knowledge of nutrition and daily nutritional requirements, and activities in their county food and nutrition project.

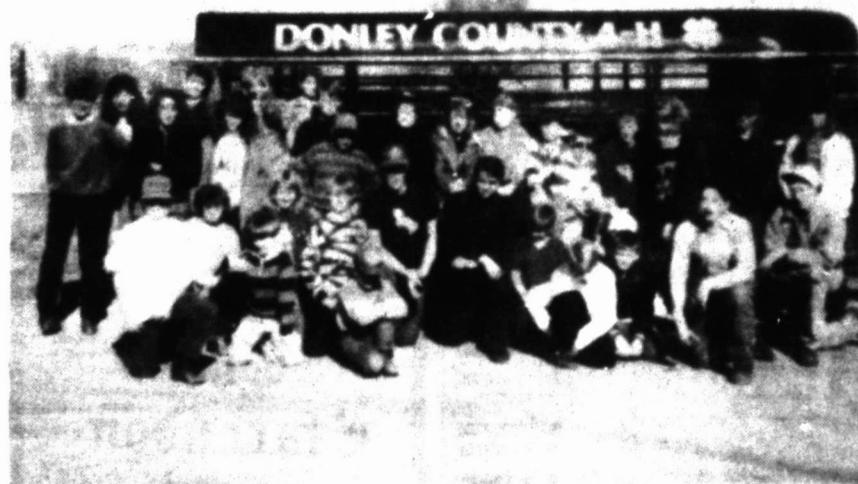

Low Elected To Board Of Directors

On January 10, 1991, at the Annual Membership meeting, the Amarillo Area Foundation membership elected William J. Lowe to the Amarillo Area Foundation Board of Directors.

The Amarillo Area Foundation, a community foundation, is a public charity which both accepts funds from individuals, families, businesses and other groups that want to help Panhandle communities and gives funds through carefully considered grants to nonprofit organizations for the enrichment of the quality of life of the people in the 26 northernmost counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Assisted by a professional staff, the 25-member Board of Directors sets policy for and makes final decisions regarding all grants. The Board also protects the long-term interest and growth of the Foundations' assets and ensures that income and other funds available for current use are distributed in a manner consistent with donors' wishes and the changing needs of Panhandle communities.

Check Your Butane Tank

Winter is far from over and the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department would like to remind people who use butane to check to see if their regulator valves on the tank are covered to keep freezing rain and drizzle and snow off of the valves. Falling moisture will freeze over the vent hole on the regulator, causing the valve to freeze in the full open position. This in turn causes any device such as a water heater, heating unit, stove, etc. to produce a large area of flame in and around the burner instead of the normal burner size flame which in turn will cause a fire in your residence or outbuilding. It seems as though every year there are several fires within the county caused by these regulator valves freezing in the open position. Since most of these fires are rural and occur in the presence of freezing precipitation, response time is often increased due to low visibility and poor road conditions thereby most often resulting in heavy damage or total loss to the structure affected by the fire.

Check your tank to see if the cover is closed. If the cover is missing, see that the valve is protected from freezing moisture by some type of cover.

Fire Damages Home

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department was summoned to the Jerry May Home two miles west of Clarendon on Tuesday, January 9th shortly after 2 p.m. to battle a blaze at that residence. The fire was reported by Jiggs Mann who noticed a large amount of smoke coming from the roof of the home and stopped to discover that the house was on fire.

Six units and sixteen members of the volunteer fire department responded to the fire and had it extinguished in less than 15 minutes. The fire started in the water heater closet of the home and was due to freezing drizzle forming over the vent hole of an uncovered

butane tank regulator valve.

Fire and heat damage was extensive to the kitchen and dining room area and the rest of the home sustained heavy smoke damage. Due to the fog and low visibility at the time of the fire, had the fire been allowed to burn for even a very few minutes more, the house would most likely have been a total loss before being discovered by anyone.

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department would like to acknowledge the quick actions taken by Jiggs Mann who probably saved the May home from total destruction.

