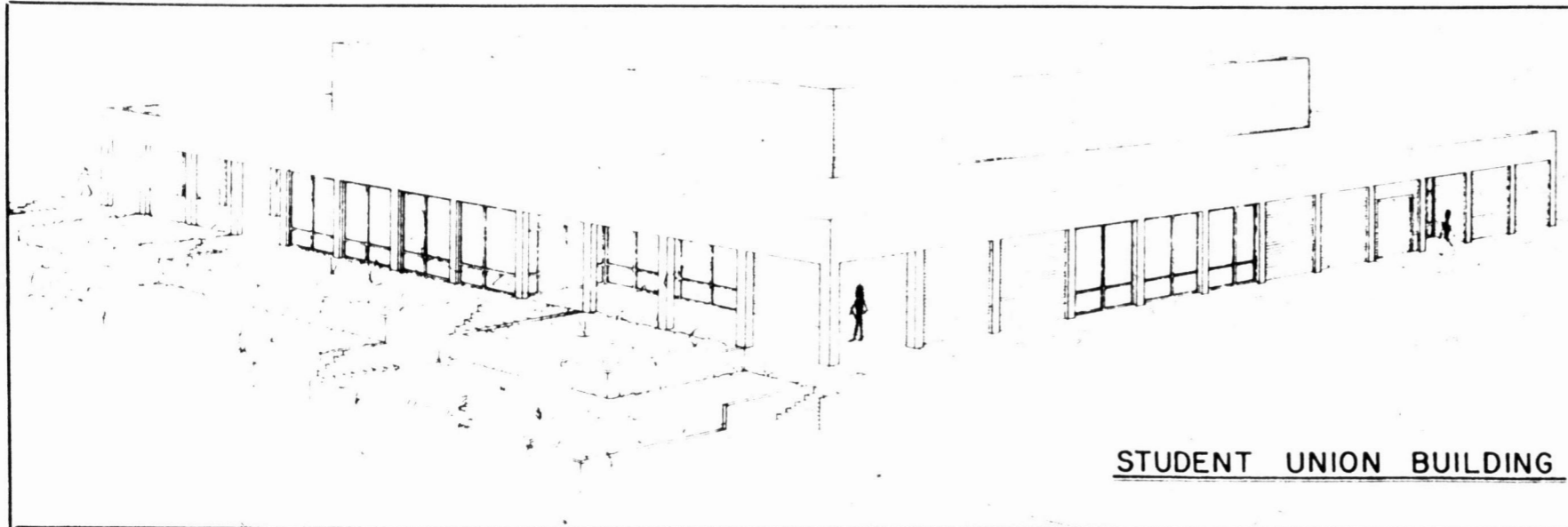

## College To Get New Building

As announced previously, Clarendon College is in the process of finalizing the plans for the Bairfield Activity Center just west of the college gym. The building fund was initiated by Mr. & Mrs. Charlie Bairfield. The Bairfields have contributed very generously regarding the construction of the new building which will bear their name. The balance of the cost of the building will be financed by revenue bonds, which will ultimately be paid by various student fees.

I remember well the meeting which took place with Charlie concerning the center. Charlie assured us that he and his wife wanted to leave something to the people of Clarendon which could express their love for the community. Their decision to assist Clarendon College was based on the fact that an activity center would benefit the community as well as the college.

The Bairfield Activity Center will be designed to accommodate banquets, special meetings, etc. which will support the students and the community. It will have a game room, a snack bar, a nice meeting

room, a bookstore, a large banquet area, and it will have offices for Financial Aids and for the Counselor. The center will have approximately 14,000 square feet of floor space which should accommodate a banquet for 300 people. A speakers podium, sound system, and folding dividers will make the area flexible for many uses. The construction was designed for fuel efficiency and to match the existing buildings.

The Center will be constructed on the hill where the old tennis courts lie and overlook the track facing highway 287. The building site should be very attractive and students can watch intramural activities from the building.

Bids on the building will be solicited beginning in November. We expect and hope for good bids, which will allow our money to purchase as much as possible. We should have a ground breaking somewhere around the last of November or the first part of December.

We want to thank Mr. & Mrs. Bairfield for their interests in Clarendon College and the community. Mr. Bairfield realizes what the college means to Donley County and to the city of Clarendon. Any city would love to have a Community College contributing to their economy. Modern state laws will never allow that to happen. Tax evaluation and population numbers now govern creation of community colleges.

We welcome you to come to the campus at any time, but particularly as we begin our building program. We want each of you to feel that this is your community college and that we exist to serve the needs of our students and the supporting community.

