundation and corporate proposal writing.

Umlah, together with Anice Read, director of the THC's Texas Main Street Program, will lead the workshops. Each of the workshops will cover all aspects of fund-raising, including where to find funding, how to approach foundations, and how to write convincing proposals. The first day of each workshop is spent on lecture and discussion. On the second day, each participant will write a grant proposal. Under the guidance of the instructors, many grant applications have been funded.

The workshop nearest Clarendon is in Plainview, July 17-18. Registration is open to representatives of nonprofit groups for a fee of \$95, which covers all materials needed to complete the course. New Wheat Variety Released

BY TIM TRIMBLE

By the time the 1992 wheat harvest fills the bins, farmers will have a new, high quality variety for fall planting.

TAM 202, a semi-dwarf hard red winter wheat, has features that will benefit both the farmer and the end-user, according to Dr. David Worrall, wheat breeder for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Vernon.

"This variety should do a better job than what's available currently," Worrall said. "It's an alternative that may answer different situations experienced by farmers."

Texas farmers plant about 6 million acres of wheat a year, mostly in the High and Rolling Plains regions.

The new variety, the result of a breeding effort that began 10 years ago, claims high yields, disease resistance and good milling and baking qualities among its attributes.

Beyond the farm, hard red winter wheat—used primarily for bread—has to have good baking qualities. Worrall said TAM 202's performance in this area is one of the key assets of the new variety.

Worrall explained that changes in the new Federal Grain Inspection Service classing system, scheduled to be implemented in 1994, will rate some of the current popular varieties "soft." Wheat classed "hard" is preferable for milling and baking, so the "soft" rating results in a price dockage of as much as \$1.20 per bushel—or one-third to one-half of the price a farmer receives.

"That is one of the most compelling reasons to release" the new variety, Worrall said.

Loans Available

Ms. Morgan, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) in Donley County announced today that the Agency in Texas is now accepting applications through approved local lenders for rural housing loan guarantees.

This new Guarantee Program offers loan opportunities to families who by themselves are unable to afford a commercial loan, thereby extending the possibilities available to rural residents to obtain decent housing. Guaranteed Single Family Housing Loans may be made for up to 100% of the value of a property, for which Farmers Home Administration guarantees 99% of this amount for the lender. This program offers opportunities not only to low-income families with incomes of approximately \$18,000 to 38,000 but also moderate-income families with incomes of \$23,000 to \$47,000 who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere. FmHA Housing Guarantees furthermore have a loan fee of one (1) percent which is less than similar fee for FHA or VA.

Areas eligible to receive Farmers Home Administration funding include open country, communities with populations of 10,000 or less, and under certain conditions, towns and cities with populations between 10,000 and 20,000.

Applications for guaranteed rural housing loans should be submitted to local approved lenders of FmHA.

Cotton Prevented Planting

Producers who are prevented from planting cotton because of a natural disaster may apply for prevented planting credit. This application must be submitted by June 15, 1992.

Before the County Committee can approve an application for prevented planting, producers must prove that they attempted to plant the cotton. Documentation must show that the ground was worked, seed was purchased, herbicide was applied, etc. The COC is required to inspect similar farms in the area to see if they were able to plant.

If your application is approved, you will be given the choice of (1) leaving the land idle, classifying it as CU for PAY and drawing the guaranteed deficiency payment of \$.15/lb on the CU acres, not to exceed 92 percent of your maximum permitted; OR (2) file for prevented planting, forfeit the deficiency payment and plant a "ghost" crop for harvest.

Some of the prevented planting provisions apply to other crops also. Contact the Donley County ASCS Office for more information or questions.

Failed Crops

Never, hay, graze, plow, or otherwise destroy acreage intended for grain or lint, until you measure, certify and file your application for disaster credit is on file in the ASCS office. The ASCS office is required to make a field visit to confirm the disaster before

you do anything with the crop. Failure to follow this procedure will result in loss of history credit and loss of program payments.

CRP Signup

The 12th CRP signup will be held in Donley County from June 15 through June 26. WE cannot accept regular CRP bids on cropland because we have exceeded over 25% limit. We are eligible for applications for windbreaks and shelterbelts. If an application for these practices is accepted, the owner of the land must provide the government with a 15 to 30 year easement to the property and the Soil Conservation Service will assist you in developing a plan to establish your windbreak or shelterbelt.

Weed Control on CRP

With the recent moisture, producers are reminded to check their CRP fields for excessive weeds and take any necessary weed control measures. This year we are required to make a field visit to EVERY CRP field. Penalties will be assessed to those producers who let weeds go uncontrolled to the point that they interfere with the approved cover or create a problem on other farms.

