Panhandle Transit Available

Panhandle Transit is active in all twenty six counties of the Panhandle, stated Robbie Hill, Regional Manager. The local Panhandle Community Service office takes calls and schedules with other Panhandle Transit vans to get clients where they desire to be on time and in a comfortable manner.

The Panhandle Transit van runs from Childress to Amarillo three days a week. They pick up passengers on the trip up from Childress. The Wellington van meets the van in Memphis and also Memphis people may board for the trip on to Hedley, Clarendon, or Claude, wherever they have someone scheduled to be picked up. Also, the Turkey Van brings persons over on Monday, Wednesday, or Fridays as need be to complete the trip to Amarillo on the van for Childress.

If the need arises for a wheel chair van, the Childress van is equipped. On Tuesday or Thursday either the Wellington, Turkey or Clarendon van maybe taking persons into Amarillo for medical attention or other needs.

By utilizing the other vans from other counties the Clarendon van is in Clarendon most of the time for local needs.

If you desire a ride to the post office, beauty shop, library, grocery store, Senior Citizen's, bank, to take a child to school or just to visit someone, they are here to take you. The transit van is here for all transportation needs not just medical trips.

The van can also be taken for trips to Memphis or Pampa. The price for in town trips is \$.50 per one way trip. The out of town fare varies.

A 24 hour notice is needed to schedule your ride for your trip. No emergency runs are made.

Call Panhandle Community Services at 874-2606 or 874-2573 and Carlene Hollar, Center Coordinator will work with you to schedule the best time and type of trip you require.

Cancer Scam Running Again

Con artists are again praying on the generosity of innocent people in the guise of cancer research. And they are targeting small towns for their scam, including Clarendon.

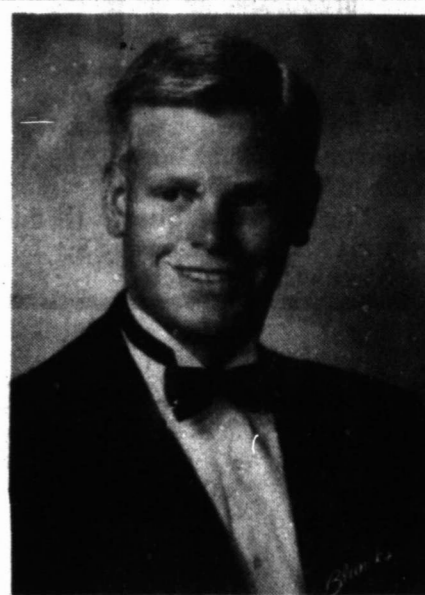
Monday Mrs. Gilkey read Ann Landers' column in the Dallas Morning News. Ms. Landers warned that unscrupulous people were conducting a fund raising drive, ostensibly to help with cancer research. In tiny print on the back, the solicitation revealed that only .96 percent of the funds would actually go for research. The remainder was consumed by "administrative costs". That means that less than a penny out of every dollar donated will actually go to research.

The same day she got a letter asking for money for cancer research. The letter was from one of the organization listed in Mrs. Landers column: Pacific West Cancer Fund, out of Seattle, Washington.

Such scams draw money away from legitimate organizations and bilk the donors.

The only recognized organization that raises money on a nationwide level for cancer research is The American Cancer Society. Before donating to any other "Cancer Funds", it would be a good idea to check with Genivieve Caldwell, President of the local chapter of the American Cancer Society or to check with the County Sheriff. Mrs. Caldwell's number is 874-3792; the Sheriff's is 874-3533.

Among the organizations that Ms. Landers warned about were: Cancer Fund of America, Knoxville, KY., Center for Alternative Cancer Research (aka Project Cure), Dothan AL., Walker Cancer Research Institute, Inc., Edgewood, MD., Pacific West Cancer Fund of Seattle, National Animal Protection Fund of Tulsa, and Social Security Protection Bureau (aka Foxhall Corp. of Washington, DC.

Bust Nabs Three in Hedley

On Saturday afternoon, October 24, about 6:00, law enforcement officers raided a residence and an automobile in Hedley. They arrested three suspects. The three were charged with delivery of marijuana. The suspects were arraigned and taken to the Donley County Jail. Bond was set at \$5,000. One posted bond, but two remained in jail as of press time.

Officers participating in the arrest included Constable Blackie Johnson, Deputy Joe Shadle, Deputy Jake Longan, Sheriff Jimmy Thompson, Warden Gary Hunt and Warden Buck Williams.

Delivery of that amount of marijuana is a third degree felony, punishable by two to ten years in the state penitentiary.

DPS News

Beginning November 1, Texans applying for a driver's license and persons renewing their license or seeking a duplicate will need to show their Social Security card, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Social Security numbers already are required for Commercial Driver's License, which the DPS began issuing in September 1990.

"We think this new policy will make it harder for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver's license," explained DPS Driver's License Inspector John Hall. "This should pay off by reducing crimes where a fake identification is important, like hot check cases. It also should make it much more difficult for a minor to obtain a license with an incorrect year of birth."

Only Social Security cards issued by the federal Social Security Administration will be accepted, Hall said.

"I realize almost everyone knows his Social Security number by heart, but we need to see the actual card issued by the U.S. government, not a commercially-produced metal or flea market card," the inspector said. "If you do not have the government issued card, income tax documents, W-2 forms, payroll or other employer records may be presented."

Applications for DPS Identification Cards also will be asked for Social Security card, but it is not a requirement for the ID card, Hall said.

The inspector said Social Security numbers would not be printed on driver's licenses and were for DPS internal use only.

Signs explaining the new policy will be posted in DPS Driver's License office across the state, he added.

