Coal Train Hits Ground

Thirty-five cars in the middle of a 116 car coal train jumped the rails just east of Hedley Wednesday morning, October 2, about 6:30.

There were no reported injuries.

Of the 35 derailed cars, it appeared that all but three were destroyed. The accident occurred on a curve in a cut. Thirteen cars smashed into a pile in the distance of about three car-lengths. The impact of the collisions broke and twisted the rails of both the mainline and the siding. About 3,850 tons of coal was no longer on the rails. The mainline was severed and blocked. At least \$1.5 million worth of equipment was ruined. And every minute the line was blocked cost thousands of dollars.

By midmorning, the first equipment from Hulcher Services arrived and began clearing the wreckage, while Burlington crews began working on the track.

Cleanup proceeded with deliberate haste. No one ran much, but everyone moved faster than a walk.

The salvage company attached cables from huge bulldozers to the twisted and tangled hopper cars. Working steadily, they winched the cars over and dragged them out of the way. Caterpillars with loaders pushed the coal into heaps on the north side of the track, while other tracked machines with booms hoisted trucks, broken rail and debris out of the way. Even before the last cars had been moved, Burlington crews lowered the first prefabricated track panel into place. At 8:28 a.m. Thursday, the last prefabricated panel was bolted into place and a work train began placing ballast. At 11:50, the first train rolled across the scene of the wreck. That first train consisted of several locomotives, bound for Clarendon to pick up the last 30-odd cars from the coal train.

In less than a day-and-a-half, the railroad and the salvage company had the railroad running again. Throughout Thursday and Friday trains rolled through Clarendon and Hedley every few minutes as the backlog of freight gradually moved along toward various destinations.

The job is not yet over. Wrecked hopper cars will have to be cut up and hauled off. Spilled coal, dirt and rock will have to go to a suitable EPA-approved landfill. And the railroad will replace the temporary track with all-welded ribbon rail.

But clearing the right-of-way and opening temporary track in less than 36 hours is no mean accomplishment.

Installment Payments May Ease Burden of Paying Taxes

A recent addition to the tax code allows for installment payments of certain homestead taxes. The individual must be at least 65 years of age and be paying taxes on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead. The taxes must be paid in four equal installments, the first being due before February 1. The other payments are due before April 1, before June 1 and before August 1. If an individual fails to make a payment by the due date, the unpaid amount becomes delin-

quent and incurs penalty and interest as of that date. An individual may not pay less than the installment amount due; however, he may pay more than the amount due. Another recent change in tax law pertains to making escrow payments in order to pay taxes in advance. A taxpayer may enter into a contract to make monthly payments toward the next year's taxes. The advantage in using this method is that the taxes are paid by the time the statement is mailed the following October.

So far, commercial ventures have not been able to beat homemade for flavor.

WTU Lowers Cost

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. have some good news in the form of lower costs for electricity beginning with October bills. The lower costs are produced by a one-time credit and a reduction in the fuel cost portion of the bill.

"Our continuing efforts to lower boiler fuel costs and related transportation costs were successful and prompted the reduction," said, Jerry Chambliss WTU's area manager. Those efforts include renegotiation of supply and transportation agreements, construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide better access to suppliers, and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so they burn less fuel to make electricity.

The credit will be issued on customer's electric bills during the billing month of October. An average residential customer using 660 kilowatt hours of electricity will see a reduction of \$13.17 on the bill that month. The actual reduction for each customer is based on their previous month's use of electricity.

The reduction in the fuel portion of the electric bill will be in effect for all upcoming months. According to Chambliss it will mean an average 3.5 percent reduction from costs last year.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) recently granted the company's request to reconcile fuel costs for April 1987 through December 1990 and adjust the fuel portion of the bill to recover projected fuel costs. WTU filed the request last February.

West Texas Utilities Co. serves 177,000 customers in a 52 county area that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

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This year's clinic should prove very beneficial and informative to producers as in the past. There will be door prizes and a Bar H Dude Ranch Chuck Wagon brisket meal for participants that evening following the clinic.

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

Seborrhea: Affects 12 Million Americans

Seborrhea is a skin condition that is commonly confused with dandruff. The term *seborrhea* refers to chronic skin eruptions, most of which occur on the scalp, face, and other hairy parts of the body. Seborrhea is associated with dull, greasy scales. The skin tends to itch and burn.

When seborrhea occurs in newborns and young infants, the condition often is referred to as "cradle cap." Seborrhea tends to intensify during periods of stress. Women are affected more often than men, and the condition is seen most frequently among middle-aged and older adults.

Although seborrhea and dandruff are not the same condition, they are treated in much the same way. Many medicated over-the-counter shampoos can be used to treat either condition. A recent article in *U.S. Pharmacist* suggests these guidelines for medicated shampoos: (1) If the condition gets worse or does not improve, try products with different ingredients. (2) Do not use medicated shampoos on children under the age of two except on the advice of a physician. (3) Do not use products containing *selenium* if you have open sores on your scalp. (4) If the scalp is especially dirty, wash it first with a regular shampoo to remove excess dirt and scales.

