## Politicians are

 hungry to pass 'fat tax' lawsBy Steve Dasbach,

Toss those Twinkies, protect your potato chips, and
stash that soda because politicians want to slap a "fat tax" on some of your favorite foods.
That's rioh. Several states are co That's right: Several states are considering raising
revenue by targeting soda, candy, and other so-called junk food for special taxes.
Leading the way is the California Soda Tax Act (SB $1520)$ sponsored by State Senator Deborah Orriz. The
bill would impose a new tax on distributors of sod bill would impose a new tax on distributors of soda and
other sweetened drinks. By raising the price of a 12 . other sweetened drinks. By raising the price of a $12-02$
soda by about two cents, Ortiz hopes to raise about $\$ 300$
mill million a year to fund anti-obesity programs for children.
Then there's California State Assemblywoman Then there's California State Assemblywoman Wilma Chan. She filed a bill that would require the state
to study the feasibility of taxing "junk food" to fund new to study the feasibility of taxing "Junk food" to fund new
health and dental services for children. Unfortunately, the
other states as well:

- In Connecticut, a bill was filed to repeal a $6 \%$ sales tax exemption for candy or confectionery sold to college
cafeterias, senior centers, and day care centers. The state cafeterias, senior centers, and day care centers. The state
is also considering a tax on sugar products and vending
machine sales.
- A Maryland proposal would make it illegal for reslaurants that sell soft drinks not to sell sugar-free bever-
ages as well. Violators would face a 500 on ages as well. Violators would face a $\$ 500$ fine. impose special taxes on soft drinks; Minnesota charges sales tax on candy, chewing gum, and ice cream; and Texas imposes a candy tax.

companies for causing cancer, can they sue McDonald's companies for causing cancer, can they sue McDonald's
or Burger King for causing heart disease? If they can
declare obesity an epidemic, can they mandate exercise. declare obesity an epidemic, can they mandate exerci classes to help prevent a public health disaster?

Private school parents have many
options for their children's education options for their children's education,
including all-boys or all-girls schools or

choice. Now things are about to change. In January, President Bush signed the "No Child Left Behind Act" into law. One

gives public school systems the flexibility to offer single-sex classes and schools. The Department of Education will issue
guidelines on implementation of these guidelines on implementation of these
programs, and parents and other concerne programs, and parents and other concerned

their school board and request, for example, an eighth-rgade math class for boys or
a chemistry lab for girls. Until recently, most public school
systems have avoided the legal hassles systems have avoided the legal hassles
that typically accompany any attempt to offer single-sex programs. Only 11 public schools in the country have dared to chal-
lenge the lenge the status quo and offer these innova-
tive choices tive choices.
In 1972, legislation was passed to ensure equal educational opportunities for
boys and girls. While some people have boys and girls. While some people have
argued that single-sex schools go against this standard, it is in fact within the spirit of educational equality that we passed
this legislation. Equality of opportunity means that all students here in Texas and

merged with The Donley County Leamer in merged with The Donley County Leader in 1945 and then with The Clarendon
Press in 1974. Publisher Robert C. Williams renamed the Press in 1990, beginning the third series of The Clarendon News, which was later merged with Thes CLarendon Enterprise in 1996.