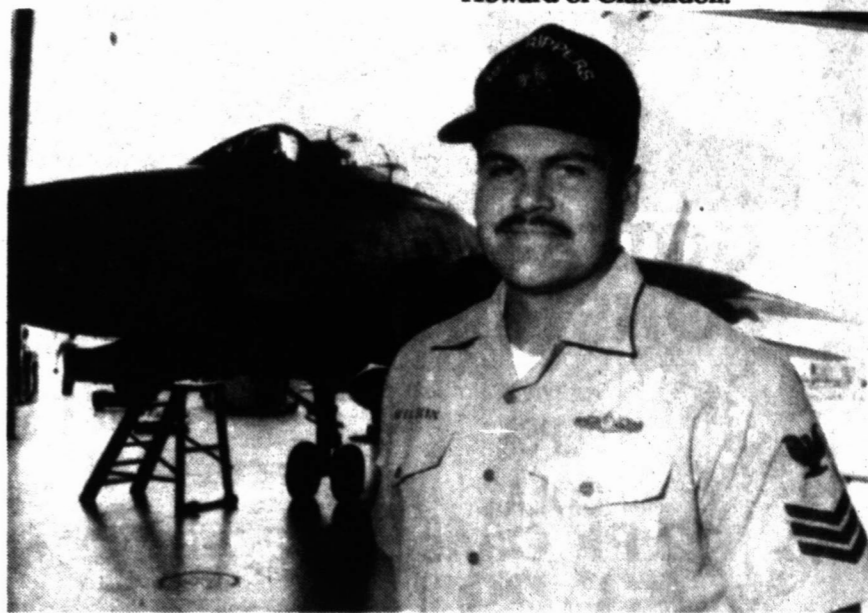

Hankins Honored

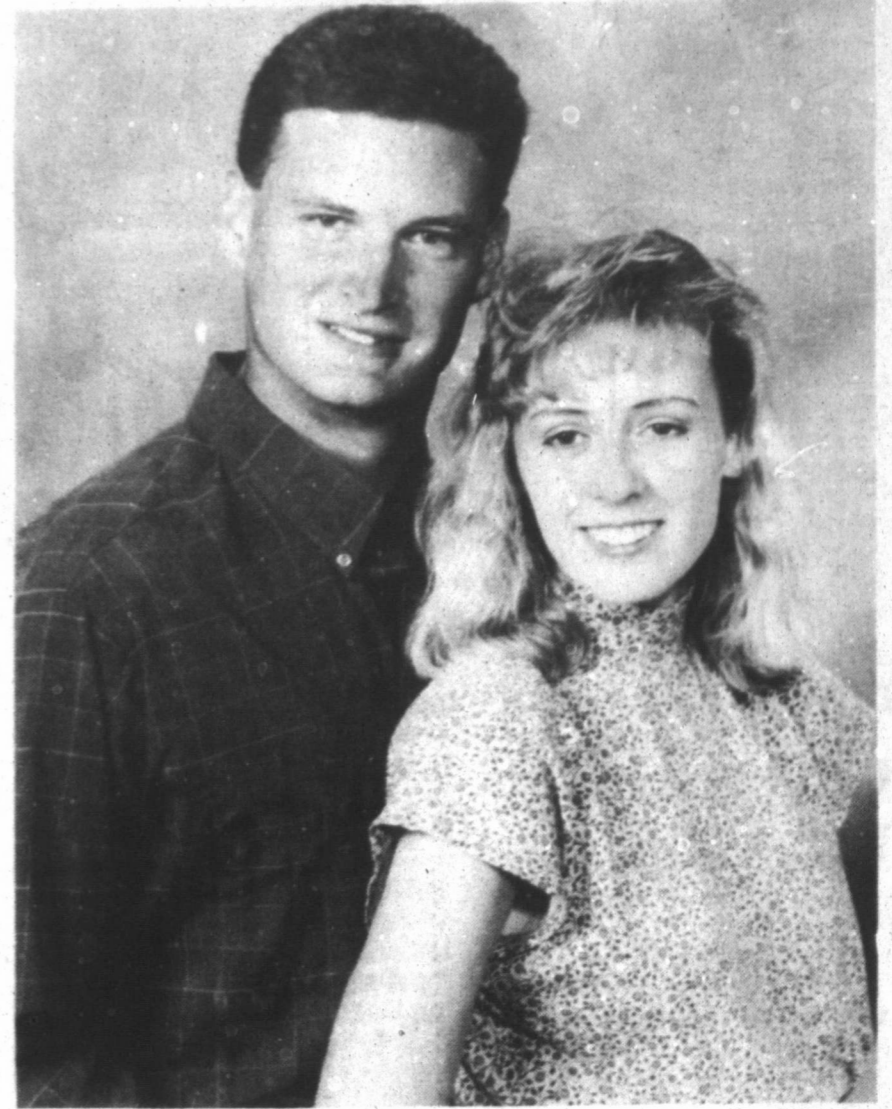
A select group of America's teachers who are being honored by their toughest critics, their former students, in the second edition of *Who's Who Among America's Teachers*, 1992.

What Is

The National Historic Preservation Act?

Continued from last weeks paper. The National Register: The Act authorizes the Department of the Interior to establish, maintain, and expand a National Register of Historic Places. The Register is maintained by the National Park Services; it is a computerized listing of properties that have been nominated and accepted as having historic, architectural, archeological, engineering or cultural significance, at the national, State, or local level. The Register is growing steadily as more properties are identified and nominated each year.

The SHPO: The Act establishes the responsibilities of State Historic Preservation Officer, or "SHPO's," the State officials who

administer the national historic preservation program at the State level. Each SHPO is responsible for developing a statewide plan for preservation, surveying to identify historic properties, nominate properties to the National Register, providing technical assistance to Federal, State, and local agencies and the public, participating in the review of Federal undertakings that affect historic properties, helping local governments become certified to participate in the program, and other activities.

Grants-in-Aid: The Act establishes a program of matching grants-in-aid by which the National Park Service assists the SHPO's in carrying out their work. SHPO's may subgrant portions of these funds to local governments and others for approved preservation projects.

Safety Tips For Halloween

Parents need to be certain their children follow a few, simple safety tips this Halloween so that the festive occasion turns out to be a happy and healthy event.

"Supervised parties at home or school are the safest way for children to enjoy Halloween," said Charles L. Barnton, head of the Product Safety Program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

He warned that if small children go trick-or-treating, they should be accompanied by an adult. The adult should carry a flashlight to show the way and to make the children more visible to motorists.

- Branton offered these additional safety tips:
- * For clear vision, use make-up, instead of masks.
 - * When buying a costume, look for the label stating it is fire-resistant. Costumes should be brightly colored, and dark colored ones should have fluorescent or reflective tape on them.
 - * Teach children not to eat any treats before bringing them home for examination by an adult. Remember, many hospitals offer free X-raying of treats.
 - * Keep children out of the street and never let them run between parked cars.
 - * Parents should control the amount of treats children eat to avoid stomach aches and indigestion.

Branton said that children should stop only at homes with outside lighting and not enter the home of anyone they do not know.