## Three Injured in Wreck

Three Clarendon College students were seriously injured in a single-car roll over on Saturday night, September 27th. Kim Moore, 19, of LeFors, Tricia Johnson, 19, of Arnet, Oklahoma, and Tommy Preston, 21, of

Hereford were eastbound on U.S. Highway 287 at a high rate of speed when the driver lost control of the vehicle. In the ensuing roll overs, all people three were thrown out of the vehicle. All three were transported by Clarendon Ambulance Service to Amarillo where they underwent emergency surgery. As of press time, Preston and Moore were reported to be in fair condition, but Johnson was still in critical condition. She had not regained consciousness.

The cause of the accident is still under investigation.

"All three would have probably walked away with minor bruises if they had been wearing their seatbelts," said the investigating officer. Had the vehicle rolled another quarter of a turn, it would have crushed two of the ejected students. Being thrown from a vehicle is frequently fatal.

## First Bale Is In!

Clarendon Gin cleaned and baled the first bale of cotton in 1990 on Thursday evening, September 27th. Bobby Cole raised the fiber on the Higgins place, west of Clarendon. He defoliated part of one field and stripped enough cotton to produce about 10 bales.

"This looks like it will be a good year," said Wandell Luttrell, owner/manager of the gin. "It looks as though we are going to have an above average year." Preliminary estimates indicate that both quantity and quality will be good.

No grade figures were available from the compress as of press time.

## Clarendon Shuts Out Gruver 19-0

The Clarendon Broncos broke a three game losing streak, chalking up their first victory of the season by beating Gruver 19-0.

Gruver took the opening kick off on their 20 yd line. Three plays later Gruver was on their 19 yd line where a stubborn Bronco defense forced them to punt. The Broncos started a drive from the Gruver 42 yd line. On the second play Stewart's pass was intercepted and returned to the 47 yd line. Gruver moved the ball over the 50 yd line to the 37 in 3 plays, but QB Hoel was sacked by Davis & Johnson back to the 42 yd line. The Broncos fumbled on the first play, but Nathan Lowrie recovered on the 33 yd line. Stewart passed to Shadle who moved the ball to the 46 yd line. Two plays later, Stewart punted for the Broncos to the end zone - a 54 yd punt.

Gruver started the next drive on their 20 yd line and eight plays later were on the Bronco 27 yd line where the Broncos defense again denied Gruver a first down and Clarendon took over on their 27 yd line. The Broncos moved the ball to the 39 yd line and a first down. QB Stewart passed to Randy Allen who moved the ball over the 50 yd line to the 48 yd line of Gruver and a first down as the first quarter ended 0-0.

As the second quarter began, Stewart moved the ball on a QB keeper to the 32 yd line. Randy and Dusty Allen then took turns moving the ball to the 5 yd line. Stewart lost 3 yds on the next play, but then went 8 yds on the next play for the T.D. The kick was blocked and the Broncos led 6-0 with 7:42 left to play in the second quarter.

After the kickoff, Gruver moved the ball to the Bronco 48 yd line where they punted to Randy Allen on the 5 yd line and he returned to the 26 yd line. QB Stewart then passed to Spencer Smith who ran the ball to the 23 yd line, a 39 yd gain. Two plays later QB Stewart completed another pass to Smith who moved the ball to the 13 yd line. A penalty took the ball to the 6 yd line and a pass to Michael Shadle took the ball to the one yd line. On the next play Dusty Allen went over for the T.D. The E.P. was not good and the Broncos led 12-0 with 15 seconds left to play in the first half. Two plays after the kickoff, Dusty Allen intercepted a Gruver pass on the 30 yd line and scored his second TD in 15 seconds. The extra point kick by Stewart was good and the Broncos led 19-0 at halftime.

Although there was no more scoring for the night, both teams moved the ball but the rest of the contest was highlighted by out-

standing defense by both teams. Gruver had the ball down to the Bronco 9 yd line, but could not dent the Bronco defense. Later in the 3rd quarter, Randy Allen intercepted a Gruver pass on the 25 and returned it to the 15 yd line. The Broncos could not capitalize and gave the ball back to Gruver on downs.

In the 4th quarter, Gruver had a TD called back due to a holding penalty. Three plays later Lee Gage intercepted a Gruver pass in the end zone to end the last serious Gruver threat.

This victory was a team effort and no individual really stood out. Michael Shadle caught 2 passes for 18 yds; Randy Allen caught 2 passes for 22 yds; Spencer Smith caught 2 passes for 48 yds; Desmond

Johnson had 32 yds rushing; Randy Allen 20 yds rushing; Dusty Allen 20 yds rushing. The Broncos had 221 total yds.

Spencer Smith made 8 tackles; Randy Allen had 9 tackles; Brice Fletcher had 10 tackles; Steven Davis had 8 tackles; and Nathan Lowrie had 8 tackles.

However, The Clarendon News selected Jonathan Stewart, who completed 7 passes for 96 yds, ran for 38 yds and punted 5 times for an average of 42 yds per kick, (with longest kick of 62 yds) as the offensive player of the week. Also, selected was Dusty Allen as defensive player of the week. Dusty intercepted a pass and returned it for a TD, with two other near misses. Made seven tackles and numerous assists.

