# Sales tax rebates decline locally

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered \$378.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments last week.

So far this year, sales tax collections in Texas cities were lower. Local rebates this month were mixed as Clarendon and Hedley were down, and Howardwick was up.

Clarendon's rebate was \$23,702.80 for the month, a decrease of 6.8 percent from last year. Hedley was down 39 percent to \$547.24. Howardwick's rebate rose 3.7 percent to a total of \$1,107.50.

For the year-to-date, statewide city sales tax rebates are down 1.3 percent compared with 2001.

August sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in June and reported to the Comptroller in July.

# Safety programs are reducing gun accidents

## By James Dark

The recent study released by the David and Lucille Packard Foundation stating that gun safety programs have done little to reduce the toll of 20,000 children killed or injured every year in the United States is a classic case of looking only in the most superficial manner at a problem and its likely solution. However, you can bet that the authors who prepared the study would not be interested in giving an appropriate look at the facts since the resulting information would not fit their pre-determined conclusions.

The gun safety programs used in the United States, including the NRA's Eddie Eagle program, are designed to keep guns out of the hands of children. Its focus is on children of elementary school age. It is designed to teach that a gun is not a toy and for children to notify an adult if one is found. It is funded by the National Rifle Association and is widely used by law enforcement agencies across the United States.

Primarily it is designed to prevent accidental shootings by children playing with firearms.

According to the academics working for the Packards, this program is not effective. However, recent studies by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention show a dramatic decrease in non-fatal firearms related injuries for all age categories for children and adolescents, with a similar decrease in accidental firearms fatalities. These numbers have reached an all-time low in 2000. Six hundred accidental firearms deaths (of all age groups) in 2000 is a 25 percent drop since 1999, 58 percent drop since 1990, and the lowest raw number of fatalities since records began being kept in 1903.

The Packard Foundation used a variety of statistical trickery to make its case. To show the largest number of injuries possible, it used "firearms related" injuries, which includes a wide variety of injuries other than gunshot wounds. Included in this category are gunpowder burns, recoil injuries, and even getting pistol-whipped.

But most important of all, it relied on the oldest trick in the book used by those calling for safety to our "children."

It came up with an odd definition of "child." In its cry for action, the Packards cited that "Each year, more than 20,000 children and youth under age 20 are killed and injured by firearms in the United States." Children? Under 20? Am I the only one who sees something wrong with this picture?

The largest part of the problem is firearms that are used for crimes of violence by our "children." Accord-



They want to create "Safety Regulations" on the sale, manufacture, and design of firearms. In the detail of their proposal, you will see that the call is really for more oversight of dealers, tracking private gun sales, licensing gun owners, and conducting the registration of all firearms. It's just the same old call for gun control, bundled up in a neat little package to protect our "children.

They want to pass laws compelling parents to take responsibility to protect children from firearms. Perhaps they are unaware that Texas already has had such a law on the books for several years.

Interestingly, they call for law enforcement and community-based programs to teach our "children" that gun violence is not acceptable. This program would identify "at-risk" youths and connect them with services before they turn bad. This doesn't sound like a bad idea and should be looked into.

What is abundantly clear is that the measures being called for by the Packards to control firearms will only end up affecting law-abiding citizens, not the criminals who are the root of the problem. The "children," and other criminals, who are committing these crimes will continue to get their firearms from their traditional sources. They will steal them. New rules on dealers, private transfer, registration, or licensing will have no effect, for the simple reason that these people don't follow laws in the first place. That's why they're called "criminals."

But what is most interesting is that real, appropriately analyzed unspun statistics prove that accidental death rates by firearms have never been lower. They have dropped precipitously in the last decade. The one major change that has occurred in that decade is that the United States' gun manufacturers have poured millions of dollars into safety programs (most of them not mandated by law) to make firearms safer.

#### And it has worked.

It is very ironic. The programs being pursued in the United States to stop accidental deaths by firearms are proving to be dramatically effective.

And that's the one thing that the Packards call "ineffective."


# Punish corporate greed to restore economic trust

In the summer of 1996, Congress passed a landmark piece of legislation that reformed the Nation's welfare laws and system. Among other things, this bill put time limits and work requirements on those Americans who collect a welfare check from the federal government. The intent was to put some accountability into the system and instill a sense of responsibility into welfare recipients' lives.


Six years later, the words accountability and responsibility are being heard again. But this time, the words are not being used to describe those who are trying to make ends meet and are looking to the federal government for help. In the summer of 2002, the words accountability and responsibility are instead being applied to those on the other end of the income spectrum - those CEOs and corporate bosses who, through accounting gimmicks and other distortions of the truth, have cheated the system and taken

thousands of people for a ride. By now, the story is all too familiar - a high-flying company that by the end of the 1990s was reporting record profits declares, seemingly out of the blue, that those profits were not a record after all and, in fact, may have been quite a bit lower than originally reported. The company CEO blames the accountants, and the accountants blame the CEO. Suddenly, a company that had once been everyone's favorite on the stock market finds itself on the verge of collapse, and the company's employees who had been planning for an early retirement now find themselves out of a job.

The Howardwick Board of Aldermen met in regular session August 13 in the Howardwick City Hall


Curtis Campbell of the Red River Water Authority discussed the need to increase the city's water rate. The board took no action and will reconsider the matter at the next meeting.
