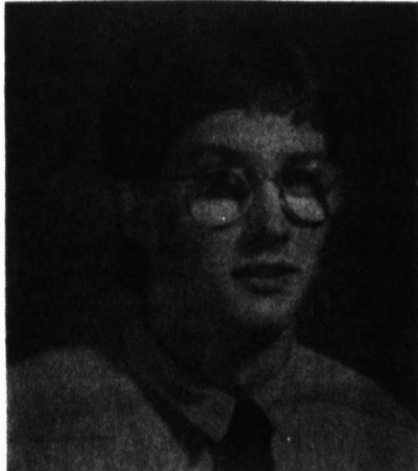

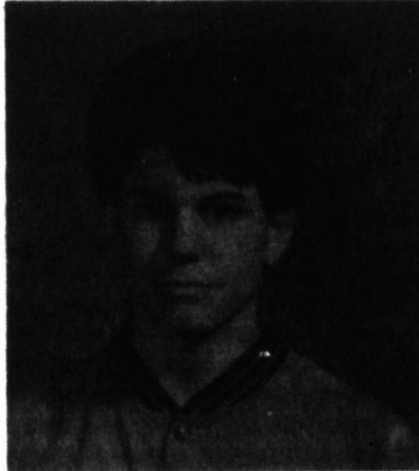

Houston Trying to Steal Area Court

A new bill in the Texas legislature would take away the 100th District Court and give it to Houston. That would mean more criminals loose in the vicinity since the court could only meet two or three times per year. Most people arrested would be released on bond for an extended period. Area law officers and attorneys are encouraging every Donley County citizen to write to Austin to oppose the move. Citizens may also sign petitions that are available in many business in the vicinity.

Sinfronia Thompson, a radical urban representative from the Houston area, has introduced legislation to do away with the 100th District Court and add a new court in Harris County. Those counties now in the 100th District would be lumped into other area courts. Many of the other courts in the area are not disposing of the cases that are already coming before them. Court could not be scheduled in Donley County except at widely spaced intervals.

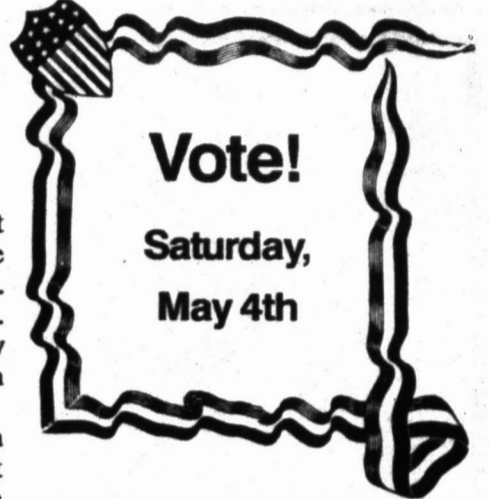
Jimmy Thompson, Donley County Sheriff, says, "The District Attorney and the Judge in this district do their job. They will respond even if it's 3:00 a.m. Not all districts are like that."

There seems to be little question that the change would result in slower justice and more crime in what is now the 100th district. It would also make it more difficult to probate a will, get a divorce settlement or schedule a civil suit. The change would probably raise taxes in the area, also.

Last year the 100th District Court—with one judge—settled 1059 cases from Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties. By comparison, the 31st District Court in Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Roberts and Wheeler Counties, with two judges and a far larger population, handled only 1375 cases. (Gray county alone has a larger population than all the 100th district!) The 84th District, composed of Hansford, Hutchinson and Ochiltree Counties, completed 1190 cases, with two judges. Briscoe, Dickens, Floyd and Motley counties had 933 cases finished by their judge in the 110th district court.

There do not appear to be any significant advantages in the change for Donley County or Clarendon residents.

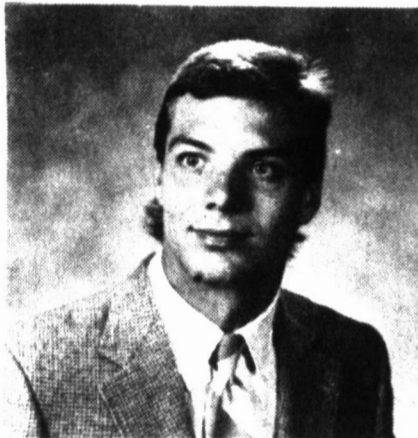
Emergency Loan Applications Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Clarendon.