Election To Be Held Saturday

A reminder to Donley County residents that are qualified voters (property owners), that an election to ratify the annexation of Donley County to the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District Number 3 will be held on the 19th of January, 1991. Polling places will be in the Donley County Courthouse in Clarendon, Texas, and the Lion's Club in Hedley, Texas. Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Voters will be voting on two propositions. The first is the ratification of the annexation of Donley County, Texas, to the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District Number 3.

The second proposition is the approval of the levying of a pro-rata portion of an ad valorem tax, not to exceed \$0.05 per \$100 valuation for the operation and maintenance of the district.

If passed, the current tax rate would be \$0.006 per \$100 evaluation.

Drink Endangers Local Youths

EMS personnel in Clarendon report that they have had an unconfirmed case of alcohol poisoning from a controversial beverage called "Cisco". The product was recently criticized by U.S. Surgeon General Antonia Novello.

Consumers are being endangered by a high-alcohol drink that looks like a mild wine cooler but is as potent as five shots of vodka, Novello said Wednesday.

The fortified wine, Cisco, which is 20 percent alcohol, is particularly dangerous to unsuspecting teen-agers who may think they are drinking a wine cooler that typically would have a 4 percent alcohol content, Novello said.

Youths who are familiar with the drink have taken to calling it "liquid crack" because of its strong effect, she said.

"It looks like a wine cooler. It smells like a wine cooler, but it isn't," Novello said, "It's an incredibly potent, potentially lethal alcoholic beverage."

Cisco, which is carbonated and comes in five flavors, is sold in small bottles shaped like wine coolers and often is stocked in convenience stores near ordinary wine coolers.

A 100-pound person who drinks two 375 milliliter bottles of Cisco in an hour could die of acute alcohol poisoning and a 150-pound person who drank the same amount would be legally intoxicated, Novello said.

The drink has resulted in hallucinations, disorientation, loss of motor control and loss of consciousness, she said.

In a letter to Cisco's manufacturer, Canandaigua Wine Co. of Canandaigua, N.Y., Novello urged the company to repackage the drink to make it look like other fortified wines. Those products generally are sold in dark bottles and kept behind the counter or on the back shelf at liquor stores, she said.

Canandaigua board chairman Marvin Sands said the real problem is underage drinking and alcohol abuse, not Cisco. He said company officials would meet with Novello.

After earlier criticism, the company agreed to state on the label that the drink is not a wine cooler and asked retailers not to place it next to wine coolers in stores.

Novello and other health advocates spoke at a news conference at the Children's National Medical Center, where 10 cases of teen alcohol poisoning caused by Cisco have been reported since March.

Dr. James Wright, who investigated the cases, said most of the youths thought they were drinking wine-coolers.

Six other cases of teen alcohol poisoning from Cisco have been reported to poison control centers elsewhere in the nation, and Cisco's critics speculated that many more cases have gone unreported.

Dr. Lillian Beard of the National Academy of Pediatrics said Cisco can easily be confused with wine coolers because "it appears bright and bubbly and perfectly benign."