He has some safety tips for homeowners, as well. "Homeowners welcoming trick-or-treaters should turn on their porch lights, restrain their dogs and clear the lawn of objects that a trick-or-treater might trip over," he said.

In addition, jack-o-lanterns and other candle-lighted devices should be kept away from doorsteps and walkways to prevent igniting a costume.

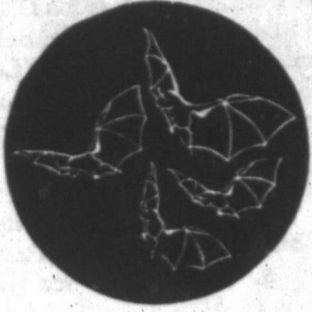

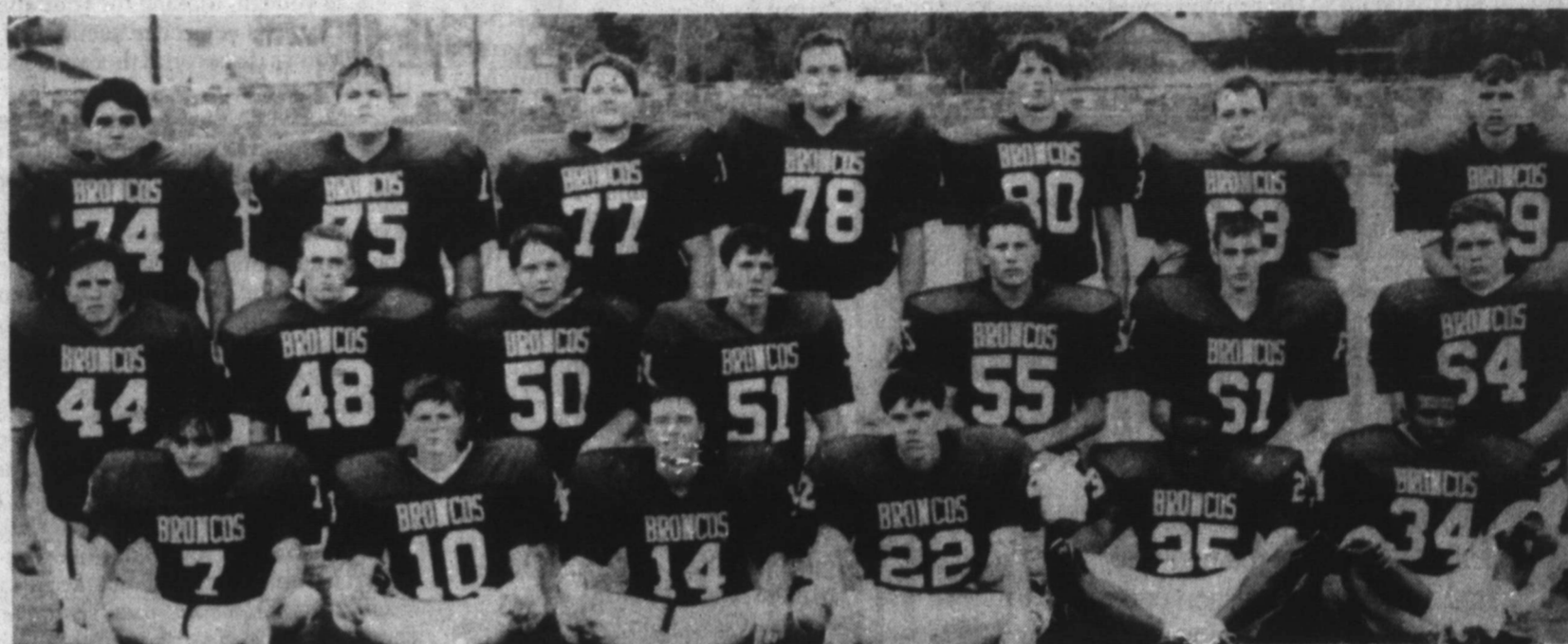

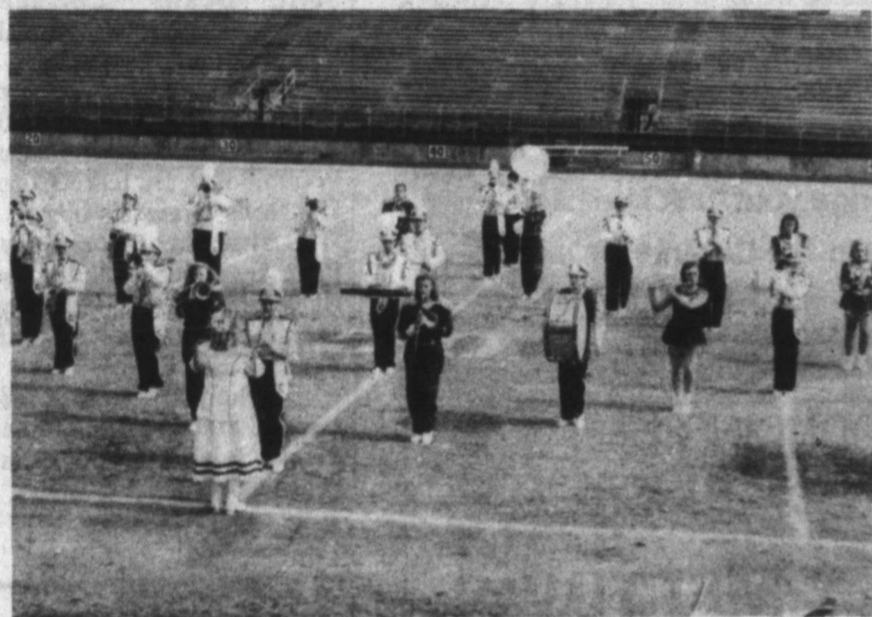

Are you still looking for your special interest in the Burton Memorial Library's reference section? If you have read our two previous articles, you've discovered there are more than one type of reference waiting to be examined.

Mechanics, handguns, art, music, literature are five more examples of the wide variety of subjects that are considered to be references.

There are seven volumes, approximately 1500 pages in each, of Chilton's Auto Repair Manuals. The earliest dates are 1964-1971. The seventh volume covers the years, 1988-1992. These give multiple information on mechanical systems of automobiles from American Motors, Chrysler Corporation, Ford Motor Company, and General Motors.

