









# Beef raisers learn about producing consistent, quality product

COLLEGE STATION - To assure consumers will continue to receive a consistent, high-quality product, Texas cattle producers zeroed in on the latest technological advances in beef production recently at the 48th annual Beef Cattle Short Course.

The two-and-a-half day event, held August 5-7 at Texas A&M University, attracted 1,100 cattle producers and exhibitors throughout Texas.

"What we've talked about here is working with producers to come up with that ultimate, high-quality product for consumers," said Dr. Larry Boleman, Texas Cooperative Extension beef cattle specialist and short course chairman.

"In addition to that, we're trying to raise safe, nutritious beef. At the same time, what we're trying to do here is teach the producers to do all of those things because it enhances consumer confidence, which enhances

consumer expenditures. If you've got a good, healthy and safe product, people are going to buy it."

"These Are Challenging Times," the theme of this year's short course, was fitting as the beef industry continues to undergo some of the most dramatic changes ever seen.

"The entire industry, all of the segments are working more closely than they ever have before," he said. "All of it is with the consumer as a goal or opportunity in mind rather than where we used to stop at just producing choice cattle or making cattle that didn't get sick."

"We're not going to abandon that all of those are good things. But we're looking beyond that. Every one of those can be good or bad. You can have a high-average daily gain, but if it's with an animal that has an inferior tasting meat because you bred it to the wrong kinds of bulls, then you didn't give the consumer a good

product." More than any other time in history, Boleman said, all segments of the beef industry - the purebred cattle producer, the cow-calf producer, the stocker operator and the feedlot operator - have joined together in a coordinated effort to share information.

"All of that information is coming back (through each segment), say for example, the gain of the bulls, whether your cattle got sick in the feedlot, whether they made a lot of money. We're not vertically integrated, but we're integrated to the degree of cooperation. That's a change in the philosophy we've not had before. That's a good thing."

And the beef industry's leading producers are already becoming more integrated, Boleman said, either by owning or sharing ownership of cattle that are sent to the feedlot.

"And some are either owning

them all the way through to the packer or sharing ownership to the packer."

Some producers are even retaining ownership until the carcass is packaged as cuts and sold exclusively to restaurants or to retail outlets. As producers adopt better breeding systems and more value-added practices to their operations, buyers will take notice and reward them with premiums paid for their cattle.

"The more ownership you can take every time it changes hands, you're the recipient of that value. That's going to take place with the most forward (thinking) producers."

Smaller producers may not have the resources to retain ownership from "pasture to plate" but will adopt some of the same practices used by larger operators, Boleman said. In return, they will be rewarded for their efforts, receiving premiums when selling their cattle.

**Harrington Cancer Center receives grants**

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center received notification of four grants awarded for patient care and educational programs and services.

The Children's Miracle Network awarded a total of \$10,000 to the Quality of Life Department. The Art Therapy Program and the Music Therapy Program each received \$5,000. The grants will subsidize the cost of supplies and consultant fees for the pediatric oncology side of both programs.

The Art Therapy and Music Therapy Programs assist in reducing the physical strains associated with cancer and its treatments. The use of art and music, under the guidance

of trained art and music therapists, can help reduce high blood pressure, muscle tension, and the perception of pain. The goals of the programs are that the patients will temporarily separate from the day-to-day struggles of the challenges they are facing. Additional benefits of the programs are self-discovery, pleasure, and relaxation, and stress relief.

The proceeds from the 2001 Komen Amarillo Race for the Cure totaled approximately \$75,000, of which \$55,480 was given in local grants to the Harrington Cancer Center for programs that benefit breast cancer. The Cancer Center gave 25 cents of the total funds raised by the Race to the Susan G. Koman

Breast Cancer Foundation in Dallas for breast cancer research.

A grant in the amount of \$1,480 was awarded to the Harrington Cancer Center's Education Department for a Cancer Education Conference including a breast cancer component. A second grant in the amount of \$54,000 was awarded to the Comprehensive Breast Center to purchase a new outreach mobile mammography van. The vans travel within the Amarillo city limits, the Texas Panhandle, eastern New Mexico, southeastern Colorado, and southwestern Oklahoma providing breast cancer screening and education.

The tournament was held this past weekend with 29 members participating in the two-day event.

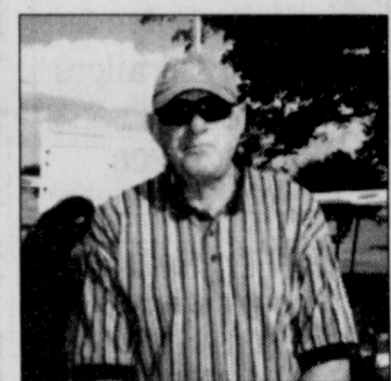
Blackerby was tied with Chris Chamberlain with 156 after 36 holes. Chamberlain was named runner-up in the tournament.

# TDH reports West Nile Virus advancing westward

A horse in Haskell County, about 50 miles north of Abilene, tested positive Wednesday, August 7, for the mosquito-borne disease West Nile Virus (WNV). This is the 21st horse to test positive for WNV in Texas and is the westernmost detection of the virus in the state.