Conservation Compliance Plans

If you have bought, leased, rented, or crop shared on a farm or are considering doing so, you need to immediately check with Soil Conservation Service about the conservation plan on the farm. This is important because the conservation plan was formulated with the previous producer and stays with the land, regardless of the status on the new producer.

Reminders

June 15 - Last day to file for reapportionment peanuts or to release peanuts.

July 15 - Last day to certify spring seeded crops.

July 31 - Last day to transfer peanuts.

Does Our Constitutional Right To Protest Give Us The Right To Burn The Flag

Cannon balls and bullets whiz past me like lightning. Men and boys scream and crumple up in pain and agony underneath me. The darkness of death fell over the battlefield and I slowly wilted to the ground.

The next morning as the first rays of the sunlight slipped over the horizon and began to dry my tear stained colors. Men around me moaned and gathered themselves up and went to look for survivors of the death ridden battlefield. Someone picked me up and slung me over their shoulder like a burden too heavy to bear. Men around me cursed our country and each word tore at my colors and ripped out my heart.

I was born in June 1776 when George Washington came to visit my maker Betsy Ross. He presented her with a rough sketch and asked her to have me ready for presentation at the meeting of the Continental Congress in 1777.

Oh I have to admit my treatment has varied over the years. I was quite honored when Francis Scott Key wrote his poem "The Star Spangled Banner" for me. Over the years, my colors grew; in 1850 I boasted 30 white stars on my front. In 1863 when my country stood divided in war I waved with the winds of change on the battlefield as my colors bled along with every man that died. As time passed, respect and honor for my colors grew. In 1945 I was raised high on the battlefield at Iwo Jima and that day my colors sparkled and sang in the sun. The day that I protected President Kennedy's coffin was the most honorable of all my memories. In July of 1969, I reached new heights as I landed on the moon.

My life had been long and plentiful until I met the man of my nightmares, Gregory Johnson. In 1984 he lit a match to my colors and up in smoke I went. The pain I felt that day was the pain of every man, woman and child that had ever died for me. The people went into an uproar when he was tried and convicted for violating the First Amendment to the Constitution. But was he really? I have to admit it hurt me deeply but is burning me covered in the Constitution? When our fore fathers sat down and wrote these amendments, did they ever intend or even imagine that anyone would want to burn me? The Supreme Court thought so because in 1989 they said that a state could not make burning me a crime. Justice William J. Brennan was quoted in a 1989 issue of Time magazine as saying "If there is an underlying bedrock principal to the First Amendment of the Constitution it is that the government cannot prohibit an expression simply because the government finds it offensive." Many people did find the burning of my colors offensive for example, Justice John Paul Stevens was quoted in the same issue of Time magazine as saying, "Sanctioning the public desecration of the flag will tarnish its value both for those who cherish the idea for which it stands and for those who desire to don the robes of martyrdom." Actually defacing my colors has always been a hot topic. For example, in 1903, Nebraska legislature passed a law that said it was illegal to wear my colors in public. In 1931, California law made it illegal for anyone to display a banner of flag in a public place or in a meeting place.



W.J. Lewis Paid \$6 Per Acre For One 40,000-Acre Pasture

These are the facts, as I remember. In 1941, W.J. Lewis bought a 40,000-acre pasture from the Hughes Estate. The land was in north Motley County and south Hall County, and the purchase price was \$6 per acre. This land was part of the Mill-Iron ranches with headquarters in Denver, Colo. W.J. Lewis, whose headquarters were in Clarendon, was on of the old-time cattlemen of the Texas Panhandle. He paid one-fourth of the purchase price down and gave notes of equal amount due in one, two and three years, respectively.

We were running an abstract business in Motley County in 1946, and go a letter from the Denver office of the Hughes Estate asking for an estimate on the price of an abstract on the ranch which they sold to W.J. Lewis.

I had kept books for the Hughes Estate at a gin which they owned in Cottle County, Texas, at a little place called CeeVee. This was in 1931 and 1932, and I drew 25 cents per hour. In 1927, the Mill-Irons had sold the CV pasture of 35,000 acres to small ranchers and to farmers.

The Great Depression struck, and the ranchers who had bought grassland from the Hughes people at \$10 per acre and 2 1/2 percent interest were deeding the land back. The Hughes Estate made extension agreements with the farmers, extending the payments of the notes and canceling the unpaid back interest.

Of the 50 farmers, George Jenkins was the only one who made his land payment in 1931. Lafayette M. Hughes, manager of the estate (no relation to Colonel Wm. E. Hughes, who put the farlung Mill-Iron properties together), laughed and said he was going to recommend to President Hoover that he appoint George Jenkins as Secretary of Agriculture. As far as I know the Hughes Estate never forcibly foreclosed on anyone.