Handguns of the World by Edward C. Ezell contains research of the years, 1870-1945. It begins with military weapons from which many handguns have evolved. Over 1000 photos and drawings accompany the written information on 692 pages.

Have you artists ever wanted to visit the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, founded in 1880? If an actual visit isn't possible, Howard Hibbard's book with the same title is bound to suffice. This beautiful reference describes and illustrates many masterpieces and curiosities with 1,050 illustrations of which 608 are in color. You who really have an appreciation of art will not be disappointed in this reference. Artists' Handbook of Materials and Technique by Ralph Mayer relates information concerning oils, tempera, mural painting, pigments, water color, mediums sculpture, and synthetic materials, and is expressed to sharpen the artist's skills.

International Encyclopedia of Music and Musicians, edited by Oscar Thompson, includes a list of over one hundred names of those who have contributed vast musical knowledge to you who are interested.

"Showboat", "West Side Story", "Oklahoma", "Porgy and Bess" are only four of the classic Broadway Shows that are discussed in Broadway Musical by Martin Gottfried.

Good, interesting reading can be found in the reference section as well as in any other part of the library. Why not check it out?

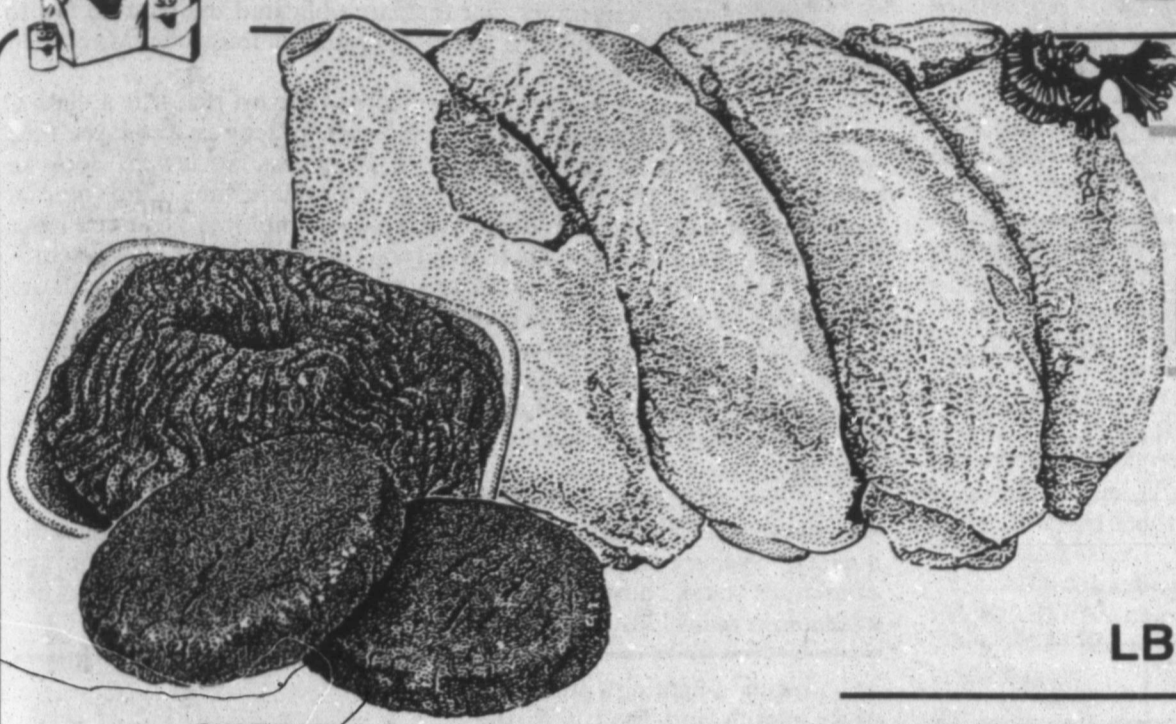

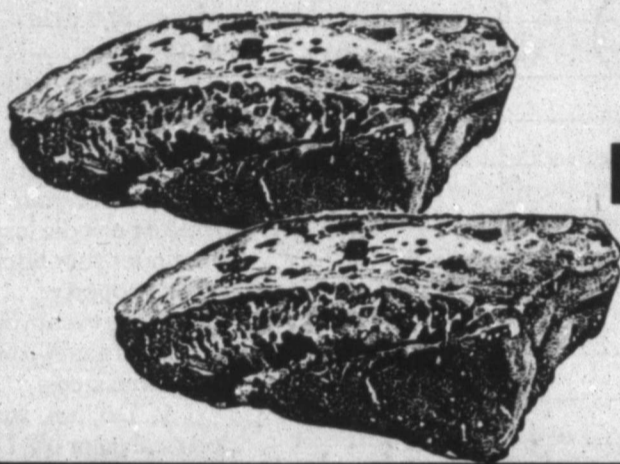

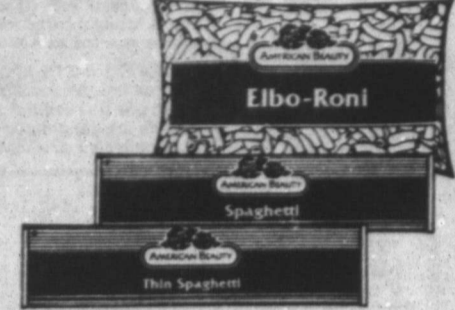

**Employers Must Allow Employees
Time Off To Vote**

As the November election approaches, it is important for Texas employers to remember that they are obligated under state law to provide employees time off from work to go vote, Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said today.

"It is always a surprise to some people to learn that it is a class C misdemeanor under state law for an employer to deny an employee time off to vote," Nabers said. "Likewise, it is against the law to dock an employee's pay or threaten to reduce wages for taking time off to vote." A reduction of wages includes deducting from an employee's accrued leave for illness or vacation time. There is only one exception to this law, according to Nabers. Time off from work to vote is not required, if the polls are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., an employee is not covered by the law if he:

- gets off work on or before 5 p.m.
- is scheduled to arrive at work on or after 9 a.m.
- is allowed a two-hour lunch break

State employees, however, are always entitled to time off from work with pay to vote.

"Sometimes employers strongly object to allowing employees time off with pay to vote. It is, however, the law and the foundation of our democratic society," Nabers said. "One option employers have is to encourage employees to take advantage of early voting locations. These booths are available in many locations from grocery store to shopping malls."