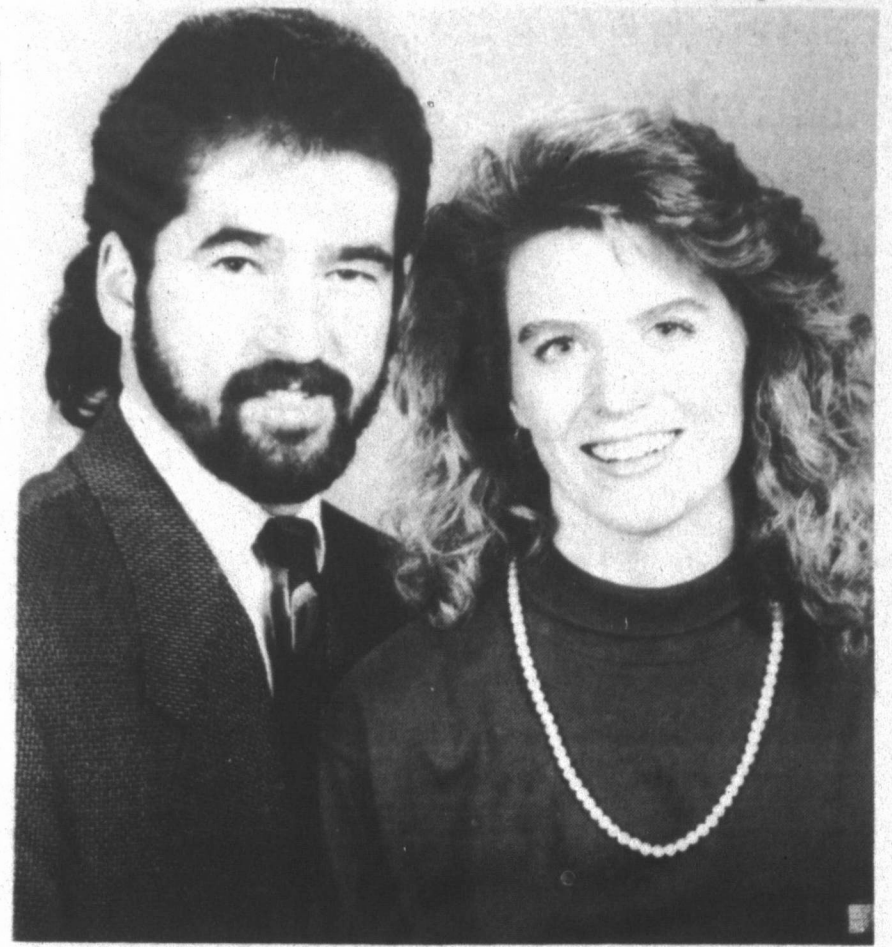

In order to complete the required forms, you must have the following items:

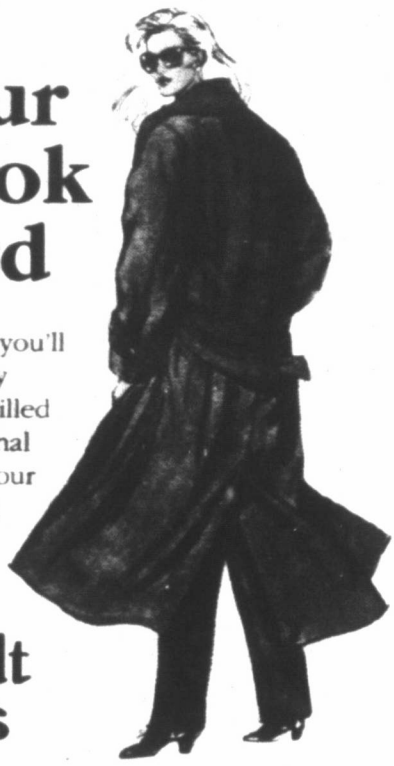
- Proof of income for all household members and,

Medicine Transfer from Nursing Mothers

Studies show that certain medicines are capable of passing from pregnant women to their unborn children. If, during pregnancy, there is the possibility of medication toxicity to the fetus, such medicines should be avoided. Another area of concern is with the potential transfer of medicine from mothers to breast-fed infants.

According to the *Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs*, the concentration of a particular medicine in breast milk depends on many factors—the concentration in the mother's blood and characteristics of the medicine, such as its fat solubility and the degree to which it is bound to blood plasma protein and milk protein. Another factor is the time of breast-feeding. If the medicine must be taken routinely, it should be taken shortly after breast-feeding. This allows as much time as possible for the medicine to clear the mother's blood and allows for a lower concentration at the time of the next feeding.

The *Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs* also indicates that aspirin and other salicylates should be used with caution by nursing mothers. Certain prescription drugs ideally should be avoided during breast-feeding. There are always exceptions, however, based on the health condition of the expectant mother.

THE EDUCATION CRISIS

Foreign and Domestic Problems Are Obscuring Education Crisis

(NU) - For months now our national attention has been riveted on a series of crises: the national debt, S&L scandals, Iraq and the federal budget.

