Trains collide head-on BNSF accident kills one person, sends three to hospital

Two Burlington Northern-Santa Fe trains collided two miles west of Clarendon Tuesday morning, killing one person and injuring three others.

Details were still incomplete at press time, but Sgt. Richard Gribble of the Department of Public Safety said an eastbound coal train collided head-on with a westbound freight train shortly before 9 a.m.

Names of crewmembers and a manifest of the freight train were not available at press time.

Local emergency crews worked to free at least one member of the train crew. Three crewmembers were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. A fourth person, believed to be a member of the train crew, was killed and his body was pinned beneath the burning train wreckage.

"I'm constantly amazed at the ability of our local firemen and EMS," said DPS Trooper Chad Simpson. "They really work together."

Fire departments from surrounding towns rushed to the scene to assist local firefighters in containing the blaze. Firemen kept the train engines doused with water in an effort to calm flames fueled by diesel. Chemical foam was brought in from Pampa, Canyon, and Abilene to help extinguish the fire.

The fire appeared to be contained to engines. A plume of black smoke could be seen for more than 20 miles away, and US 287 was reduced to two lanes with westbound arne being me eastbound lanes. Officials on the scene said they



Politicians are hungry to pass 'fat tax' laws

Toss those Twinkies, protect your potato chips, and

stash that soda because politicians want to slap a "fat tax" on some of your favorite foods.

That's right: Several states are considering raising revenue by targeting soda, candy, and other so-called junk food for special taxes.

Leading the way is the California Soda Tax Act (SB 1520) sponsored by State Senator Deborah Ortiz. The bill would impose a new tax on distributors of soda and other sweetened drinks. By raising the price of a 12-oz soda by about two cents, Ortiz hopes to raise about \$300 million a year to fund anti-obesity programs for children.

Then there's California State Assemblywoman Wilma Chan. She filed a bill that would require the state to study the feasibility of taxing "junk food" to fund new health and dental services for children.

Unfortunately, the anti-fat fanatics are out in force in other states as well:

. In Connecticut, a bill was filed to repeal a 6% sales tax exemption for candy or confectionery sold to college cafeterias, senior centers, and day care centers. The state is also considering a tax on sugar products and vending machine sales.

· A Maryland proposal would make it illegal for restaurants that sell soft drinks not to sell sugar-free beverages as well. Violators would face a \$500 fine.

 Arkansas, Washington, and West Virginia already impose special taxes on soft drinks; Minnesota charges sales tax on candy, chewing gum, and ice cream; and Texas imposes a candy tax.

What do these initiatives and taxes have in common? They're all part of a growing movement to punish Americans for consuming the "wrong" food or drink.

Supporters of such proposals point to studies that say Americans are getting heavier, with 55% qualifying as overweight, and 18% as obese. The Journal of the American Medical Association even claimed there is an "epidemic" of obesity in America that is responsible for 300,000 deaths annually.

As a result, politicians are saying, "Watch your weight." But it would make sense for taxpayers to watch their wallets. It's clear that politicians aren't just trying to make America slimmer; they're also trying to

Don't turn back clock on welfare reform

One of the most important reforms of the past decade was the change to our welfare system passed by Congress in 1996. By requiring welfare recipients to

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work and adding time limits for those able to work, the trap of welfare dependency was transformed into a true helping hand. By almost every measure, these reforms have succeeded beyond all expectations. The 1996 Welfare Reform Act will

soon expire, and Congress will take up legislation to re-authorize it. Unfortunately, there will be some attempts to turn back the clock on the work requirements. There is always room for improvement upon legislation once it is enacted, and welfare reform is no exception.

But before we decide to turn back the clock on the reforms of 1996, we ought to take a close look at some of the good things that have happened over the last six

First, welfare rolls have been cut in half. Statistics provided by the Congressional Research Service show that from 1995 to 2000 the welfare case load declined 52% and the number of individuals receiving cash welfare payments declined 56%. With fewer people receiving welfare, we are better able to help those people who really need our assis-

Second, in virtually every category, living standards are better for those in need of help

For example, the employment rate



of single mothers on welfare increased 40% during the same period. One third of those leaving welfare earn incomes above 150% of the poverty line. The teen birth rate declined for all age, racial, and ethnic groups, including the largest decline ever for African-American teen pregnancy. Child support collections have grown every year - from \$12 billion in 1996 to \$19 billion in 2001.