When re-lighting a pilot light, strike match and hold it to the opening first. Then slowly turn on the gas.

 2. Have everyone leave the house immediately, leaving the doors open for ventilation.
 3. Go to the nearest telephone and call Lone Star Gas Company. Wait until they have found the cause of the odor before returning to your home.

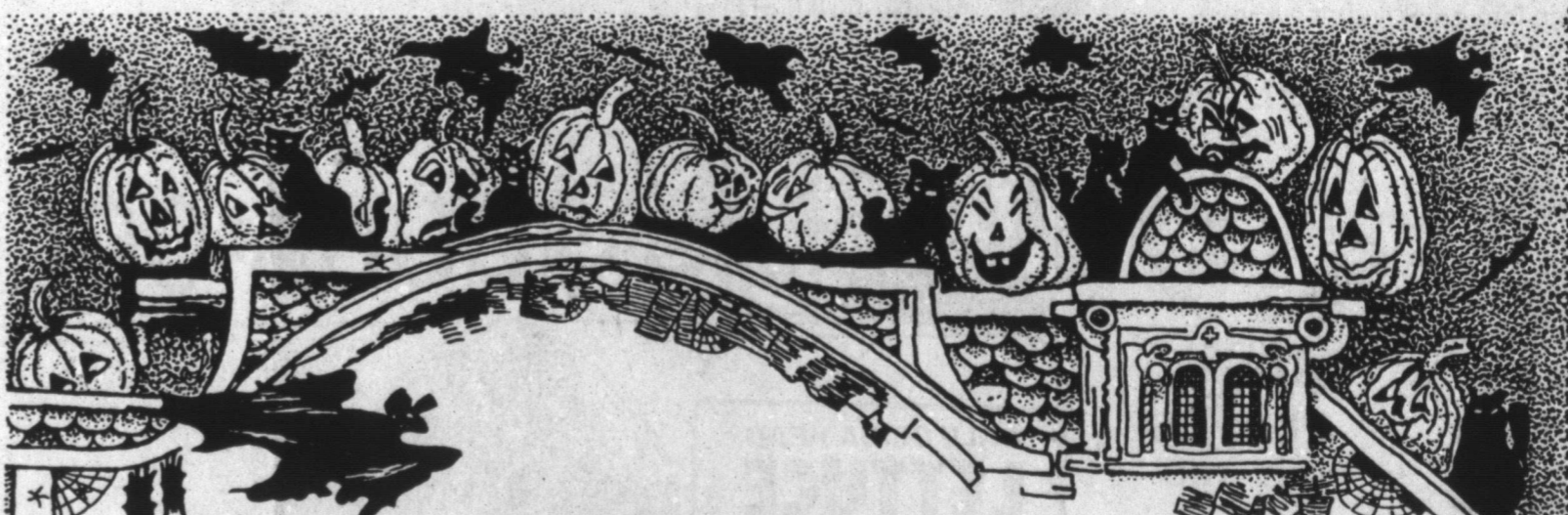

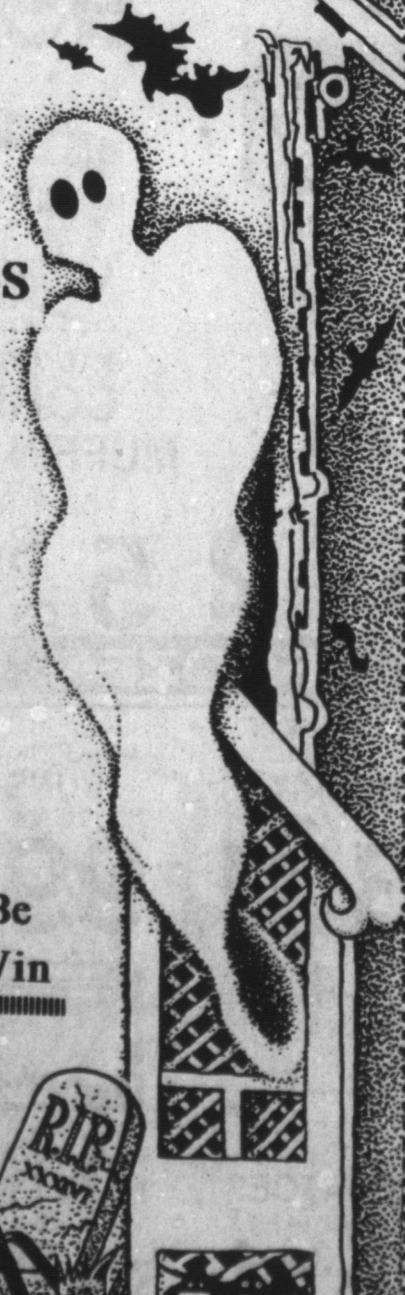

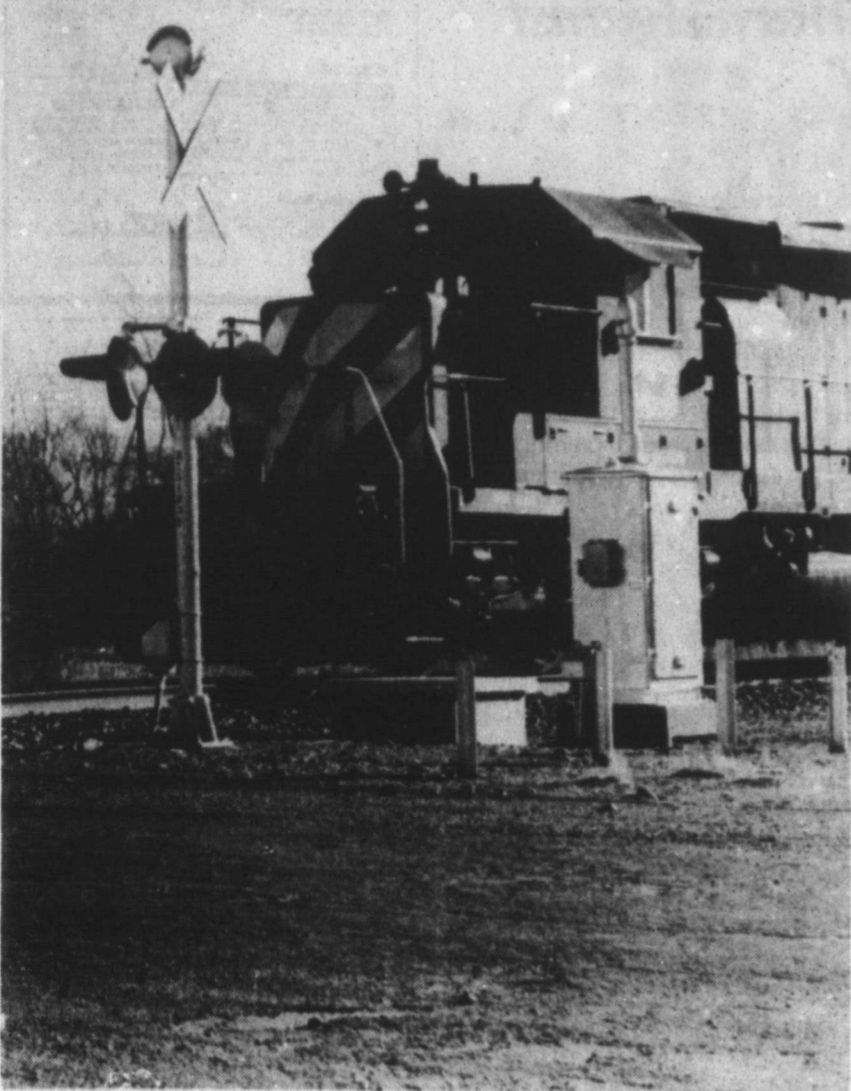

Where Are the Signals?

In the last six months, Clarendon citizens have called the newspaper with increasing frequency, asking why no progress is visible on crossing signals on Ayers Street. The paper has no answer for that question.

At least two people have died at the crossing, and others have been seriously injured.

About a year ago, The Federal Railroad Signal Administration, the Texas Department of Highways and the Burlington Northern Railroad agreed on a plan to place crossing

signals on Ayers Street. The government appropriated most of the money for the project and authorized the railroad to order the equipment. Officials expected construction to begin as soon as the necessary equipment arrived.

The railroad has installed an Automatic Block System along the route and increased the speed limit for trains. But there are still no signals on the deadly crossing near the Community Center.

Tree Planting For Wildlife

Most people enjoy the presence of songbirds, deer, and other wild creatures. In the Panhandle of Texas tree planting can support wildlife that adds beauty and pleasure to our lives. Wildlife are attracted to trees and shrubs because they provide the best (and sometimes only) cover in some areas.

Windbreaks when properly designed, offer nesting, roosting, loafing, food, and escape for a variety of wildlife. To attract wildlife, plantings don't necessarily need to be in windbreak, but can be placed in draws, arroyos, or other "unused" areas of property. To be greatest value to wildlife, a tree planting should include a variety of trees and shrubs. Evergreens are especially good winter cover; and deciduous trees provide nesting sites and some food. Certain trees and shrubs are better than others for wildlife.