Armstrong, Donley, and Gray counties were recently named by Secretary of agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the adverse weather conditions.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

Qualifying for the finals in the 100 M Hurdles, Bobbie Havens finished 4th after winning 1st at District. Havens also finished 6th in the Long Jump.

Billy Ray Wilson placed 4th in the Triple Jump with a jump of 43'.

Senior Jonathan Stewart, after a 2nd place medal in the Shot at district, also was able to muster a second place at Regional. This qualifies him for the State Track Meet in Austin on May 10-12. Jonathan threw the Shot 51 feet 6 inches, which was his personal best record.

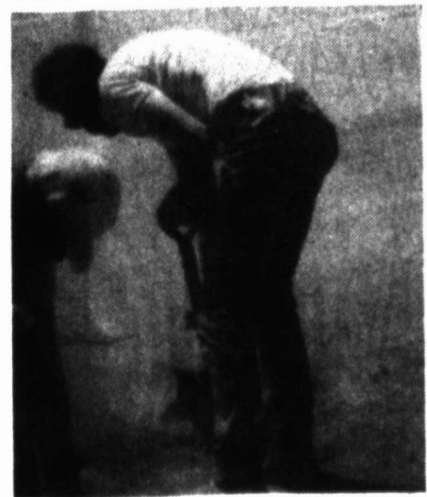
P.T.A. Meeting Scheduled

Special Education Classes Offered

Texas Public Schools provide for the education of handicapped children ages three to five. In addition to these ages, visually and/or hearing impaired children are eligible for services from birth. These services are provided through the Early Childhood Education for the Handicapped (ECE-H) class taught by Regina Wooten at the Clarendon Elementary School.

Screening tests, which are used to assess a child's strengths and weaknesses, will be held at the Elementary building in room 214 on Monday, May 6, 1991 from 9:30 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

Parents, guardians, doctors, or any person having knowledge of the special needs of any 3 to 5 years old may make a request for this screening by calling the Elementary office at 3855 and leaving the following information: (A) Child's name (B) Child's date of birth (C) Parent's name (D) Phone number (E) Address (PO Box and Street).

Children are eligible, if they qualify, on the basis of one or more of the following conditions: (A) Speech or language disability (B) Mental retardation (C) Orthopedic handicap (D) Other Health impairment (E) Hearing impairment (F) Visual impairment (G) Deaf/blind (H) Learning disability (I) Emotional disability (J) Autistic.

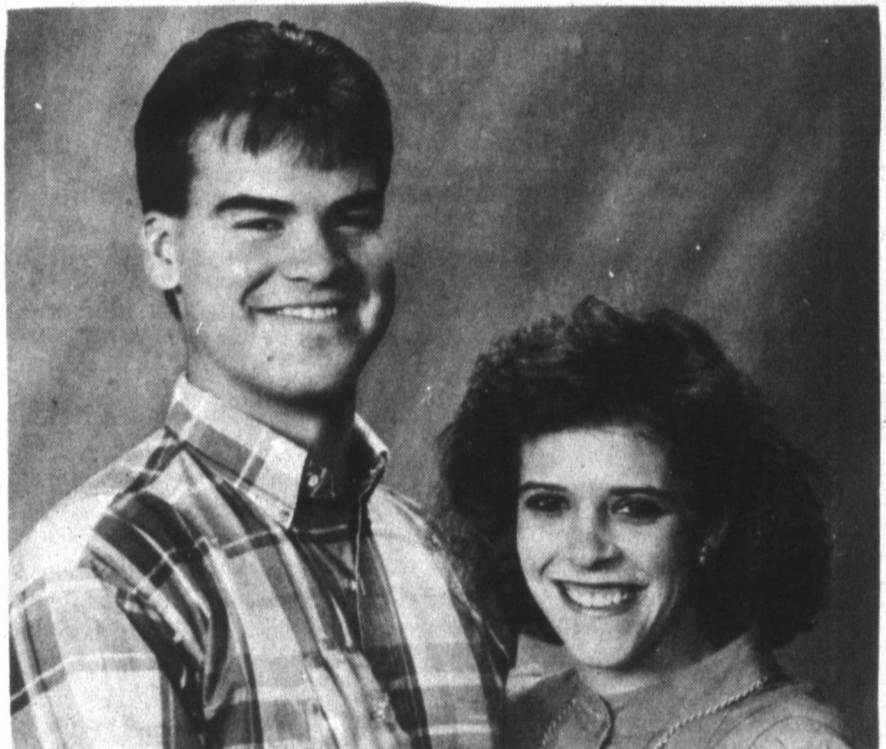

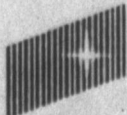

State Representative Mark Stiles of Beaumont introduced a bill (H.B. 2022) which is a slap in the face to those Texans who have chosen to live in the rural areas of our state. The bill, if passed, would allow emergency ambulances in counties of less than 20,000 population to be staffed by only one individual with minimum training. There are 254 counties in Texas and, of those, 150 of them have a population of less than 20,000. To those Texans who live in counties of greater population and believe this law will not affect you - think again! You probably do not spend your entire lives in one area nor do your families and friends. If you travel, you do not have to go very far before you find yourself passing through one of these counties.