Airlines Reunites Families

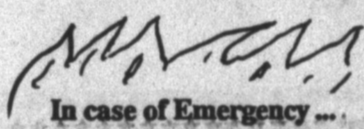

have Medicare hospital insurance. This program covers a full range of benefits including physician services, nursing care, symptom management, and pain relief.

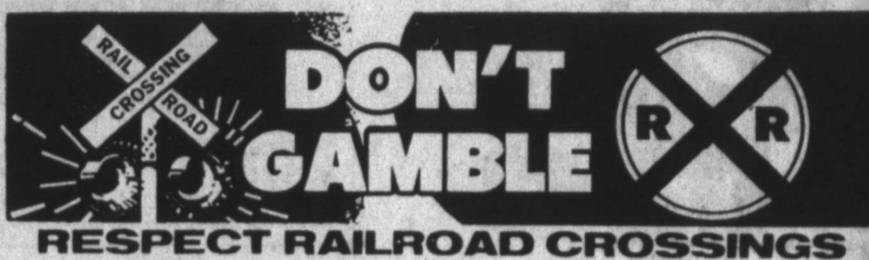
When a patient receives these services from a Medicare certified Hospice, Medicare hospital insurance pays almost the entire cost of care. The only cost to the beneficiary is 5 percent--up to a maximum of \$5.00 -- for each prescription for outpatient pain relief or symptom management, and a little above \$4.00 per day for respite care. (Respite care is inpatient care for the patient to give temporary relief to the person who provides care in the home.)

A patient can receive Medicare-covered hospice care as long as a physician certifies that the patient is terminally ill. In addition, the person must sign a statement choosing hospice care for the terminal illness, and must receive the care from a Medicare-certified hospice.

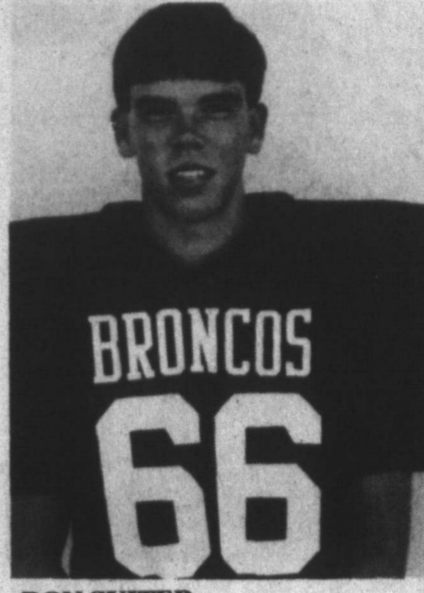
Clarendon Loses To Spearman

Proud To Be Drug Free

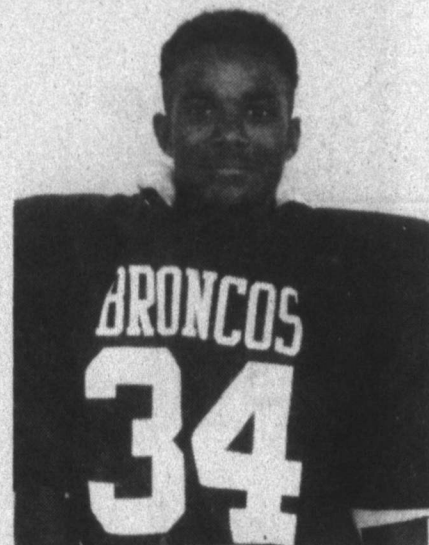
Fire Prevention Week Open House

OUR HERITAGE

America's National Symbol

Regally perched atop a cottonwood tree, the American bald eagle captures the spirit of the United States. Confident and alert, ready to defend its territory at all times, the bald eagle commands the respect and awe of all who observe it. Known as the king of birds, it is our proud national symbol.

For thousands of years eagles have been recognized and admired as powerful and noble birds. As early as 3500 B.C., they were used to symbolize strength by the Sumerians, and later, by the ancient Romans. During the Middle Ages, eagles adorned banners as symbols of determination and faith for the Crusades. Other countries, including France, Prussia, Italy and Mexico, used the eagle to immortalize their causes.

The bald eagle is the only eagle native to North America. When America's Continental Congress was searching for an appropriate national symbol, Charles Thompson, secretary of the Congress, recommended it as the perfect choice. Thompson took inspiration from the European eagles, but chose the bald eagle to illustrate the uniqueness of the new nation. Much to the dismay of Benjamin Franklin, who was rooting for the turkey, the Congress concurred, and on June 20, 1782, the bald eagle was chosen as the symbol of the young nation. However, it was not adopted formally until 1789.

Standing 3 feet tall with a 7-foot wing span at full maturation, the bald eagle is an immensely popular figure. In addition to adorning the Great Seal of the United States, it appears on the reverse of several coins, in particular the silver dollar, the half dollar and the quarter. In 1851 it was featured on a three-cent piece, and in 1857, in full flight on the obverse of a cent piece.