After taking back the grassland at CeeVee, about 20 sections in all, Lafayette M. Hughes bought 200 head of registered two-year old Hereford heifers and put them on the grass. He became one of the largest, if not the largest, registered Hereford breeders in the United States. He built a fine sales barn at Estelline, Texas, put on big, free barbecues, and sold young bulls at bargain prices.

I wrote Hughes people that I estimated the abstract to cost from \$1000 to \$1500, but if they wanted a firm offer, I would make it for \$1200. I never heard anything more from them.

Several months later I received a letter from W.J. Lewis, inquiring about the cost of an abstract on the ranch. I quoted him the same price I had quoted Hughes Estate. He wrote back and said to make the abstract and let him know when we finished with it.

We went to work. There were eighty tract in the Motley County part of the ranch, and we made separate abstract on each tract. The abstracts were comparatively short, usually a patent form the State, a deed to the Hughes people, and the will of Colonel Hughes and his wife, and the will of their granddaughter, Annie Clifton Hughes. Our daughter, Jane Warren, and her cousin, Allie Louise Brummett, were excellent typists, and we made mimeograph copies of the wills which went in each abstract.

W.J. Lewis and his son, Billy (W.J. Lewis, Jr.), came for the abstract when we notified them. Mr. Lewis was getting up in years and billy looked to be about 40. Mr. Lewis was in a talking mood that day. He said that the Hughes people were to furnish him an abstract when he paid off the first note. All of the notes had been paid off. He had done lots of business with Lafayette M. Hughes for many years, and had made lots of money in his dealings with him. Hughes would let Mr. Lewis have grass when he wouldn't lease to anybody else. Mr. Lewis never overstocked the range. He had bought lots of registered Hereford

But this brings me back to my main point, does our constitutional right to protest give us the right to burn the flag? I think not, but I'm just the flag. We as a country may never agree on this controversial topic but I want you to remember, what I stand for. I'm not just your red, white and blue or your Old Glory, I'm made of blood, sweat, tears and pain. So the next time you bring a match to my colors, I want you to remember all the men, women and children that will go up in smoke as I do. Just think about it, is it really worth it?

bulls from Hughes (the Lewis ran commercial cattle).

Sometimes a registered Hereford breeder would check the pedigrees on the Hughes bulls and decide that he wanted one that had been sold to Mr. Lewis. Hughes would get word as to which bull his client wanted and the Lewis cowboys would go out on the range and check the bulls registration until they found the right one. Hughes always paid Mr. Lewis a nice profit to get the bull back.

Shorty Roric had cowboied for Lewis nearly all his life. He had helped clean out the Spur pastures in 1915 when Lewis bought 13,000 Spur cattle. When Hughes went to draw up the deed to the 40,000 acres, Lewis asked him to make a deed to Shorty Roric for nine sections of the land. Hughes balked. He said, "I don't know Roric, but I know you, and I am deeding it all to you." Lewis later deeded the nine sections to Shorty Roric. He said the he knew the title to the land was good. It had been in the Hughes family for over 60 years, but he wanted the abstract so that if he got a chance to lease the land for oil, he would not have to wait until an abstract was made.

While we were visiting, Lewis got to talking about the "old days" when he handled lots of cattle. He had bought steers, year after year from W.O. Richards of Paducah, Texas. After they had agreed on the price, the steers were counted and Lewis drove them to his ranch. He paid Richards for them when he sold them. He never gave Richards anything but his word, no note or anything. At the time he was talking, I didn't know that Lewis had bought the Spur cattle when the Spurs closed out, or I would have asked him how long it took to gather the 13,000 head.

Finally, Mr. Lewis said to Billy: "Write him a check." The abstract were in a large, strong box. I helped Billy load them in their car, thanked them, and told them goodbye. I never saw Mr. Lewis again.

After the oil boom started around Snyder in 1948, I got a call from an oil company in Midland, asking me to pick up the abstracts, supplement them, and call their office when the abstracts were ready. I went to Clarendon and told Billy what the oil company wanted. He went with me to the bank where the abstract were stored and helped me load them. Billy said: "They ain't never been out of this box." I'm sure Billy and his father owned most of the stock in the bank. While we were in the Bank one of the boys that worked there said: "Billy, you are about out of money." Billy laughed and said, "There ain't nothing unusual about that."

A month or so later I received a letter from Billy. In it he wrote: "I thought you would like to know, the oil company said those were the neatest abstract they had ever examined." Reprinted from the April Edition of the Livestock Weekly.

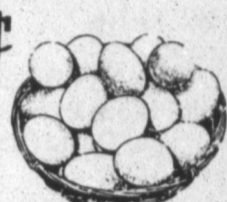

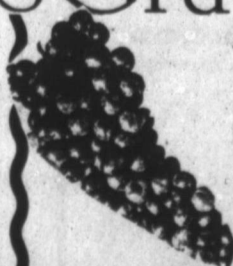