Those species beneficial to wildlife that are sold by the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District are: Evergreens, Red Oak, Pecans, Little Walnut, Hackberry, Osage Orange, Honey Locust, Russian Olive, Fruiting Mulberry, Caragana, Lilac, Bush Honeysuckle, Cotoneaster, Plum, Sumac, Nanking Cherry, and Sand Cherry. The District also offers wildlife packets that include a variety of trees selected to attract a particular type of wildlife. Each packet includes 100 trees (25 each of 4 different kinds). They have packets for Quail, Pheasant, Squirrel, Turkey and Deer.

All trees sell out quickly so if you're interested in placing an order call 874-3576 or come by the SCS office in Clarendon as soon as possible. They would like to assist you with all phases of tree planting and wildlife management.

Loan Approved

The Texas Water Development Board today approved a \$500,000 loan to Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District No. 3. The loan will be funded through the Agricultural Water Conservation Bond Program. The District will use loan proceeds to make low-interest loans to individuals farmers and ranchers in the district's service area to purchase and install more efficient water conservation equipment.

Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District No. 3's jurisdictional area covers more than 3,672 square miles in northwest Texas, and includes Carson, Gray, and Donley Counties, and part of Hutchinson, Roberts, Potter, and Armstrong Counties.

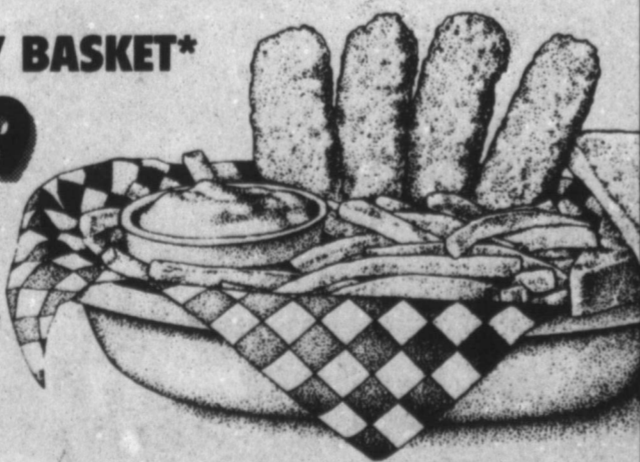

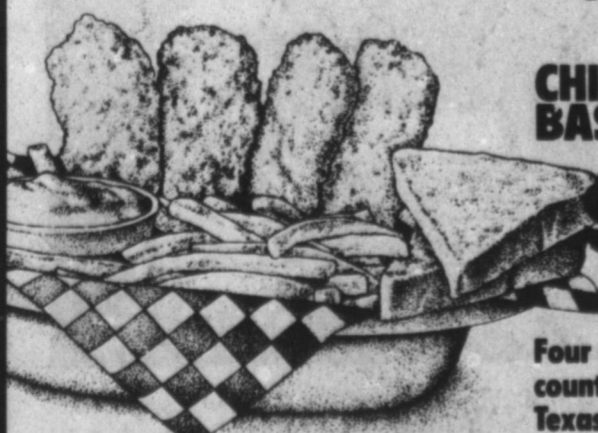

Dear Editor,

The implementation of the "Sheriff of Nottingham" method of school finance (i.e., taking from the small and poor and giving to the big and rich) caused the small, poor independent school districts -- led by Edgewood I.S.D. (near San Antonio)-- and Shallowater I.S.D. in Lubbock County to file lawsuits challenging the plan.

(PDI) and the "Sheriff of Nottingham" plan unconstitutional and demanded that the Legislature come up with a new plan.