Texas already has the lowest standards in the country for minimum ambulance staffing, requiring two personnel with only 40 hours of training. This bill, if made into law, would be a state and national embarrassment by reducing the standard to only one person. The sad part about this is that Mr. Stiles' bill passed unopposed through the House on April 18. This shows a definite uncaring attitude on the part of our elected Representatives. As a long-time paramedic with a volunteer emergency medical service, I have no idea how only one person is going to drive an ambulance and provide proper life-saving care of a patient at the same time. If this bill becomes law, E.M.S. in Texas will be set back 30 years in a large portion of the state.

Everyone who reads this letter needs to contact his or her State Senator, as well as the office of the Governor and Lt. Governor, to show concern for our fellow Texans. Demand that your Senator vote NO on this bill. It could literally make a difference between life and death.

Screening tests, which are used to assess a child's strengths and weaknesses, will be held at the Elementary building in room 214 on Monday, May 6, 1991 from 9:30 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

Parents, guardians, doctors, or any person having knowledge of the special needs of any 3 to 5 years old may make a request for this screening by calling the Elementary office at 3855 and leaving the following information: (A) Child's name (B) Child's date of birth (C) Parent's name (D) Phone number (E) Address (PO Box and Street).

Children are eligible, if they qualify, on the basis of one or more of the following conditions: (A) Speech or language disability (B) Mental retardation (C) Orthopedic handicap (D) Other Health impairment (E) Hearing impairment (F) Visual impairment (G) Deaf/blind (H) Learning disability (I) Emotional disability (J) Autistic.

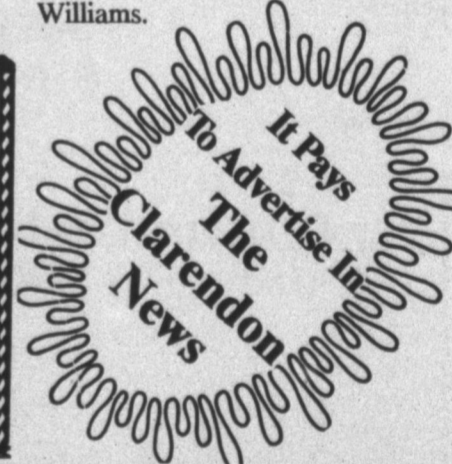

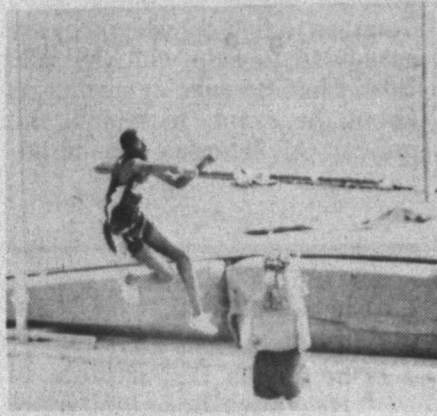

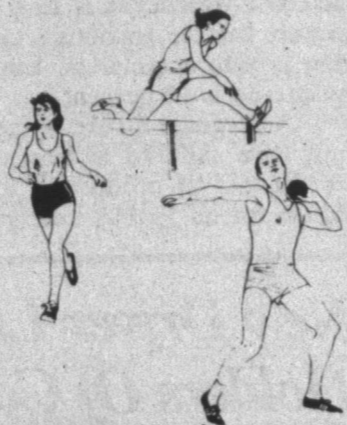

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Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Clarendon.

Armstrong, Donley, and Gray counties were recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the adverse weather conditions.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency

loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 9, 1991 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

New Driver License Test For Holders Of Commercial License

Clarendon Independent School District announced that the Commercial Driver License Testing will be held on Thursday, May 9, 1991 at 8:30 p.m. in the public school library.