Yet the one crisis whose solution would provide the greatest long-range benefits for our nation is being largely overlooked. The education crisis has become a neglected item on our national agenda.

This is short-sighted in the extreme. For we simply will not be able to reduce our national debt without national trauma until we are once again able to outproduce other nations. We will not be able to compete effectively with other industrialized nations unless we move forward with concerted efforts to educate all American youngsters to the best of their ability.

In the long run, whether in economic or military terms, education is our best defense.

But even as the demand for improved education escalates, more and more youngsters are slipping through the cracks. They arrive at school burdened by the terrible legacy of inadequate prenatal care. They arrive at school hungry, physically exhausted, emotionally drained. Many arrive hopeless.

Far too many Americans have been willing to write these youngsters off as expendable — and incur-

able. They are neither.

Must Have A Strong Start

We have long known that all children can learn if they come to school healthy and well cared for, if they receive a strong start, if they are stimulated to learn and if they experience academic success early and often.

Today, one-fifth of American children are poor. And poverty grinds them down. The only way they'll pick themselves up is by receiving an education that prepares them for the high-tech job market that's closing in with lightning speed. And that's exactly what they're not getting.

This is a moral tragedy. And it contains the seeds of a national tragedy. Unless we solve our education crisis — starting right now — it will spin off scores of crises that will threaten both our economic well-being and our democratic heritage. The ramifications will be great. They'll be long-lasting. And they could be overwhelming.

But we have an alternative. That alternative is called funding: for prenatal care, for preschool education, for school renewal. We can pay now — or pay dearly later. Now is cheaper. Now is wiser. It's easier to prevent crises than to solve them.

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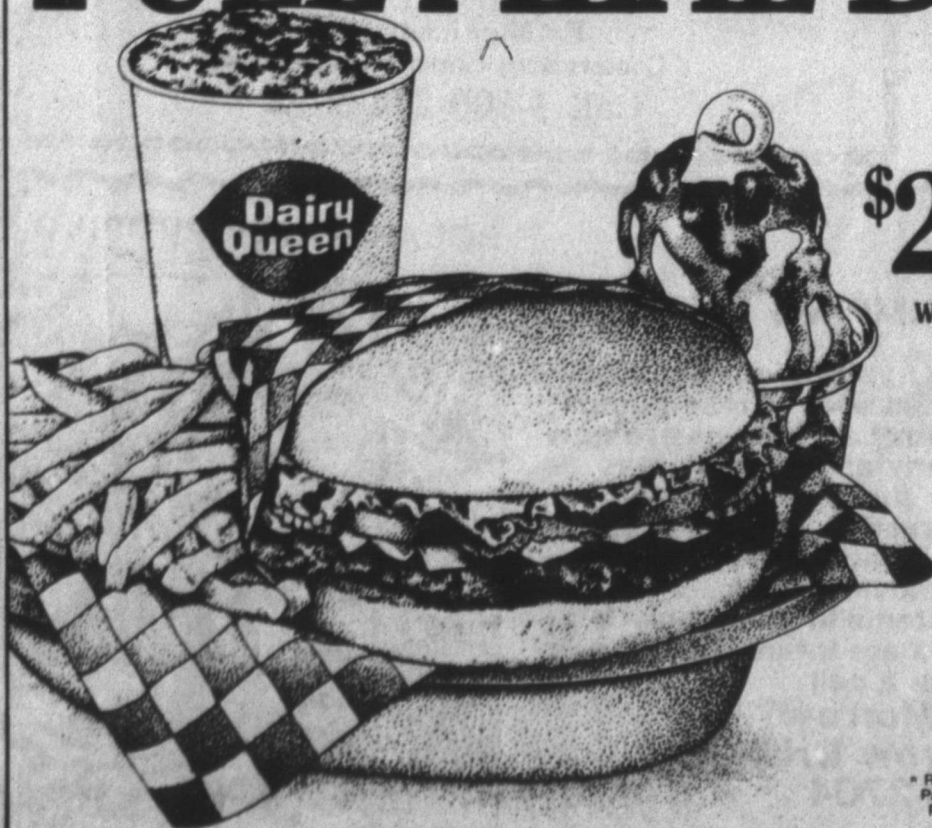
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Hedley News

