Panhandle Economy Hurt in December

Texas' new State Comptroller, John Sharp, sent out a glowing report on the state's economy in February, drawn from December sales tax receipts. His upbeat report overlooked West Texas in general and the Panhandle in particular.

In fact, much of the state-wide gain was due to new taxes and increased taxes in over 65 Texas cities.

The statistics report a 12.4 per cent increase in sales tax receipts, but that includes new taxes that were not collected earlier. December receipts normally represent a large percentage of the annual total for most places.

Donley County's figures were fairly typical for the Panhandle. The county was off 2.28 per cent for December, off 2.69 per cent for the year. Clarendon's receipts were off 2.04 for December, off 2.40 per cent for the year. Hedley was down by 14.74 per cent for the month, down 14.74 for the longer period.

Armstrong County (Claude) slipped by 4.53 and 10.06 percent. Briscoe (Quitec and Silverton) sagged by .86 and 11.49 after poor performances for the last two years. Carson County declined by 7.81 for December and 5.45 for the year. Childress managed a small increase of 3.46 percent for the month, but was 1.18 below 1989.

Collingsworth County (Wellington) was one of the few positive figures, up 5.16 for December and up 4.37 for the 1990. Dickens was also up, 3.13 and 5.45, respectively. Gray County was essentially static at 1.22 for the month, 1.63 for the year. [All of the above figures are unadjusted for inflation.]

Hall County was off .51 for December, but up .69 for the year. Gruver and Spearman led Hansford County to a 5.18 and 9.09 loss. Hardeman County (Chillicothe and Quanah) also retreated, 7.69 and 4.64 per cent below earlier figures.

Hartley (Channing) suffered a 22.4 per cent blow for both December and 1990. Hemphill (Canadian) lost 4.69 from previous December returns, but was up 9.84 for the year. Lipscomb County was down 11.70 and 13.93. Motley turned in negative figures of 13.06 and 12.57. Ochiltree had positive numbers of 3.45 and 4.61. Oldham was minus 17.57 and minus 4.64.

Canyon improved by 17.20 per cent and 8.59 for the year. Roberts County (Miami) was down 9.20 and 10.58. Wheeler had faint mixed signals, +1.26 for December, -0.24 for the year.

Fortunately it appears as though January sales figures will probably set new records in the area. January statistics will be reported in March.

School Board Meets

The Board of Trustees of the Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District met in regular session at 7:30 p.m. on February 14. Members present were Todd Knorpp, Venita Sharrar, Susie Shields, Fred Clifford, Jim Shadle and Phil Fletcher. Johnny Floyd was absent.

Others present were Lewis Riley, Mike Word, Helen Land, Jan Campbell and Beth Sharp.

In routine matters, the board approved the minutes of the previous meeting, approved payment of the bills. The board also acted on several other matters.

The board voted unanimously to approve a motion by Fred Clifford in favor of a board policy establishing a district wide council for school improvement. Phil Fletcher seconded the motion.

In a unanimous vote the board adopted a resolution of the Donley County Appraisal District on delinquent taxes, the discount rate, and other matters.

The board voted unanimously to accept the resignation of Lindel Bailey effective at the end of the 1990-1991 school year.

The board voted unanimously on several financial matters, including a raise for cafeteria substitutes, a raise for Sharon Turville, and a small increase in the budget for testing materials for the counselor.

Venita Sharrar moved to offer a two-year contract to Principal Mike Word; Jim Shadle seconded. The motion carried unanimously.

The board--on a motion by Fred Clifford, seconded by Phil Fletcher--also offered a contract to Lewis Riley, Principal. Motion carried unanimously.

The board then voted to "reluctantly accept the resignation of Lewis Riley, Principal, effective at the end of the 1990-1991 school