"Previously, WNV had been detected only as far west as Travis County," reported Dr. Joe Garrett of the Zoonosis Control Division of the Texas Department of Health. "The virus was confirmed in a dead blue jay submitted from southwest Austin on July 17."

He noted that infected birds have been found in seven counties: Collin, Dallas, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery, Tarrant and Travis. Infected mosquitoes have been detected in Dallas, Fort Bend, Harris, Orange, and Jefferson counties.

"We credit the Texas Department of Health with confirming infection in the Haskell County horse. The private veterinary practitioner, suspecting that the animal might have rabies, submitted the brain to the TDH laboratory, where rabies testing is conducted. After ruling out that disease, health

department laboratory technicians tested the tissue for West Nile Virus and confirmed infection," said Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. She said unless rabies is suspected, WNV testing for horses is usually conducted at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL) at College Station. WNV testing for humans, birds, and mosquitoes is conducted by the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

"We're continuing to urge owners to have their horses, donkeys, mules and other equids vaccinated against this form of 'sleeping sickness' which continues to spread westward," said Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). "To gain protection against the virus, however, equids need two injections of WNV vaccine administered at least three to six weeks apart. The animal will not develop full immunity for about four to six weeks after the second injection." Dr. Logan advised owners to further protect horses with insect

repellents, and if possible, house the animals at night in stalls with screens to prevent contact with potentially infected mosquitoes.

"Likewise, we urge residents to apply insect repellents if they are going to be outside when mosquitoes are active," commented Dr. Joe Garrett of the Zoonosis Control Division of the Texas Department of Health. "There is no vaccine for humans, so disease prevention is our only option. Drain all sources of stagnant water, keep pools optimally chlorinated, and change water in birdbaths daily to prevent mosquitoes from using these sites for breeding grounds. Because some mosquitoes breed in grassy areas, it's also a good idea to keep areas around homes mowed."

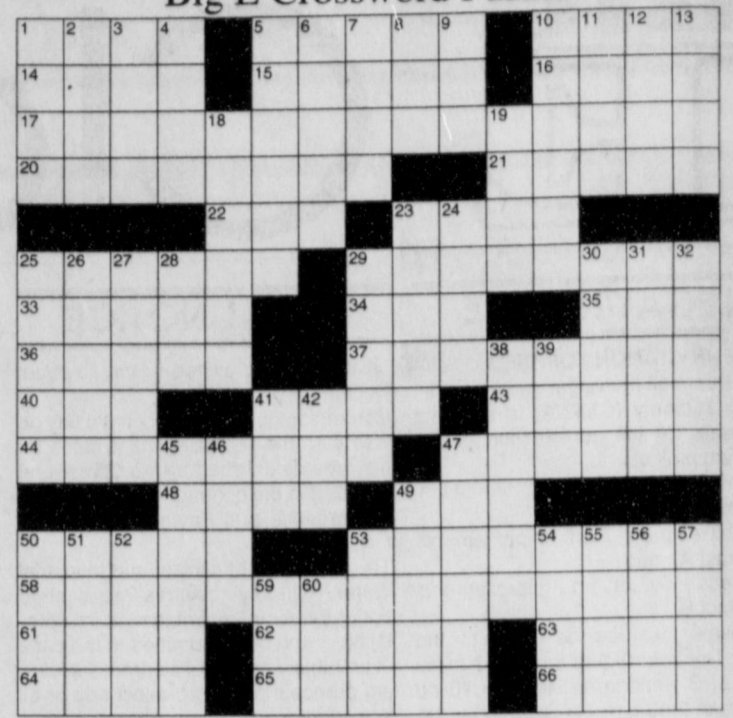
Although blue jays, crows, and more than 70 other species of birds carry the virus, they do not pose a direct WNV health risk to humans or horses, stressed Dr. Logan. She explained that the disease cycle must involve mosquitoes that feed on the infected birds, then transmit the disease to humans or horses.

"We want receive samples of dead blue jays and crows, particularly from areas west of Houston so that we can track the progression of this disease

as it advances westward," said Dr. Garrett. "For surveillance testing at the Texas Department of Health, we need 'freshly' dead birds that have not begun to decompose. If you have a dead bird to submit, call your local health department, or the state office at 1-512-458-7255 for instructions. If you handle the bird, wear gloves to protect yourself against any possible parasites or other diseases the bird may have contracted and double-bag the carcass. Prior to laboratory submission, it's best to place the bird in a cool place, such as an ice chest, to slow decomposition."

"WNV will continue to spread, but like the veterinarian in Haskell County, we need always to consider rabies or other diseases, if animals stagger, are unable to rise, or become disoriented," said Dr. Logan. "Although fairly rare, rabies can strike livestock, and if owners handle an animal stricken with the disease, they must receive preventive medical treatment. It's important to have a diagnosis when livestock become extremely sick or die. If your animals are exhibiting signs of neurological distress, notify your veterinary practitioner and TAHC at 1-800-550-8242."