With somewhere in the neighborhood of 500,000 American troops in the Middle East, it should come as no surprise that our leaders are talking tough, as they probably should when faced with such despotic behavior. However, I thought it strange when I heard our President state that we were "...arrayed against our enemy." An English professor would tell us that the word *array* is a good, old English word. But I would think of it as being more of a Jamesian Bible word. A word that paints scenes of ancient weaponry, thousands of chariots and horse-

men, and the sound of the battle trumpet.

The ancient wars of old still echo through the hills and dunes of Arabia and Palestine. It's a fitting place to *array* one's army against an enemy.

I believe patriotism is good and praying and supporting your country's leader is not only proper but Biblical. But, we must remember, as Christians, that the Battle belongs to the Lord. It's His alone. Wrapping ourselves in the flag will not chase away the fear. We need to wrap ourselves in Jesus, for in Him is true confidence.

Battle cry!
 We must put on the whole armor of God (Ephesians 6:11-17) and we need to pray and make intercession with much supplication (Ephesians 6:18) for each other and for the young men who take up positions of war.

Not in our army of steel nor in our manpower will the world know, but in our true faith and trust will they that believe not, know that there is still a God in the United States of America. "And all this assembly shall know that the Lord saveth not with sword and spear: for the battle is the Lord's..." (I-Samuel 17:47)

We must array ourselves against the enemy: Satan! And we must not fear! For God says: "Fear thou not; for I am with thee; be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness." (Isaiah 41:10)

"Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might!" (Ephesians 6:10)

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on December 11, 1990, in the Board Room, City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Minutes of the November 27, 1990, meeting were read, and upon a motion by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, said minutes were approved.

John Kiel of PRPC talked to the Board about solid waste planning and the need to have area cities finance a portion of the cost of developing a solid waste plan for the area. Clarendon's share would be .25 per capita. Motion was made by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Bobbie Kidd to pass a resolution to support the development of the Panhandle Regional Solid Waste Management Plan by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the management and disposal of municipal solid waste has become a national issue which will ultimately affect the lives of every citizen in the country, including the Texas Panhandle; and

WHEREAS, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, in compliance with Texas Senate Bill 1519 and in the face of changing federal regulations affecting land fill criteria which may soon force the closure of many landfills in the Panhandle region, has undertaken the development of a Regional Solid Waste Management Plan which will encompass the entire 26 county area of the region; and

WHEREAS, it is to the advantage of the City of Clarendon and the rest of the Texas Panhandle to work in cooperation with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission by participating in this regional planning effort which will result in an array of feasible solid waste disposal options for the Texas Panhandle and the City of Clarendon; and

WHEREAS, the cost of developing this plan will be approximately \$300,000, of which the State of Texas, in accordance with Senate Bill 1519, will provide approximately 50 percent (\$147,326) of the funds needed to complete the plan, leaving the Panhandle Region obliged to provide the balance of the cost of developing the plan; and

WHEREAS, the Amarillo Area Foundation supported with funds from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation, has generously contributed \$75,000 toward the completion of this regional solid waste plan which will reduce the Panhandle region's matching fund requirements by approximately 50 percent; and

WHEREAS, it will be incumbent upon the local governments of the Texas Panhandle to provide the approximate \$75,000 needed to complete the development of this regional solid waste management plan

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS;

That the City of Clarendon recognizes the need for the development of the Regional Solid Waste Plan by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission which will provide long-term solid waste disposal options not only for the city but for the rest of the Texas Panhandle as well. **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the City of Clarendon will financially support the activities of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in the development of this Regional Solid Waste Management Plan by committing \$555.00 (which represents the city's regional pro rata share) of city funds to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for the sole purpose of developing the Panhandle Regional Solid Waste Management Plan.