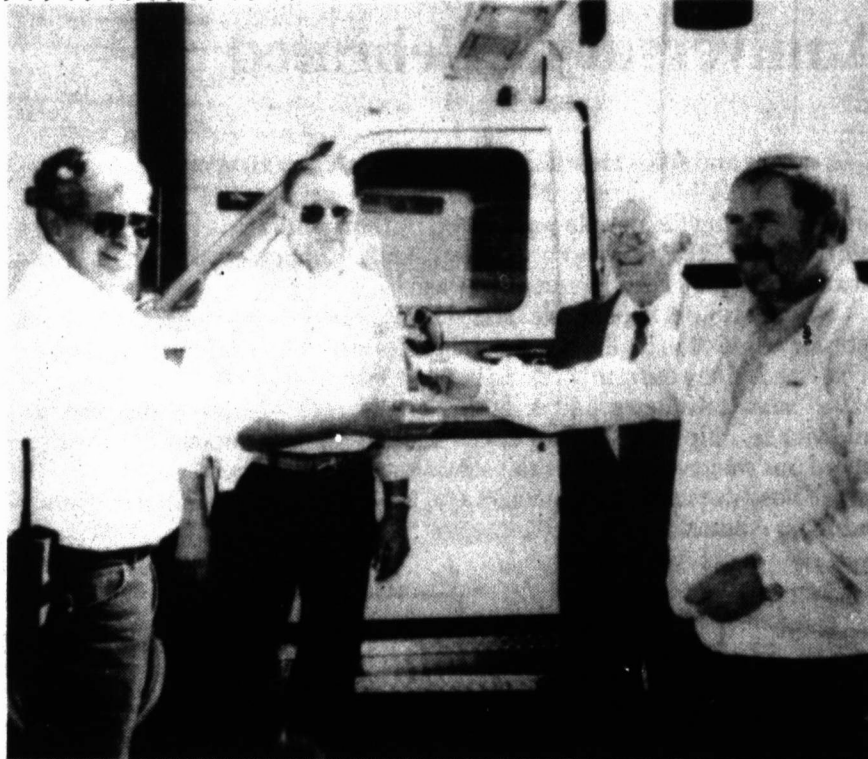

year." Motion was made by Jim Shadle, seconded by Susie Shields.

Fred Clifford moved that the meeting adjourn. Phil Fletcher seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

Clarendon Gets New Ambulance

Associated Ambulance Authority wishes to announce the arrival of a new ambulance received the fourth of February. The new ambulance was driven in from Orlando, Florida where the unit was built.

The new ambulance replaces the 1982 model ambulance, which has well over a hundred thousand miles. The new ambulance was made possible by the Associated Ambulance Authority Board of Directors, which is made up of the Donley County Hospital District, The City of Clarendon and the County of Donley. The Board members are President Lawrance Whitehead, Vice-President Jim Sharrar, and W.R. Cristal Secretary.

Bids were sent to approximately ten ambulance sales representatives the end of 1990. Each representative was sent the specification of what was needed to make it workable for Associated Ambulance Authority. San Antonio Ambulance Sales came in with the lowest bid of \$51,500.00 The company also flew one of the authority members to Florida to see how the ambulance was built. It was hard to find somebody to go to Florida, all expenses paid! But the mayor graciously volunteered to go. At the factory he was shown how the unit was built from the ground up. The mayor did most of the negotiation for the new ambulance.

The new ambulance is a 1991 Ford Diesel Type III, the first for this service and also the first unit built by National Builders in this part of the country. The unit is a modular type instead of the van type that has been used in the past. The unit has a larger patient compartment area than the van type, it has the appearance of an intensive care room. It also has more cabinets than we can fill. The unit also has outside compartments where our larger equipment is stored. This is of great help to them, because most of the equipment that is used at auto accidents is at easy access. It is also possible to be able to use the inside and outside compartments to great advantage. This new unit is also

An Editorial:

The Squeaky Wheel Gets the Grease

The Clarendon News very rarely runs editorials. This is the second one in the last three years. But the December figures from the Comptroller's office bear too obvious message to be passed over.

This region and this area are getting ripped off. The problem is not just that the economic figures for Texas as a whole were much better than those for this region. It is bad enough that West Texas and the Panhandle are left out of the prosperity. But there is more to it than that.

Virtually every county west of Austin sends far more money to the state capital than it ever gets back in services. In other words, poor rural counties are subsidizing rich urban areas like Houston and Dallas. Perhaps it is time for those counties west of 98° West longitude to remind the legislature that Texas does not stop at the city limit sign west of Austin.

If the legislature ignores an appeal for equity, then perhaps it is time for cities and counties from Laredo to El Paso to Dalhart band together.

A poor widow in Donley County does not even have a local hospital to go to in an emergency. Yet her taxes go to Austin to be fluffed off for a concert hall for rich folks in Dallas or a park for yuppies in Houston. That is obviously immoral. It seems likely that the courts might find that it is also inequitable.

Signup will begin March 4, 1991. Estimated deficiency payments will be: Winter Wheat Option 1.40; Winter Wheat Flex 1.47; Corn(\$/bu) .58; Grain Sorghum(\$/bu) .56; Barley(\$/bu) .47; Oats(\$/bu) .15; Upland Cotton(\$/bu) .10.

The advance rate is equal to 40 percent of the estimated deficiency payment rate.

All advance payments will be made in cash.

