



# **Bush** outlines plan to boost US economy

President Bush unveiled his economic stimulus plan last week, and predictably Democrats are screaming that it only favors the rich and that it will cost too much. "Rich" is of course a relative term since under the Democratic definition, the rich is anyone who has a dollar more than you do. "Cost" is also a relative term. The plan actually prevents the federal government from leeching \$674 billion (with a "B") from the wallets of hardworking Americans over the next ten years.

As you might guess, I'm in favor of the plan.

Bush wants to accelerate and make permanent the tax cuts his administration already got passed in 2001. He also wants to eliminate the tax on stock dividends, claiming that we currently have a system of double taxation whereby the corporation pays tax on income and then the stockholder is taxed again when the dividends are paid.

"I can't see giving away any more of our revenues, which we're doing in tax cuts," said Sen. Lincoln Chafee of Rhode Island

Their revenues? Is it Mr. Chafee and his colleagues who toil long hours to publish the newspaper or harvest the cotton or patch the pothole or educate the school kids? Of course not.

Chafee, who has always been a donkey in elephant's clothing, is looking at things exactly backwards. The money in question does not belong to the government. It is not their revenue. It is mine and yours and that of the family next door. A tax cut lets you and me and the neighbors keep more of our money, and in no circumstance does it become the government's money unless they confiscate it from us through taxes.

There are some places in the world where you automatically know as soon as you think about going there, you are going to do something really, really stupid.







The Bush administration says the average taxpayer will save \$1,083. Two working parents making a combined \$39,000 a year (that would be \$19,500 each) with two kids could realize \$1,100 in relief, according to the president. That's real dollars and cents, and I think most people would like to keep that extra grand rather than give to their Uncle Sam.

Bush also has a profit-based incentive to get people back to work - pay them to get off the unemployment line. That's right, the White House wants to give many - not all - people who are currently out of work a lump sum \$3,000. They can live on it until it runs out, or they can get a job and keep whatever is left.

On this idea, Congressional Democrats expressed their fear that some people may take a "dead-end job" just to get the cash. My question - and I would imagine Bush would ask this also - is this: "Isn't a dead-end job better than no job at all?"

While liberals and the media would lead you to believe there is a current unemployment crisis, the fact of the matter is that the jobless rate nationwide is six percent. Simple math tells you that means 94 percent of Americans who want jobs have jobs.

Employment opportunities abound. We have six listings in our "Help Wanted" section this week alone for positions requiring a wide range of skills. I really cannot remember the last time we printed a paper that didn't have at least one and usually several listings in that category. Add to that the fact that we live in a country where you can always make your own job by utilizing your talents and working for yourself.

Most people can find work if they want to, although it may not be the dream job they've always wanted. Frankly, I'd love a job that pays me \$75,000 a year to read comic books all day. But until I find it, I'll keep working at the newspaper.

So what do the Democrats offer as their solution? Well, first, they're going to keep all the money they are taking from us, and then they want to spend it. (Hmm ... I say we cut out the middleman and spend it ourselves.)

The Dems want to spend, spend, spend on everything you can think of, except the military.

Democrats also want to give a "tax refund".to people don't even pay income taxes because they don't make enough. This will be done, they say, out of general revenue and not out of payroll tax funds or out of Social Security funds.

That isn't a refund. It's a redistribution of wealth, or - more simply put - it's welfare for the working poor.

The Democrat plan calls for extending unemployment benefits with no real incentive to get off the program. They really don't want anyone to get a job - at least not until after the 2004 election. As usual, the two plans come down to the same differences. More government or lower taxes. Ronald Reagan proved tax cuts could successfully help grow the economy. George W. Bush knows that, and his plan will make it happen again.

## Congress acts to improve school system

In America's early days, our founding fathers wanted to do something very different from what they had experienced in Europe. They wanted every child in America to have a quality public education. The standard they set forth more than 200 years ago has been the foundation of our democracy and our economic success.

Unfortunately, in the past few years we have not kept pace with the demand for quality in public education. Creativity and accountability in our public schools became increasingly rare. But last year Congress passed legislation to turn the tide. In the spirit of ensuring each child in America gets an equal opportunity to succeed, it was christened the No Child Left Behind Act. This January we celebrated the one-year anniversary of these landmark education reforms to improve our nation's public school system.

No Child Left Behind set high expectations for our children and our schools. And Congress put its money where its mouth is. The legislation provided more federal dollars with fewer bureaucratic strings for our nation's schools. Last fall when America's children went back to school, so too did millions of dollars in new resources and the mandate that our

nation's schools improve.

We know that parents are one of the keys to a successful education. One of the key components of No Child Left Behind was a series of reforms aimed at empowering parents. An element I introduced was the parents' report card, which provides parents regular updates on the performance of their child's school. Additionally, the law provides immediate new options for parents of students in chronically underachieving and dangerous public schools. The Department of Education has also dedicated part of its website to providing resources for parents. By logging on to www.nclb.gov/parents, Texans can actively participate in their child's education.

No Child Left Behind provides help for all of our nation's schools but gives additional resources to underachieving schools - the ones that need it most. It also implements a variety of reforms from giving teachers tax relief for out-of-pocket



No Child Left Behind triples funding for reading programs proven to work and increases funding for Title I, the largest education program for disadvantaged children, by \$1.5 billion. Most importantly, the legislation acknowledges that states and local school districts - not the federal government - know how to most effectively allocate their resources. It gives all 50 states and every local school district new freedom and flexibility in the use of federal education dollars so that schools can spend the money on the programs and initiatives that work best for their students.

Texas schools experienced a dramatic boost to their bottom line as a result of No Child Left Behind. Federal funds for major state K-12 education programs increased by 23 percent, from \$1.8 billion in 2001 to \$2.2 billion in 2002.

As we move forward and continue to improve our public school system, we will do what our founders intended: level the playing field for each child.



Laws should not be passed for the purpose of assuaging someone's grief. Reason, not emotion, should be the guide in crafting legislation. If you look at the Ohio case rationally, it is clear that the laws already on the books there have worked. A man committed a crime through carelessness, and now he sits in jail because of it.

### New federal law extends benefits for unemployed

AUSTIN - The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) announced recently an extension of the Temporary Extended Unemployment Compensation program (TEUC).

The extension was signed into law January 8, 2003, by President George W. Bush. The extension temporarily provided up to 13 additional weeks of benefits for eligible, unemployed Texans who exhausted their regular Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefits.

The latest extension allows individuals who established a valid TEUC claim and had a balance remaining when the previous program ended December 28, 2002, to draw the remainder of those benefits. Additionally, it allows Texas to continue to establish TEUC claims until May 31, 2003, for individuals who have exhausted their regular UI benefits.