These statistics are encouraging, but we can and should do even better. Too many former welfare recipients continue to live in poverty. Many have trouble paying housing and utility bills and putting food on the table.

At least one-third of those leaving welfare do not participate in Medicaid, food stamp, or child-care programs because they do not know that they are eligible. Our country's teen.pregnancy rate is still higher than most industrialized nations. We need to build on the successes of the program thus far but not revert to the failed policies of the past.

To make even more progress, we will need a rich mix of options because every situation is unique. The President's Faith-Based Initiative acknowledges that federal

support in the hands of communities makes a real difference in people's lives. This partnership of government with raith-based community caregivers who are close to the needs of people and trusted by those who hurt is the right approach. Government should strive to be a help up, rather than encourage dependency.

Moving from welfare to the workplace can be very disquieting at first for anyone who is attempting to step out of their comfort zone. Making this transition is certainly difficult, but it is also very important. It takes effort, good judgment, and a lot of determination on the part of the person who is making the transition. It also takes effort and good judgment by the government to craft legislation that is fair for the recipients and for the taxpayers. And, it takes the effort, good judgment, and compassion of the community to be the guide and a "hand up" for those who hit a bump in the road.

If there is one thing I know for sure, it is that Texans respect hard work. There is something important about the sense of accomplishment and self-reliance that comes from doing a good job. Government policies should help foster this selfreliant spirit.

No one piece of legislation will be a panacea for our country's social ills, but building on the success of the past six years can help create greater economic freedom and a higher standard of living for all our citizens.

State Senator Ortiz, for example, has admitted the soda tax revenue - along with an \$800 million increase in tobacco taxes that she authored - would be used to help close the state's \$17.5 billion budget gap. (Wait a minute: How can the same money be used to create new anti-obesity programs and reduce the budget deficit?)

And although one purpose of Ortiz's new tax is purportedly to discourage overweight people from eating sugary foods, there's no tax exemption or credit for people who are not overweight.

The new fat tax proposals are a continuation of a trend that started with so-called sin taxes on tobacco and liquor

Politicians have long argued that those products carried high social costs, such as increased need for medical care. So, they forced people who drank and smoked to pay higher prices for their vices.

(Those old-fashioned taxes are still popular: Nine states are considering boosting their current "sin taxes" on alcohol or tobacco.)

Once Americans got used to the idea of sin taxes, it was only a matter of time before the list of "sins" was expanded to include snack food, candy, french fries, and soda. Politicians never know when to say "enough."

That's why the next question is: Will they stop at taxing "bad" foods?

If they win the fight to tax fattening foods, should they subsidize food that's good for you - like tofu, broccoli, and bean sprouts? If they can sue tobacco companies for causing cancer, can they sue McDonald's or Burger King for causing heart disease? If they can declare obesity an epidemic, can they mandate exercise classes to help prevent a public health disaster?

But before the Calorie Cops take over, it's time to take another approach.

It's time for Americans to recognize that what you eat and how much you eat are matters of personal preference and personal responsibility. And if you make foolish choices, you are responsible for the consequences of your behavior.

While reasonable people can disagree over the proper role of government, we should all be able to agree that one place the government does not belong is in our refrigerator.

That's why we need to stop these fat tax proposals now before they devour more of our money and our freedom

After all, if Americans wanted the government to tell us what to eat, we would have elected Jenny Craig president.

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More options needed for public school kids

Private school parents have many options for their children's education, including all-boys or all-girls schools or classrooms. However, due to bureaucratic barriers, parents whose children attend public schools have been denied this choice. Now things are about to change.

In January, President Bush signed the "No Child Left Behind Act" into law. One of the landmark reforms in this legislation gives public school systems the flexibility to offer single-sex classes and schools. The Department of Education will issue guidelines on implementation of these programs, and parents and other concerned Americans have until July 9 to give public comment on this important issue.

I was proud to sponsor the amendment to remove the obstacles preventing public schools from offering single-sex programs to parents and students who request them. We wanted to provide this as an option ... - not a mandate - for America's public schools

Most of the time, co-educational classes are going to be the right answer for a child's learning needs. But studies conclude that, in some circumstances, students do better in a single-sex atmosphere. We want parents who might not be able to afford private school to be able to go to their school board and request, for example, an eighth-grade math class for boys or a chemistry lab for girls.