At this point, Texans need to understand how government works. If you, as a politician, have given the big, rich school districts something, then it is not politically palatable to take it away. Therefore, the Legislature needed a plan to take from the small, rich districts (which were not receiving any state funds) and give it to the small and poor. So, the big and rich (Dallas, Houston, Austin, etc.) could be left basically intact.

The new plan (Senate Bill 351) involved County Education Taxing Districts (CEDs). These districts would combine several school districts and would give these districts taxing authority for the schools within each district. Hence, the small rich districts were combined with poor districts so the state could take from the local taxpayers in that rich district. In this manner, the previously untouched small, rich districts could be used to protect the big, rich districts.

Once again, here comes the judge.

He says this plan also is unconstitutional. But, believe it or not, the CEDs were allowed to collect this unconstitutional tax for two years - and still are doing so. The Legislature has now been given until June 1, 1993, to come up with a fair plan or the schools will be closed by court edict.

While all of these things were happening (1984 to 1991), bill after bill (205 in one Legislative session), was being passed without any - or only marginal-state funding. The cost of education is being increased dramatically and the local taxpayers are being required to pay. The terminology for this phenomena is "mandates without funding."

Local school boards and administrators across the state are being required to raise local taxes. In many cases, the local taxpayers are unjustifiably angry at their hometown school trustees, but these trustees are required to obey the law.

At this point, the governor comes up with a plan. State spending is skyrocketing. What happens next?

Postal Inspectors Warn Against Tax Refund Scam

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service is warning consumers to beware of a notice in the mail that says the IRS is holding a refund check in your name.

To claim the money, the notice says all you have to do is send ten dollars to an address in Florida. Those who send in ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim form -- something the IRS gives away for free.

Millions of notices have been sent to addresses throughout the U.S., and Postal Inspectors have seized almost \$1 million from accounts belonging to the scam operators. There have been numerous complaints and inquiries in the Texas and Oklahoma areas.

"The postcards are designed to look official," says Paul Griffo, national spokesman for the U.S. Postal Inspection Service. "The bureaucratic mumbo-jumbo makes it appear as though disbursement has been approved. But customers who send in their ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim form--something the Internal Revenue Service gives away for free."

Linda Weiskopf, Assistant Director of the Taxpayer Service Division for the Internal Revenue Service, says there is never a charge to claim a refund.

"If a taxpayer is due a refund, all he or she has to do is call our 800 number, and we'll send them a claim form free of charge."

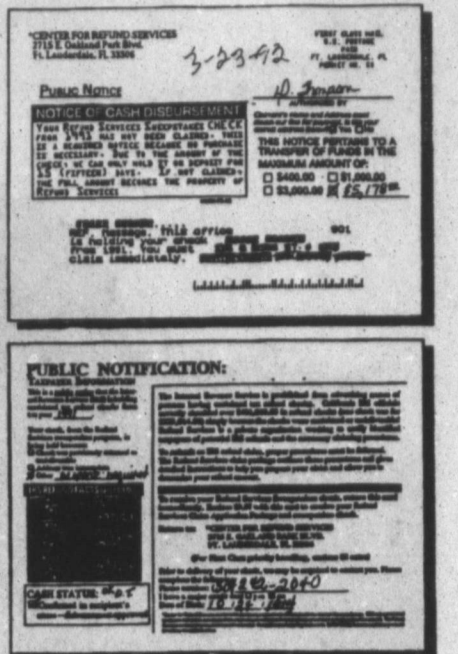
The IRS has a fully staffed 800 number for people who have questions about their income tax returns, including questions about tax refunds.

Meanwhile, Postal Inspectors offer tips to keep you from getting stung by scam artists who make bogus offers through the mail.

"Any offer that requires you to pay a certain amount up front should be looked at dubiously," says John Brugger, a Postal Inspector in Washington, DC. "Be willing to check them out. Make a few phone calls and verify the truthfulness of the offer."

But one phone number you should not call is the 900 number printed on the postcard. Scams that employ this method usually charge high fees to victims who respond by calling.

Finally, Postal Inspectors offer this advice for those who get a postcard promising a big tax refund for a small fee: throw it away.



"We're still making progress, but... I want to make sure it's definite before we announce it," says Hess. "It has to be all sorted out, and we have to have several meetings before it crystallizes." He suggested that more concrete information could be available in early October.

(Note: Plans for building the theme park in Palo Duro Canyon was released to *The Clarendon News* in early October.)

Mike Isley of the Amarillo Credit Bureau also confirms that he is actively involved with the project and that a significant amount of money has already been raised locally to help bring the theme park here. He cautions, however, that the local share would be far less than the original figure of \$8 million that had once been discussed.

"Some wonderful things are happening, but we are right in a sensitive time with a group out of California," he says. "We're just on the verge of having some information that we would love to give you. But come hell or high water, this thing is going to happen."

New Federal Rural Development Agency Opens

The U.S. department of agriculture's new Rural Development Administration will officially open its Southwest regional headquarters in Levelland, Texas on October 30, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm said today.

Gramm said a ribbon cutting ceremony is scheduled at the new regional headquarters in Levelland at 2:00 p.m. on Friday.

The senator said the RDA will administer direct and guaranteed loans for community facilities, including health clinics, fire stations and other facilities; loans for both existing and new rural businesses; and, loans and grants for water and waste systems infrastructure in rural areas.

Many of these programs have been handled in the past by the U.S. Farmers Home Administration and other federal agencies, he noted.

"Consolidating all of the federal rural development initiatives and programs into one agency makes good sense," Gramm said. "Rural development is vital, particularly in Texas, and I am confident the RDA can work closely with rural communities to create jobs and economic growth."

The senator said the regional office in Levelland will also serve the states of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona.

The Levelland office will employ 15 people when it opens on Friday.

RDA loans and grants in the current fiscal year are expected to total more than \$88 million, Gramm noted.

Gramm and Rep. Larry Combest worked earlier this year to establish the new regional headquarters in Texas.

Could An Amarillo theme park steal thunder from the Junction?

For nearly two years, area civic and business leaders have been speaking in hushed tones over prospects for a new amusement facility that could put Amarillo on the map.

They claim they are just on the verge of making their big announcement - but they've been hoping to make it for more than a year. Despite the delays, enthusiasm remains high among the facility's proponents.