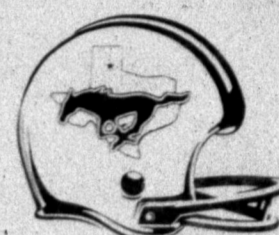

### Who Do You Look Down On?

There was a "hen party" in progress, and the ladies were enjoying the visiting. Near the center was an older lady who had a mischievous grin and sparkling blue eyes. Despite her age, her wit was quick. Everyone always enjoyed being around her.

The conversation gradually shifted. Some one brought up the name of a man that several of the ladies didn't care for, and almost instantly several of the younger people got into a contest to see who could make the meanest comment about the guy. Then, when there was a second's pause, the old lady spoke up, "I reckon he usually done about as good as he knowed how."

She spoke gently, but in place of the grin was a serious expression. The room was quiet for a few seconds, the someone changed the subject, and the party went on. But with very few words, the old lady had taught a pretty good lesson in Christian living. Whatever her comment lacked in grammar in more than compensated for in wisdom.

"Who are you to judge someone else's servant?" Asked the Apostle Paul in Romans 14:4. Or again, in Romans 14:10 "You then, why do you judge your brother? Or why do you look down on your brother?" Rhetorical questions, but the message is clear. And three verses later it is repeated: "Stop passing judgment on one another!" No "ifs, ands or buts".

Jesus often taught the same lesson, and in Matthew 7:2 he said, "For in the way you judge others, you will be judged..." Judge arrogantly, harshly and hastily and you will be judged in the same manner. Judge by external appearances and be judged on the same basis.

In the gospels, Jesus constantly amazed and offended those around him because he criticized the "holy" folks while caring about those who weren't respectable. They saw outside roles; Jesus saw inside souls.

"I reckon he done as good as he knowed how." How many of us really know what someone else "knowed" or "didn't knowed"?

And how many of us live up to what we know to be right?

If we look at what we know (or what we assume we know) then we can get pretty proud. But if we think about what we don't know, it's pretty humbling.

Maybe we should each assume that every person around us is "doing as good as he (or she) knows how" until such time as we can live up to our own knowledge of what we should be.

For if we did that honestly, that would stop most of us from looking down on anybody, anytime.

ing basketball for Clarendon College. Janet (Janet) Mantilla is twenty-five years old and hails us from Bucaramanga, Colombia. Beatriz Elana Castano is twenty-one and is from Medellin, Colombia. Both girls are very interesting to talk with despite the language barrier we had during the interview.

Janet and Beatriz both had several years of English during school in Colombia; but as is the case with many American students taking Spanish, they saw little point in learning another language. Now they wish they had paid more attention.

Of course, the big question on my mind was what are these girls doing in the United States, not to mention Clarendon. Janet (the most talkative of the two) told me of a girl from Colombia who had come to play basketball for Oklahoma City University. Patricia Ordonez became one of the most valued players on the team. The citizens of Patricia's hometown, Cali, paid her way back to Colombia to participate on the Cali team playing in the national tournament. This was in May of this year.

At these games Patricia saw Beatriz and Janet. Each was playing on teams from their respective towns. Patricia asked them if they would like to play ball in America. They answered with a resounding "Yes!"

They came to Clarendon in order to practice learning English for the next two years, so they can handle the work load and situations at the University of Oklahoma. Also, the most important thing to them is being able to play basketball, because they love the game so much. They now have three months to learn English well enough to be able to pass twelve college hours and to pass the TASP entrance exam. If they cannot do so, they will be ineligible to play ball.

When asked about her impressions of Americans, Beatriz responded that while growing up, she had the notion that Americans were snobs. However, she always liked the idea of visiting Texas. Janet wants to study physical education and be a basketball coach either here in the United States or in Bucaramanga. She formerly worked in Colombia as a basketball coach for kids in their early teens. She says that the pay would be better in the United States, but because she is something of a local star at home, she would receive a higher than average salary.

Beatriz would like to study business and specialize in marketing. She worked in a bank in the loan information department. Beatriz has not yet decided whether she would rather live and work in the United States or take the knowledge she learns here back to Medellin to help improve their marketing ideas.

Janet and Beatriz both are giving one hundred percent in their efforts to learn English and make good ball players for Clarendon College. I feel that in three months, they will have no problems being

able to pass their twelve hours. As a matter of fact, they will probably make top grades.

God, through the Bible has much to say about neighbors. For instance: "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour." (Exo.20:16; Deu.5:20) "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." (Lev.19:18; Matt.19:19, 22:39; Gal.5:14; Jam.2:8)

who they are: people worth more than a cup of sugar?

Excuse me, closest neighbor, would you like to share my Passover Lamb of Glory, Jesus Christ, with me?