Planting flexibility and related provisions will be:

Wheat and Feed Grain Bases - The average of planted and considered planted for each of the preceding 5 years.

Cotton Bases - the average planted and considered planted for each of the preceding 3 years. There are exceptions for this if the cotton crop was non-participating in 1989 and 1990 and 1991.

Yields - the program yield will be the same as the 1990 yield.

Triple Base - refers to the (1) crop acreage base, (2) permitted acres and (3) maximum payment acres (MPA). Triple Bases provides that deficiency payment acres shall not exceed 85% of bases minus required set-aside.

Producers may plant certain crops on up to 25% of a participating program crop acreage base. This acreage will be known as "Flex" acres. The first 15% of the flex acres will be known as "Normal Flex Acres" and the other 10% will be known as "Optional Flex Acres". The Normal Flex Acres is required and the other Optional

Flex Acres is the producers option. Together, they will be known as 0/25 Flex Acres.

Permitted Crops on flex acreage are - (1) any program crop, (2) any oilseed as designated by the Secretary, (3) industrial or experimental crops as designated by the Secretary, and (4) any other crops except fruits and vegetables, including dry edible beans, lentils and peas.

0/92 Wheat and Feed and Feed Grain Provisions and 50/92 Upland Cotton Provisions are still going to be available.

All producers are encouraged to attend one of these information meetings.

Tests Available

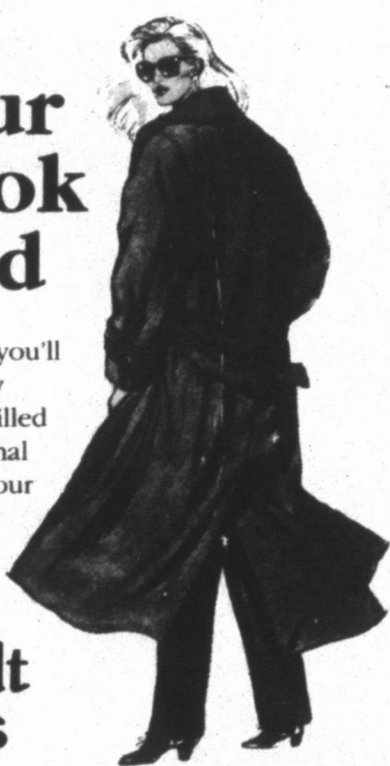

Middle Ear Infections In Children

Infections of the middle ear (called *otitis media*) affect approximately seven out of ten children at least once before their third birthday. By age eight, almost all children have had at least one infection in the middle ear. Children often become irritable and may complain of fullness and pain in the ear. There may be some hearing loss. Some children experience fever as high as 104 degrees with earache. Many of these symptoms result from the presence of bacteria that build up within fluids in the ear. Infection causes tissue swelling which prevents fluid drainage from the ear into the throat by way of the eustachian tube.

The primary treatment of middle ear infections in children involves the use of antibiotics to kill bacteria. Antibiotics commonly prescribed for ear infection include penicillin derivatives and the cephalosporins, a category of powerful and often well-tolerated antibiotics. Steroids (prescription only) may be needed on a short term basis when there is fluid discharge from the ears.

Nonprescription medicines often are useful in dealing with the symptoms of the infection. Fever and pain reducers such as acetaminophen help reduce general discomfort associated with the infection. Decongestants and antihistamines help relieve associated congestion.

Tax Report

Austin, Tex.--"January may be in the middle of winter, but it was the hottest on record at the Comptroller's office," State Comptroller John Sharp said today.

"Texas taxpayers broke all January records by filing \$1.3 billion in state and local taxes," Sharp said. "The first month of the year is historically busy since all state sales taxpayers file returns then, but this

was easily the largest ever."

There were 1.5 million transactions for the month, up 235,000 over last January. Total taxes collected increased by almost \$28 million over last January's record.

"Comptroller employees literally worked around the clock processing returns and seeing that the money was quickly deposited into the state's interest-bearing accounts," Sharp said.

Most taxes processed in January are traditionally for the state's 6 1/4 percent sales tax collected by merchants in cities and counties across Texas.

"These businesses help us keep a finger on the pulse of the Texas retail economy and from their returns, I'd say our economic heartbeat is strong," Sharp said.

Record numbers of fuels tax returns were also filed with the state with almost 8,000 more transactions last month than in January 1990 for a total of 42,560.

Minerals taxpayers also filed a record 147,849 transactions, up 13,807 over last January's total.

Texas taxpayers also filed 124,441 other tax transactions during January.



College Month Set

February has been proclaimed Community College Month in Texas by Gov. Ann Richards.