America's most famous bald eagle may have been Old Abe, the war eagle named after Abraham Lincoln. Old Abe became the mascot of Company "C" of the 8th Wisconsin Regiment in the 1860s after a Chippewa Indian chief traded him for a bushel of corn. It is said he led soldiers into more than 25 Civil War battles and attracted many admirers, including P.T. Barnum, the famous showman, who offered \$20,000 for the impressive bird. Old Abe was not sold, but rather presented to the governor of Wisconsin with whom he spent the rest of his life appearing at patriotic events and rallies. He even represented the state at the Philadelphia Centennial of 1876, before passing away in 1881.

Throughout the last two centuries, the bald eagle has demonstrated a remarkable tenacity for survival. Coming close to extinction in the 1960s, today the bald eagle still soars across open skies, thanks to efforts of the federal and state governments and environmental organizations. The bald eagle remains on the endangered species list, but several states may transfer it to the threatened species list, which still requires strict protection — a tremendous step forward in the species' recovery. The success of conservation efforts can be seen especially in Michigan, Wisconsin and the Chesapeake Bay area, where the bald eagle is once again casting a protective eye over its territory — the United States. *ll*

Continued Cleanup: The Key To Year-Round Yard Beauty

A sharp-looking yard, one that features a lush green lawn and well-pruned plants and shrubs, is relatively simple to achieve if you start early and work periodically to maintain it.

Begin with the lawn. When winter comes to an end and the last frost has melted and cleared, it's time to rid the turf of grass and leave clippings left over from the previous fall. An old-fashioned raking will do the job.

Many towns and municipalities now charge for the pick up of lawn waste as well as for the actual bags in which the materials are placed.

Once the lawn is cleared, prep it for the coming summer by tilling or using another aerating device to let the turf breathe. Then lay down grass seed as needed in bare spots or thinned areas. Many professional landscapers recommend applying a fertilizer high in nitrogen to provide an added boost to the developing lawn.

Watering

Lawns thrive when they receive an inch of water a day. Many cities face drought each season and therefore enforce water restrictions, so water wisely. Turn on the sprinklers in the early evening. This allows the soil to absorb the moisture before the sun's warm rays evaporate it the next morning.

Beds can benefit from proper watering, too. A landscape fabric laid atop the soil allows air and water to filter through while physically blocking the growth of weeds. An inch-thick layer of mulch or wood chips placed over the fabric continues to permit air and water through, while making a decorative addition to the land-

scape and reducing the number of necessary waterings.

Chips can be produced by recycling broken and pruned branches collected during a yard cleanup. A machine such as the electric Chipp'r/Shredd'r/Mulch'r (model CS-3000), also from Flowtron, quickly and easily reduces twigs and branches into wood chips that, when spread evenly over the beds, give the look of a professionally landscaped yard.

Pruning

Trees, shrubs, perennials and annuals all benefit greatly from pruning, though this task needs to be done properly and at the appropriate time of the season. The myth that all pruning must happen during the dormant season simply isn't true. When to prune, how far to cut back, and the methods of cutting back vary depending upon the season, the plant's condition, and its reaction to weather and previous

prunings. Contact your nurseryman or local county extension agent for specific information.

Once you know what to prune and when to prune, one of two basic pruning methods will be utilized. Thinning cuts create space and reduce the effects of pressure caused by rain, snow, sleet and wind. The cut follows the branch to be removed back to its source, with the cut made close enough to leave what appears to be a short stump, called a branch collar. A thinning cut enables the remaining limbs to continue growing naturally.

Heading cuts, rather than following a branch back to a limb, lead back to a bud or buds. Such cutting promotes further bud growth and encourages the remaining buds to thrive in the full sun.

Heading and thinning are often complementary. For instance, if a shrub requires pruning back because it has grown too large, it should first be thinned. That

is, the person pruning should cut branches inside the plant formation. Fine-tuning—or heading—can then be done to shape the shrub and promote the dense growth of foliage. A well-maintained shrub is a bit wider near the bottom, allowing sunshine to reach the entire shrub.

Continued cleanups and pruning are just two of the many ways to keep your yard looking good throughout the seasons. Cleanups result in spotless lawns with thick turf, while pruning ensures big blossoms and helps prepare plants for the following year.

Breast Cancer Clinic Set

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examinations every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age 35-40 - One baseline mammogram; 40-50 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; Over 50 - Yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Clarendon on Monday, November 11, 1991, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic. Exams are done by appointment only. 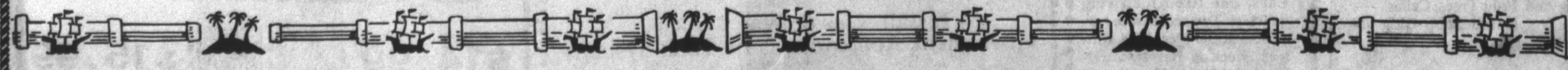
