Special Gift Presented To School

Genevieve Caldwell, along with the Clarendon PTA, has purchased a special gift of an enrichment program for Clarendon School. Art Awareness is a pre-planned enrichment program to encourage an understanding of the arts. PTA volunteers will teach the structured developmental curriculum to K-6th grade students, who will learn great art in terms of simple art concepts which students can relate to their own art projects.

Visual aids and vocabulary are used in combination with over 70 museum prints, 7 sculpture reproductions, an architectural model, a world map, photographs and a slide set. Art Awareness introduces students to art from many cultures - American, Native American, Black American, European, Hispanic, African, Oriental, as well as prehistoric cave art and the art of ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome.

Volunteers will enter the classroom once a month, present the enrichment program, then conduct a related art project for the students to do as a group or individually, depending on that particular lesson.

Art Awareness, called the "Genevieve Britt Caldwell Art Awareness Series", in honor of its

benefactor, was first published in 1976 by Mary Ann Peoples, who holds a master's degree in art from Stanford University. She has been an art teacher, a director of a museum-sponsored art lecture program which was in 180 schools in Orange County in California and has served on many committees of art education and outreach programs in the area. Ms. Peoples has also been a lecturer for the Lafayette Arts and Sciences Foundation. Presently, she serves as an art consultant to Bay Area businesses. A revised edition of Art Awareness was completed in 1990.

This is being used in school districts all over the United States, as well as Puerto Rico.

Mike Word, principal, has expressed great enthusiasm for the program and feels the students should benefit from the enrichment series, which will continue year after year, since each grade level is presented a different curriculum. The Clarendon PTA is especially grateful to Mrs. Caldwell, not only for her enormous generosity, but also for her continuing interest in the arts and her willingness to share this with the children of this community.

Economy Steady

Donley County's economy is holding its own. It did not follow much of the area into a slump several years ago, and it is not following the rest of the state in the current expansion.

Clarendon Receives Grant

The City of Clarendon has recently learned that a State Facilities Development Grant for the Clarendon Municipal Airport has been approved in the amount of \$209,430.

The City will furnish \$23,270 remaining project costs with in-kind labor. The grant will provide the construction of turnarounds, extend and mark runway 800' X 60', install medium intensity runway lights, and repair and seal coat entrance road.

DPS News

The Department of Public Safety is making preparations to license approximately one million commercial drivers in Texas. On September 17, 1990, DPS began uniform testing for all currently licensed commercial and bus drivers.

All commercial motorists who drive vehicles in excess of 26,000 pounds or transport hazardous materials that require the vehicle to be placarded are required to have a commercial drivers license (CDL) by April 1, 1992. Bus drivers, including school bus and church bus drivers, who drive buses designed to carry 16 or more passengers, including the driver, will also be required to obtain a CDL by the same date.

Exempt from the CDL requirements are farmers, when they are driving within 150 miles of their farm, military personnel, recreational vehicle operators, and fire fighters when operating fire fighting vehicles or equipment.

Commercial drivers who must carry the new CDL's cannot renew their current licenses due to expire between September 17, 1990 and April 1, 1992. They should plan to visit the DPS Driver License offices for CDL testing at least one month before the expiration date.

To ensure that all commercial drivers in Texas who must have the CDLs obtain them to avoid penalties, the DPS troopers are urging them to visit the Driver License offices as soon as they have studied the CDL handbook. CDL license fee is \$40.00, less \$4.00 for each year of validity remaining on current Texas driver license. Free CDL handbooks are available at all of the offices. For more information contact: Sgt. Take This Medicine "As Needed"
One of the abbreviated instructions written on prescriptions by physicians and other prescribers is p.r.n., from the Latin pro re nata. P.r.n. is loosely translated and typed on the prescription label as "if needed," "when needed," or "as needed." A prescription might read, "take two tablets every four hours p.r.n. pain."
The use of p.r.n. instructions often occurs when there is a specific symptom to be relieved, such as diarrhea, fever, cough, pain, or upset stomach. When the symptom is relieved, the medicine should not be continued.
Many medicines should be taken on a routine basis and, therefore, do not lend themselves to p.r.n. dosing. Sometimes persons who take prescribed medicines for chronic health problems may take their medicines incorrectly on an "as needed" basis. For example, persons who take high blood pressure medicine or ulcer medicine should take medicines as prescribed, not when they think they need it. There is no reliable way for an individual to "feel" that the blood pressure is elevated or that ulcers have healed. For this reason, most medicines for chronic conditions must be taken every day, often for years. Always check the prescription label. If you are not sure about the directions, discuss the situation with your pharmacist.

Football Pro on Sports Safety

First Aid Tips

For all injuries to the face and mouth, request an examination by an oral and maxillofacial surgeon upon arrival at an emergency care center.

• **Knocked out tooth** - Rinse it and replace it in the socket covered with a piece of gauze. Or, store in cold milk, salt water or saliva. Make sure it does not dry out.

• **Facial bleeding** - Cover the wound with cloth and apply pressure. Do not remove the soaked cloth; add more cloths and continue to apply pressure.

• **Jaw fracture** - Gently align jawbones. Immobilize the jaw by wrapping a bandage under the chin and tying it securely over the head. Apply ice.

• **Nasal fracture** - Gently pack the nose with gauze. Apply ice.

• **Head or neck injury** - Do not move the victim without professional assistance. Immobilize the head by placing rolled towels on either side. Keep victim warm. If unconscious, clear out mouth and hold tongue forward to maintain open airway.

