## Award Recipients Named

Amanda Ward and Buddy Howard have been awarded the national I DARE YOU LEADERSHIP AWARD in recognition of personal integrity, balanced living, and potential for leadership. The honor was presented by Cheryl Pickard at the Donley County 4-H Achievement Banquet on Saturday, October 20, 1990.

The I DARE YOU LEADERSHIP AWARD is made available each year by the American Youth Foundation in cooperation with Principals, Headmasters and 4-H County Agents across the country. The Award was first offered in 1941 by William H. Danforth, founder of the Ralston Purina Company in St. Louis, who dared young people to achieve their highest potential and to influence others through lives of service. The Award takes its name from the book, I DARE YOU, written by Mr. Danforth, in which he commends the balanced life of mental, physical, social, and spiritual development as the backbone of leadership.

In addition to a Certificate of Recognition, Amanda and Buddy received a copy of Mr. Danforth's inspirational book, *I Dare You*, and a scholarship opportunity to attend the American Youth Foundation's National Leadership Conference at Camp Minwanca in Michigan or Camp Merrowista in New Hampshire. Over 8,000 schools and 4-H programs participate in the I DARE YOU LEADERSHIP AWARD each year.

In 1924, Mr. Danforth helped establish the American Youth Foundation, a non-sectarian, not-for-profit organization committed to the service of youth through summer camps and leadership conferences.

Amanda is the daughter of Leon and Carole Ward of Hedley. She is President of the Charter Hedley 4-H Club, and is active in FFA, FHA, basketball, and UIL Drama. She is President of her class, and is a cheerleader.

Buddy is the son of George and Sue Howard of Clarendon. He is President of the FFA, Spanish Club, and the Junior Class. He plays varsity football, and is a member of the National Honor Society.

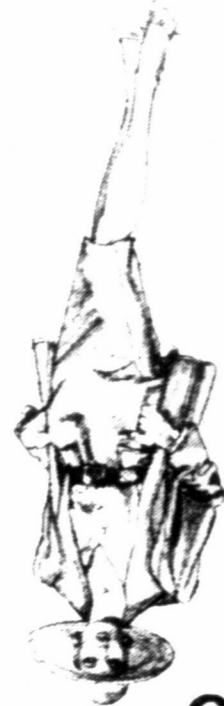
The newspaper offers a heartfelt "Congratulations" to each student on either list. All the students on the honor roll deserve the respect of their peers and their neighbors.

## To Your Good Health

Over the years there has been a tendency for Christians to confuse preaching (spreading the Good News to those who have no heard) and teaching (the on-going instruction of the saints). The result of this confusion has been to weaken both preaching and teaching.

A poor job of teaching leaves believers in a stunted, unhealthy condition. Sickly Christians not only fail to thrive, but they cannot do the work that God has laid out for them. That is why the Bible speaks of "sound" (i.e. healthy) teaching.

Over the years many myths have developed about "sound doctrine". Tradition has given the word "doctrine" an ecclesiastical meaning that is not found in the original language of the New Testament. Doctrine means theory, theology, or parroting the right creed.

By contrast, the Biblical meaning of healthy teaching is "how to do it". Healthy teaching is practical instruction in how to live a Christian life on a day-to-day basis.

The ultimate goal of such teaching has nothing to do with a perfect theory of the organization of the church or a correct doctrine of the Second Coming. While these may be important, the vital matters are those that help a Christian become Christ-like.

How does one tell whether teaching is healthy or not? The simple test is "Does it produce disciples who pattern their lives after that of the Suffering Servant?" That is really the mission of the Christian teacher: he is to produce apprentices of the servant Messiah.

"Your attitude should be the same as Christ Jesus, who, being in the very nature of God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking on the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness and being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death, even death on a cross." --Philippians 2:5-8.

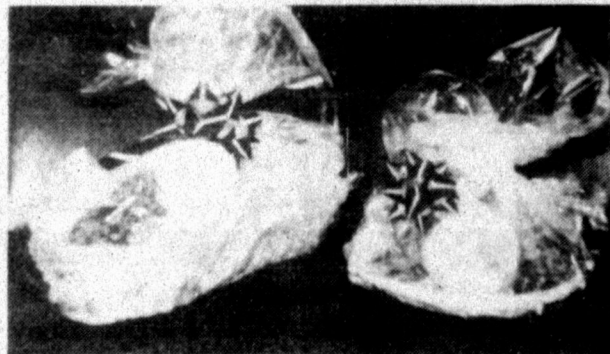
