#### Clarendon, Hedley tax rebates rise

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn delivered \$264.9 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit systems, and special purpose taxing districts, a 2.9 percent decrease compared to April 2002. But two Donley County cities saw

The City of Clarendon's rebate increased 7.84 percent to a total of \$16,137.92, and the City of Hedley posted a gain of \$178.42 for a total rebate of \$472.87.

Howardwick was down from \$939.40 for this period last year to \$776.54.

o far this year, local sales tax rebates statewide are down 1.8 percent compared with the first four months of 2002.

#### **Deputy recovers HISD** computers

A quick investigation by a Donley County sheriff's deputy resulted in the return of two computers stolen from the Hedley Public School.

School officials reported April 8 that two laptop computers had been stolen from a mobile computer cart, and Chief Deputy Randy Bond vestigated the case.

Bond said the suspects d used a rock to keep a gym door from closing securely and ined access to the school uilding that way.

The deputy's investigation sulted in the April 9 arraignent of three 14-year-old veniles, each of whom were iced by County Judge Jack Hall to 120 hours community service at the Hedley school.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn praised his deputy and said his ears of experience had paid off in the quick resolution of this case.

# Penn & Teller reveal the truth behind hysteria

If you enjoy this column, then you probably will enjoy a great new television program starring Penn & Teller on Showtime. Due to some language, it isn't a program for all ages as you might be able to guess from the title Penn & Teller: Bull\*\*\*\*. (The asterisks are my own... this is a family publication after all.)

The duo, which gained fame for pulling the curtain back on magic tricks, has now taken to debunking every stupid thing in our society. Time and time again they show how many Americans have no common sense about them and how most lack a basic grasp of science. For critical thinkers, the show is like manna from

In recent weeks, Penn & Teller have taken on topics from bottled water to second hand smoke. The show reveals all kinds of charlatans and frauds for the modern day snake oil salesmen they really are and are never afraid to just come out say when someone is full of B.S. The show's Web site says Penn & Teller are "there to aggressively shoot down whack-jobs and fuzzy thinkers, no matter where they originate."

I particularly loved the episode where they did a sting operation on a gal who claimed she could use hypnosis to allow women to use the powers of their mind to expand their... ahem... bosoms. Despite the high price tag, the treatment didn't work. Surprise, surprise.

Last week's episode was particularly brilliant and perfectly timed. Bull\*\*\*\* took on the topic of "Environmental Hysteria" just days before Earth Day.

As my longtime readers know, the environmental movement is mostly a bunch of eco-Nazis who use green policies to pursue socialist agendas. Radical environmentalists are against private property rights, against corporate America, and against capitalism.

Penn & Teller affirmed this with one of their featured guests last week - a man named Patrick Moore. This fellow co-founded Greenpeace and, while he remains committed to a clean environment (as most thinking folks are), he has left his former organization and now tells it like it is.

"They are using sensation, misinformation, and scare tactics," Moore says of the current leaders of the environmental movement. He says his former organiza tion has been hijacked by people who are anti-corporatism and anti-business.

Rich came to mind more than once as I watched Penn & Teller last Friday. They went to some damn environmental march in Washington where most folks didn't even know what they were marching for. They interviewed some nut jobs who couldn't answer any critical questions about deforestation, global warming, or any other trumped up crisis.

But the best part was a petition they started circulating calling for the government to ban Dihydrogen Mon-

Now let's stop for a second. Think about that chemical. Use what science you should have learned in junior high to figure out what it is. Can you do it without read-

Dihydrogen Monoxide is some really nasty stuff. It can kill you if you inhale it. The chemical is a leading cause of corrosion and oxidation of many kinds of metals. It is found in acid rain. It's used in solvents and coolants and is found in nuclear power plants. It's used in the manufacturing of Styrofoam as well as chemical

In a gaseous form, Dihydrogen Monoxide can cause severe burns. It is also linked to sweating, frequent urination, vomiting, and diarrhea.

Most disturbing is the fact that Dihydrogen Monoxide can be found in every home in America, and "the children" are constantly being exposed to it.



## Hospital board hears report of proposals facing indigent care

The Donley County Hospital Board met in regular session April 15 in the Conference Room of the Medical Center Nursing Home.

Administrator Alan Graham reported that new computer equipment at the Associated Ambulance Authority is now operational and appropriate personnel have been trained on new software. Graham said the ambulance service staff is now submitting claims that could not be billed previously due to computer problems.

The census for the nursing home was reported at 46 residents

Board member Jerry May discussed the idea of producing a budget variance report. He will work with the administrator on this idea.

In the Indigent Care report, Holly Eads said one application had been denied because the applicant was a resident of Amarillo. Another application was denied for having income above the guidelines.

Eads said she had a attended a County Indigent Health Care Program meeting in Canyon where current pending legislation was discussed. There is a proposal to repeal spending caps, raise the maximum income limits for eligibility, and add a \$5 charge to motor vehicle registrations. She said other legislation would remove funding to the Texas Department of Health for indigent care programs, which would include training.

In other business, the board accepted bids on delinquent tax property for three lots in Howardwick.





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Election officials counted the returns three times Saturday to prevent any calls for recounts and even double-checked their figures on Monday just to be sure.




The Broncos scored two runs in the first inning and then scored again in the third and fifth innings. They committed only one error while the Skyrockets had three.