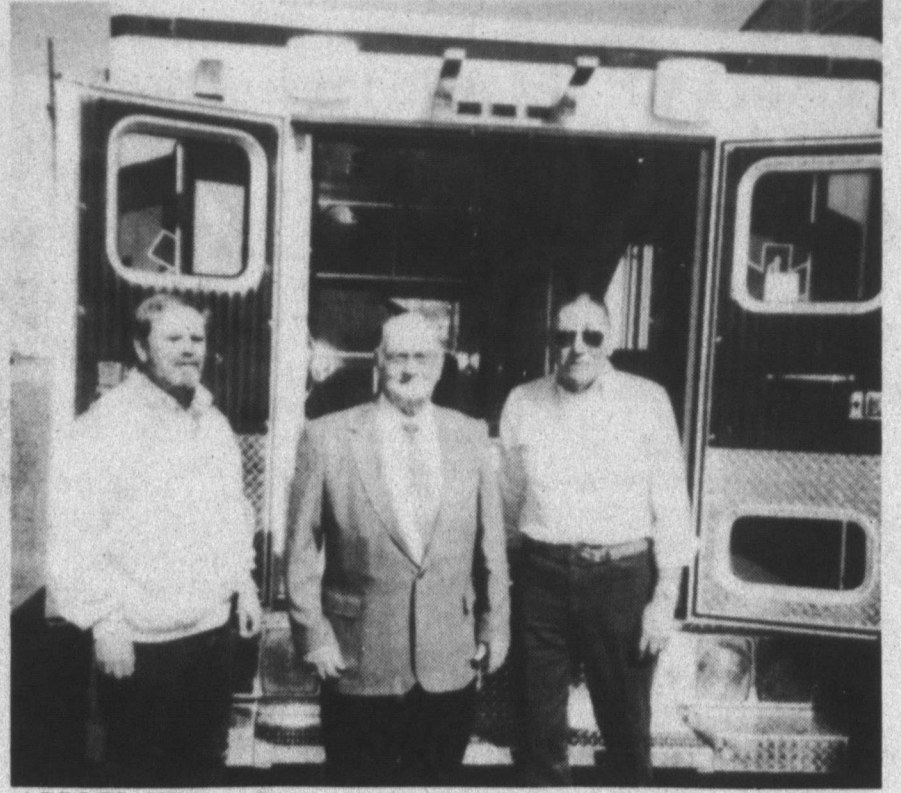

Food Security Act Implementation

"From 1985 to 1990, we scrambled to assemble conservation plans in Donley County," said Jim Donaho, district conservationist for the USDA-Soil Conservation Service at Clarendon.

"We sorely complained of the shortness of planning time. After all, time was short."

Donaho said, "Given that time frame, many producers hurriedly made decisions on conservation practices and techniques unfamiliar to them. Some producers didn't have the proper equipment to carry out their plan."

"1990 was a learning experience for all. Some producers have already plowed up their cover crops and strips. I have been informed this will be a violation in 1991. These plans need to be applied," Donaho said.

"Be advised, the 1985 Farm Bill is not fading away," Donaho added. "If you don't understand, don't fully agree, or just don't can't live with your plan, immediately contact the Soil Conservation Service Office."

Donaho also said, "It's not to late. But, it's imperative to make these adjustments now.170

Plans, or modified plans, must be applied by December 31, 1994. Time is running out along with options.

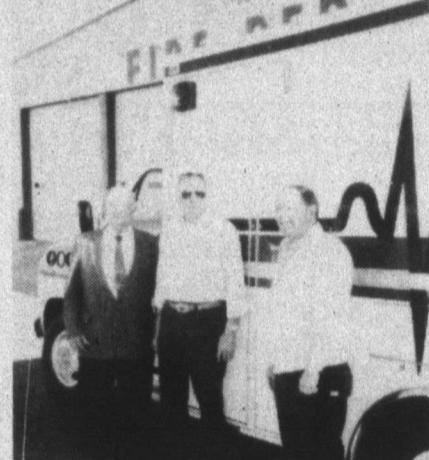

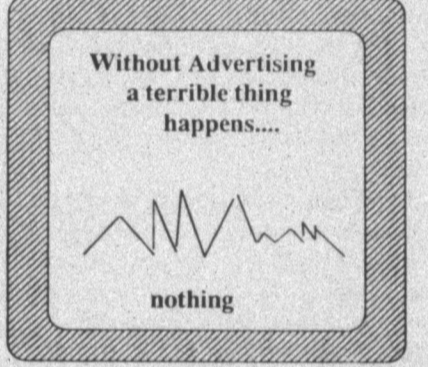