There is even speculation that the Thunder Junction project got the cold shoulder in Amarillo because area leaders were aware that a far larger project was in the works. If the Amarillo theme park becomes reality, it could impact Thunder Junction.

At press time, lips were still tight and speculation was running high, but *Observer* sources say proponents are still trying to strike a deal to bring an amusement complex to the edge of Palo Duro

Canyon.

The complex - estimated by some to cost around \$150 million - was originally envisioned to be a large theme park on the order of Silver Dollar City at Branson, Missouri, plus the addition of a scaled-down Indian reservation. As much as \$8 million of the total would need to be raised locally, sources say.

Instead of competing with the high successful musical drama, Texas, the facility would, in fact, include another large indoor theater and an outdoor amphitheater.

Although numerous civic leaders report being contacted by the Disney Corporation's "Imagineers," most contend that the Disney company is not yet involved directly. The effort, they say, is an independent project by people who have worked with Disney.

The effort to launch the project along Palo Duro Canyon has been going on for quite some time.

Michael Borune, executive director of the Amarillo Economic Development Corporation, reports being contacted early in 1991.

"I had some exposure to a project to develop a theme park on property owned by the Curry Ranch," he notes, indicating the the AEDC was informally approached about the possibility of helping fund the project.

Bourne says this type of project does not fit within AEDC guidelines but feels the theme park could attract funding elsewhere. "I

know they are still actively pursuing it" he says.

Franklin Jeffers, President of Coldwell Banker First Equity Realtors, says his contacts with the theme park group indicated the concept had promise.

"They were observing and looking and had some creative plans for what they could do for Palo Duro Canyon," he says. "They had some beautiful excellent and dreamy ideas that I cautiously enjoyed listening to. They visited with quite a few people trying to get a feel for the area."

David Curry, whose property was among those under consideration for the site of the theme park, expresses caution, however. When contacted by the *Observer*, he called the concept still in the "creative stage" and noted that it was still too early to predict the outcome.

"We were approached as land owners," he admits, noting that it was a Disney employee, not the company officially, who approached him. But the ideas expressed, he says, were of quite significant proportions.

"The people in this area aren't used to big ideas...not something this large," he emphasizes. "Everybody is excited about something like this happening."

In recent weeks, all those associated with the project have pointed to Lone Star Ballet director Neil Hess as the them park's focal point. Hess confirms that something is definitely in the works, but declines to give further details.

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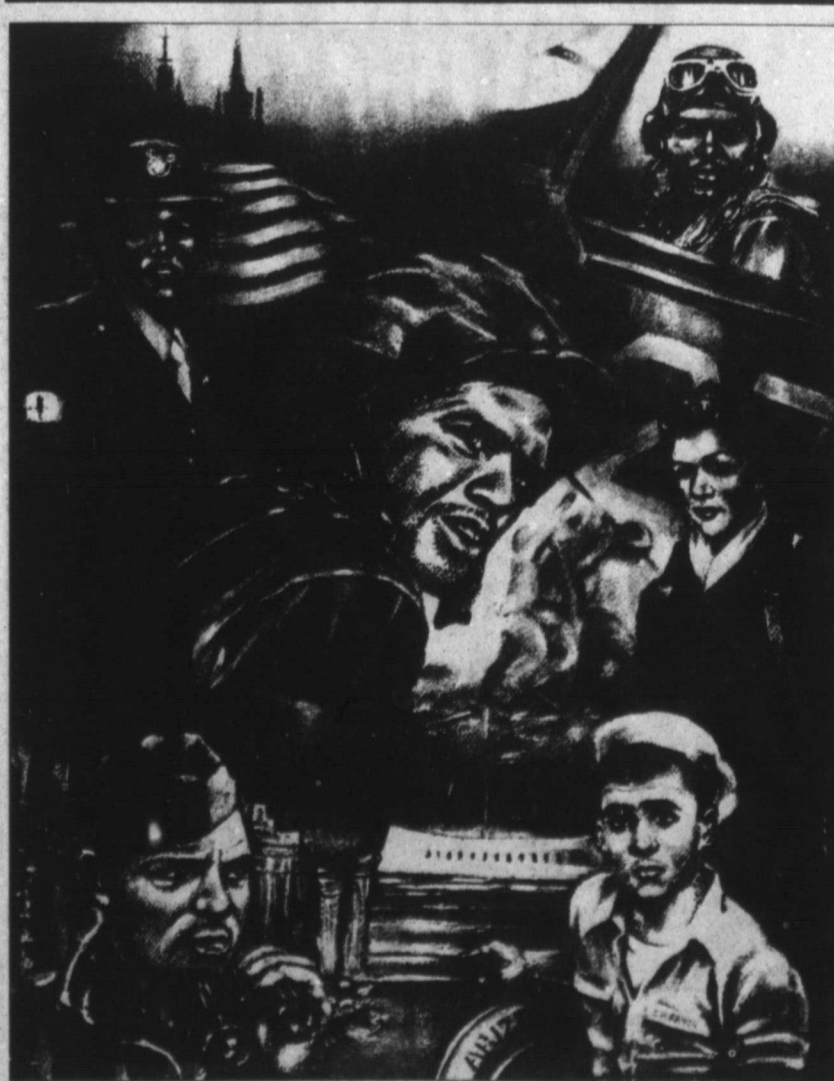

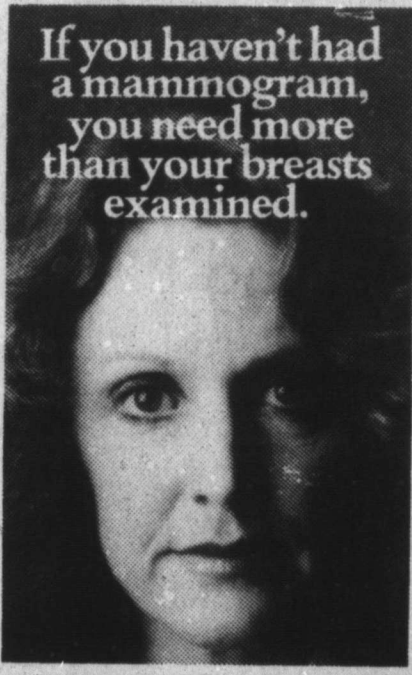
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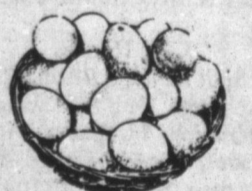
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