"Since young athletes are still developing, if an injury is not treated correctly, it can lead to long term problems," Dr. MacAfee said. "Coaches and parents should always take an injured athlete to the nearest hospital emergency room as soon as possible."

As an All-American tight end at Notre Dame and a first-round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers, Ken MacAfee has seen his share of sports injuries caused by blows to the head, face and neck. But, unlike most other professional athletes, MacAfee now treats people who are injured during contact sports.

Ken MacAfee, D.M.D., an oral and maxillofacial surgeon and spokesperson for the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, is a vocal advocate of sports safety among children.

Prevention is First Priority

Whether on the sports field, in the backyard or on the playground, young athletes should always wear protective gear.

Mouthguards are the absolute minimum protection any child should wear. Dr. MacAfee also urges young athletes to use facemasks and helmets during football and hockey, and to use helmets with clear plastic shields when playing baseball.

"In contact sports, the face and mouth are particularly vulnerable to injuries," Dr. MacAfee said. "Hits from playing sticks, flying balls and other players can cause serious and instant damage."

The Board then discussed the tax rate for the 1990-91 year. Motion was made by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith, to set the tax rate at 3% over this year's effective tax rate, for a rate of .55401 per \$100 valuation. Motion carried.

Ronnie Hudson with Employers Insurance Company explained a Workers Compensation plan available through Texas Political Subdivisions Workers Compensation Joint Insurance Fund. As the cost for the policy would mean a savings for the City, motion was made by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, to have the City's Workers Compensation insurance placed in this fund. Motion carried.

Bills for the month of August 1990, were presented and upon a motion by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, said bills were ordered paid. Motion carried.

There being no further City business at this time, motion was made by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman Steve Smith, to adjourn. Motion carried.

Remove Not the Ancient Landmark

Texans and Okies don't really hate each other. But we certainly do keep a court case going against each other. What is the problem? The Red River forms the Texas-Oklahoma boundary for a 480-mile stretch from the Sabine River to eastern edge of the Panhandle. But the fickle old Red won't stay put. Every now and then it decides to wander, looping down into Texas, or what used to be Texas, an Okie would say, then meandering into Oklahoma, or, again, what used to be Oklahoma, Texans say, as they present in court their claims to the land-gift of the Red. Such a case has found its way in the judicial system just this year.

The United States and Mexico have had similar boundary problems, and for the same reason: The Rio Grande doesn't always behave just the way we think it should. One such dispute over a few acres in the El Paso area dragged on for ninety-nine years.

Several years ago, it was suggested that several students at a major northeastern university who were having trouble with their studies not be required by their professors to express themselves in standard English. The students, virtually illiterate, it seems, were at the university on athletic scholarships, and were about to lose those scholarships because of their inability—or unwillingness—to commit themselves to the study of anything more serious than how to win the next football game.

"Let them use their street jargon," the argument went. "What difference does it make whether they are even exposed to, much less master, the finer points of English grammar?"

Just such an attitude prevailed among many in Britain until very recently, when it was discovered that numerous groups of persons scattered over England, all claiming to speak the Mother Tongue, were having difficulty understanding their neighbors only a few dozen miles down the road.

Border disputes and pedantic discussions over what constitutes standard English—what do the two have in common?

Snaky rivers don't make the best of boundaries, and an "anything goes" mentality with regard to our language does not make for the best of communication. One wishes there were more dependable standards in each case.

"Remove not the ancient landmark," we are admonished in Proverbs 22:28, and again in Proverbs 23:10. We need standards, markers, limits, guidelines, pointers, foundations, anchors. We need them in international relations and in across-the-fence encounters with our neighbors. We need them in scholastic endeavors and in everyday business dealings. We need them to stabilize our home life, and to formulate a philosophy of life.

"Remove not the ancient landmark." What is this landmark? In the original context, it was quite literally a boundary marker. The Word warned the Hebrews not to take advantage of a neighbor by

moving those markers which were set when the Lord led Israel into the Promised Land. Spiritually, the Lord has set markers for us, and those markers are to be found in the Bible. "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (II Peter 3:16). Did you get that? "...For doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction..." How's that for a marker, a standard?

What happens when we remove the ancient landmark? Actually, we cannot remove the landmark: "The grass withereth, the flower fadeth: but the word of our God shall stand forever" (Isaiah 40:8). But many certainly try. What happens when we try?

Look around you—a nation of people that feels it must "look out for number one," the murder of millions of unborn babies every year, epidemic lying and cheating in business and politics, soaring crime rates, homes that simply will not—cannot—hold together in a godless atmosphere, an education system

laden with textbooks that cannot abide the words "God" or "Christian," men who are "covetous, boasters,...blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy,...traitors,...lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God..." (II Timothy 3:2-4). That's what happens when we try to move the old landmarks!

Do you think this assessment is too harsh? Recently multi-billionaire Donald Trump arrogantly announced that the Ten Commandments are out of date. He's not alone; he's just more vocal, more blatant in his blasphemy than many others. Who do you think will stand better equipped on Judgement Day—Mr. Trump, who will have left his jillions—ever last cent—behind, or the psalmist who said "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against Thee"?

"Do not remove the ancient landmark." There ARE unchanging boundaries; there ARE rock-solid standards; whether we ever acknowledge them or not. Those boundaries, those standards, are

the Word of the Lord which abideth forever. Go back a few paragraphs and read II Timothy 3:16 again. No other book, no other code of law, no other philosophy could truthfully make such claims. In the words of Edward Mote's old hymn, "All other ground is sinking sand."

Thank you, Lord, for the ancient landmark.