The new federally mandated commercial driver license (CDL) is required when operating any one of the following:

1. A vehicle with a gross combination weight rating (GCWR) of 26,001 pounds or more inclusive of a towed unit with a gross combined weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds.
2. A single vehicle with a gross registered vehicle weight of 26,001 or more pounds.
3. A vehicle designed to carry 16 or more passengers including the driver.
4. A vehicle transporting hazardous materials required to be placarded in accordance with the hazardous material regulations.

Kennedy said commercial motor vehicle does not include the following: 1. A vehicle controlled or operated by a farmer within 150 miles of his farm. 2. Firefighting vehicles. 3. Military vehicles; 4. Recreational vehicles.

The judge stated that each of the drivers of the above mentioned vehicles will have to obtain a CDL when their current license expires or by April 1, 1992, which ever date comes first. More than two thirds of current Class A and B licenses will not expire before April 1, 1991. We are anticipating long lines at all driver license offices beginning late, this year and continuing until April 1, 1992. Those that postpone getting their drivers tested may find themselves without properly licensed drivers on April 1, 1992. The driver will be given \$4.00 credit for each full year of validity on current license when obtaining a CDL which costs \$40.00. There is no fee when making application or for taking as many tests as necessary to qualify for a CDL.

Persons may obtain more information by contacting the Driver License Office in Pampa.

Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health will be in their office at the Old Courthouse, May 14, 1991, from 9 to 12 and 1 to 3 p.m. for the immunization clinic offering vaccines that give protection against Polio, Diphtheria, Lock Jaw (Tetanus), Whooping Cough (Pertussis), measles, Rubella, Mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Dept. of Health will be charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

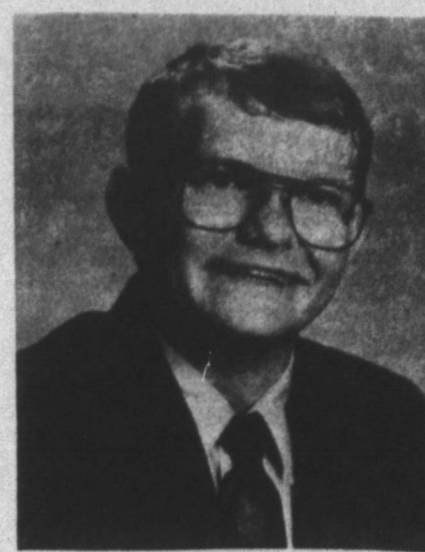

Annual Wheat Field Day

The Annual Wheat Field Day will be held on May 23, 1991, at the Texas A & M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo and the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory 0.75 miles west of Bushland. The morning session conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service begins at 8:30 a.m. in the Texas

A & M Auditorium, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. The program is chaired by Dr. Brent Bean, Extension agronomist, and is designed to qualify people for three continuing education units needed for renewal of Pesticide Applicator licenses.

The wheat research and demonstration bus tour begins at 1:00 p.m., according to Dr. B. A. Stewart, research director at Bushland.

Stops will include irrigated and dryland nurseries, wheat rooting depth study, wheat classification, grazing management, and tillage. This year's tour will highlight two new releases by Foundation Seed, TAM 202 and TAM 109.

vice economist and management specialist at Lubbock. "Improving their record keeping system can provide more immediate access to important financial information about their business to aid in decision-making."

The software used in this two-day session will be Quicken, Version 4, by Intuit. Since first introduced on the software market several years ago, Quicken has been widely adopted for small business and home record keeping.

"While not specifically designed for agricultural use, Quicken is flexible and easily adapted for this purpose," Smith said. "It is especially satisfying for those who have purchased a computer and are anxious to put it to use."

Participants will learn to use Quicken by a case study approach. They will set up a record keeping system with various accounts, income and expense categories and enterprises. Participants will write and print checks and enter transactions in the register.

These transactions will be used to generate customized reports that can be memorized for repeated use. Speeding entry of repeated transactions, using quick keys, and other tips will be discussed. Reconciling, interfacing with Lotus and word processing packages, budgeting, payroll and investment accounts will be covered, as time allows.

This course will run from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. each day. The cost will be \$100, which includes workshop materials and catered lunches each day. The necessary software will be provided for the duration of the course. No prior computer experience is necessary. Enrollment will be limited to fourteen. The deadline for registration will be May 7.

The Computer Training and Education Center is in the Moody Building at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center, fourteen miles west of Plainview on Highway 70.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 9, 1991 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Clarendon is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The supervisor will be at the Claude Courthouse on the first Wednesday of each month from 10:00 to 12:00 noon and in Pampa at the Courthouse annex on the second Thursday of each month from 10:00 to 12:00 noon.
