Agriculture News

Training Session Scheduled For Clarendon

The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a Predator Management Training Program on Monday, March 30, 1992, in Room 102 at Clarendon College in Clarendon. The training session begins at 7:00 p.m., and lasts about three hours. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training session.

All persons who want to use M-44 sodium cyanide to control coyotes, feral dogs, and foxes preying on livestock should attend the course. To continue using M-44 sodium cyanide, all M-44 applicators certified prior to April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free. Proper certification to use M-44 sodium cyanide also requires possession of a private applicator license, or a commercial applicator license to purchase state-limited-use pesticides. Information on obtaining these types of licenses will be covered at the training session.

Among the winners was Stephen Bivens, son of Paul and Elmonette Bivens. Stephen placed 2nd in Literature.

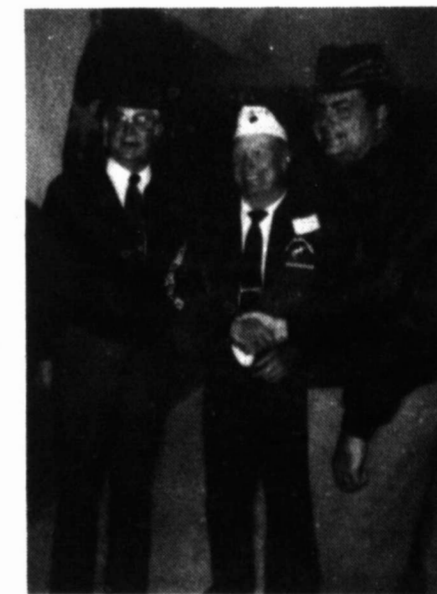

Total Ranch Management Meeting

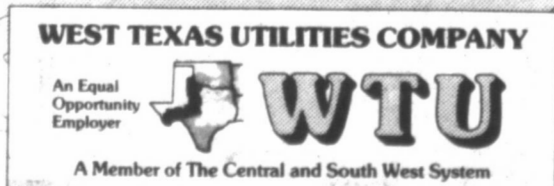

Strep Throat Requires Immediate Care

When someone has sore throat, it does not necessarily mean that he or she has strep throat (the medical term is *streptococcal pharyngitis*). Symptoms of strep throat infection range from no symptoms at all to fever, red throat, and painful swallowing. Lymph glands in the neck may become enlarged and tender. There may be white spots on the tonsils or dark red spots on the soft pallet of the mouth. Since these same symptoms can occur with a viral infection, the only certain way of determining the presence of streptococcus is with a throat culture.

Strep throat infections are caused by a specific type of bacteria called group A *beta hemolytic streptococcus*. This bacteria is a member of the same group that causes scarlet fever, rheumatic fever, impetigo (a skin infection), and streptococcal kidney disease. If left untreated, a strep throat can lead to rheumatic fever and heart damage in children. For this reason, sore throats in children that do not clear in a few days should be evaluated by a physician.

Antibiotics effective against beta hemolytic streptococcus include penicillin, erythromycin, and any of several of the cephalosporin antibiotics. Although strep throat symptoms may subside in 24 hours, antibiotics should be taken for the prescribed period, which is usually 7 to 10 days.

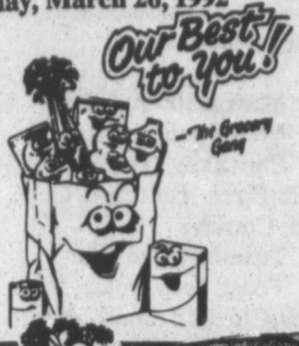



Home Health Agency Adds Office

Clarendon has a new business. Shepard's Crook Nursing Agency opened an office in Clarendon this week, according to executive director Susie Wilkinson. The Clarendon location is the fifth office for the agency which serves 18 towns in 11 counties in the Panhandle. Other offices are located in Pampa, Borger, Amarillo and Wheeler.

The Clarendon office, located at 111 Kearney, will employ six people, Wilkinson said. Those who wish more information should call 874-3569.

Wilkinson said that the Shepard's Elder Health Care Program will be offered to Clarendon patients also. Elder Health is a free service which allows the elderly to visit the Shepard's Crook office for blood pressure checks, blood sugar screening, and lung assessments. A health history file is kept at the office and can be used as a reference by the patient's physicians. The program also offers the members assistance with filing Medicare or other insurance forms.

Wilkinson explained that a home health agency offers nurses, aides, and other healthcare professionals who work under a physician's orders to care for patients in the home. The majority of patients are elderly, but the agency also cares for accident victims, newborn babies who need special care, or the chronically ill who need continuing care.

Working with the physician to devise a plan of care, the nursing agency provides nurses who can take vital signs, draw blood for lab tests, change dressings, care for wounds, evaluate and dispense medications, manage catheters, supervise feeding tubes, give injections, and do special teaching for ostomy patients and diabetics. Home health aides give baths, provide personal care, assist with exercise, prepare meals, do light housekeeping, and assist the patient with daily activities.

Founded in 1988 by Ernie

and Susie Wilkinson, Shepard's Crook Nursing Agency is based in Pampa. The agency employs more than 90 registered nurses, licensed vocational nurses, aides, clerical and administrative workers, and makes over 6000 patient visits each month.

Currently, the agency serves patients in Alanreed, Amarillo, Briscoe, Borger, Canadian, Clarendon, Fritch, Lefors, Miami, McLean, Pampa, Panhandle, Phillips, Shamrock, Skellytown, Stinnett, Wheeler, and White Deer.

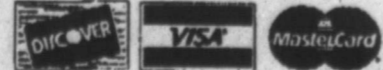
