### Early voting starts next Wednesday

Early voting by personal appearance begins April 17 for three local boards.

Citizens of the City of Clarendon can cast early ballots for three aldermen at City Hall. Those running are Tommy Hill, Janice Knorpp, Mac Stavenhagen (i), and Mark White (i). Billy Jack Land (i) is running as a write-in candidate.

Howardwick citizens will also select three aldermen and can choose from Vernon Byars (i), Sam Grider, Donald Holladay, or Bobby Murdock. Balloting is at the Howardwick City Hall.

Citizens of Donley County can vote for three positions on the Clarendon College Board of Regents. Those running are Jimmy Blackerby, Mary Douglas, Sherol Johnston, Jack A. Moreman (i), and Bill Sansing (i). Early vote may be cast at the CC Administration Build-

Early voting continues through April 30, 2002. The election will be held May 4.

# Greenbelt improving beach area

The \$187,000 improvement project at Sandy Beach that has been three years in the making is nearing completion.

Greenbelt Water Authority received its third grant since 1997 from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to build and improve facilities on Sandy

"We can apply for grants every other year," said Bobbie Kidd, General Manager of Greenbelt Water Authority. "This is the same grant that helped us do the Boat Routes in 1995 and work on Kincaid Park."

The Commission requires that all projects be completed within three years of receiving the grant. That time limit expired March 15.


'We have received an extension, but everything must be complete before August. We should be done well before that deadline."

The construction includes walking trails, RV campsites, covered picnic tables and grills, a gazebo, and even an amphitheater.

"The project is now 71 percent complete," Kidd said. "The only projects still undone are the volleyball court and playground area, and those shouldn't take long."

Once the Sandy Beach project is completed, the plant must update its Master Plan, but the next projects on the agenda are High Bluff and the plant itself, he said.

# Sheriff's office gets \$9k grant

Governor Rick Perry this week announced grants totaling \$553,217 to help local law enforcement agencies in 94 Texas cities and counties purchase equipment, including more than \$9,000 for the Donley County Sheriff's Department.

The grants, awarded through by the Criminal Justice Division (CJD) of the Governor's Office, are funded through the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant of the US Department of

"These grants make it possible for smaller communities in Texas to provide peace officers with the latest technology," Perry said. "By providing access to essential equipment, law enforcement efforts are strengthened, and safety is bolstered for Texans in every part of our state."

The one-time grants for up to \$10,000 may be used to purchase equipment related to law enforcement or public safety functions, such as bulletproof vests, radios, video systems, or mobile data units for patrol

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said his department will use the money to buy four new light bars and five new radios for patrol vehicles. The grant totals \$9,415, and the county will provide a match of \$1,043.

Donley is one of only three Panhandle counties receiving the grants. The others are Hemphill and Ran-

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# Energy more important than caribou

Iraqi suicide bomb underwriter Saddam Hussein cut off oil exports Monday. Turning off the spigot is supposed to hit the United States in the pocketbook and thereby get us to stop Israeli defense forces from weeding out terrorists in their midst.

America's dependency on foreign oil is a detriment to our economic security and is the overriding factor of why we're even involved in the Middle East. Year after year, we become more dependent and less self-reliant. And yet, the Senate Democrats continue to block any effort to remedy this situation.

In August of last year, the US House of Representatives voted to permit drilling for oil in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), but the Senate - primarily Majority Leader Tom Daschle - has kept the issue from coming to the floor for a vote.

Senate Democrats like Daschle are nothing more than obstructionists and are actively preventing the strengthening of our national security. In a sense, they are lackeys for people like Saddam. In their continuing games of political one-upmanship, the Democrats are helping the very people who would kill all of us if given

America must find ways to produce its own energy. Ideally, we should be dependent on no foreign nation or group of nations for the stuff which fuels our lives and our economy. And while alternative fuels would be great, they aren't going to be here overnight. We must therefore drill for more domestic oil, and ANWR is the place to do it.

Admittedly, opening new oil fields will take time. It could be years before our nation benefits from exploration of that frozen wasteland. This is not a good excuse to keep from drilling. It is just another reason to start drilling right away. The sooner we develop new domestic oil sources, the sooner we decrease our dependency on people like Saddam and OPEC.

The US Interior Department says the Alaskan oil field at ANWR could provide enough oil to offset for 30 to 40 years what we now import from Iraq. But opponents say there is only enough oil in ANWR to fuel an SUV for two trips to Allsup's, and, besides, it might upset the caribou.

Well, I for one don't give a rat's booty about the caribou, the polar bears, the musk-oxen, or Alaskan migratory birds. I have just one message for those critters: "Adapt or die."

The very idea that we're putting our national security at risk for the sake of a few stupid animals is simply insane. The Constitution was not established for "We the caribou." It is the liberties of "the People" that the federal government was established to protect.

The Bush administration is trying desperately to persuade people that drilling in the Arctic can be accomplished with very little impact to the environment. This is very true. We've all seen cattle grazing next to oil wells. You don't see it in Donley County much, of course, but just travel a few miles north, and it's not unprecedented. Oil companies have been drilling for more than half a century in parts of the Panhandle, and we still have migratory birds and other wildlife.

Yes, drilling does impact the land. (That's why they call it drilling.) But it does not necessarily follow that any animal or bird will become extinct or even threatened just because exploration is allowed up there.