Until recently, most public school systems have avoided the legal hassles that typically accompany any attempt to offer single-sex programs. Only 11 public schools in the country have dared to challenge the status quo and offer these innovative choices.

In 1972, legislation was passed to ensure equal educational opportunities for boys and girls. While some people have argued that single-sex schools go against this standard, it is in fact within the spirit of educational equality that we passed this legislation. Equality of opportunity means that all students here in Texas and across the country should have the options in a public school setting that they could



choose in private education.

Numerous studies have shown that single-sex programs can reduce barriers to learning by providing a less intimidating and more productive classroom. Research shows that some girls have more confidence to express themselves in the classroom and they pursue more courses in mathematics and science in same-gender programs than they do in a co-educational school.


Public, all-boys programs in other states have successfully offered young men the tools they need to succeed by instilling in them discipline, self-respect, and leadership. In one school, eighth-grade boys have outperformed their peers in state writing and mathematics benchmarks by nearly two-to-one.

Another example of the benefits of single-sex classrooms is the Young Women's Leadership School in New York City. The school opened its doors in 1996 to

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These kinds of results demonstrate why we must open the door for more public schools to explore similar educational alternatives.

Congress, the President, and Secretary of Education Rod Paige have encouraged innovation and creativity in our public schools. Our goal is to have the best education system in the world. One of the options that should be available if parents ask is a single-sex educational opportunity in public schools. I encourage you to voice your opinion on this important issue.

How much water do you use in a day? A gallon? Ten gallons? Few people know how much they use. The amount is likely to be as much as 60 gallons per person per day. This figure has tripled since 1901.

They know that water is a limited resource. Today, water shortages are a local or regional problem. Someday they may be a national problem. It is wise to learn how to conserve nature's precious supply of fresh water.

As the weather continues to heat up, I would like to offer some tips for conserving water outside the home. Car washing can use a lot of water. You may have to lower your standards and wash the car less often. However when you do wash your car, keep these tips in mind:


• Use a bucket of sudsy water to remove soil from the car. Hose down only as a final rinse.

• Drive your car onto your lawn before you rinse it. Water the grass as you wash your car.

. If you go to a car wash, patronize one that recirculates water.

When it comes to conservation and plants, soapy water that comes from soap you can use on your skin is OK for outdoor plants. Do not use water with bleach or borax compound in it on plants. It could damage them. Rinse water can be used on outdoor or indoor plants.

"Mulch" to retain the moisture in soil is great. Try "trickle" or "drip" irrigation systems in outdoor gardens. These methods use 80-90 percent less water than hose or sprinkler methods.

this year with eight of the contestants being freshmen. Two were juniors, and only one, Roberts, was a senior.



AUSTIN - One of the most popular forms of individual expression on the road today is the personalized license plate. TxDOT is featuring the personalized plate as the specialty plate for May.

Since 1965, when TxDOT began issuing personalized plates to Texas drivers, vehicles have displayed vanity plates with names, initials, greetings, or clever phrases on them. "Personalized plates have


proven to be popular among Texans," said Mike Behrens, TxDOT executive director. "They are a creative expression of individuality. Once a driver gets a personalized plate with a phrase that they really like, they can hold onto it forever."

Personalized plates are available through TxDOT or county tax offices for \$40 per year, in addition to regular registration fees.

Money raised from personalized license plates goes to the state's General Revenue Fund, where it is used for various state services and programs. In a one-year period ending on August 31, 2001, personalized plates accounted for approximately \$3.2 million of that fund.

Personalized license plates accommodate up to six alpha or numeric characters. Motorists can purchase a set of personalized plates at anytime, regardless of when the vehicle registration expires.

Applications for personalized plates are available at county tax offices, on TxDOT's web site (www.dot.state.tx.us), by calling the TxDOT Help Desk at (512) 465-7611, or by calling TxDOT's Fax-On-Demand at (888) 232-7033.

Events this year included Bring Your Own Banana, the Junior Olympics class competition, and a dance for Valentine's Day.


Student council also hosted a talent show on May 9, where all proceeds were donated to the St. Jude Children's Hospital. Donation boxes for the hospital were also set up around town.


Some members also attended the Annual State Convention in Arlington. Members visited Six Flags over Texas and attended a convention to build a better council for the future.