Rep. Don Young of Alaska has said that ANWR was meant to be explored and drilled for the good of the American people. He also correctly points out that most people have never even been or ever will go to that remote area of his state.

He's right. I've got no interest in going there. But I do have an interest in how much it costs to fill up my gas tank, I do have an interest in the cost of goods shipped to merchants from which I buy, I do have an interest in the cost of agricultural products which feed and cloth me, and I do have an interest in the thousands of products that are created using petroleum.

It's nice to be able to protect wildlife and see them in their natural habitat. But the reality is that the average American - including me - doesn't want their daily life disrupted for the sake of any wild animal. It's a shame, for example, that the buffalo were hunted to near extinction. But how many people in the Great Plains states would like to see those thunderous herds bursting through their homes and towns? Not very many I suspect.

Our federal government is supposed to protect our rights to live life as we see fit, and it was explicitly set up to defend us against foreign enemies. By subjugating our lives to those of the caribou, Senate Democrats are making a mockery of our Constitution and threatening our national security. Any energy crisis we face is largely their doing, and President Bush should take to the bully pulpit and hold them accountable for such.

# Community upset about Classic Cable

This is my first time to write a letter to any newspaper, but I feel like the public was not given all the facts. To say the radio station was upset is putting it mildly. Clarendon is upset.

It sounds like the radio station has been paying nothing for six years. Wrong. They have, and Classic just wanted more, \$200 more a month. Do you want cable service in your home to go up \$200 a month? Well, neither do I.

A few years back Mission Cable was asking anyone that could bring channels into Clarendon, so the church bought a \$1,500 receiver, new dish, and men to install the equipment, then this last month the TV Ministry paid \$900 for a new sound system to make things better. All this was done through donations and \$300 (a year) the churches pay us to air them. If a church has a revival, Vacation Bible School, or anything, that is aired free.

I was given a letter from a church that is "happy" with Classic, so I called the church to find out how. Well, you tape your service, take it to the Classic Cable station, pop your tape in and set the timer, and it comes on Monday night, for one hour at \$25. The church I spoke to runs their tape to two other towns and does the same thing. Is this what we want in Claren-

Tell me why they need another community channel when we had two already? Mr. Harbison says he is not trying to get any church off the air. Well, what did he just do? As for paying \$25 an hour, if that's not so bad then write us out a check for \$100 a month so we can go back on the air, because our TV Ministry cannot afford this. Also, this will stop the ministry from being able to give Christmas gifts to all our



Education critical to preventing meningitis

Nearly 3,000 Americans contract meningitis each year. It is a serious illness that can result in deafness, blindness, amputations, permanent brain damage, and even death. Approximately 10 to 13 percent of Americans afflicted die despite receiving antibiotics immediately after diagnosis. Last year 198 Texans became ill with this disease. Seventeen died.

The bacteria that cause meningitis can be found in the noses and throats of many people who never become sick. In isolated cases, however, the bacteria can travel to a person's blood, brain, or spinal cord, causing an infection that leads to the illness.

The bacteria is spread through sneezing or coughing directly in someone's face, kissing, sharing eating and drinking utensils, or any exposure to another person's saliva. Severe symptoms can appear suddenly in a matter of hours or may begin with flu-like symptoms. Abrupt onset of



a stiff neck, nausea, or vomiting requires prompt medical attention. Also, dramatic behavioral changes such as disorientation, sleepiness, and difficulty waking may be later warning signs. Last year I introduced the "Meningitis

Immunization Awareness Act" (S. 1009) along with my colleague, Senator George Voinovich from Ohio. The legislation would raise awareness about meningitis by requiring the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to consult with the Centers for Disease Control to provide information about the disease and available vaccinations. These resources would be high fever, severe and persistent headaches, distributed to locations with high-risk pop-

ulations to help educate parents and families who are often unaware of the risks their child may face.

Currently, a vaccine for most strains of meningitis is available, and it is effective for three to four years. It helps prevent the onset of the infection, yet it can take up to two weeks for protection to begin. Easy tasks such as covering your nose and mouth when sneezing, washing your hands regularly, and avoiding sharing utensils and drinking bottles can help reduce the risk.

The Meningitis Immunization Awareness Act will be part of a comprehensive package called the "Improved Vaccine Affordability and Availability Act." I will be working with my colleagues to pass this legislation, so we can ensure that all Americans will have information to help prevent this horrible disease.

# Tahoe crashes into local restaurant

An afternoon pizza was interrupted for one Clarendon family when a truck crashed through the west wall of the Pizza Hut on Saturday.

Albert Duran, age 34, and his daughter Krista, age 3, were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital by Clarendon EMS where they were treated and released. They suffered no major injuries, Donley County Deputy Bruce Burrell said. Duran's wife, Stacey, was not injured.

A 2002 Chevy Tahoe driven by a 15-year-old Pampa girl struck the building at approximately 4:22 p.m. and partially entered the building where the Durans were seated.

"If the little girl had been sitting beside her father, it could have been very bad," Burrell said. "He was thrown clear out in the floor."

Burrell said the driver's mother, Kimberly Freeman Dyer, was apparently teaching the girl how to drive.

No charges are pending, but the case remains open, awaiting an estimate of damages to the restaurant.
